

With his music knowledge and star connections, JY was popular for a decade on Perth's 6IX before Singo's call from Sydney. (Another blast-

Young by name and young by nature, JY also had a young-looking face and when he was passing through Kalgoorlie it attracted the attention of the local coppers.

"The sergeant reckoned I was far too young to be travelling alone and ordered me back to Perth," he laughed.

Back in Perth at 18 in 1965, JY was hosting TVW-7's pop music show Club Seventeen, the first step in a multipronged career straddling many fields.

While mostly recognised as a pop star (with number one hits Step Back and Caralyn in 1966) and TV host, JY is one of Australia's foremost and successful songwriters.

Sharing a London flat in late 1967 with Barry Gibb, JY was encouraged to write songs. The following year he penned The Real Thing which went to number one for Russell Morris and became one of the biggest-selling hits in Australian history.

The song has also been used in major promotional campaigns for WA tourism, Subaru cars and a European bank.

Other JY-written number one hits are The Girl *That I Love* for Russell Morris. The Star for Ross D. Wylie and I Thank You for Lionel Rose. Another hit was his slower version of The Beatles' track All My Loving which reached number four nationally and became his signature song. A Top 40 hit Lady was written for him by Barry Gibb. continued on page 4

many years that we are going to have an ageing population but little planning by governments has been done to cater for these changing demographics and frankly it is still not being addressed properly.

In the coming state election one in three voters will be over the age of 60. It really is time that that the political parties started recognising the importance of adopting more age-friendly policies.

One such policy, which I believe would be beneficial for the community as a whole, is to abolish stamp duty when selling the family home for those who wish to downsize.

I could get on my political soap box but I would prefer for you dear reader to think about the great influence that older people have as a collective and start using that power to ensure that as people age they are treated in a fair and respectful manner.

Write to your local MP and tell them you are 'having a go' and let them know how you expect older people to be treated. Or write to me -I'm happy to share your thoughts and opinions with the politicians. After all you've paid taxes and are still paying them, if not through income tax now, then through indirect taxes such as the GST.

# Living proof that exercise makes people stronger and helps them live longer

IF someone offered you a magic potion to improve your health and well-being would you take it?

Twins Peter and Gary Hall found that magic potion and have turned their life around.

They told Have a Go News that 18 months ago they were in dire straits, they weighed more than 115kgs each, were taking up to 20 pain killers a day, both were depressed and fed up with life and seriously thinking about suicide.

They had had forklift accidents in the late 1980s and damaged their spines and were told by doctors that there was little that could be done for them.

Their weight spiralled, their health and mobility deteriorated and they became dependent on scooters and walking aids to get around; that was if the pain allowed them to get out of bed.

"Life was pretty grim for us. we had lots of pain, we were really unsteady on our feet, we had developed diabetes and we were really unhappy,' said Peter and Gary.

"We went to our local doctor and he recommended that we start the Living Longer Living

Stronger program. "We came and saw Jetts Bassendean' exer-

cise physiologist Samantha Tran and she worked closely with our doctor and designed a program for us.

"We were both absolute wrecks when we started but Samantha really guided us through, inspired us and showed us the importance of long term goals," said the twins.

"We also made an effort to eat better, threw away the coke, lollies and biscuits, reduced our sugar intake and our portion sizes."

Samantha said she has worked closely with the twins and designed an exercise program which took into consideration their health issues and also what they enjoyed doing in the gym. When they started the

program their T-shirt size was XXL, it's now M. The Living Longer Liv-

ing Stronger program is designed to increase strength and muscle mass, improve balance and is an effective weight management tool.

"We support our members emotionally, physically and spiritually, our door is always open to our seniors," said Samantha. The twins attend the

gym three times per week said Samantha. and they said they'd come every day if they could. twins have for other people?

The miraculous transformation saw them lose 52kgs between them, they now can walk up to 5kms at a time, do not require pick up sticks to get items off the floor and they are able to perform all their household tasks

unaided. Even their 88-year-old Mum has been inspired to participate in the program.

The twins said that they would run into people on the street in Bassendean who thought they were sick because they had lost so much weight but they said 'no' we're just healthy.



With a Logie Award for Best Teen Personality in 1967, JY received three gold records as an artist, was 1966 King of Pop, had six gold records as songwriter and six TV Logie Awards including Logie Hall of Fame and was Go-Set Songwriter of the Year 1970.

In 1990 he was inducted into the TV Week Logie Awards Hall of Fame and in 2010 he was inducted into the Australian Recording Industry Association (ARIA) Hall of Fame by Tina Arena who performed his song, *The Star*. He is the first person to be inducted in both halls.

From 1971 to 1989, JY hosted and pro-duced Australia's longest-running continuous TV show, Young Talent Time. Forty-two kids appeared as regulars between 1971 and 1989. Some are now household names: Jamie Redfern, Debra Byrne, Dannii Minogue and Tina Arena.

"In those days we just met the challenges as they presented themselves. It was a hectic pace but it brought the best talents out of everyone," says JY who also established Johnny Young Talent Schools for performance arts across Australia (still operated by JY's first wife) in 1979.

"I guess I'm still rising to the challenges. The main thing is, I'm still breathing," he joked.



# **COTA WA has** a new CEO

MARK Teale is the new face at COTA WA and he's raring to go.

"I'm very excited to have the opportunity to lead COTA through the changes that are taking place in services for older people. I'm also excited to be working with staff, volunteers and board members, many of whom I've worked with before,' he said.

"COTA needs to be a strong voice for older people in WA. It is exciting and a lot is happening.

"My first task is to fully understand the key issues for our membership and the political landscape.

"À state election is coming up next month and we are having a forum where members can meet politicians face to face and raise the key issues that impact on them.

"Baby boomers are retiring and their expectations are very different from earlier generations. Key issues are the cost of living, access to affordable housing and creating an age-friendly community.

Most people want to age in place and for that we need to address issues such as public transport. Big changes are coming to Home and Community Care (HACC) and we are seeing the implementation of selfdirected care.

Health is a major issue, including mental health, which is often neglected in older people.

'The main purpose of COTA is advocacy, policy development and being the voice of older West Australians, but we also have a service role.

A series of seminars

were held with Dr David Cook, computer scientist and head of Edith Cowan University's Security Research Institute, teaching seniors how to avoid becoming victims of cybercrime.

Three COTA staff members work with the Seniors Housing Centre providing advice on housing and assistance for those seniors already living in retirement villages.

COTA also sponsors the Living Longer, Living Stronger exercise program for people aged 50 and over.

"There is strong evidence that strengthening exercises helps people successfully," age he said.

# Lifestyle changes could prevent nearly all strokes



On average, high blood pressure contributes to 48 per cent of the risk of stroke

#### by Frank Smith

A STUDY of 27,000 people worldwide has shown that high blood pressure (hypertension) is the single most important risk factor for strokes. Hypertension, together with nine other modifiable lifestyle factors, accounts for 90 per cent of strokes.

The study, led by Dr Martin O'Donnell from the Population Health Research Institute at McMaster University, Hamilton, Canada with collaborators in 32 countries worldwide, was published in The Lancet last month.

The importance of each risk factor varies from country to country but high blood pressure is the most significant risk factor in all cases.

cause of death and disability. The two major types of stroke are ischaemic stroke (caused by blood clots in an artery supplying the brain), which accounts for 85 per cent of strokes, and haemorrhagic stroke (bleeding when an artery bursts in the brain), which accounts for 15 per cent of

strokes. blood pressure Hiah contributed 48 per cent of the risk of stroke on average. Other risk factors were for physical inactivity 34 per cent, poor diet 23 per cent, obesity 19 per cent, smoking 12.4 per cent, irregular heart-beat nine per cent, diabetes four per cent, excess alcohol consumption six per cent, stress six per cent and excess blood cholesterol 27 per cent.

sociated with each other (e.g. obesity and diabetes), and when combined together, the total for all ten risk factors was 91 per cent, which was similar in all regions of the world.

"This study is of an adequate size and scope to explore stroke risk factors in all major regions of the world, within key populations and within stroke subtypes. The wide reach confirms the ten modifiable risk factors associated with 90 per cent of stroke cases in all regions, young and older and in men and women," said Dr O'Donnell.

"The study confirms that hypertension is the most important modifiable risk factor in all regions, and the key target in reducing the burden of stroke globally."

Professor Valery L Feigin and Dr Rita Krishnamurthi from the National Institute for Stroke and Applied Neurosciences, Auckland, New Zealand, say the key messages to be drawn from this study is that stroke is a highly preventable disease globally, irrespective of age and sex.

"Stroke prevention programs must be integrated with prevention of other major non-communicable diseases that share common risk factors with stroke to be cost-effective.

