

# WA's solo sailor drops anchor

JON Sanders, who has had the wind in his sails for more than 70 years, earning him boat loads of sailing world records, believes keeping active is central to a contented life.

"At least it is for me," says Jon at Royal Perth Yacht Club, home to his history-making, bluehulled yacht.

"People in retirement should do what suits them. Jump in the car and drive around Australia; or go on the Queen Mary 2; or the Ghan. But you do need to do something physical," says the living legend.

Coming up for 79, the oldest person to circumnavigate the world and

the only person to do it 10 times, Jon has set a simple course to sail to his final sunset. Merely to stay active, sailing only locally and leisurely.

Asked how he'd like to be remembered, Jon says: "I don't know how I'll be treated when I'm gone. I'm not like that. I suppose I might be a bit of a legend for a while. And then I won't.

In the world of sailors there are the elite, the super sailors and the legends. Jon qualifies as all

There are few ports, even the remotest spots around the world, where Jon Sanders isn't recognised and hailed. He's sailed into ports so many times, he can do it with his

eyes shut.

"I sleep at night while sailing," he confirms, "My body clock wakes me every 20 minutes to check the instruments."

These days, boat, Perie Banou II, is fitted with technology that detects and reports nearby ships or fishing boats.

"Where I mostly go, near islands, there's not much traffic. But you always have to be aware of boats. There are more fishing boats, I reckon, than there are fish."

Jon sights plenty of whales and believes they're growing in numbers.

On his latest circumnavigation feat, Jon sailed for 15 months over 28,844 nautical miles.

"This one was easy," he says, choosing to take his time.

Before he got his sturdy sea legs, Jon was a wool classer, sub-contracting his outfit to WA's big sheep stations.

Then a landlubber, he used his money to dabble with boats until his hobby steered him out to sea. His mostly solo existence, far away from civilisation and at the fate of the elements, was led by his passion for new horizons.

But he's not a recluse. "I like being with people, but in what I do on a boat of my size (13m) it's a bit tight for others to

"I enjoy sailing with the crews bringing boats to

Australia from Japan or Hong Kong or Indonesia," he said. Jon says his life's choice wasn't conducive to marriage and he's remained single.

Jon won't touch alcohol while sailing but says he enjoys a beer and a restaurant meal while catching up with people after he comes into a port.

His sailing life is frugal; something light to nibble for breakfast and during the day but making himself an evening meal.

"It's mostly canned or packaged. I make a point of having greens and healthy food," he says.

With a heart scare behind him, Jon is feeling his ageing bones but is committed to being as active as possible. He accepts what the proverbial tide washes in and paces himself.

Jon keeps in touch with another West Aussie solo-sailor, David Dicks, the youngest man to circumnavigate the world.

"He sometimes helps me with the boat," Jon says of the younger man he inspired.

David is now a commercial helicopter pilot, flying passengers from a luxury Kimberley cruise boat to tourist hotspots. David, father-of-three, follows in the family tradition with his dad, mum and sister all flyers.

In honour of a triple-circumnavigation, the Royal Perth Yacht Club awarded Jon its inaugural James Cook Award, a gold medallion for sailors who have performed 'rare and exceptional feats of seamanship and navigation'.

The club supports its world-honoured member. arranging advance moorings for him around the world, handling arrangements for his various attempts and assisting with the media. Various companies provide Jon with materials including Rolly Tasker sails and from B & G, his major sponsor, more than \$40,000 in electronic equipment, including his navigation system.

### Doing it his way - Basil Zempilas talks about work, family and sport

BASIL Zempilas says he has a funny name, a big nose and an unusual face. Hardly attributes for a national television presenter. But he is poised for even bigger things.

Baz has prospered and vived, now boomed in front of national TV cameras. winning over mass audiences with his personalitv. smooth delivery and man-next-door touch.

No-one has done it quite like Baz. And he's truly done it his way.

"I think it's a mistake trying to pretend you are somebody you're not." he says simply.

When I track him down interstate, Baz (everyone calls him Baz) is on yet another sports assignment while swattingup on sports happenings around the world.

