# Seaside sculptures return to Cottesloe

COTTESLOE Beach will once again be transformed into an outdoor art gallery with the annual Sculpture by the Sea returning to the beach until the 20 March.

Now in its 12th year

this public art event will feature works from more than 75 artists from across the globe.

Artists hail from Peru.

China, Japan, USA, England and Denmark alongside 40 sculptors from Australia.

Crown Resorts Foun-

dation and the Packer Family Foundation have sponsored a new support program for the indiaenous artist of the year for the next two years.

Local indigenous artist Sharyn Egan will be creating her work during the first weekend of the exhibition allowing visitors to see her creating her piece which will be made from woven natural materials first hand.

"I am thrilled to be invited to exhibit at Sculpture by the Sea this year and acknowledge the support from the Packer family through Crown Resorts Foundation which will encourage the local and national community of professional sculptors," said Ms Egan.

Mr Jones has more than 40 works of art in the public domain in WA.

This year people will have the opportunity to enjoy another outstanding piece from him which reflects our coastal environment.

Mr Jones said that he is privileged and fortunate to see his many works of art publicly displayed in WA.

"I am inspired by where I live and the materials which are available to me to work with and transform, and this year's work relates to navigational hardware mainly using recycled steel.

CHEERS to this...

A study conducted by the University of Alberta in Canada has found that the health benefits from resveratrol, one of the compounds found in red wine are similar to those we get from exercise.

Resveratrol was seen to improve physical performance, heart function and muscle strength in the same way as the effects of a session at the gym.

Researcher, Jason Dyck said these findings may help those who are unable to exercise. Discussion over the health benefits of red wine are well documented and studies have revealed that those who drink a glass of red wine a day are less likely to develop dementia or cancer, that it's good for your heart, anti-ageing and can help regulate blood sugar.

DESPITE turning 102 this year, Dr David Goodall still goes into work at Edith Cowan University's Joondalup Campus every weekday, researching plant ecology, although he officially retired 37

"I can't get out in the field now so I work at a desk writing and editing, mainly editing," he said.

# 101 year old working scientist named in honours list

Tropical Ecology.

"I receive papers and send them out for review

and make decisions about publication. He regards editing 36 volumes of the publication Ecosystems of the World as his biggest contribution to science, but he has also authored more than 130 research publications and supervised countless students.

Last year he wrote a guest editorial '100 years of vegetation science' in Journal of Vegetation Science.

"Actual reviews - where historical published data are brought together for the attention of today's readers – are rare," he says. "The reviewer gives today's scientists a view over the time perspective which they could otherwise obtain only by painstakingly studying the literature for themselves, or by use of indirect means such as pollen records?

Dr Goodall, who works at ECU's centre for ecosystem management, has also written a recent paper in Plant Biosystems.

He is associate editor of the scientific journal ing probabilistic algorithms, rather than the traditional method that requires a botanist to work

progressively through printed keys," he says. "This method will be particularly helpful in problematic situations, such as when a specimen is incomplete, or at a difficult point in its development, or perhaps the botanist is not particularly knowledgeable about that species.

This year Dr Goodall has been made a Member of the Order of Australia recognising his contribution to ecology over the past seven decades.

He says he considered the award a recognition of the importance of his profession rather than a personal honour.

"I am not proud of my personal contribution. I am proud of the contribution that my profession has made in the field of ecology," he said.

He is a keen amateur actor and director. "I've not counted them, but I must have been involved in more than 80 productions over the

He last appeared on stage in a small part in The paper looks at development of data Shakespeare's Love's Labour Lost three years ago, but has had to give up theatre because he

can no longer drive. Instead he has joined Well Versed, a group who meet regularly to discuss and write poetry.

"I was always interested in poetry. I joined Well Versed when it was formed two years ago. They hold meetings in the daytime so I can get to them," he said.

Dr Goodall first came to Australia in 1948 as senior lecturer in botany at Melbourne Univer-

He spent several years overseas in academic roles including Professor of Agricultural Botany at Reading University, Professor of Biological Sciences at University of California, Irvine and Professor of Systems Ecology at Utah State University. Later he worked at CSIRO division of land resources management, and then with the division of wildlife and ecology in Helena Valley before formally retiring in 1979.

And his tip for living a long, happy life? Dr Goodall said he rarely drinks, gave up smoking many years ago and aims to keep his mind and body active and keep in touch with young people.



I drove the fuel-tanker and work-bus, it had 46 seats. My passengers were made up of 22 nationalities, even and including a former U-Boat captain, plus an Aussie

We worked a 10-hour day, six days a week for a dollar an hour plus overtime.

I often did seventy plus hours as the re-fueller, we were paid \$26 per week for (5 star) meals and accom-

There was no agro there, the first one to throw a fist, ensured both parties were on the next plane out.

The planes were old DC3 Dakotas. Going on R and R we often jumped on the plane straight from shift. A Landrover cleared the run-way of roos for take off and we landed in Perth still in hard-hat

## Local hero is Royal Flying Doctor director of medical services

STEPHEN Langford joined the RFDS for a one-year stint in 1983 and he's still there.

He was named a local hero in the year's Australian honours, one of 8,000 people nominated.

"I was honoured and humbled by the award," he said. "I encourage everyone to make a nomination if they know someone appropriate in the fu-

One third of a century ago Dr Langford was a general practitioner with training as a procedural GP for remote areas. He also had his private pilot's licence.

"I was planning to go to Antarctica but I put in an application to the RFDS. I got a call back and a job offer, so I went to Port Hedland and straight out on a flight. I was hooked."

During his 33-year career with the RFDS, Dr Langford has saved countless lives and eased tremendous sufferina.

He saw the opportunities available within the RFDS to expand and improve its services. Over the years, Dr Langford introduced dozens of innovations, such as treatment preventing premature birth, clot-busting drugs for heart patients, portable ultrasound, a single state-wide emergency number and specialised equipment for heavy patients.

He campaigned for the first RFDS jet, mitigating, if not conquering, the tyranny of distance and transforming how emergency medical teams could respond to remote patients - some of whom are 2,000 kilometres from specialist hospitals.

As medical director of the RFDS in Western Australia, Dr Langford has had a tremendous influence on health in remote indigenous communities. Recent studies confirm high survival rates for patients with serious trauma in remote Western Australia and excellent outcomes for obstetric emergences, when cared for by RFDS teams.

"There have been huge changes. In 1983 there were no mobile phones, no GPS, no Internet and no email.

"Communication depended on crackling HF radios. If I was in a supermarket I might get paged and have to connect to the radio operator by a Telstra coin-in-the-slot phone.

"Now there is wide mobile coverage, although the coverage in remote areas is patchy because of the vastness of the state.

"If a tourist has a car crash or is taken sick in remote areas they cannot ring up for help unless they have a satellite phone. Thirty years ago they would carry an HF[SAL1]\* radio and string an aerial over a tree.

"Now it can take longer to get assistance to them.

He says grey nomads and other travellers need to be careful to carry enough medication with them and know what has been prescribed. It is not enough to ask for those little blue

"You need to prepare and think ahead if you are going on a long trip in remote areas.

"When I started we thought population growth would make regional centres bigger and each would have their own medical facilities, reducing the need for the RFDS. This has not happened except to a few towns; some grew but others declined.

"We are kept busy due to the resource boom. It's not just mining but more people are travelling in remote

areas. The RFDS will always be needed for its role in emergency medicine.

"The RFDS was the first to use telemedicine in 1930 with pedal radio communicating over long distances. It is helpful but no substitute for a physical visit. There is a limit to talking; you can't feel a patient or carry out procedures. A computer is not the same as a personal relationship with a GP," he

In addition to emergencies the RFDS provides clinics for remote communities providing health screening, health promotion and early intervention to reduce the need for emergency treatment.

Dr Langford has written and just published a book The Leading Edge: Innovation, Technology and People in Australia's Royal Flying Doctor Service, published by UWA Publishing which can be ordered online at uwap. com.au. This provides an account of the RFDS since the late 1970s and the technology and innovation that has allowed the organisation to remain at the forefront of air-delivered medical care.

Audrey spent her early years on a soldier-settlement farm in the eastern wheatbelt. She attributes her down-to-earth practicality to her Gallipoliveteran father's versatile farming and living through the Depression in Perth and the Goldfields. Living in Melbourne, she married in 1940 and with war-time food rationing she quickly learned to grow vegeta-

"I realised I could grow food by digging in kitchen scraps and using manure from the horse-drawn milk cart," she said. "I kept laying hens and I've always made my own clothes."

98 years of...a good life

Looking around the solar-passive home she shares with daughter Pam, it's easy to see that Audrey keeps up her doit-yourself philosophy. The pair designed the home two years ago and planted a flourishing garden that already supplies much of their fruit and vegetable needs. Audrey's interest in organic gardening goes back a long way.