"We have heard the calls for actions about primary prevention. Now is the time for governments, health organisations, and individuals to proactively reduce the global burden of stroke. Governments of all countries should develop and implement an emergency action plan for the primary prevention of

stroke. Professor Graeme Hankey Professor of Neurology at the University of Western Australia said targeting, treating and controlling these ten modifiable risk factors, particularly raised blood pressure, could result a substantial reduction in the burden of stroke.

# Local heroes are not just sportsmen...

MENTION names like Lillee, Smylie and Green and I'm sure most readers could put a first name to our WA sporting heroes. In the next few months I'll introduce you to some new heroes - people who have devoted their lives to ensuring you age well and live longer, especially those who are leading the way in dementia response.

**Professor Leon Flicker** is a celebrated Western Australian and inaugural Professor of Geriatric Medicine at UWA. This year he was awarded the Order of Australia for distinguished service to medicine and medical education in the field of geriatrics, as an academic and researcher, and through contributions to improved dementia prevention and care.

Professor Flicker is a ground breaking researcher who has devoted much of his career to improving the health of older Australians. He has played a major role in implementing research results and changing the way we understand how lifestyle intervention plays a ma-

ing dementia and cognitive function. He graduated in med-

icine at the University of NSW and trained in internal medicine and geriatric medicine in Newcastle, Sydney and Melbourne. He completed a PhD in Melbourne and began his academic career there. He moved to Western Australia in 1998. Professor Flicker has been a key part of new thinking that has changed the way the medical profession operates. A particular focus of these studies has been the assessment of people with memory problems, men's mental health and exploring the association between biological and lifestyle factors on cognitive function and depression. He has also studied some the factors that lead to osteoporosis and falls and what can be done to help.

The landmark Health in Men Study (HIMS) sought to understand successful ageing and while doing so challenged long-held views. More than 12,000 men aged over 65 were studied for more than 20 years.

The study worked to solve the puzzle of how some live healthy and well, while others died early or age with declining health. Published findings had many reconsidering long held view in areas like weight, alcohol, stroke, dementia and heart attack. But Professor Flicker was



"Our results add further credence to claims that the WHO BMI thresholds for overweight and obese are overly restrictive for older people," Professor Flicker said.

His work in the bush has also received international praise. Working closely with remote Indigenous Australian communities in the Kimberley and Pilbara region, he sought to develop new tools suited to Aboriginal people. His Kimberley Indigenous Cognitive Assessment Study (KICA) demonstrated for the first time the rate of dementia in these areas was an alarming five times greater than in non-Indigenous Australians.

Professor Flicker has changed the way many people think about dementia in terms of assessment, early diagnosis and management and was a critical player in the release of The Clinical Practise Guidelines For Dementia in Australia last year.

He has published more than 350 articles and remains a practising geriatrician in Perth.

"Probably the secret is being physically active, mentally active, and staying engaged and you can't discount getting medical attention making sure your blood pressure gets treated and if you have diabetes that it gets checked and you are monitored,' Professor Flicker said.

Many grandparents swam these events with their grandchildren which is great to see. Many adults and younger swimmers enjoyed these novice swims conducted by





# The history and future of world-wide stamp collecting: Part 12

PHILIPP de Ferrari aka Philipp Ferrari de La Renotiere aka Philipp von Ferrary aka Philipp Arnold, it seems, struggled with his identity. As to why this eccentric gentleman elected to change his name through his life is confusing. However, there is no doubting the fact that he compiled, during the late 1800s, the greatest stamp collection ever known. Upon his death, it was confiscated.

Philipp von Ferrary (or Ferrary as collectors have simply referred to him since) was born in Paris in 1850. His father, Raffaele de Ferrari was an ultra-wealthy Italian duke who operated an international commercial bank headquartered in Paris. The family home was the exquisitely palatial, Hôtel Matignon, which was formerly the residence of King Louis XVIII and is today

the official residence of the Prime Minister of France.

Raffaele's Following death in 1876, Philipp's mother left Paris because she was disturbed by the prevailing monarchical and political machinations within France and handed her home over to the Austro-Hungarian emperor who she favoured. The emperor made it his French embassy however Philipp continued to live there. Philipp then decided to renounce the noble title inherited from his father, allowed himself to be adopted by Count de La Renotiere von Kriegsfeld (rumoured to be his actual father) and took on Austrian nationality and the name Philipp Ferrari de La Renotiere. However he preferred and used von Ferrary as his surname. He received an inheritance of about five million pounds which allowed him to travel and further acquire major rarities and collections which, as we discovered last month, included the three most prized items in the philatelic world.

In 1915 when the First World War was spreading through Europe, Ferrary was aged 65 with immediate family. no

By then he had become and was well-known to be pro-German and so he fled Paris for Vienna and then Switzerland leaving his collection behind in the Austrian embassy.

Two years later Ferrary died of a heart attack in Lausanne, Switzerland. and was laid to rest in a village in the province of Upper Austria where he had bought a house in 1890. He was a generous benefactor to the local community and highly regarded. Curiously, the inscription on his grave referred to him as Philipp Arnold.

His will, prepared be-

fore he left Paris, stipulated his collection be granted to the German nation and housed in the Berlin postal museum, where it was to remain intact and displayed in its own gallery.

He also bequeathed a considerable sum of money to maintain, preserve and acquire further appropriate items. However the collection was seized by the French government which claimed that as it belonged to a citizen of the enemy, the proceeds of it's sale were due to France in lieu of war reparations.

fered for a reasonable price to the Postmuseum in Berlin, which however did not have the necessary funds. Offers were received

from the wealthy American collector, Arthur with another Hind. greater offer of a million dollars from Stanley Gibbons in London. However these were declined and the collection was eventually broken down into more than 8000 lots, some of which contained more than 10.000 items, and sold through 14 auctions between 1921 and 1926, achieving a total realisation of 30 million francs.

# The voice of cricket Richie Benaud commemorated by Royal Mint

"MORNING. everyone. It's a marvellous, sunny day here at the MCG and we're all looking forward to a splendid day of cricket."

Such words, spoken with that inimitable accent only Richie Benaud

possessed, will always be fondly remembered and dearly missed by the generations of cricket fans who listened to his live coverage, summer after summer, for more than 40 years.

Having captained Australia, beginning with the

1958/59 season through to 1963/64, one would expect he knew what he was talking about when he once said: "the hallmark of a great captain is the ability to win the toss, at the right time." Then, what better way

could there be to decide future tosses than to use a coin featuring 'The Voice of Cricket' himself - yes, the Royal Australian Mint recently released a 50¢ coin celebrating Richie Benaud, who sadly died of skin cancer in 2015, aged 84.

Benaud has been described as being possibly the most influential cricketer and cricket personality since the Second World

War. As a player he was an accomplished leg spinner middle-order batsman and brilliant close-in fielder. He was the first cricketer to achieve the test double of 200 wickets and 2000 runs. His total of 248 Test wickets upon retirement was a record at the time.

The early 1950s was something of a boring period for cricket and so the aggressively tactical approach that Benaud brought to the game was not only refreshing, it helped rekindle interest. His ability to lead, motivate and bring out the best in his players as captain of NSW and eventually Australia, culminated in re-

gaining the Ashes. Under his stewardship, the Aussies did not lose an international series and became regarded as the dominant team of the era.

World Series Cricket com-

petition. It was a sensa-

tional hit from the outset.

Following the 1956 tour of England, Benaud stayed on and began training in journalism with the BBC. His first stint as a cricket commentator was on BBC Radio in 1960. Upon his retirement from cricket in 1964, he embarked into full-time professional cricket journalism and commentary. Come 1977, he was convinced by Kerry Packer to support the break-away

in part because Richie brought credibility through his participation as the host commentator.

It was then that Packer insisted Richie further distinguish himself from his peer commentators of the day by discarding the standard navy blue jacket and tie and appearing on set dressed in trendy jackets in the colour ranges of cream, beige, ivory and bone through to white along with shirts of pink, lilac and mauve accompanied with matching fashionable ties. With a full head of hair

that evolved through time from brown to grey and eventually snow-white. a smiling face as brown

as a berry, with lips that lifted at the ends, from which flowed his distinctively toned and incisive words, Richie became the face and voice and doyen of Australian and World cricket. Consequently he was often parodied by all and sundry, including fans while watching at home, like me and my mates. But no matter what, we still respected and couldn't help but admire him because he was the man. The fact that he participated in or commentated on 500 Test matches is testament to how marvellously regarded Richie Benaud was.

May he continue to rest in crease



# UK Citizens - claim your pension entitlements details if visiting the UK

TWO directors of the Consor-International tium of British Pension-(ICBP) visited the ers UK in November for detailed conversations with politicians from all parties from the lower and upper houses, a meeting of the all party parliamentary group (APPG), meetings with the British Overseas Territory (BOT) group, the Australian Deputy Hiah Commissioner, discussions with various other organisations and the media. Many useful new contacts were established.