As Channel 7's national sports presenter, Baz has to cover an enormous range of events that form the basis for extremely important happenings in the lives of millions sports. He's up there to be analysed, scrutinised and judged. How does he do it?

"I have an intense swatting period every January, for example, of tennis. And as it gets closer to the Olympics, I'll have a different focus and, of course, there's a football focus as we approach the season," he says.

"I also present sports news on nightly television, so that helps keep me informed.'

Baz says he also has a thick skin and can laugh at himself.

Turning 47 in July, Baz has put in the vears, the sweat and the focus. Somehow he makes it seem like a breeze.

"It helps that my hobby is also my work. Truly, I am lucky", he says.

Baz says no-one is more supportive than Amy, his wife and mother of their three children. Ava, 7, Chloe 4 and Anthony six months.

husband thinks his wife is incredible but Amy really is that and extremely capable.

I was away for 10 days covering the world swimming championships last vear just after Anthony's birth and Amy was juggling a newborn and the girls and doing everything else. I really appreciate and love her for how she

Baz is in and out of home every working day which begins with a 4.30am walk from his home to 6PR's studios where he's a breakfast radio commentator.

He gets home about

9.30am to catch-up with Amy and kids and do a couple of hours of homework before leaving for Seven's studios.

Usually home by 7pm, Baz gets the children to catching-up with bed. their stories.

He's away at weekends, co-hosting Weekend Sunrise and covering the things that dominate his busy life sports.

"When I started media courses, I wasn't desperate to become a sports journalist but when handing out assignments lecturers knew I was playing footy for West Perth would say: "Basil, you know something about sport you can cover that.

"It was probably an advantage.

Baz was named as one of the best players in his side and noted by Eagles talent scouts.

It was Baz's destiny. And he has made a fist of it, slipping into commentary on footy, tennis, swimming and myriad elite-level sports.

Baz's timing was perfect, stepping into roles occupied by the legendary Dennis Cometti.

On our screens, Baz, doesn't come across as egotistical, excessively facts-filled or intrusive in our lounge rooms.

"I'm just me. I think the person you see in the queue at the shops should be the same person you see on TV.

In Basil's media evolution, he has been able to embrace general current affairs topics as well as sports, firstly on breakfast radio and now on breakfast television.

Baz's life is rich, professionally and personally, not least because of his proud Greek roots.

Baz's mum, Jessie, was born on the Greek island Kastellorizo where Baz and Amy were married. Baz's dad, Anthonv. born in Perth, also has Greek heritage.

The Zempilas families regularly visit each other. Baz has two sisters, Diane, and Roslyn.

Baz, by all accounts, was a cheerful pupil at Floreat Park Primary School before attending Hale School.

After school he played footy for Perth. He went on to Murdoch University, graduating with a Bachelor of Arts degree and a double major in Communications and English and Comparative Literature. Baz also picked-up a Graduate Diploma of Journalism.

In his final university year, Baz began reporting for the Sunday Times; working as a casual covering athletics at Perry Lakes Stadium.

He was a volunteer radio broadcaster on RTRFM, a writer for Westside Football and editor of new junior sports newspaper, Rookies Review.

In 1994 Baz became a



We worked a 10-hour day, 60 hour week - a more boring job would be hard to find, upload four bucket loads then away to the crusher, twelve-fifteen round

I was then offered the fuel tanker, refuelling all machines on site sometimes twice a day which boosted my hours to nearly 80.

The giant shovels took three hundred gallons per shift. I also drove the works bus having twenty-one nationalities in the forty-six seats, never any aggro, first fist raised both out on the next plane.

I'm sure a few of the old guys are still around to say "Yer'e, I worked there," with pride in their voices. I'd love to get in contact.



### Save the Children - there is still a big need for this quiet achiever







Save the Children (STC) programs in the Dampier Peninsula

IT seems a world away from the city but Save the Children (STC) Australia state manager Juan Fernando Larranaga was off to the Kimberley at the start of a busy year for the organisation. Established in 1919, Save the Children has a long and illustrious history of helping achieve change in disadvantaged childrens' lives

"Our big focus is on working with the most vulnerable and disadvantaged communities in WA, equipping children and helping them engage meaningfully with quality education," Mr Larranaga says at the STC's West

Perth headquarters. More than 110 people work for the organisation across WA, including 17 in Perth and there are about 700 volunteers. The STC has branches in Armadale, Gosnells, Newman, Dampier Peninsula and Kununurra.