"Edna Walling's writing in the 1940s was an immense influence. Edna opened up new thinking about the environment. In the 1970s I subscribed to an organic gardening magazine that opened my eyes to self sufficien-Cy.

The home showcases Audrey's creativity in a stained-glass window and colourful patchwork wall hanging.

"I learned to restore antique furniture back when it was cheap and everybody wanted new vinyl stuff!" Audrey said. "I went to tech school and learned upholstery, lampshade making, basketry, spinning, weaving, quiltmaking and embroidery. I did courses in mud brick and straw bale buildings. I'm an avid reader. I've been a constant learner.

"I was always searching for how to live a good life. Simplicity in architecture and landscape, productive gardening, taking care of nature - it gives one a sense of stability."

Audrey has always environmentally been aware and politically ac-

"There are too many people putting pressure on water and land resources. I feel desperate about climate change, forest clearing and degradation of our environment but I'm an optimist. I have faith in zero carbon technology like solar, wave and wind energy.

"We are lucky. We have abundant energy resources from sun, wind and waves. I hope people are becoming more aware and taking on a sense of responsibility."

## **Achilles Tendonitis**

ACHILLES tendonitis is inflammation of the Achilles tendon. This tendon connects your calf muscles (gastrocnemius and soleus) to the back of your heel bone (calcaneum) and provides the push off power the foot exerts on the floor when walking.

Achilles tendonitis can be either acute, meaning occurring over a period of

a few days or following a hard training session, or chronic which occurs over a longer period of time. The tendonitis can occur at the attachment point to the heel or in the mid portion of the tendon (about 4cm above the heel). Healing is very slow in the tendon due to its poor blood sup-

What causes it?
• increase in exercise activity including hill climbing
• less recovery time between activities

change of footwear or

training surface
• weak calf muscles

 decreased range of motion (flexibility) in the ankle joint usually caused by tight calf muscles

walking /running up hills
poor foot biomechanics which create more stress on feet with increased activity

wearing high heels regularly.
 Symptoms of Achilles

Śymptoms of Achilles tendonitis

 gradual onset of pain over a few days

 pain at the start of exercise that fades as exercise continues

pain eases with rest
tenderness on palpation

of tendon.

Treatment (first 48hrs)

rest the affected foot and avoid weight bearing activities

• use ice packs to help ease any swelling, pain and redness

 compress the affected area with an elastic compression bandage

 elevate the affected foot as much as possible

wear a heel pad to raise

the heel and take some strain of the tendon. This should be a temporary measure only.

Rehabilitation

See your physiotherapist for more specific advice. You may be asked to perform any of the following:

 gentle calf stretches strengthening the Achilles

change shoes or wear orthotics custom made for you as symptoms resolve

 do more weight bearing activities gradually

• avoid running until all

tenderness has gone
• swim or cycle instead of

jogging
Specific treatment may also include:

 taking anti-inflammatory medication to reduce swelling

 taping to the back of the ankle to support the tendon

 ultrasound treatment apply a plaster cast if the tendon is in a very poor

 scan with an MRI or ultrasound

• surgery on the tendon if all conservative treatment fails.

whelmingly in support for the campaign and still the UK Government said that they are not going to make any changes.

However due to pressure from MPs there was a full debate in the House of Commons on 24 February following on from Prime Minister's Questions and it was scheduled for three and half hours.

While the debate will result in a non-binding vote, a vote against the government would put even more pressure upon them to right this wrong before the Budget on 16 March.

BPiA are in touch with the WASPI organisers who were totally unaware of our frozen pensions issue. They have agreed to help us with our campaign when they win theirs.

Many of you who have been reading and benefit-ing from this column who are not members of BPiA might not be aware how we conduct our campaign against the UK Govern-

BPiA is run by volunteers and we have teamed up with the Canadian Alliance of British Pensioners (CABP) to form the International Consortium of British pensioners (ICBP). The ICBP comprises of five volunteers most of who are from the board/committee of either BPiA or CABP.

Much of what ICBP has achieved in recent months towards the cause of unfreezing UK State pensions

## Food for thought

DID you know that following a low-carbohydrate, high-fat (LCHF) diet for just eight weeks can lead to rapid weight gain and health compli-

A recent study, detailed in a paper in Nature Journal - Nutrition and Diabetes, has prompted University of Melbourne researchers to issue a warning about putting faith in so-called fad diets with little or no scientific evidence.

The paper's author, Professor Associate Andrikopoulos, president of the Australian Diabetes Society, says that this diet, exemplified in many forms of the popular Paleo diet, is not recommended - particularly for people who are already overweight and lead sedentary lifestyles.

Professor Andrikopoulos is wary of the media hype surrounding these diets, particularly those driven by celebrity chefs, celebrity weightloss stories in the tabloid media and reality TV shows.

These endorsements are leading people to believe that fad diets (backed by little or no scientific evidence) are a great way to lose weight

Prof Andrikopoulos stresses that for people with pre-diabetes or diabetes, the LCHF diet could be particularly

"Ĺow-carbohydrate, high-fat diets are becoming more popular. but there is no scientific evidence that these diets work. In fact, if you put an inactive individual on this type of diet, the chances are that person will gain weight," he said.

"There is a very important public health message here. You need to be very careful with fad diets, always seek professional advice for weight management and always aim for diets backed by evidence."

Researchers at the niversity of Mel-University bourne's originally sought to test whether high-fat and low-carbohydrate foods would benefit the health of people with pre-diabetes.

They took two groups of overweight mice with pre-diabetes symptoms and put one group on the LCHF diet. The other group ate their normal diet. The mice were switched from a three per cent fat diet to a 60 per cent fat diet. Their carbohydrates were reduced to only 20 per cent.

eight weeks, After the group on the LCHF gained more weight, their glucose intolerance worsened, and their insulin levels rose. The Paleo diet group gained 15 per cent of their body weight. Their fat mass doubled from two per cent to almost four per

"To put that in perspective, for a 100 kilogram person, that's the equivalent of 15 kilograms in two months. That's extreme weight gain," Professor drikopoulos said.

"This level of weight gain will increase blood pressure and increase your risk of anxiety and depression and may cause bone issues and arthritis. For someone who is already overweight, this diet would only further increase blood sugar and insulin levels and could actually pre-dispose them to diabetes.

"We are told to eat zero carbohydrates and lots of fat on the Paleo diet. Our model tried to mimic that, but we didn't see any improvements in weight or symptoms. In fact, they got worse. The bottom line is it's not good to eat too much

Prof Andrikopoulos says the Mediterranean diet is the best for people with pre-diabetes or diabetes.

"It's backed by evidence and is a lowrefined sugar diet with healthy oils and fats from fish and extra virgin olive oil, legumes and protein," he said.





WHEN we left off in last month's edition of Have a Go News Dirk Hartog had headed north to complete his outward journey to the Spice Islands of the East Indies.

Let's now jump forward twelve years to 27 October 1628. The newly built Batavia set forth from Texel in the Netherlands on behalf of the Dutch East India Company loaded with a large supply of gold and silver

to enable expansion of trading opportunities in the East Indies. She was part of a seven-ship fleet bound for the town of Batavia.

In command of Batavia was Francisco Pelsaert. He held the position of supercargo or opperkoopman - the most senior merchant aboard. Within his command were the captain Adriaan Jacobsz, and Jeronimus Cornelisz whom the VOC had placed aboard as the onderkoopman - subcargo or junior merchant.

Cornelisz was the most mysterious of characters, a bankrupt pharmacist from Haarlem, west of Amsterdam who had chosen to flee from the Netherlands, for fear of being arrested because of the heretical beliefs that he embraced as a

follower of the radical artist Johannes van der Beeck, also known as Torrentius.

Here is just a sampling of some the hard line views held by Van der Beeck..

"All traditional religions restrict pleasure. In doing so they are contrary to the will of God, who put us on earth that we might, during our brief existence, enjoy without hindrance everything that might give us pleasure".

imagine if you will how such views sat with the strong Calvanist values that prevailed in the broader Dutch society of the time.

Choosing to share such views placed Cornelisz at some risk, and so deciding to flee aboard a ship heading to the East Indies seemed like a good idea.

A review of the ship's manifest suggests that Batavia officially carried 341 people for the voyage to the Indies. Of this number around 180 were the officers and crew who had the responsibility of sailing the ship; there were about 100 soldiers,

with the remaining being civilian passengers, of which most were women and children.

With cargo loaded and passengers and crew aboard, Batavia headed into the English Channel, bound for Cape Town. It must have been an omen for the challenges that lay ahead, for within days of leaving Texel the fleet of seven ships was hit by a massive North Sea storm. Once the skies had cleared only three of the original seven ships remained within visual contact, not a good way to begin a six to nine month voyage.

During the voyage to Cape Town the first signs of trouble began to brew. Jacobsz, the captain enjoyed a swig or two and on many occasions he clashed with Pelsaert who became concerned for the safety of the ship whilst in the command of a drunken captain.