Most of the MPs they met with have promised to take up and discuss the issue with Richard Harrington, who is Theresa May's Parliamen-

tary Under Secretary for Pensions.

The BOT group have an interesting case because some of them have frozen pensioners and some are uprated. Now that they are aware of this fact, it is being promoted up their agenda for discussions with the UK Government. The chairman of their APPG, Andrew Rosindell, is also a long term supporter for unfreezing pensions.

Since the visit John Markham who has been the chairman of the ICBP has stood down and been replaced by Nigel Nelson who visited the UK with him. Huge thanks are due to John who, despite his age, has worked hard to promote the ICBP and our campaign.

While UK tax is not relevant to many of you, if you are still paying UK income tax it is worth mentioning that a UK Taxpayer can transfer up to £1060 of their unused tax free allowance to their spouse or partner. A claim made in the current year will be

back dated to 2015/16 when the scheme started. Please note this point is for information only; I am not a UK tax expert.

It is about this time of year that many of you are planning a UK or European holiday. If you are, remember that you are entitled to claim your full unfrozen pension entitlement while on holiday or cruising out of the UK and Europe. You can claim even for a few days. It is your money. If you are visiting for longer than

183 days and are actually living and paying utility and rates bills you could also be entitled to keep your increases when you eventually return to live in Australia.

I've received several calls from people who are returning or considering returning to the UK to live (for many personal reasons). If you have worked in Australia prior to 2001 there is a possibility that you can request that your UK State Pension is increased to take account of those years worked in Australia. This could make a considerable difference to your state pension. Also, there are many additional benefits that you can claim. Information about them can be found on web site like Age UK and


time but Roy's neighbour Mr McKenzie owned a Chevrolet that burned charcoal to produce the gas that powered the car. Corrigin had its own

In the early days of the Swan River colony most theatrical and musical entertainment took place either in private residences or in the Court House (now the Old Courthouse Law Museum in Stirling Gardens). Gradually as the population increased and more public buildings were constructed, further venues became available (such as the Town Hall, St George's Hall and The Mechanic's Institute) for public entertainment events.

Open-air venues multiplied too. The ideally-sloped Esplanade Gardens at the foot of William Street, presented programs where films shared the arena with boxing exhibitions. Other outdoor arenas, such as Melrose Gardens, the Shaftesbury Gardens, and the Olympia Theatre, put on films with live vaudeville entertainment. There are no longer any cinemas operating in

Perth but at its peak, there were more than 15 screens in the CBD. You will be amazed as you meander around the city, exactly where they were located. It's sure to bring back some memories.

A not-to-be missed talk will celebrate the 100th Anniversary of Burt Memorial Hall. The Hall is probably one of the largest, and certainly amongst the earliest, WWI war memorials in Australia. The history of this building is a tale of family tragedy which will be told by Julian Burt, a direct descendant of Septimus Burt, the donor of the hall.

There will also be a guided walk looking at Perth's oldest buildings. Many Perth residents will still tell you the city has virtually no heritage buildings left, most of them having been toppled in the last quarter of the 20th century to make way for the concrete giants which now adorn St Georges Terrace and other parts of the city centre. This walk will help to demonstrate this statement is patently not true.

Starting at the oldest standing building in the city, The Old Court House, built in 1836, the walk with take you on a journey of discovery to the oldest residential property, the Old Deanery, schools, a church with a hidden past and ending up at Perth's answer to the Arc De Triomphe, the Barracks Arch. defiantly standing in front of the Parliament House, having been saved from demolition by eight votes in a 1960s parliamentary motion. Discover the buildings which were part of the early struggles to establish Perth as a viable town and how the place

has been transformed into the vibrant city we know today.

Other events in this year's Heritage Perth Walk and Talk Series include a panel discussion which will be presented by three esteemed Perth heritage voices discussing the importance of different aspects of our heritage to the present and future generations. There will also be An Audience with Martin Colgan, an award-winning stone-mason with an incredible 40-year career in restoring our heritage buildings, and the chance to look into, and hear about, panoramic photography of Perth during the last 130 years.

Generally the walks and the talks will last no longer than an hour so it is possible to pop out in your lunch break for a heritage hit. All events are free, but bookings are required as places are limited. Bookings for each event will open a few weeks prior to the event date.

# Wines for summer barbecues and outdoor entertaining

SUMMER is the time for barbecues. Cooking outside in the evening saves heating up the kitchen after a hot day. It is also a time when we are more likely to feel warm hearted and that all's right with the world.

Research published recently in Food Research International shows that when we feel good we are more likely to spend a little more on a good bottle of red.

Researchers used a range of expertly-rated wines and looked at relationships between how people rated wines of varying quality, drinking context, emotional responses to wine, and how much they were willing to pay.

Peoples' emotional responses to wine directly influenced how much they wanted to pay for it. So be careful if you're feeling content, enthusiastic, optimistic or passionate; then you'll want to pay more than your discontented drinking companions.

But let's not get too carried away and look for some good value wines to go with the steak, chops and snaggers.

La Bise Adelaide Hills Tempranillo 2014. La Bise is French for the kiss and is also the name given to a southerly wind that blows over Burgundy just before harvest so giving the vines the kiss of life.

The La Bise Tempranillo is sourced from a single vineyard in the Kersbrook region of the Adelaide Hills. The maturity of the vines and evenness of crop ensured the varietal flavours of rhubarb, cherry, raspberry and vanilla sponge cake are concentrated even with the naturally medium body of the wine. The palate is juicy and full of red fruits. RRP \$22.

Gartelmann 'Jesse' Shiraz 2013 is made from the fruit of 65-year-old vines planted in Mudgee NSW. The wine is deep red in colour with a purple hue. The aroma is of fresh pepper and spices laced with ripe berry characters. The palate displays flavours of spices and red fruits. There is some fruit sweetness balanced by acidity and soft tannins. The wine has a refreshing finish. RRP \$30. Windowrie The Mill Shiraz 2015 is a full-bodied

wine with plum and spice aroma. The palate is well balanced with fruit intensity, complimented by French oak. RRP \$20 but on special this month from the vineyard at \$17.

And here are suggestions for those who prefer a white wine, particularly good with seafood or chicken:

Patina Wines Scandalous Riesling 2014 is pale straw in colour, its aroma is fruity, with floral, rose petal, pear and citrus - very fragrant yet quite delicate. The palate is juicy fruit up front and light minerality leading to lemon/apple sorbet mid palate and a refreshing lime finish. A very fruity wine with a good balance between up front sweetness and tangy citrus finish. RRP \$25. La Bise Adelaide Hills Pinot Gris 2015. This wine comes from the Gumeracha sub region of the Adelaide Hills. It is bursting with fruit aromas of Bosche pear and white peach. The palate has a pleasant silky texture that is complimented by the cool climate acidity. The finish is long and slow. RRP \$22.

# **Mozzarella pork rack**



#### by Vince Garreffa

Time: preparation about 15 mins; cooking two hours 20 mins. Ingredients: 2 kg pork loin rack 150g mozzarella 100g ham slices 2 silverbeet leaves

WRAP mozzarella in ham, wrap this in silverbeet leaves (no stalk). Lightly French and chine and feather the pork rack. Cut a slash into the rack like a pocket, stuff the silverbeet parcel into it and tie up.

Rub the pork with extra virgin olive oil (25 ml), then salt and pepper.

Roast in the pre-heated oven on a wire rack (skin side up) on a flat tray at 180°C fan forced for two hours or until an internal temperature of at least 60°C is reached. Rest for 15 minutes, cut thick and serve.

Mix 50ml of extra virgin olive oil and 50ml lemon juice with one crushed clove of garlic, infused well together and drizzle a little over each cutlet when served.

Serve with seasonal vegetables or salad. Yum Yum!!

Knife and fork talk with the Dining Divas

> we wandered up to Dolphin Quay and discovered Sharky's, a large open plan restaurant with the main dining inside.

> If you choose to dine alfresco there are a few tables on the boardwalk where you alimpse the boys' toys (boats) bobbing on the water.

There is an extensive menu, but we chose from the \$18.90 menu which offered six choices including a glass of wine and tea or coffee.

We chose the Thai fish cakes and salt and pepper calamari.

The fish cakes were large enough to share but so delicious and delicately spiced that I ate the lot. They came with a fresh garden salad and a Thai lime and fish dipping sauce. Yum.

The calamari was perfectly cooked (no rubber rings here) and melted in the mouth. It was coated in a mixture of gluten free rice flour and the chef's own salt and pepper spice blend. The Greek salad and a

garlic aioli completed and complemented the dish.