The main aim of STC is to work with children and young people, Aboriginal refugees communities, and recently settled migrants but sometimes the general public is unaware of what it does.

To enable Save the Children to provide quality programs in WA. it relies on both government non-government funding through grants, corporate support, trusts and foundations, op shops, book sales, fundraising activities and general donations.

"Save the Children in WA works with disadvantaged children, preparing them and supporting their transition to school. Mr Larranaga said. "We support the family, helping solve any problems that might arise. We also

work with the community to help them understand and support these families and their children."

Mr Larranaga, who has headed the STC in WA for the past 10 years, visits the Kimberley every few months. He said the organisation aims to provide families with the right support at the right

time.
"The more we can understand these communities the better we are in finding solutions provided by the community itself.'

Because of its isolation and high proportion of complex and troubled communities with a desperate lack of services, the Kimberley had the biggest need. The Australian Early Development Census that measures a child's readiness for school estimates 50 per cent of children surveyed in the Kimberley were vulnerable in two or more domains compared with 10 per cent of chil-

dren in the mainstream. "These kids have a high likelihood that the system will fail them which means they enter into a cycle of welfare dependency, poor health

outcomes and premature death or incarceration."

Mr Larranaga said it was pleasing 80 per cent of STC staff in the Kimberley were Aboriginal which meant they understood their community, the need to strengthen the workforce, maintain sustainability and support community-led solutions.

"I travel there to meet local partners and staff, visit programs and understand the level of support the region needs.'

Covering 2.6 million square miles of WA might seem daunting but the STC has become quite sophisticated in using evidence of what works, how it works with the community and community-led approaches. It also works with state and federal governments to help understand and address various issues.

Volunteers play a key role in STC work, from university students - who want experience across the sector - to retirees who want to give back, their interests tailored to a specific program to showcase their specialist

"We are well known to government in what we do, but our profile with the general public could be stronger; we are re-ally quiet achievers," Mr Larranaga said. "People who contribute have the opportunity to visit and see for themselves what a difference their contribution is making to the lives of children in the WA community."



### As the world heats up addressing climate change is essential



by Karen Majer

HOW did you fare this summer? Perth had its share of high tempera-

tures and it's been a scorcher in parts of the eastern states where the heat affected sporting events as well as people's lifestyles and health.

In mid-January, extreme heat forced organisers to shorten a stage of the Santos Tour Down Under cycling event in South Australia and cancel a public ride. Tennis players at the Australian Open in Melbourne endured extreme heat, with on-court temperatures reaching 69 degrees at Rod Laver Arena.

This followed a series of record-breaking summers. Australia's Climate Council says new data has confirmed that the world experienced its hottest five years from 2013 through 2017 and intensifying heat is worsening extreme weather. In Australia, last summer had more than 200 record-breaking treme weather events in just three months. This is part of a longterm upswing in global temperatures, with 17 of the 18 years hottest years on record occurring in this century.

addressing Clearly, climate change is an urgent priority. Some encouraging signs include the rapid uptake of renewable energy and divestment from coal. Lloyds of London, the world's oldest insurance market, is the latest to announce plans to stop investing in coal companies. Some 28 global banks, including the big four in Australia, have ruled out investing in Queensland's proposed Adani coal mine. However Australia is lagging behind on climate ac-

What can we do? You can put your vote behind effective policies to curb climate change, and adapt your way of living to hotter summers.

Heatwaves can be a killer so plan ahead and respond to heatwave warnings.

Think about how to keep your home cool, for example by managing curtains and air circulation to keep the heat out in the day and let cool evening air in. Consider visiting a library or

shopping centre during peak temperatures and rescheduling activities to cooler parts of the day. Before next summer, think about whether your home needs adapting - insulation, awnings, shade trees, or solar panels to run the air-conditioner.

Take care when the heat is on.

### WA's solo sailor drops anchor

"I had some assets, some land which I gradually sold off. I could

probably manage finances without the supporters but it would be a bit tight," says the man with no interest in seeking gain or glory

from his sailing feats.