Observing this, Cornelisz sought out Jacobsz's ear in the hope of hatching a plan to take over the ship, then sailing to somewhere in the Indies where they could begin a new life using the huge supplies of gold and silver aboard to secure the food and materials that they would require.

A disgruntled Jacobsz did not require much persuading, so upon leaving Cape Town after re-provisioning, Jacobsz deliberately steered Batavia away from the rest of the fleet. The protagonists enlisted the support of a small group of men who embraced their intentions, and together they hatched an incident that would ensure a mutiny would befall the Batavia.

Mutiny and murder are to come...



## The Wreck of the Batavia: Part 3

I JNAWARE that his second in command, Jeronimus Cornelisz, had been conspiring with the ship's skipper, Ariaen Jacobsz, to seize the Batavia and it's treasure of 250.000 guilders, following the Batavia coming to unexpected grief on a reef in the Abrolhos Islands, the commander, Francisco Palsaert, decided to make for Batavia (Jakarta) in two of the ship's sloops to seek a rescue ship.

He was accompanied by Jacobsz and some crew while leaving approximately 280 other survivors in the care of Cornelisz.

Left to his own devices and in pursuit of his treacherous intentions, Cornelisz and his band of mutineering sailors and soldiers assumed control of the stricken ship which was still intact (later to break up with 40 drowning as she went down) along with the limited food and water supplies. Using the ship's remaining sloops they divided some of the survivors into groups and ferried them to surrounding islands with the expectation

they would die of thirst or starvation. One group of some 40 soldiers led by Wiebbe Haves were taken to the High Island (West Wallabi) on the pretence they were to search for food and water and send a smoke signal should they succeed.

From this point in time, Cornelisz' men went on a wild rampage at first killing those who were weak or injured and anyone considered to be a threat to them. Then it seems the marauding mutineers needed little excuse to murder; possessed by the lust for blood and sated by the power and terror they beheld over their captives, to hunt down and kill had descended into a macabre pastime. even island-hopping in the chase.

Meanwhile Hayes and his soldiers had the ironic good fortune to find water and food in the form of wallabies, birds and eggs. Smoke could be seen from their island so Cornelisz sent men to land and overpower the group however, a few survivors who had escaped being slaughtered and somehow made their way to Hayes' island, revealed to him the carnage that had occurred and the plans of the mutineers.

Hayes' group was prepared; they had made pikes and morningstars from wreck timbers, barrel hoop and materials washed up on shore from the wreck and so they were able to repel the marauders who attacked periodically over the next month. Cornelisz then sent word that he and a handful of men would come to make a truce, bringing some supplies and an offer to share the spoils. Hayes sensed it was a deceitful ploy, which it was, and upon Cornelisz' arrival, he was captured and taken prisoner. Four of his accomplices were executed while the fifth escaped by boat.

The mutineers regrouped under the leadership of a soldier, Wouter Looes. Further raids on Hayes's defenders were launched to almost success but just as in a Hollywood film script, at the eleventh hour, a rescue ship appears on the horizon... to be continued.

## **Tribute to Australia's most successful stamp dealer**

LAST month, one of my cherished mentors died. I was so saddened, for the few days that followed, a tear or two would come to my eye when I thought or spoke of him.

He was Max Stern, an amazing personality in many respects and arguably if not undeniably the most dynamic and successful stamp dealer to ever trade in this country while also becoming internationally renowned. In the 1960s, he conceived a promotion for Ampol whereby millions of stamps were given away to purchasers of their fuel

Have a. Go

- some of you may well remember this. Mr Stern supplied the packets of stamps, an album was also produced and it was because of this promotion that my father and thousands of others became collectors. Soon thereafter, my dad became a dealer with me eventually following in his footsteps.

Mr Stern was born in 1921 into a Jewish family in Czechoslovakia. For his bar mitzvah he received a stamp album from his father and by mid-teens was already trading at markets. With the outbreak of WWII and the German invasion of Czechoslovakia in 1939, his father lost his business with Max then having to support the family from his stamp trading. When the Germans declared Czechoslovakia was to become cleansed of Jews, Max went into hiding, was captured and interned in concentration camps. He escaped when the Germans abandoned them due to the advancement of Russian forces. Near death, he managed to return to his home in Bratislava only to tragically find that all of his family, other than two sisters, had been executed.

He married in 1948, the same year the communists came to power and for which reason he then fled Czechoslovakia and migrated to Melbourne. He setup shop in Central Arcade and then moved to Port Phillip Arcade in 1956 where the business has traded ever since, nowadays occupying an impressive nine shop fronts in a row.

Beyond retailing, Mr Stern also directed his business towards wholesaling, supplying dealers with albums and catalogues as well as new stamp releases on behalf of 21 countries including Great Britain and the USA. As such, his business is the largest supplier of stamps in the country, now under the directorship of his son-in law, Sam Seigel, who has worked with him for about 40 years. Mr Stern still manned the shop till the day he died.

Space does not allow me to list all of his achievements: life member of the Australasian Philatelic Traders Association, also the US equivalent; 20 year board member of the International Federation of Stamp Dealers; recipient of the British Rowland Hill Award; convener of National Stamp Week and the Australian Stamp Promotion Council which was the fore-runner to the Australian Philatelic Federation; and in 1999, he became a Member of the Order of Australia for his contribution to philately.

Mr Stern was a notable identity in the Jewish community and in recent years held a weekly lecture for students at the Holocaust Museum. His other passion was soccer. He sponsored a cup in his name and recently received a special award for his contributions to the Victorian Soccer Federation. Amazingly, he retired from playing only a few years ago when he turned ninety, at which time, he had been the oldest registered player in the southern hemisphere, a title he proudly held for more than 10 years.

You truly made your stamp on us collectors and dealers Mr Stern - we will dearly miss your enthusiasm, encouragement and guidance, support, unparalleled energy and that bright, beaming smile.

THE BikeQuest @ Bibra Lake is one challenge bike riders won't want to miss. Explore this popular lakeside playground by bike as Orienteering Western Australia teams up with Bike Week to host this morning cycling adventure event. Family friendly, it's suitable for all ages, solo adventurers or groups.

How BikeQuest works: Once people have a map, they get on their bike and the clock starts ticking. The goal is to see how many checkpoints competitors can reach before time is up.

Orienteering is a sport that combines outdoor adventure with map reading and navigational skills. involves navigating

though the bush, parks a longer route that goes or streets with the aid of a round the hill which may specially produced map; the aim being to locate checkpoints as quickly as you can.

WOMEN have jobs and careers, raise children, study, volunteer, and still manage to keep home fires burning. It's hard work. Recognising that effort, the United Nations first officially designated 8 March as International Women's Day (IWD) in 1977.

Aiming to promote women's human rights, political participation, and economic security, the UN went on to develop the United Nations Development Fund for Women, now known as UN Women. Dedicated to advancing women's rights and achieving gender equality. UN Women offers financial and technical help to innovative programs which foster

# Heritage Corner - the women of WA's history

women's empowerment.

To celebrate the centenary of IWD in Western Australia, the WA Women's Hall of Fame was launched. It acknowledges the achievements of Western Australian women past and present.

Throughout our State's history some extraordinary Western Australian women have left their mark, but it was not an easy path for our female fore-bears.

Following Queen Victoria's assent to a Bill that was passed by the WA Parliament on 15 December 1899, Western Australian women won the right to vote in 1900. The situation was not quite the same for indigenous women who were not given the right to vote until 1962.

Once the right to vote was secured, it was a further 20 year's before women in WA achieved the right to stand for State Parliament and that is exactly what Edith Cowan did. She became the first woman to be elected to an Australian Parliament, where she served in the WA Legislative Assembly until 1924. Then in 1943, Dame Dorothy Tangney, a Perth school teacher. became the first woman elected to a Federal seat in the Senate. She served for 25-years, making her the longestserving woman parliamentarian.

Much of the early advancements for women and indeed social change were championed by suffragettes, often members of the Woman's Christian Temperance Union. It is believed their activities were quietly supported by some, but not all, members of the Karrakatta Club, a women's club founded in 1894. The Club's first constitution stated a single purpose: to bring into one working body the women of the community for mutual improvement and social intercourse. Early concerns of club members focused on women's issues, the guardianship of children, voting rights, assault, divorce law reforms, and equal pay for male and female teachers.

The club's membership boasted some historically important WA women such as Dr Roberta Jull - the first female medical practitioner in WA, Edith Cowan, Florence Cardell-Oliver - politician, activist and well-known suffragist Bessie Rischbieth. a founding member of the Children's Protection Society in 1906 and the inaugural vice-president and later president of the Women's Service Guilds of WA.