The place is light and airy, exceptionally clean and the staff were delightful.

# Button mushroom and prawn Japanese pancake

200 g button mushrooms, finely sliced 100 g shiitake mushrooms, finely sliced 100 g enoki mushrooms, trimmed, separated 2 cups Chinese cabbage, finely shredded 200 g green prawn meat, finely chopped 11/2 cups self raising flour 2 eggs, lightly beaten 1 cup milk 1/2 cup cold water Pinch salt 1/4 teaspoon white pepper 1/4 cup olive oil 1/4 cup Japanese mayonnaise\* 2 tablespoon salt reduced soy sauce 1/4 cup spring onions, finely sliced PLACE mushrooms, cabbage and prawn meat in large bowl. Sift

flour over mushroom and cabbage mixture and toss gently to coat evenly with flour. Add eggs, milk and water, stir gently to combine. Season with salt and pepper. Heat barbecue plate to medium-high and drizzle with two tablespoons oil. Scoop 1/4 cups of mushroom mixture onto the barbecue plate to form eight small pancakes. Barbecue for 2-3 minutes on each side until golden and cooked through.

Transfer to a plate and keep warm. Repeat with remaining mixture. To serve, top each pancake with a teaspoon of mayonnaise, drizzle with soy sauce and garnish with spring onions. \*Japanese mayonnaise is available from the Asian grocery section of supermarkets or Asian grocery stores.





diverse and high-profile events and projects' and it seems to have delivered it's phase one promises already.

The first of four seasons sees a seven-day opening event curated by award-winning Royal Shakespeare Company; Opera North will transform the city's Humber Bridge into a piece of music, you can see art loans from the Royal Collection and the British Museum and there's a Nordic music festival among the events. The 365-day cultural celebration will focus national attention on the city - but the attention has

caused a little bit of a stir since it was announced.

You see Hull was once a prosperous fishing port, in fact it's known as the gateway to Europe with it's proximity to Denmark, Netherlands and Germany just across the North Sea. But in the Second World War the Germans practically flattened the city, then in the 1970s a proxy war with Iceland, about fishing rights in the North Atlantic, virtually killed the city's fishing industry and it saw a steady decline from then on.

In 2016 it is one of England's most socially deprived cities; a city that overwhelmingly voted Brexit (67.6 per cent) and one that holds immigration responsible for a lot of its woes. So you could imagine my and others surprise when it was announced as the country's city of culture. But as a fan of overused turns-ofphrase: 'never look a gift horse in the mouth' - or for that matter 'look a port city square in the Brexit.'

The first season, Made in Hull, will run from January to March and will open with the traditional fanfare of a spectacular fireworks display over the Humber, accompanied by a specially created audiovisual soundtrack. But where it seems to have

shone most is bringing the United Kingdom's top cultural organisations and institutions in as creative partners to showcase national, international and especially local talent too. Big names like the BBC, British Film Institute, the British Museum, National Portrait Gallery, Royal Collection and the Royal Philharmonic Orchestra have all come on board. For the first in more updates to come, here are some key excerpts from Hull 2017

#### Ziggy Stardust and the Spiders from Mars

- A film retrospective The Spiders from Mars saw local heroes Mick Ronson, Trevor Bolder and Mick 'Woody' Woodmansey join forces with David Bowie to become one of Hull's most important musical exports. The band Holy Holy, featuring the original Spiders drummer Woody Woodmansey, long-time Bowie collaborator and producer Tony Visconti and Heaven 17's Glenn Gregory, will perform the first ever live rendition of The Rise and Fall of Ziggy Stardust and The Spiders from Mars in its entirety at City Hall (25 March).

has helped to give Hull a cultural renaissance and





a massive 68 per cent of that will be spent on public facing initiatives to create a culture landscape in nooks, crannies and facades throughout the city. Designed to challenge people's perceptions of Hull and offer different ways to experience the city, Look Up will present a series of newly commissioned artworks in a year-long program (1 January - 31 December).

#### **Richard Bean's** The Hypocrite

Just one highlight from the program's theatre selection is the world premiere of The Hypocrite by award-winning Hull playwright Richard Bean. Famous for his hit Broadway and West End show One Man, Two Guv'nors it is inspired by the life of Sir John Hotham, a historic Hull figure, who in 1642 became pivotal in the start of the English Civil War. It's on at the Hull Truck Theatre and is a co-commission and coproduction with the Royal Shakespeare Company. (World Premiere: 24 February – 18 March).

#### WOW - (Women of the World) festival comes to Hull

WOW Hull is part of the global movement founded by Jude Kelly six years ago at the Southbank Centre in London working to achieve equality. With more than 33 festivals across five continents, WOW Hull will mark International Women's Day in a festival of talks, debates, music, film, comedy, theatre and activism.

There is also multi-arts Freedom Festival the Humber Street Sesh day of music; the Heads Up Festival bringing contemporary theatre; Assemble Fest which brings pop up theatre and performance to Newland Avenue: and the Humber Mouth commissioning literature festival along with the above mentioned - just some extracts from the Hull 2017 program.

This quiet port town in the north east of England is going through a cultural and social metamorphosis - one that looks like fun to take part in.

# Antarctica – the day trip of a lifetime

EARLY morning on Australia Day more than 350 people assembled at gate 12 at Perth Domestic Airport to depart on flight number QF 2906 on what could arguably be one of the world's best day trips.

After months of planning, me and a group of readers excitedly made our way to our seats to settle into the four-hour flight down to Antarctica.

What better way to fulfil a bucket list item than to spend a day flying over the world's most isolated continent by plane, and what better day to do it than on Australia Day.

Tour organisers' Antarctica Flights have been running these day trips since 1994 and have flown hundreds of people over the ice.

It also means that Qantas can say they fly to every continent.

There are 19 different flight plans which enable the captain to choose the best possible route taking into account weather conditions on the day.

We had perfect weather on Australia Day and you can see from the photographs just how clear the viewing was from the plane.

Also on board the flight were three Antarctic experts, who had spent considerable time on expeditions to the bases and representatives from Mawson's Hut Foundation. Peter Attard was a sta-

tion maintenance plumber and he had made five trips. He wandered through the aircraft chatting to passengers and talking about his experiences on these expeditions.

I heard one passenger ask him whether he had to have his appendix out prior to working down there as she had heard that this was a pre-requisite. Apparently that was a myth and he said they had very good medical facilities on the bases and this wasn't required.

As we flew directly south, passengers relaxed and many enjoyed watching a movie, or documentary about Antarctica and a meal was served.

The service from the

crew was outstanding and apart from the two meals served throughout the flight there were lots of snacks and drinks available.

Just under an hour out of Antarctica the captain Peter Caws connected with the Australian base Casey and spoke to the manager about life on the station which was piped through the plane.

The inhabitants of Casey were preparing for their Australia Day cricket match on the ice and reported it was a beautiful day with temperatures reaching a torrid –2°C.

As we got closer to the ice the excitement in the plane was building up and with the first sighting of icebergs everyone started moving about the cabin

for the best views. As we approached the continent the plane's altitude drops to about 10,000 feet above sea level or about 2000 feet above the highest ground within 100 nautical miles.

During the four hours over Antarctica we enjoyed commentary from expert Di Patterson who spent two winters and one summer on Australian Antarctic bases.

Her commentary was excellent and she told many stories about what is was like living on the bases and many of her experiences.

Former leader of the lce, Ocean, Atmosphere and Climate program, Professor Ian Allison also provided interesting commentary about his research.

They both shared geographical information about the areas we flew across.

Over four hours we explored a huge expanse of the Australian Antarctic Territory directly flying to Casey base and then along the Knox Coast exploring glaciers, capes and the Shackleton ice shelf before turning around at the Russian base Mirny.

The views of Antarctica were incredible, the atmosphere aboard the plane was friendly and fun, the flight crew provided extra special service and as we descended to Perth we all had to pinch ourselves to believe that we had just been to Antarctica.

That's a tick off my bucket list!







# What's in a name? A prize - find a funky name Artificial reefs a boon for fishing for Exmouth's 50th manta ray and win...

NINGALOO Reef is home to a large resident population of graceful manta rays. To date, more than 800 individuals have been identified in and around Coral Bay using the unique dot patterns found on the belly of each fish. In conjunction with Project Manta and The University of Queensland, this identification program has now been expanded to include the northern part of the Ningaloo Reef. around Exmouth.

To commemorate this, the Exmouth Visitor Centre and Project Manta are asking the public to name the fiftieth manta ray identified as part of Project Manta. The winning entry will win two tour tickets to swim with Ningaloo manta rays thanks to Coral Bay Eco Tours.