Other members included trade unionist Mary Hynes Swanton, who arrived in Perth around 1889 and went on to become the first woman to be awarded honorary life membership of

the Australian Natives Association in 1900. In that same year, she helped to found, and became the first secretary of, the Australian Women's Association (Perth). Also a member was Lady Margaret Forrest - founding member of the Wilgie Club WA, a fine artist society. A 'fine' artists herself, her collection of wildflower works was bequeathed to the Art Gallery of WA when she died

In 1923 members of the Karrakatta Club decided to align with the international movement of Lyceum Clubs. The club still exists today and resides in the beautiful art-deco Lawson Apartments on the Esplanade.

Such clubs have played an important role throughout our State's history in helping women to make their mark and effect change for the better in so-

Formation of a Country Women's Association in Western Australia was first proposed in 1923 by Lady Forster, wife of the Governor General at that time. The CWA held their first meeting a year later and by the end of 1924 four branches were operating.

Again this women's organisation had many influential members; Jean Beadle feminist, social worker and founder of the Labor women's organisation in Fremantle; Irene Greenwood,

broadcaster, activist and participant in the peace and women's movements and Ruby Hutchison, the first woman elected to the WA Legislative Council and a key figure in establishing the Australian Consumers Association in

There are so many inspiring women who have effected change and provided a better pathway for the women who followed them.

On 8 March, International Women's Day, you may like to reflect on these women and investigate the role they played in shaping the society in which we now live. You may also wish to celebrate women both past and present who will be honoured with induction to the WA Women's Hall of Fame.

## Have a Go News celebrates 25 years in 2016 - making its mark in the community

LAST month I featured the beginnings of the paper and how Judith and Quentin began the Have a Go story through sheer hard work and determina-

This month we look at the building of Have a Go Day and some of the other community projects the paper contributed to or created.

I spoke to former columnist and inaugural

president Seniors of Recreation Council of WA, Brian French about the beginnings of Have a Go News and Have a Go Day.

"About 25 years ago I set up Seniors Recreation Council of WA (SRC) with the aim of encouraging healthy ageing through activity.

"However, I had no finance or staff, but the Ministry of Sport and Recreation (MSR) gave me office accommodation and I recruited six active volunteer seniors to help with getting SRC off the ground.

"The MSR at that time was producing Have a Go News but with limited success, and was looking for an organisation to take it off their hands.

"Concept Media owned by Judith and Quentin agreed to produce the paper and Quentin joined SRC to take on the vital role of publicity", said Mr

"From tiny acorns do the mighty oaks grow; so did Have a Go News under the strength and passion of Judith and Quentin. "Over the past twenty five years the paper has developed into an important part in the promotion of older people's interests.

"This certainly would not have happened without the powerful input and effort of Judith and Quentin and their daughter Jennifer.

"I have had the privilege of contributing my column of French's Forum in the newspaper for quite some years. (I recently resigned).

"I used my column to voice my own personal views, which although not always agreed with by Judith, Quentin and Jen, was never censored. Perhaps this is an indication of the freedom of the paper?" said Mr French.

"It is unfortunate that Judith has been unwell for the past few months, but with the support of Quentin and Jennifer, Have a Go News continues to thrive every month. (May it do so for many years).

"In my time running the Seniors Recreation Council, Have a Go News has been a major contributor to the activities and specially on Have a Go Day. This we took over from the MSR 25 years ago when we only allowed participation in activities with no selling.

"We used all the seniors activity clubs to encourage people to come along, and after a couple of years moved from Mc-Callum Park to Burswood Park. Once again promotion of the event was undertaken by our faithful ally Have a Go News.

'I think back and wonder what would SRC have done without Have a Go News' publicity?

"I take this opportunity to send a big thank you to Judith, Quentin and Jennifer," said Mr French.

Some of the innovations which Judith and Quentin brought to Have a Go Dav in those early years included the hospitality tents which back then were manned by the Country Women's Association with tea donated by Madura tea. Then a few years down the track Channel 9 got involved and starting subsidising the CWA

In 1994, Have a Go News initiated the very successful photographic competition Discovering WA With Your Camera which ran for 11 years.

During this time we were privileged to display the photographic works of some of our talented readers at many major shopping centres.

Postcards also featured the exhibition on one of their television programs.

community Other events the paper ran included reader movie mornings in conjunction with cinemas and film companies and a variety of reader lunches as well as Seniors Impact Days at various shopping centres across Perth promoting services and activities for older people in their local area.







## Cornwall's St Ives is renowned as the best seaside town in the UK

FROM ACROSS the weathered rooftops close to our open attic window, there suddenly appeared a hopeful herring gull, wishing to grab some crumbs, as we relished arguably, the best Cornish pasties in town.

The solid building of granite, oak beams and slate roofing, our home for a few days, began life as an Ale House twelve years before Captain Arthur Phillip and the First Fleet entered Botany Bay

Now, a homely bed and breakfast, with walls of old photos and sketches, this romantic establishment serves hearty breakfasts of local produce, and is typical of links with the past that guests seek in

accommodation in St Ives, these days.

Of course, one can't write about St Ives and Cornwall without alluding to the colour and charac-

ter of this coastal county. Smuggling and piracy have always been associated with Cornwall and smuggling reached its peak in the late 1700s with brandy, tea and tobacco being the contraband of choice at that

The Sloop Inn a thriving pub with a restaurant offering fabulous Cornish fare from goat's cheese to St Ives Bay crab and West Country beef, was believed to have been partially built from timber salvaged from Sir Francis Drake's encounter with the Spanish Armada in

1589. The Inn itself dates back to circa 1312, so perhaps the aforesaid timber was used for renovations - if you can believe the salvaged wood story.

St Ives on the north coast of Cornwall and warmed by the warming Gulf Stream, is about six hours away by train from London and a whole world away in pace and

This little gem of a seaside town invites visitors with its narrow cobbled streets and quaint alleys, to explore the many eateries and variety outlets that fuse visual pleasure with salt-laden breezes and sizzling seafood.

Endless streams of people, day and night, wander this maze of streets in search of the gallery with that special piece of pottery or a sunny seascape. For others there are boat trips and a fine museum, worth exploring.

museum tells The of early tin and copper mining days and gives a compilation of memorabilia with an emphasis on maritime history, the fishing industry and the famous Royal National Lifeboat Institution - a voluntary organisation set up around 1824 for the rescue of ships in heavy seas

During our wanderings, we discovered a local market selling homemade farm wares, and fresh honey. The apiarist, a scientist, remarked that he was most impressed with Western Australia in not allowing the importation of honey into that state because of a fungal spore in untreated honey that can kill indigenous

Another walk brought us to the Tate Gallery of St Ives that oversees the management of another gallery - Barbara Hepworth Museum and Sculpture Garden where huge abstract forms fill its shaded garden.

Hepworth herself settled in St Ives pre WWII, to join the artistic set here. Indeed, St Ives has an international reputation as a serious centre for creativity and every September, the town provides a feast of music, books, art, sculpture and pottery.

St Ives has a population of around 11,000 and for several years now, has been voted the best seaside holiday town in the

A certain Saint la of Cornwall, an Irish holy woman in the fifth century AD was reported to have scrambled ashore near where St Ives lies today, when she was shipwrecked. The resulting town was incorporated by Royal Charter in 1639.

Fishing has always been the mainstay of St Ives and back in the 1750s, pilchards were exported to Italy, declining only in the 1950s. Like a lot of commercial fishing, it has been damaged by over-fishing. Crabs and lobsters have replaced the pilchards industry to-

Meanwhile, tin in Cornwall was exploited as early as the Bronze Age and the old brick chimneys today are all that remain of a once flourishing tin mining industry. Copper too was mined.

By the 1840s, many tin and copper miners moved to South Australia as supplies were diminishing in Cornwall and both metals were discovered in that state. There is a saying that 'at the bottom of the deepest mine, you will find a Cornish miner.'

Nowadays, slate, granite and clay for ceramics remain important indus-

The legendary Cornish pastie evolved as a valuable food source for the miners - the thick outer crimped crust was the means by which one grasped this all-in-one meal.

Places of interest near St Ives include the Minack Theatre – a cliff- top auditorium, the Lost Garden of Heligan, the Eden Project and the Geevor Tin Mine, closed since 1990.

Today, St Ives remains a treasured place of history and art with tourism as its core enterprise.

# Ensure you fight the mozzie bite when travelling overseas

THE BIGGEST risk travellers face when going overseas is not being mugged, or blown up by terrorists, but being bitten by a tiny insect transmitting nasty viruses.

Mosquitoes inject a local anaesthetic when they bite you which prevents you noticing until the deed is done. The list of mosquito borne infection is a lengthy one but the most serious and most likely to affect Australian travellers are malaria, yellow fever, dengue, chikingunya, Japanese encephalitis and zika virus.

Check the WA Department of Health website healthywa.wa.gov.au/ Articles/N\_R/Preventmosquito-borne-disease-on-holiday-overseas to find out where each disease is endemic. If you are likely to be at risk, talk to your GP well before you go.

At present vaccines are available only for yellow fever and Japanese encephalitis. Yellow fever vaccine lasts for life so it's a no brainer to get immunised if you are going to tropical África or South America.

Malaria causes nearly 500,000 deaths every year throughout the world. It is widespread throughout the tropics and while there is as yet no vaccine, anti-malarial pills are readily available. Unfortunately some strains of the malaria

parasite are resistant to

some drugs. Check that An initial infection will you have the right antimalarial drug for each region before you go.

Chikungunya is a viral infection transmitted by mosquitoes throughout Africa south of the Sahara and south Asia.

Symptoms of chikungunya include fever, severe joint and muscle pain, headache, nausea, fatigue and rash. Symptoms continue for months or years in some cases.

Japanese encephalitis virus has very mild or no symptoms in most individuals. However, in some cases it can cause inflammation of the brain (encephalitis) resultina in headache, high fever, disorientation, coma, tremors and fits and can lead to permanent brain damage or be fatal.

Vaccination is the most effective form of prevention against Japanese encephalitis. Once infected, there is no specific treatment for the disease.

Dengue causes severe flu-like symptoms including fever, headaches, muscle and joint pains, rash nausea and vomiting. The virus is found in mosquitoes throughout the tropics including north Queensland.

There are five different strains of dengue virus.

result in dengue fever. However, a subsequent infection with a different strain can lead to a severe illness that may be fatal if not treated appropriately.

Zika virus is found throughout the tropics but is particularly severe in north eastern South America

Australian Medical Association president Dr Michael Gannon urges all West Australians travelling to South America to reconsider their travel plans, as health officials struggle to get the current Zika virus pandemic under control.

"Until the current situa-

tion is resolved, we urge people to be extremely cautious about travelling to countries where Zika virus outbreaks have occurred.

"We still have a lot to learn about the virus - it is still very unclear what the exact link between the virus and certain severe birth defects is.

"What we do know is that is a mosquito-borne virus transmitted by a species of the Aedes mosquito", said Dr Gan-

#### Prevent mosquito bites

Many mosquitoes bite around dusk and dawn, but some can bite day and night. The best way prevent mosquitoborne disease is to avoid being bitten.

Dr Cameron Webb, department of medical entomology, University of Sydney, advises travellers to wear long, loose-fitting, light coloured clothing, covering as much of the body as you can. Mosquitoes can bite through tight clothes like ieans.

"DEET and picaridinbased repellents provide the best protection if applied as recommended. Plant-based repellents work, but will need to be reapplied at least three times more frequently.

repellent "Mosquito should be applied first thing in the morning in the tropics as the mosquitoes that transmit pathogens including dengue, chikungunya and zika viruses bite during the day.

"It is also important to remember that these mosquitoes love urban habitats so the risk is just as great around cities as it is in the jungle or rural regions in which you may be travelling.

mosquitoes "These are often not quite as abundant as those that cause so much trouble every year along the coasts of Australia. Don't be complacent and don't wait to notice the mosquitoes before applying insect repellent," said Dr



LOOKING at the stars at night when you visit the Goldfields is a simple yet unbelievably rewarding thing to do.

The night sky becomes a vast display of twinkling lights and if you are really keen to see more than the massive array of stars, then a visit to the NASA website before the trip is a must to find information about when the International Space Station orbits past WA

Another fun thing to watch for is iridium flares caused by the sun being reflected from one of the three main mission antennae (MMA) of an Iridium satellite directly onto the earth below and appearing as a brief, bright flare.

Plenty of websites list the information: try www.heavens-above. com to check for times of their occurrences.

It's an interesting and fun thing to do when seeing the night sky in the outback and a great opportunity to impress your grandchildren with knowledge of the skies above if they are travelling with you.

Many Western Australians have family links to the Goldfields and there is much history to discover. There is a fabulous website called Outback Family History, which also have an active Facebook page as well as a comprehensive historical website.

I found some long lost relatives here and some interesting family heritage from my Italian and English forebears who settled in the Goldfields.

People can visit www.outbackfamilyhistory.com.au and see whether they can find some of their long lost relatives.

This harsh environment offers many opportunities of finding beauty. When I was a young child and travelled to Kalgoorlie I couldn't see the beauty of the landscape. I dreamed of faraway places like England and Europe and thought that the countryside

there was the most beautiful.

## 2016 is a special year for the Coral Coast, both historically and environmentally



The stunning beaches at Shark Bay

THIS YEAR marks the 400th anniversary of Dirk Hartog's visit since Dutch explorer Dirk Hartog left the Netherlands on his epic journey during which he famously stumbled on the island, now known as Dirk Hartog Island, off the coast of Shark Bay on 25 October 1616. Long before Captain James Cook landed on the east coast of Australia in 1770, Hartog had left a pewter plate as a mark of his discovery in WA. There will be a week-long celebration in Shark Bay from 20 – 25 October. To learn more visit www.sharkbay1616.com

Anniversary Commemorations will be held in Carnarvon and Geraldton on Saturday 19 November 2016 marking 75 years of the HMAS Sydney II - Australia's greatest naval tragedy. The Sydney was sunk by the HSK Kormoran, a German raider disguised as

a Dutch merchant ship, none of the 645 crew members survived. Visit Geraldton's HMAS Sydney Memorial, one of eight Federal Memorials of National Significance (the only one in WA).

Swimming with humpback whales will become a reality on the Ningaloo Reef, as the second location in Australia to offer this experience. Existing holders of whale shark operators have the opportunity to conduct whale swimming tours which will allow them to extend the current whale shark season (March - July in Exmouth and March to June in Coral Bay) into the humpback migration (July to October annually). Swimming interactions will be completely on the whale's terms, so if behaviour and weather allows, there will be the chance for a genuine wildlife encounter in the water.

The Coral Coast seafood indus-

try continues to thrive. In 2000, the Lobster Shack of Cervantes became the first fishery in Australia to receive the world Marine Stewardship Council (MSC) Fisheries Standard certification, recognising sustainable seafood. Tourists can learn more and enjoy eating a Western Rock lobster on factory tours in Cervantes and Geraldton as well as pot-pulling and fishing tours in Kalbarri. Carnarvon is also home to Western Australia's signature dish, Shark Bay wild chilli prawns and mackerel mousse in a zucchini noodle seafood broth, judged as part of the annual Margaret River Gourmet Escape fes-

## Whale sharks arrive early to the Ningaloo

NINGALOO has welcomed some of its most famous annual visitors well ahead of time this year.

Whale sharks visit Ningaloo Reef each year from autumn to spring, but they have arrived much earlier than their normal mid-March appearance. Reports of sightings off Exmouth have been coming in since late January.

The first tour of 2016 to

The first tour of 2016 to swim with whale sharks

took place off Exmouth on 17 February, with local operator Ningaloo Blue Dive swimming with a very inquisitive eight metre long whale shark that delighted the tour group.

Since then, tours have been taking place three times a week and multiple whale sharks have been sighted and swum with on each tour.

Exmouth Visitor Centre general manager, Kristy Bryan-Smith said the early arrival of whale sharks this year was good news for visitors.

"The typical season for Ningaloo whale sharks is March-August, triggered by the annual Ningaloo Reef coral spawning which takes place around the full moon in March

To see whale sharks

arriving before this event is a really good sign for a long whale shark season ahead, particularly with the Easter public holiday weekend falling in March this year," she said.

Whale sharks have also been sighted off Coral Bay, 150 kilometres south of Exmouth, and whale shark swim tours are expected to begin operating out of Coral Bay soon.

Ningaloo is one of the only places on the planet where these huge but completely harmless sharks can be reliably located in large aggregations, providing a ready opportunity for visitors to experience the thrill of swimming right beside these largest fish in the sea.

this was the second year running that whale sharks had arrived early on at Ningaloo.

"Whale shark movements to and from the Ningaloo Reef vary from year to year, but the trend in recent years has been for them to arrive earlier and stay longer than has been the norm in the past.

"In 2013 and 2014, the whale sharks stuck around until late October, so the opportunity for visitors to see and swim with these spectacular creatures just seems to be increasing here on the Ningaloo," Ms Bryan-Smith said.



It is clear from the notebook entries that Sally Elliott is alive and happy on the island. After finding a wreck of a yacht she is able to use many of the items that were salvageable and important to her very existence on the island. From packets of seeds and dried up vegetables she grew her own.

Peter eventually contacts her but she asks that he keep her survival a secret for now as she didn't want the world's attention on her. He agreed but would return in three months. This he did by working as a cook's assistant on one of the survey ships.

He discovers that the cook, apart from being a drunk, has some images of a dubious nature on this computer concerning children. Peter's young son was murdered by a man such as this a few years earlier and Peter was determined to bring him justice.

But after confiding in Sally she waited for the cook to come ashore drunk as usual and battered his head in with a hammer that she found on the wreck (the same hammer was used to crack open coconuts; very resourceful is Sally) and without remorse she buried him in the dunes, she exonerated herself because this was a crime of passion.

This is a good read, a little tongue in cheek perhaps but overall a satisfying well thought out novel.