Project Manta seeks to examine how environmental factors affect the movements of manta rays, both within known hot spots such as the Ningaloo Reef and right throughout northern Australia. An understanding of why manta rays occupy particular sites at particular times is important, especially in the face of climate change.

Project Manta also encourages people to contribute to this research by submitting any photos taken of manta rays they see throughout the Ningaloo region. The unique spot pattern on a manta ray's belly is like a fingerprint, so a photo of the underside of a manta allows the research team to cross reference their existing database and determine if it is a new or previously identified Ningaloo manta ray.

The fiftieth individual manta ray identified as part of Project Manta's northern Ningaloo Reef expansion was a female ray that was part of a large feeding aggregation of mantas which took place inside Exmouth Gulf in October 2016. During this aggregation, spotter plane pilots reported seeing more than 100 manta rays swimming and feeding within an area of just a few kilometres of coast, close to shore near the Exmouth township.

Exmouth Visitor Centre manager, Kristy Bryan-Smith said the Ningaloo Reef and in particular Coral Bay is one of very few places in the world that is home to a resident population of manta rays.

"Because of the large resident population of manta rays, tours to swim with these huge, but completely harmless and very playful creatures, are available every day of the year out of Coral Bay," Ms Bryan-Smith said.

Snorkelling with a Ningaloo Reef manta ray is an unforgettable experience, as these rays are known for their love of interacting with swimmers.

Artificial reefs may be a boon for safe inshore boat fishing

**RECOGNISED** for many years around the world for the beneficial role they play in both recreational and commercial fishing, artificial reefs are rapidly becoming an integral part of the local Western Australian fishing scene as well.

Two reefs were deployed off Bunbury and Dunsborough a couple of years ago and a third was put in off Mandurah in April last year. Each artificial reef array is made up of 30 ten-tonne reinforced concrete modules placed in six clusters in a fourhectare area.

last month and this one was designed to be a little different to its predecessors. Instead of concrete, steel is the base material for the structure and the Rotto reef consists of two 12.5m high towers, designed to attract pelagic species like tuna, mackerel, Samsons and yellowtail kings, as well as demersal species like snapper, dhufish and skippy.

To put this into perspective, these underwater towers are as high as a four storey building, so it's not hard to imagine the sort of complex marine community that could evolve around such a significant structure. The Rotto reef could become something of a focal point for pelagic species south of the island and as such is bound to become a popular destination for the Perth light tackle game and sport fishing brigade.

Funding for the construction and deployment of reefs has come from the Royalties for Regions program and our fishing licence money. The local recreational fishing community has been involved in decisions regarding the placement of the reefs and there's no reason to think other than that the future of safe inshore fishing has received a shot in the arm thanks the artificial reefs program.

# Shhh - please don't tell anyone about the secret of Greenhead

THIS may be the story of the last time I ever get invited to Greenhead

As I pulled my first ever jewfish into the boat, my host told me to tell anyone who asked that I caught it from waters off Jurien Bay.

But we were in 40-odd metres of water off Greenhead. The jewfish filled our quota for the day and although it was my only offering to the catch, it allowed me to leave content.

It sat proudly in the esky among the other jewfish (check Fisheries Department regulations), baldies and black-arse. Oh and crayfish!

Would-be fisherman wanting to visit are well warned to keep an eve on the weather forecasts though. My host spends more time on the Bureau of Meteorology website than my daughter does on Instagram.

He tells me that days where he can get out fishing are very few and far between, because of the wind. But he seems to be able to regularly send me photos of catches he has been lucky enough to get out for.

The fact that the wind blows in this area is well known though as windsurfing is at its best along the coast north of Perth. And just in case you can't get a line out (to fish), you can take your golf clubs and play the local course.

Greenhead is about two and half hours (287km) north of Perth and 20 minutes north of Jurien Bay. Get there along the pictur-esque Indian Ocean Drive.

The locals and those who own holiday homes there are doing their best to keep it a secret, but they are fighting a losing battle. It featured in the national press

late last year as one of the hidden gems to visit in Australia in 2017.

Accommodation options are limited. There are a couple of B&Bs, the Centrebreak Beach Stay and a caravan park. Plus land has been cleared along one of the beaches for camping.

The Greenhead Caravan Park offers powered and unpowered sites; it has onsite vans, plus basic facilities such as a campers' kitchen, laundry, toilet block, playground and children's playground.

You'll also find good old-fashioned service. That service is found throughout Greenhead. When I woke up with a flat car battery on the day I was supposed to drive home, the owner of the service station/local store lent me his battery charger without even asking who I was or where I was staying.

Driving around Greenhead doesn't take long.

We put the boat in at South Bay, which requires the old-fashioned reversing of the 4WD into the water - and me holding the boat waist high in the ocean while my host, complete with waders to keep his clothes dry, sorts out the car.

A short drive gets you to the well-protected Dynamite Bay. There are people snorkelling here and popping their heads up regularly to celebrate the citing of a school of big fish. There are several walks you can take from here too, but the best is out along the rocks where you can look out towards the break where you're every chance of seeing surfers or windsurfers. You can look back towards land too and get a great pick of people enjoying themselves inside the bay.


Travel a little further north along Ocean View Drive (towards Leeman) and you'll come across the new camping areas. The road to get there is unsealed, but easy enough to drive without a 4WD.

There is another little bay here too, which is also sheltered and which looked to offer a little more for snorkellers.

It's easy to see why Greenhead has received national attention recently, and also why those who already visit are doing their best to keep it a secret.

You will need to search for Green Head and Greenhead if looking to visit. I think the locals are trying to confuse the search engines and those using them.

IT'S ALWAYS nice to see one of your designs come to fruition and last year was no exception with the tricky task of transforming a barren wasteland of grass and old grey concrete quadrangle at Southern River College into a usable outdoor space and 'classroom' for year seven and eight children.

The area backed onto existing classrooms on the northern side and basketball courts on the southern side and was devoid of vegetation, apart from a couple of old misshapen trees. I was commissioned to design this new quadrangle courtyard based on previous landscape design work that I had completed at schools in Perth including Melville Senior High School, Santa Maria College and Penrhos College.

The challenge was to design a space that catered for year seven and eight students during recess and lunchtime, while also providing a practical and inspiration teaching facility during the day and space for assemblies and other functions when required. Consultation with teachers, administrators and parent bodies provided relevant feedback and ideas to incorporate into the design.

Using these ideas I created a landscape design that encompassed a large covered outdoor area that was to be used as a classroom and located close to the existing classrooms. A central raised concrete stage was built in the covered area to provide elevation for teaching and assemblies

as well as allowing quick and easy transition into the area. Built-in bench seating catered for students and teachers with adequate space for additional temporary seating or experimental areas required. These when corner built-in seats directed the flow of pedestrian traffic flow through the covered area to avoid students cutting corners or walking through gardens. Pleached magnolia 'Little Gem' was planted around the outside to offer shade. It was under planted with Murraya and

anella to give additional contrast and colour to the garden. Hedges of Indian hawthorn and ornamental pears flanked the main axis to the classroom. On both sides raised grass banks provided viewing platforms for the basketball courts and classroom/assembly area, or just a place to lie on the

Rovena hedges and Di-

lawn and relax. High school students require individual space so that they can study, relax, talk and play. With this in mind I developed two separate enclosed seating areas; one square the other circular. These areas were designed to accommodate as much seating as possible and to encourage interaction and use as alternative outdoor classrooms. The seating areas were surrounded by raised garden beds planted with taller trees including maidenhair trees, purple leaved plums, frangipani, a golden shower tree and jacaranda in the centres surrounded by lawn. The trees were underplanted with colourful foliage and flowering plants such as hibiscus, silver bush, Duranta, Indian hawthorn, Alternanthera, Radermachera and Buxus to provide year round interest.

Textured concrete aggregate paths with contrasting paving form the framework and axis of the quadrangle garden directing students and visitors through the area whilst establishing sanctuary along the way with limestone wall planters and seating areas for different student groups.

There are many lessons to be learned from the key aspects of this school garden, which translate to when you design your own garden at home, even on a small scale. It is important to look practically at how pedestrian traffic uses the garden area, avoiding bottlenecks, whilst directing flows and usage. Views, vistas or points of interest can be highlighted in the garden by carefully positioned planting, such as avenues or pairs of trees or aligned paths and garden beds. The use of raised garden beds in smaller gardens

provides structure, improved growing mediums, screening and extra seating when built to around 50 to 55cm high. A tip for smaller gar-

dens is that layered or tiered planting with carefully chosen plant selection will make areas appear larger and create seasonal interest, texture, shade and privacy.