# In search of the elusive catch - the Spanish mackerel...

THIS is a great time of year for fishing almost anywhere along the vast WA

coastline. The weather is usually at its most settled, the temperature is generally comfortable and best of all, there's a good

chance there will be fish about, even around Perth.

One of my favourite species to catch in metro waters in autumn is the electrifyingly fast Spanish mackerel. These fish have it all, speed, stamina, good looks, impressive size and great eating qualities. The only downside is the mackerel's set of razor sharp teeth that demand a certain amount of caution when handling it. Keep your fingers away from the mouth and never bring a lively mackerel into a small boat. If you are going to keep the fish, make sure it's pacified before hoisting it over the

Finding Spaniards in metro waters isn't always easy but when you find one, chances are you will pick up two or three. Places to try include along the back of the Three-Mile reef sys-

gunwale.

tem, along the back of Five Fathom Bank, off the south side of Rottnest and at West End.

There are even occasional fish caught from shore each autumn, usually by floating a big bait out under a balloon in a strong easterly breeze in the morning. Places where this has been successful include the reef at Yanchep Lagoon, North Mole and even Cockburn Sound jetties.

If you have access to a boat, trolling for them is generally more productive. Big minnow style lures account for most fish and the go-to lures for this include big Rapalas and my own favourite, a Halco Laser Pro 190 DD. This reasonably

priced lure is built super tough and is extremely reliable straight out of the box. I'd be amazed if it hasn't accounted for more mackies in Australian waters than most of the rest combined

Best trolling speed is at around six knots. Keep an eye out for bait schools being harassed from below. A patch of excited seabirds, wheeling and screeching is a pretty good indicator of an area worth trolling past.

Despite the universal popularity of braided lines, trolling for energetic fish like mackerel is an easier proposition with good old monofilament, where the line stretch dampens down the effects of violent head

shaking. Generally 8-10 kg line is a good choice for mackerel trolling and your reel needs a capacity of 250m or so, just on the off chance you hook a monster.

The fight is most often a long first run, followed by one or two shorter runs. The Spaniard isn't a species that sulks around down deep as a rule.

Finally, when you catch a Spaniard, get it on ice as soon as possible. A fillet of Spaniard caught that day is an absolute delight on a hotplate in the evening. It doesn't need fancy sauces, just a squeeze of lemon and salt and pepper will produce one of the best seafood eating experiences





FRESH off the back of the biggest year in WA cruising history, 2016 is set to topple 2015 as our love of cruising continues to grow. With more than 50 ships in Australian waters, and 100,000 people expected to set sail from Fremantle, the choice can be a bit daunting. 



It is advisable to wear loose, white cotton garments.

The colourful Gulal powder can be purchased directly from the festival.

The Festival will not be cancelled in the event of rain, however if the forecast is for very heavy rain, the Festival will be switched to Sunday. You will be informed in time via the festival Facebook Page or the link below.

1 boneless double short loin of lamb, flap on about 2kg 4 boiled eggs peeled and cold extra virgin olive oil (EVOO) Western Australian salt cooking string to tie roast meat thermometer to check internal temperature Filling ingredients 350g minced lamb

½ small onion finely diced 1/3 cup finely diced carrot 1 raw egg beaten 60 ml milk 1 cup stale bread

½ tablespoon mild mustard 1/3 cup Italian parsley chopped roughly

½ tablespoon finely chopped rosemary leaves pinch nutmea **WA** salt

cracked black pepper extra virgin olive oil (EVOO)

## Method

SALT and pepper the inside of the meat and remove about three finger lengths of lamb flap on each flap - cut in a straight line and set aside. (You will use these to hold the stuffing in).

Now make the filling by first frying the onion in 100ml of EVOO until it is soft, then add the carrot and cook together for two minutes, then take off the heat and allow to cool.

Next add the egg. milk and bread and mix thoroughly. Follow this by adding the mustard, parsley, rosemary, nutmeg and lamb mince and mix really well again and season with salt and pepper

before mixing again.

Then put half your filling onto the middle of the seasoned lamb loin, add your whole boiled eggs on the filling in pairs, side by side all touching.

Cover the eggs with the second half of the filling, wrapping the eggs so they can't be seen and are cocooned inside.

Now wrap the lamb flaps around the filling to create a tubular roll like an oval log with all the filling trapped inside and tie with string vertically. Don't tie

the string too tight.

Then use the two pieces of lamb flaps you have cut as ends to the roll to ensure the stuffing doesn't come out during the cooking process.

Tie the ends horizontally and use lots of cotton string to hold it together.

Bake immediately or the following day after storing in the fridge overnight.

Roast at 150°C for two to two and half hours, longer if you like it very well done, check with your meat thermometer that the internal temperature is 60°C at the centre where the eggs are for a perfect result.

Rest for 20 minutes covered in alfoil before carving, serve hot or cold.

# **Brunch with T - BamBamBoo in the city**

I'VE returned to Perth after my trip to Japan and Korea and I had such a great time that I want to go again, so this month I have kept with the Oriental theme for brunch.

Taylah (who travelled with me) and I decided to venture out for yum cha and eat dim sum at the BamBamBoo Chinese restaurant.

Yum cha is a type of Chinese style brunch tea, which involves drinking Chinese tea and eating dim sum. Dim sum is dishes of small steamed or fried savoury dumplings containing various

BamBamBoo owners previously owned the Grand Palace which was renowned for its delicious Chinese cuisine.

Although not a traditional yum cha setting with the carts coming around filled with offerings - we love BamBam-Boo because they serve dim sum all day long from 11am-8.30pm<sup>2</sup> except Sundays when they close at 4.30pm.

When you arrive at BamBamBoo you order on an iPad which displays pictures of the dishes and lists all the ingredients contained in the dish. This is very helpful if you are a little hesitant at stepping out of your comfort zone with the food

Taylah and I may have over ordered, as often happens at yum cha but another favourite thing I like about BamBamBoo is you can ask for a container and to take leftovers home. They also offer takeaway food.

The other thing I admire about this restaurant is the service is always very quick, even when they are very busy.

There are so many options to eat here, but these are favourite dishes that make up the highlights of a yum cha expe-

Shanghai dumplings (xiao long bao – \$6.50 for six pieces) are little steamed morsels filled with pork and soup. These are essential ordering as far as I am concerned.

They are amazing here but do be very careful as they come out steaming hot and if you pop them in your mouth too soon they can feel like a volcano.

Allow a few minutes for them to cool down and then grab the top of the dumpling gently with your fingers and pop whole into your mouth for the delicious soup to tantalise your taste buds. Sometimes one serve is iust never enough.

As we are regulars for dinner here I requested the Peking duck pancakes (\$18.80 for 4 pieces) which is featured on the dinner menu but not on the lunch one.

It is an amazing taste sensation and BamBam-Boo barbecue their own ducks and other meats.

The dish is served separately with pancakes, crispy skinned duck, hoisin sauce and shredded Chinese cabbage, carrot and spring onion, which you pile together on your pancake, smother in sauce and fold and eat.

I'm not a big fan of seafood but Taylah loves it, so she ordered the chilli fried squid tentacles (\$7.20) which are always a popular dish at Yum Cha. These ones are crisp and tender in a delicious spicy light batter.

Taylah's favourite is the hao gao (\$6 for four pieces) which are steamed prawn dumplings, but this

food chive dumpling (\$6 for four pieces) but she said the hao gao is better as they are bursting with tender and juicy prawns.

I particularly love the stir-fried Chinese radish cake (lo bak go - \$6.20), the flavours are subtle, it's not spicy but is pan fried with spring onions.

We call the cha siu bao (steamed pork buns - \$6.80 for three pieces) fluffy buns and they are another favourite of mine. The light fluffy sweet dough encases a lovely char sui pork filling.

There are vegetarian options as well and they are all delicious.

As well as dim sum, they offer a variety of Chinese teas, a selection of soups, noodle dishes and barbecue meats and delicious sweet custard buns. The menu is comprehensive and very well priced.

Besides the delicious food, the atmosphere of BamBamBoo is very modern with street art on the walls, some communal tables, some very modern donut chairs and tables and they are licensed.

The roof has bamboo hanging down and the setting is modern Asian.

It's always fun to visit and eat there and I think it's more welcoming than some of the more traditional Yum Cha restaurants.

I've been back to this restaurant many times and the quality of ingredients and consistency of food and service each time means that I have awarded them a hearty four spoons.

## What's fresh for March



ROYAL Gala Apples: For the lovers of freshly harvested fruit, the new season Roy al Gala is a welcome arrival on the fruit scene. They are as sweet, crisp and juicy as you would expect from a freshly picked apple, with a beautiful peach coloured skin and an exterior of red stripes over a pale cream background. Choose carefully, keep your purchases in the fridge until you are ready to eat them and you'll be rewarded with a perfect eating experience. Gala apples make wonderfully moist cakes and muffins and are fantastic in a hearty crumble.

Bartlett Pears: Another lovely new-seasoner, Bartlett Pears are a light green to yellow pear, or a red-green in the case of 'Red Sensation' Bartlett's. They're medium sized and are sweet and aromatic with the Red Sensation being slightly tarter. These pears are a good all-rounder being suitable for both cooking and eating fresh. To test for ripeness, the flesh near the stem should give when gently pressed. It's often best to buy them quite firm and let them ripen at room temperature for a couple of days, however remember that pears ripen from the inside out, so don't leave them too long. Pears and a strong cheese such as a blue or a goat's cheese are a gorgeous combination.

Cucumbers: Indeed a very cool addition to salads and dips. Picking up a cucumber to feel its weight is a good indication of freshness; they should feel heavy and have firm, bright-looking skin. Lebanese and Burpless (Continental) cucumbers are very similar in texture and flavour but they differ in size, the Lebanese being the smaller of the two. One of the most commonly asked questions about cucumbers is whether to peel and de-seed? The best way to decide this is to slice a small round off the cucumber. If the skin is tough and the seeds are large and bitter, it's best to peel and deseed it. A fantastic way to eat cucumbers is in a home-made Tzatsiki, a Greek yoghurt-based dip. Simply peel and seed one cucumber and combine with natural yoghurt and minced garlic to taste.

Sweetcorn: Nothing beats piping hot sweetcorn eaten straight off the cob, and thankfully luscious juicy cobs are now plentiful. Use as soon as possible after purchase and cook for a short time only. Steaming for about seven minutes allows corn to maintain all its lovely succulence and flavour. Sweet corn works well on the barbecue, either whole wrapped in foil or back in its original husk, or in chunky slices threaded on skewers and brushed with good olive oil. Sweet corn is wonderful with crab or prawns and works particularly well with butter, garlic and cumin.

Meanwhile, place chick peas, two tablespoons yoghurt, tahini, lemon juice and remaining oil in a food processor. Process until smooth. Transfer to a medium bowl. Process mushrooms until finely chopped. Stir mushroom mixture and remaining yoghurt into chick pea mixture. Stir through chives and season with salt and pepper. Cover and refrigerate for one hour. Sprinkle with extra chives and drizzle with oil to serve, if desired. Serve with wafer biscuits.

1 Lebanese cucumber, grated or finely diced

½ cup natural yoghurt

½ clove garlic, crushed

**Upper Reach 2015 Black Bream White.** This classic white blend of Chardonnay and Verdelho is all fruit salad with luscious sweetness and a fresh finish. Great with spicy food. RRP \$15.

# Looking at the pros and cons of downsizing

UK homeowners aged 55 or older. The results are applicable to Australian conditions with the exception of the effect of downsizing on pensions.

All UK pensioners receive a basic pension regardless of their income and assets. This is because, unlike Australian aged pensions, UK pensions are funded by personal contributions not taxation. The consequence is that there is less financial disincentive to downsize amongst pensioners with substantial assets.

While 44 per cent reported they did not expect to downsize at any time, 48 per cent had either already downsized, were currently considering it, or expect to consider it in the future.

Over half the over 75s expect never to downsize compared to around 40 per cent of younger age groups.

Reasons given for downsizing included:

**Financial** Benefits: Downsizing allows home owners to gain access to the wealth held in their properties. This was the most important reason, though reducing the costs of bills was more important than releasing equity. Nonetheless, close to a third of respondents did or expect to release at least \$200.000 by downsizing.

Most plan to put this into a savings account. Younger seniors plan to put it toward their superannuation, but the next most common use being

to enhance their day-today life. Big purchases and reducing debts were less common, while gifting it to family members was much higher for those aged over 70.

Reduced Maintenance: Having fewer rooms and space to care for can be a relief to people as they get older. This was the most important reason why 56 per cent of people had downsized or would consider it.

Health **Benefits:** Downsizing allows people to move into properties that are better suited to their physical needs. two-thirds of Nearly homeowners in the survey reported improved wellbeing after moving into specialist retirement housina.

**Benefits:** Social

Downsizing can be a good opportunity for people to put themselves in a better position to encourage greater social contact and interaction in later life.

Reasons for not downsizing include:

**Emotional** Factors: Nearly one in three people, especially those over 75, reported that their sentimental attachment to their homes was a deterrent to downsizing.

Factor: Nuisance The disruptive nature of moving - packing up the house or exploring the housing market - put off people from considering downsizing. Again this was particularly important amongst the oldest age

Esteem Factor: The pride people take in their homes may discourage

downsizing in case it is perceived by others as moving into lesser quality accommodation.

Hospitality Factor: Some older households value having additional space, such as extra bedrooms, as a place to accommodate guests and family.

Cost Factor: The costs associated with the process, such as stamp duty and real estate agent's fees can be discouraging.

The International Longevity Centre says there is a need to raise awareness of the benefits of downsizing in later life and encourage older people to think about their future needs such as care, rather than waiting until a shock event forces them to make changes.

The talks will focus on email deception, password protection, Wi-Fi security, and digital legacies including financial, social, and legal vulner-

COTA WA and Edith Cowan University have received a grant from the Department of the Attorney General to host cyber safety workshops for the people in WA. The first round of presentations takes place this month.

# **Proper preparation** can prevent a later challenge to the will

IN WA certain persons, including spouses, children and in some cases step-children, have the right to challenge the disposition of assets via a Will following a will maker's death. Often disgruntled beneficiaries are given a free ride to contest an estate as in most cases, even where such a person is unsuccessful in their claim, their legal costs are met from the assets of the estate.

Most commonly, wills are challenged because it is alleged that the will maker did not make adequate provision for the claimant or on the basis that the will maker lacked testamentary capacity or was placed under undue influence at the time of making the will.

If you are concerned about challenges being made to your will, it

is imperative that you seek specialist legal advice. A specialist lawyer can discuss various estate planning strategies which have the effect of mitigating the threats of a claim being made in due course.

All persons (not only those of advanced years) should also prepare legal documents that allow someone else to make financial and lifestyle decisions for them while they are still alive but for any reason can't make those decisions for themselves. 

## Ensure your will is written by a legal practitioner for peace of mind

MANY people put off making a will until it becomes a 'must do' or urgent need.

Often at this point it is tempting to have a go at making a will with a kit from the Post Office or even a DIY will.

But beware.

Don't be tempted by a quick fix will kit.

A will kit bought from the post office or simply a DIY Will can have serious repercussions on the surviving family members.

If it is written incorrectly it can lead to family confusion, expensive legal bills and worst of all the division of a family over squabbles about the estate and where it goes.

The court, law firms and will writing and estate planning specialists, like Willcraft, often see the results of a poorly or incorrectly completed will kit or DIY will.

"It is imperative that something as important as the distribution of one's entire wealth should be dealt with by qualified legal practitioners and be professionally completed,' said Colin Chapman, founder and client services director of Willcraft Estate Planning Pty

"The temptation to have a go at it in a DIY fashion with a low cost will kit is extremely dangerous.

"A professionally drafted will, along with the corresponding enduring powers is basically a one off cost. Compare this to other family budget items such as health insurance, house insurance, car insurance, car rego, etc. all payable monthly or annually and indefinitely. Making a will professionally and correctly is, in reality, a really small cost to protect what can be a substantial amount of

"Writing a will can also deal with many other aspects of life such as protecting vulnerable or minor beneficiaries, protecting property, keeping businesses and trusts running smoothly and in the right hands providing for your family in the long term.

Some reasons you should not use a will kit are:

A will kit in Australia often makes it easier for someone to challenge a will.

1. Your wishes may not be carried out. Using a will kit makes your will more susceptible to challenges as they can easily be misinterpreted and ambiguous if not drafted properly (which is often the case). Your will is also less likely to be legally binding and executed correctly. There are strict laws surrounding amending and executing a will which must be complied with.

## Model makers never get old - meet Bob the model ship builder

YOU'VE probably seen the advertisements on

"Build the German World War II battleship, the Bismarck (or something similar). Get a piece of the ship in the post every month, along with an informative booklet, until the model is complete."

When Bob Gilbert retired, he thought he would spend all his time playing golf, but when he saw that exact ad, he thought he'd give it

a go.

"I'd get the bit in the mail and have it built in 30 seconds and then I had nothing to do for

the rest of the month," he said. "So, I built a bigger one - that slowed me

That bigger one took four and a half years to complete and is to a 1:80 scale of the real thing, so it can fit on his box trailer for trans-

It's 3m long and weights 70kg. He needs a trolley to get it to the water at Ranford Lake. near Livingston Shopping Centre in Canning Vale on Sundays, when he sails it.

If you happen to be there when Bob is, you'll

know it's him. The Johnny Horton song, Sink the Bismarck is playing from speakers coming from out of the ship. The eight-channel transmitter he will be holding also allows him to play the sounds of incoming bomb shells and subsequent explosions and he'll sound the ship's horn if one of the smaller models on the water gets in his way.