The Quadrangle Garden for Year 7/8 students at Southern River College will continue to grow and improve as the plants mature, hopefully inspiring students and teachers as they continue to use and enjoy the garden

# Outdoor kitchens are ideal for entertaining all year round



LANDSCAPE expert Matt Leacy looks at the growing trend in outdoor kitchens and why it's here to stay.

Traditionally, kitchens

have been an indoor property feature for most homeowners and investors. However, more and

more Australians are

looking to maximise their outdoor space for cooking, dining and entertaining - paving the way for an increase in the popularity of outdoor kitchens.

So what is an outdoor kitchen and how can homeowners maximise their value?

Matt Leacy, co-founder and creative director of Landart Landscapes, and president of the LNA Master Landscapes Association, shares his top tips for creating a kitchen outdoors - from what features to include, to how to install for your individual outdoor space and aesthetic.

"The outdoor kitchen.

in particular, is a feature that is increasingly becoming an expectation rather than a want for homebuyers and homeowners alike. People are starting to say "yeah, yeah we expect that for sure" whereas in the past they probably would have been happy with a moveable more makeshift set up barbecue," says Matt.

"I've been advocating the idea for a while now that we should treat our outdoor spaces the same as our indoor spaces in terms of creating different spaces and functional dynamics.

"The same way that you have a kitchen area, dining area, casual lounge area and a playroom indoors, you can create equivalent areas outdoors that serve the same purposes and help you unlock the potential of your space.

You can do much more outside food-wise than simply cooking on a barbecue," adds Matt.

"An outdoor kitchen can have cupboards, a fridge, sink and more - or it could be as simple as some cupboard space and a barbecue with a nice servery. If you wanted to do a bit more, you could look at installing a breakfast bar with some stools around it to make it

more social and to create a casual space for breakfast, a cup of tea or reading the paper. Add to that a more formal dining area with seating and lounge space and you have the makings of the perfect outdoor living and entertaining space. "It depends on the

size and layout of your outdoor space. If you've got a small courtyard, then you might consider an outdoor kitchen and bench top with stools for dining so you don't have to clog up the space with a dining table as well as a servery. If you have a bigger space, you could have a full blown kitchen

with a sink, fridge, wok burner, dishwasher and cupboard space.'

'For foodies who love to cook, but don't have great airflow throughout their property, it can be a challenge to keep the kitchen from stinking out the rest of the house, says Matt.

"An outdoor kitchen can be the perfect solution for those who love cooking fragrant food without the long term smell - ensuring that everything, from Sunday roasts and barbecued meats to curries, can be cooked outdoors without cooking odours lingering inside for days.'

# Mistakes in legitimate tax deductions cost property investors thousands

BMT Tax Depreciation, a company that has worked with more than 400,000 Australian property investors to help uncover and claim legitimate tax deductions for the wear and ageing of their investment properties, has compiled a list of its top five tax mistakes commonly made by investors that likely result in millions of dollars of tax savings going unclaimed each year.

The Australian Taxation Office (ATO) recognises that the structure of a rental property and the assets within it can experience wear and tear over time and therefore allow tax concessions for investors to account for this deterioration. Quantity surveyors such as BMT are used to uncover these deductions and help maximise tax claims for property investors.

The chief executive officer of BMT.

Bradley Beer said the first mistake many investors make is not claiming all the legitimate items they are allowed to depreciate.

"Items such as smoke alarms, security systems, swimming pools and even garbage bins are often overlooked but hold valuable tax savings for property investors," said Bradley Beer.

"Fixtures and fittings with a depreciable value less than \$300 can be immediately claimed in the first financial year

"A garbage bin valued at \$250 and smoke alarms valued at \$145 are just two examples of items which are eligible and can generate immediate tax savings for applicable investors," said Bradlev Beer.

The second common mistake seen

by BMT is investors believing that their properties are too old to hold any deductions but the truth is that a property's age does not necessarily rule out all deductions completely.

"In order to claim the capital works allowance for structural elements of a rental property such as walls, floors and ceilings, your property must have been constructed after 1987. However, owners of older properties can still claim deductions for renovations carried out after the relevant date, even if these were completed by a previous owner," said Bradley Beer.

"They are also eligible to claim deductions for plant and equipment assets within the property such as carpets, hot water systems, blinds and stoves.

Investors who renovate their proper-

ties are often not aware of scrapping deductions available for the assets they remove and replace.

Ideally, a property should be assessed before renovation to determine the value for scrapped assets such as tiles or appliances like dishwashers and refrigerators, then after a renovation to account for new additions"

The fourth common mistake seen by BMT is investors believing that because they purchased their investment property some time ago that they cannot benefit from tax depreciation or items that may have been missed in a previous claim.

"The ATO allows two previous tax returns to be adjusted so investors would be wise to examine whether they have missed anything and if so,

speak to their relevant advisor to have their tax return amended," Mr Beer said

Lastly, many investors can mistakenly believe that using an expert quantity surveyor to assess their property in order to maximise their tax claim will be expensive and therefore opt to 'DIY' their own claim.


'Some investors may not realise the cost of obtaining a depreciation schedule is 100 per cent tax deductible.

"By taking the time to explore the tax depreciation system and working with an expert quantity surveyor, property investors can avoid making these common mistakes and help ensure their investment properties are generating the maximum amount of cash flow possible," Mr Beer said.

neighbourhood. Downsizing is promoted to help release equity, but you could also explore other options which allow you to do that and still stay in your own home. Last month Venessa

Miler, seniors housing information centre coordinator at COTA, addressed Mundaring Probus about some of the important issues people have to face as they age.

She said most people want to age in place.

"Home is an emotive place where you have an established network, mortgage probably paid off and you feel secure. "You don't have to move to a retirement village if you don't want to. Stay in your home if you want to and tell family and friends who try to move you to get stuffed," Ms Miler said.

"You are the only person who knows what makes you happy. Hang in while you still have a choice.

"It is also cheaper for the government if you stay at home, but many Australians have an aged care mind set. In Finland 45 per cent of people die in their own home but in Australia only 10 per cent do.

"The stress of moving gets greater as we get

older. Retrofitting your home may be a better option. It is possible to make most houses wheelchair friendly and designed to compensate for reduced mobility. "

She said get an occupational health assessment of your home before you start to modify it. Technology Assisting Disability WA (TADWA) and the Independent Living Centre will provide free advice and an age-friendly home maintenance kit is available from the Department of Local Government and Communities. www.dlgc. wa.gov.au/Publications/ Documents/AgeFriendly HomeMaintenanceKit.pdf

The kitchen and bathroom are the main areas needing modification for easier living and self care. People can make incremental changes as their needs increase.

Smart homes can monitor health. The home knows people's habits and will call for assistance if they change, for example if someone has a fall, or fail to get out of bed in the morning.

People with dementia are generally happier staying at home if that is possible. Dementia-friendly design can reduce their stress and frustration. They know where the toilet is at home, but may not remember where it is in an age care facility.

There is lots of help available through HACC and ACAT including minor maintenance, gutters and gardens and help with self care, transport and getting to social activities.

The Internet allows mobility challenged people I to shop, bank, socialise, educate and entertain i themselves and much s

more nowadays. She said most people plan only when it is too late.

"Don't wait for a catastrophic event. If you have dementia you may not be able to make your own decision. Consider making an Advanced Care Directive and Enduring Power of Attorney. All the forms you need are available online.

"Ask for help if you need it. Don't put up with crap," she said.

# Independent retirees outline policy recommendations

New clubhouse design at El Caballo revealed

SENIOR politicians from the two major parties have been invited to the meeting of the Association of Independent Retirees (AIR) Perth Southern Districts branch on 24 February to outline their party policies on the following:

 Waiver on stamp duty on the purchase of a principal place of residence by a retiree

AIR is of the view that the overall financial strain on its members who are fully or partly self-funded retirees is extremely serious and not confined to the issues identified in this submission.

This submission focuses on State issues. However also to be considered is the significant changes to superannuation which came into effect on 1 January, and other Commonwealth initiatives enacted or proposed.

AIR consider the recent increases in land tax

exorbitant, and seek relief from stamp duty when changing their principal place of residence. They further request that the Country Fuel Card be made available to all residents who live in regional zones and who hold both the Commonwealth Seniors Health Card and WA Seniors Card.

AIR advocates that the pension systems should be used as a safety net and not as a method advocated by many in the financial planning industry to gain access to a pension as a financial add on. Such practices although perfectly legal have the effect of adding to the already serious budget problem this country faces in the years ahead.

It is time that politicians of all parties realise a complete review of financial matters is absolutely essential and implemented as soon as possible.

AIR is a not-for-profit organisation and is one of the peak bodies representing the views of ful-

ly and partly self-funded retirees in Australia. It advocates particularly on behalf of its members but generally for the interests of retirees committed to funding as far as possible their own retirement. AIR has 48 branches throughout Australia including nine in WA. There are five branches in the metropolitan area and four in regional areas.