The member of the Australian Model Ship Society wanted to go a step further, but laws in WA wouldn't allow it.

"I thought it would be a great idea to have working guns and shoot at the other boats,' the 69-year-old said. "But it's not allowed in

"I went to the Morley Police Station and told them I wanted to fire it; make guns, with all the smoke and stuff.

"When the constable told his sergeant, they just both laughed. It's ballistics, so I'm not allowed to do it.

"They are allowed to in Victoria."

The model of the US World War II battleship, the Missouri, that Bob is working on now (and almost completed) is a little longer than the Bismarck and as well as being able to control the moving of the guns from side-to-side, he can also move them up and down.

The technology he uses has improved too. Bob has bought a 3D printer and makes a lot of the parts himself, which has sped up construction time dramatically, although this July marks three years that he has been working

The challenging part is designing and drawing his own pieces, but Bob used to teach aspects of the engineering trades, such as robotics, so it's not entirely alien to him - and a lot of the info he needs can now be found online.

Having been retired for nine years, he knows that he needs to keep his mind active.

He tried playing golf when he first retired and got his handicap down to 10 before he gave it away. And assisting his wife Sandra in the garden is restricted to mowing the lawn. Building ships has filled the void.

"I have to use a bit of grey brain matter to draw it, then convert it to the computer and push the button to print," he said. "But there's an old saying that model makers never get old."

The Australian Model Ship Society will display at the Bayswater River Festival on 3 April.



When it also involves guilbulbs it will certainly make me sit up and take notice. I thoroughly enjoy picking out bulbs and planting them in pots and in the

garden, but for many gardeners it can be quite confusing. How deep should they be planted, how far apart, which way up do they go up and so on.

Bulbs are a ready-made flower waiting to burst and brighten up your garden. Usually the flower is formed the year before and is already present in the bulb. All it needs from you is a bit of water, soil and fertiliser and away it goes. Some bulbs require a chilling period of four to six weeks below 5°C to initiate and improve flowering, particularly tulips, hyacinths and crocuses. The veggie crisper in the fridge is ideal for this. Some bulb companies can pre-chill them for you.

Many bulbs are extremely waterwise as they grow during the cooler, wetter winter and spring months and then die down during the warmer weather until they pot up again next spring. All they needs is some slow release fertiliser like Osmocote in autumn and liquid feeding with a high potash liquid feed such as Yates or Manutec Liguid Potash, Powerfeed for Flowers and Fruit or Miracle Gro MaxFeed Flowers and Blooms, just as they come into flower and for around four weeks after to build up the bulbs for flowering the following year. Many bulbs can be left to naturalise in the ground for many years. Bulbs suited to naturalising in WA include daffodils and jonquils, freesias, grape hyacinths, sparaxis, tritonia, iris, snowflakes, spring starflowers and bluebells.



But back to the planting, well this has been changed forever with the innovative ready-to-plant bulb trays from Mr Fothergill's. Similar to the trays for fruit or eggs, each of these biodegradable trays are already pre-spaced and filled with

an assortment of forty-five flowering bulbs. All that is needed is for you to dig a hole to the required depth and cover it with soil. Even easier is part filling a container, placing the tray and then covering it with potting mix.

There are three mixes in the range to help your garden come alive in spring including tulip and friends, daffodil and friends. Your friends will wonder how you created such a fantastic display; it can be our little secret.

## Pamela's passion for dance took her from childhood to overseas fame

LIKE many people in Perth's dancing fraternity Pamela Humphreys started dancing at an early

Born Pamela Strickland in February 1943, the eldest of four siblings, she spent her childhood in Floreat Park. After some years learning ballet and piano Pamela, aged 12, took up dancing, learning and taking her medal's exams with Jim Maschmedt.

Partnered by Barry Wrightson, she won her first bronze medal and discovered a real passion for dance.

She recalls being inspired and encouraged by watching exhibition and cabaret routines danced by the Wrightsons, Roy and June Mavor, John and Betty Harrison and Barry and Dorothy Meakins.

Pam started her working life with her father next door to Victoria Hall in Fremantle. She was offered a new dance partnership between Alwyn Dedman or Len Humphreys (a Year 12 student and prefect at John Curtin High School), choosing the latter.

The rest became their family history with a long, colourful and illustrious career which took them around the country and overseas.

The couple's first maior title was the Novice Champion title at the Port Festival in Fremantle. In a few years they had won numerous State ballroom titles and were chosen to represent WA at the Australasian Championships in Auckland in 1961.

In 1963 the couple turned professional, winthe Professional Ballroom (Standard) Rising Star championships. Pam studied under Robert Wrightson to attain her associate diplomas in Ballroom and Latin and expanded her competitive career with Len by adding exhibition to their portfo-

lio.
With routines choreographed by Shelda Wrightson, they had huge success in this field, winning the Professional Rising Star, State, Australasian and South Pacific titles. They were also kept regularly employed, dancing cabaret shows in metropolitan and country areas.

In November 1964 Pam and Len marred at Saint Nicholas Anglican Church in Floreat Park. During their honeymoon in Sydney, they found time to compete in a major championship at the old Trocadera Ballroom. Soon after their return home, Pam and Len danced their Ballroom Oscar at Canterbury Court.

In 1967 Pam and Len left Wrightsons to open their own school at the Victoria Park RSL Hall. June that year saw the happy arrival of their first child, Debbie-Anne, after which they moved their school to the old Alexandria Theatre on Albany Highway, Victoria Park. The building was purchased two years later in a deal brokered by Pam's father and was to remain the school's headquarters for the next 30 years. In 1971 and 1972 second daughter Melanie and son Brendan arrived.

Pamela and opened their first branch of their school, buying the old Police and Citizen's centre in Medina. Pamela continued to teach throughout this period and, in 1974, she completed her Members degrees in Ballroom and Latin with FATD (Federal Association of Teachers of Dance).

With Pamela's sister and brother-in-law managing the school, the couple made a big step in their careers and personal lives, moving their family to England. They set about an intensive six months of training with coaching greats such as Bill and Bobby Irvine, Anthony Hurley, Peter Eggleton, Alan and Hazel Fletcher, Sonny Binick and Benny Tolmeyer (Pamela's favourite).

The couple attended lectures to help improve teaching techniques and danced at the British Open and World Championships at Blackpoolintimidating but a dream come true for Pamela.

In 1979 the couple returned to London for six weeks competing and studying after which they moved back to WA to settle permanently. The couple continued to compete until 1982, winning several State Ballroom titles. Studying with Bob Potter in Sydney, Pamela completed both her Fellows degrees in the mid 1980s.

The studio relocated to its present position in the Victoria Park Centre in 1996 where it remains one of WA's foremost schools of dance. In

In 2003 Pamela was awarded the Order of Australia Medal for services to the profession, scholarship and program for schools.

After the arrival of three grandchildren and an amicable divorce, Pamela married Joseph Martino in 2009. The family, including Debbie-Anne and husband Glen Tierney, Melanie and Brendan. all work together sharing staff between the studio and Pamela's business, Pamela Humphreys Dance Program, which continues to take a comprehensive dance program into more than 100

schools throughout WA.

Next year will see Humphreys Dance Studio celebrate the 50th anniversary of teaching Western Australians to dance.







WEARING a cat costume eight times a week might not be everyone's idea of fun during a long hot summer, but Sydney performer Chris Favaloro takes it all in his stride as he tours the country with the acclaimed revival of Andrew Lloyd Webber's record-breaking musical CATS

Favaloro, 25, who visits Perth with CATS in April, confesses to wearing a new costume during a phone interview from Brisbane where the show is currently running.

"We have a great wardrobe department and I've just been fitted with a new costume," he said. "Eight times a week takes its toll on costumes and sometimes washing is not enough and they lose their elasticity. The costumes are quite hot in an Australian summer, especially when wearing a full body leotard. I wear black most of the time so I absorb heat off the stage.

"As Mr Mistoffelees I'm in black velvet which doesn't help. But the roles I play of Quaxo and Mr Mistoffelees are just so\_rewarding

Favaloro is somewhat of a veteran with CATS which stars popular Australian singer and performer Delta Goodrem as Grizabella. He started off with the show in South Korea in April 2014 and has visited there with the show on two occasions. He has also been to Singapore, Macau and New

Zealand. Following a triumphant season in London's West End, the acclaimed revival of Andrew Lloyd Webber's record-breaking musical opened in Sydney last October. then went to Hobart, Melbourne, Brisbane, Adelaide and now Perth.

CATS is a story based on TS Eliot's Old Possum's Book of Practical Cats set against a larger-then-life junkyard

Mod Dance Company as principal dancer and later performed in many Opera Australia productions including Baz Luhrmann's A Midsummer Night's Dream. He is uncertain where

he will head career wise after CATS ends, but says he would like to travel overseas properly to see the United States and Europe.

Ronald Thomas continued to perform in concerts in Europe until 1990.