The Association's policies aim to achieve justice, equality and freedom of choice for all retirees and those in transition to retirement, while recognising there is a diverse range of individual circumstances. It advocates on policy positions to advance and protect their interests and independent lifestyles across the four core areas of Financial; Aged Care; Health Care; and Social Wellbeing matters.

# A labour of love for historical researcher on WWI railway men




Author and railway enthusiast, Tom Goode

TOM Goode as a small boy growing up in West Midland liked nothing better than playing with his friends at the back of the railway workshops inside written-off locomotives. His love affair with the railways and its history has resulted in his first book. The Cold-Footed Mob, a History of the 5th Australian Broad Gauge Railway Operating Company.

Tom's decade-long research and decision to write a book about the brave band of unrecognised 250 men who volunteered for the Western Front started when the now retired school teacher was a volunteer at the WA Army Museum in Fremantle.

"Someone brought in a World War I postcard which had been signed with the unit initials 5 ABG Railway Operating

formed, three were ready to set sail almost at once. The WA group sailed from Fremantle on 28 January 1917, others sailed from Melbourne and Sydney a little later. Once at the Western Front, the men undertook gas mask and other basic training.

'The unit was extremely lucky in that it suffered no members killed by enemy action," Tom Goode says in the book. "While not involved in the fiercest of fighting as were the infantry and artillery, they operated trains close to the front line and lived within the range of German artillery for many months. Six of the original contingent died while on active service. Four died from illness and one by accident."

The unit's youngest member was 17 and got special permission from the Federal Minister for Defence and the oldest. William Longford, was at least 65. Longford had emigrated to NSW from England with his wife in 1872, spending almost 50 years as a porter or fireman. When he heard the army needed railway men he said he felt that though he was over the age limit he had the health and strength, shaved off his moustache and joined

the WA unit. Longford's army career ended when ANZAC General commander Birdwood noticed him while inspecting the unit. While on leave in Britain. Longford admitted his age was 66 and he was returned to Australia.

Tom Goode's extensive research took him to Canberra with the National Archives providing invaluable details of the men and their mission.

"I was looking for correspondence and having worked in the public service knew there would be a file where Britain had formally written to the Australian government asking for railway units and there would be quite a bit of correspondence. To find the file I listed all the WA files as listed WWI railwaymen and found the information I was looking for filed under 'Railwaymen for Egypt.'

Tom says the main information for the history of the railway men is the unit's war diary.

"Fortunately, the re-corders in 5ABGROC took seriously their role as the first Australian railway unit to be deployed. They recorded much of their experiences with an eve to helping other units avoid the same mistakes," he says in an introduction.

second "The rich source is personal military records of individual members available through the National Archives. Also, another source is gradually be-

#### coming available as the National Library releases more digital copies of local newspapers. During WWI newspapers were the major source of information.'

Tom reflects on the upheaval two a half years overseas at war had on the lives of these enterprising brave men. One man left his two daughters in the care of the Salvation Army while he was away. Though the war ended in 1918, there was a trickle of men returning to Australia: some delayed by ill health while some had married in Britain, being granted passage home with wives and children. Tom Goode's links with the railways run deep.

Both his grandfathers

Thomas Goode and William Rice were in the railways as was his father George. The book is a tribute to his family and the men who served.

BEING able to get around for shopping, social activities and medical appointments is essential to the well being of older people and because of limited public transport options for many this means driving or being driven

Dr Kristy Coxon of the George Institute for Global Health, University of Sydney said older drivers have fewer crashes than young drivers but more at intersections and other times when driving is stressful.

"As people age their reaction times get slower; they are more prone to make mistakes and

Dr Coxon and her colleagues studied a group of older drivers to find out why.

The team installed GPS black box devices in the vehicles of 380 volunteers aged 75 to 94, to measure distance driven, routes taken and time of travel. They then tracked their movements for 12 months.

All volunteers underwent a battery of functional assessments and self-reported questionnaires to characterise their driving practises, community involvement and any depressive symptoms. Half of the older driv-

ers also undertook a safe transport course to manage their driving skills and encourage alternative forms of transport. On average older peo-ple drove 7,280 km per

involvement in social activities.

"By 2030 there will be half a million people aged over 65 driving on NSW roads alone, so it's essential that we understand their driving patterns,

"Being mobile is important to many older drivers, but we need to ensure they are driving safely and not harming themselves or other road users.

"Our study showed that those who underwent the course were ready to self-regulate their driving and avoid high risk situations such as night, during rush hour and in wet weather, driving alone or on high speed freeways.

"More work clearly needs to be done to encourage older people to cut back on the time spent in their car and take up other forms of transportation wherever possible.

"They need to explore other options like public transport and family and community support in advance of the need to give up driving," she said. The study was published in the Journal of the American Geriatrics Society last year.

Ms Carol Nevin, Curtin university lecturer, de-partment of dental hygiene and therapy, says the department teaches oral health therapy students who upon graduation are registered dental clinicians with the national registration body Australian Health Practitioner Regulation Agency (AH-PRA).

"There is a difference between a dentist and oral health therapist in the range of procedures each discipline can do. A dentist is trained to perform all acts of dentistry whereas oral health

therapists are trained in a specific area of dentistry.

"Oral health therapists can perform dental examinations of adults, take X-rays and dental impressions, do assessments of the teeth and gums, perform scales and cleans, treat gum disease by deeper cleaning and performing teeth whitening and polishing.

"They can also give local anaesthetic if any of the treatments are uncomfortable such as the deeper cleaning.'

And this dental care can extend to your grandchildren. Students are trained to do dental examinations, take X-rays, fillings on both adult and baby teeth, extract baby teeth, apply fluoride and perform scale and cleans on children.

"In both children and adults there is a major focus on prevention and in particular identifying those people more at risk of developing dental disease and put in place measures to decrease the likelihood of having dental problems.

"Any treatment bevond their scope such as fillings, crowns and dentures is referred to a dentist," she said.

There is a small charge for services with the maximum cost for all procedures capped at \$60 for the whole course of

treatment. This excludes teeth whitening which is charged at \$250 but includes an examination, any required X-rays and a scale and clean.

Ms Nevin says the only downside is time. "A course of treatment

tends to take longer as it is a teaching environment and the students are learning, however the work is of a high standard," she said.

# The means tested care fee in residential aged care explained for people

Activities of Daily Living	Low care \$36.11	Medium care \$78.62

THERE are three types of ongoing fees for residential aged care. These are: Basic daily care fee

which is the same for everyone and is currently \$48.44 per day. This is equivalent to 85 per cent of the single Centrelink Age Pension. The means tested care

fee (MTCF) which is determined by your level of income and assets.

And the extra services fee which is an optional fee to receive hotel type accommodations and

services. This fee is determined by the residential aged care facility and averages around \$30 - \$40 per day.

The maximum amount of the means tested care fee is capped at \$26,041.09 per annum which equates to \$71.34 per day.

However, if a person's level of care is greater than this then the resident will pay more.

The aged care funding instrument (ACFI) is used by residential aged care facilities to determine the actual cost of care and is based on three categories of care as shown below which is set by the government, see table above. So, if a person for example is rated as low on activities of daily living (\$36.11), medium on behaviour (\$17.10) and medium on complex care (\$46.27) then their means tested care fee will be \$99.48 per day. However this is more than the maximum daily cap of \$71.34 per day. However the annual cap of \$26,041.09 is an annual cap, not a daily cap. So in the above example the resident will pay \$99.48 per day for 261.77 davs or around 9.34 months. As opposed to \$71.34 per day over 12 months. 

"We also need a balance of genders. It is important to get equal numbers of males and

At the conclusion of the trial we should be able to make recommendations for everybody and select those who will benefit." he said.

The trial will continue for five years and participants will undertake annual health checks with the STAREE research team in collaboration with their GP.

There has been considerable controversy about statins due to their widespread use in otherwise healthy people and the small but real risk of adverse side effects.

However 60,000 people in Australia stopped taking statins as a result of the program and subsequent publicity, putting their heart health at risk according to pharmacist Andrea Schaffer, from the University of Sydney. Statin side effects are

probably underestimated because trials often exclude people with early side effects, the elderly and people with other conditions, such as kidnev disease.

"Any drug has side effects. The main risk with statins is muscle weakness and disorientation. We will monitor a large group to see if the benefits are greater than the risks," said

Professor Reid.

Recent clinical guidelines from the United States and United Kingdom advise that statins should be taken by people at increased risk of a cardiovascular disease, including healthy people aged 75 and above as a primary preventive measure. They may also be valuable in preventing the mini-strokes which may lead to dementia in some patients.



IF YOU care for your grandchildren you may live up to 10 years longer than if you have little or no contact with grandchildren.

That's the findings of a team of researchers at Edith Cowan University (EDU) and the University of Basel, Switzerland. The team, including Dr David Coall of EDU, studied more than 500 randomly selected people aged over 70 and up to 103 in Berlin for nearly 20 years.

Participants were assessed for an extensive range of health and social conditions every two years.

The risk of death in any one year was 33 per cent lower among caregivers than among non care givers. As a result half of the grandparents who took care of their grandchildren were still alive about ten years after the first interview in 1990.

The same applied to participants who did not have grandchildren, but who supported their children – for example, by helping with housework. In contrast, about half of those Looking after grandchildren helps you live longer

who did not help others died within five years.

The researchers were also able to show that this positive effect of caregiving on mortality was not limited to within the family.

Childless older adults who provided others with emotional support, for example, also benefited. Half of these helpers lived for another seven years, whereas non-helpers on average lived for only another four years.

But there are limits. When grandparents are tasked with full custodial and highly stressful care, the risk to their health increased.

"Helping shouldn't be misunderstood as a panacea for a longer life," says Ralph Hertwig, of the Max Planck Institute for Human Development. "But a moderate level of caregiving involvement does seem to have positive effects on health."

Other research conducted by Dr Coall's research group at ECU has found negative physical and mental health impacts among grandparents who care fulltime for their grandchildren.

Women lived longer, but there was no significant interaction between the helper's gender and care giving in longevity. Grand mothering is beneficial, but no more so than grandfathering.

"This research shows the positive link between care giving and a longer lifespan in older people however we can only speculate as to why," Dr Coall said.

"Previous research points to helping behaviour as a stress buffer which involves, for example, the hormone oxytocin which can strengthen bonding between people.

"This link could be a mechanism deeply rooted in our evolutionary past when help with childcare was crucial for the survival of the human species."

He said the research showed the benefits of caring also extended beyond grandchildren.

"Older people who cared for their own adult children or other members of the community showed the same increase in longevity," he said.

Dr Coall said there is no way to estimate the amount of caregiving which is best to boost longevity.

"It is very important that every individual decides for themselves what 'moderate amounts of help' means," he said.

"As long as you do not feel stressed about the intensity of help you provide you may be doing something good for others as well as for yourself."

The study was published in the journal *Evolution and Human Behavoir* last year.

The Community Visitors Scheme connects older people who could benefit from more social contact with caring volunteer visitors who provide valuable friendship and companionship. It's delivered to older people living alone in their own home, who often have no other visitors.

The Community Visitors Scheme aims to improve the lives of older people experiencing isolation and loneliness by re-establishing healthy social connections. Caring volunteers are matched with an older person who receives a home care package of services. The match is made based on common interests, hobbies, and preferences. At least fortnightly, volunteers visit the older person for a relaxed social visit. They may play cards, reminisce, take a walk in the garden, or even just have a cup of tea together. It is a simple idea but it has powerful effects.

# Are you a sitting duck? It's time to move it or lose it...

RESEARCHERS at the University of California San Diego School of Medicine, have found that the body cells of elderly women who sit for more than ten hours a day, with low physical activity, are biologically eight years older than those of women who are less sedentary.

The study, published

online in the American Journal of Epidemiology, last month, concluded that elderly women with less than forty minutes of moderate-to-vigorous physical activity per day (and who remain sedentary for more than ten hours per day) have short-

er telomeres. Telomere are tiny caps found on the ends of DNA strands, similar to plastic tips on shoelaces that protect chromosomes from deterioration and progressively shorten with age. As a cell ages, its telomeres naturally shorten and fray, but health and lifestyle factors, such as

obesity and smoking, may accelerate that process. Shortened telomeres

are associated with cardiovascular disease, diabetes and major cancers. Nearly 1,500 women, aged 64 to 95, participated in the study. They are part of the larger

Women's Health Initiative (WHI), a national, longitudinal study investigating the determinants of chronic diseases in postmenopausal women. The participants completed questionnaires and wore an accelerometer on their right hip for seven consecutive days during

waking and sleeping

hours to track their movements.

"We found that women who sat longer did not have shorter telomere length if they exercised for at least 30 minutes a day, the national recommended guideline," said Dr. Aladdin H. Shadyab of San Diego School of Medicine. "Discussions about the benefits of exercise should start when we are young, and physical activity should continue to be part of our daily lives as we get older, even at age 80."

Further studies indicate that muscles break down more readily with age and that maintaining blood flow to the extremities is a vital component to muscle preservation.

A University of Notting-ham research team, led by Michael Rennie, Professor of Clinical Physiology recently discovered that muscle breakdown, normally suppressed by food, increases with age.

The results, published in The American Journal of Clinical Nutrition, compared one group of people in their late 60s to a group of 25-year-olds, with equal numbers of men and women.

Professor Rennie said: "we studied our subjects

first, before breakfast and then after giving them a small amount of insulin to raise the hormone to what they would be if they had eaten breakfast, of a bowl of cornflakes or a croissant

"We noticed that the blood flow in the leg was greater in younger people than the older ones. This set us thinking: maybe the rate of supply of nutrients and hormones is lower in the older people? This could explain the wasting we see.'

# Funding announced for increased access to transition Aged Care for Western Australians

OLDER people in Western Australia will benefit from the Federal Government's decision to provide short-term funding for additional transition care places.

Minister for Aged Care, Ken Wyatt AM, MP, recently announced the allocation of 60 new transition care places from March this year to June 2018.

"This temporary allocation is a response to the WA Government's urgent request for more aged care places in Western Australia," Mr Wyatt said.

"The Federal Government is keen to ensure that all older people, regardless of where they live, have access to appropriate care and support.

"In Western Australia, there is a shortage of operational residential aged care beds available to older people.

"This time-limited allocation of transition care places provides the WA Government with breathing space, while it addresses factors contributing to the state's shortage of residential aged care.'

Mr Wyatt said he had worked with WA Minister for Health; Culture and the Arts, the Hon John Day MLA, to identify options to address the state's aged care needs.

The Commonwealth will contribute approximately \$6 million for the temporary transition care places,

with other funding provided by the state government.

Transition care provides a limited period of care and therapy to older people who have been in hospital, to enable them to rebuild their strength and abilities.

"These new places will allow old-er people in WA to improve their independence and confidence after a hospital stay, giving them a greater chance to remain living independently in their own homes," Mr Wyatt said.

"I will continue to work with the WA Government to develop sustainable solutions to meeting the aged care needs of West Australians, now and into the future.'



# Perth's Mad Tatters Morris team danced again in Shanghai

MAD TATTERS Morris dancers are women and men who perform traditional dances originally from English villages along the border between England and Wales.

Team leader Christine Hogan says, "It's really Morris dancing with attitude - lots of yelling and stick clashing which mimics fighting.

"The Morris border tradition goes back 500 years and was originally performed by poor farmers and miners trying to obtain extra money to feed their families during the harsh winter months in England.

'They made colourful costumes or tatter coats out of scraps and decorated black top hats with feathers," she said.

The team is based in Guildford, however dancers and musicians come from all over Perth (Byford, Nollamara, Gooseberry Hill, Woodvale, Cottesloe, Midland, Helena Valley, Claremont, Toodyay and York).

The group was selected to represent Australia again at the fourth International Folk Dance Festival in Shanghai which is organised every two years. They were honored with the best creativity award by the Chinese judges.

from Western Australia travelled to Shanghai for the competition.

"We were so excited when we were chosen in 2014 to represent Australia and even more elated to be invited back again in 2016," said Christine.

When she asked why the Chinese committee decided to invite them back again, they replied: "because you connected so well with the Chinese audience.

Music and dance is a fantastic way of communicating across cultures.

The Tatters chose to fuse their traditionally based dances with a famous Chinese folk song, entitled Mo Li Hua or Jasmine Flower composed in the 18th century Qing dynasty.

"It was hard work learning a song in Mandarin, but You Tube is a great help. It was worth it and soon we could not get it out of our heads," said Christine.

"When we danced on to the stage with our traditional yells and leaps, the audiences laughed... then we stopped dead and faced a sea of faces (bigger audiences than we ever encounter in Australia)... a short pause and then our flautist played the first line of the song and there was a gasp.

"Some joined in with us singing whilst others clapped along with obvious joy and appreciation. It was a magic feeling and united us for those few minutes," she said.

They performed in Shanghai in front of 20 judges, numerous TV cameras (which relayed the concert to millions of people across China) and an excited crowd.

There were eight Chinese teams representing the diversity of cultures and history of China (from Guizhou, Jiangxi, Anhui and Shanghai) and seven international troupes including teams from Sweden, Egypt, Argentina, Peru and Sri Lanka.