At the conclusion of his momentous, lifetime journeys, Jon stands out like a beacon. Worldwide, nobody on water ranks anywhere near the West Aussie.

Most recall the world's first solo, non-stop, triple circumnavigation in 1988 on board SV Parry Endeavour. The 71,000 nautical mile journey took 658 days - the longest distance sailed continuously by any person or vessel. The boat takes pride of place next to the 1983 America's Cup-winning Australia II in the Fremantle Maritime Museum.

Jon's first-time solo sailing records include:

Five Cape Horn roundings (one east-west and four west-east); Five Cape Horn roundings during non-stop circumnavigations;

four roundings of the five southernmost capes; a circumnavigation using the east-west route; four circumnavigations using the west-east route; circumnavigate non-stop via Cape Horn westabout and east-about; skipper of small yacht (less than 15.5m) to complete five circumnavigations, crewed or single-handed and only yachtsman to complete five circumnavigations via Cape Horn, crewed or single-handed.

From 2000, Jon has skippered a 44ft sloop from Sydney to Europe via the Red Sea and Suez Canal, including his 11th crossing of the Indian Ocean and fourth transit of the Suez Canal.

Other voyages include: Indian Ocean (14 times), Atlantic Ocean (11 times), Pacific Ocean (12 times), Australian seaboard west-to-east and east-to-west (45 times) and Cape Horn (five times).

And there are many more by the bloke who says he's "just a sailor".





### Hey, Hey, it's Daryl Somers-day - Australia Post celebrate this Aussie legend

KNOWING I'd likely be nursing a massive hangover consequent to celebrating a best friend's 21st birthday, my parents excused me from working in the shop one Saturday way back in 1980. After downing Berocca Bs and toasted sandwiches, my mates

and I crashed in front of the TV and watched Hey, Hey, It's Saturday which for me was the first time. I loved it. Not since the Norman Gunston Show had I laughed so much and fortunately, it proved to be a soothing remedy and perfect distraction from my

throbbing head. It was zany, wacky and irreverent rapid-fire comedy that cleverly appealed to the typical Aussie sense of humour by taking-the-mickey on whatever, whoever and ourselves. The show's masterfully sharp and witty yet cuddly-type host, Daryl Somers, was recently honoured by Australia Post in a series of Australian Legends of TV stamps, which also includes Denise Drysdale, Kerry-Anne Kenne-rley, Ray Martin and Bert Newton.

Beginning as a children's cartoon show in 1971, Hey, Hey, It's Saturday was co-written and produced by Ernie Carroll who auditioned and gave the nod for Daryl to host the show. Formerly a writer for In Melbourne Tonight starring Austra-lia's King of Comedy, Graham Kennedy and his sidekick Bert Newton, Carroll progressively transformed the format of Hey, Hey by gradually phasing-out the car-

toons and replacing them with live performances. He also introduced and became the life and soul of Daryl's co-host, Ossie Ostrich. With voiceovers by the equally comedic and silver-tongued, John Blackman, the show's popularity broadened by also appealing to parents and young adults. This particularly became so when the delightful and slightly gullible yet care-free, Jacki Macdonald, joined Daryl and Ossie in 1979.

Hey, Hey's ratings exploded as did the production's talent base. Red Symons of Skyhooks fame joined the following year as a member of the show's houseband and resident judge of Red Faces, the segment of the show which was a parody of the talent quest show, New Faces (as the drummer in a band, Daryl competed in the 1968 and 1970 series of New Faces). Contestants on Red Faces, were not judged so much on their talent but rather as to how bizarre, outrageous and original their performance was, which invariably allowed Symons to vent his supposedly sardonic disposition by casting acidic adjudications that would have the audience cringing with expectation and

delight. Also central to the show's growing success were the impromptu contributions of sound effects guru, Murray Tregonning, cartoonist Andrew Fyfe, floor manager and cameraman, Phillip Lambert, and of course, the very naughty and rude, Dickie Knee (John Blackman).

Daryl won the first of his three Gold Logies in 1983. The following year, the show was moved to the 9.30pm time slot and then in 1985 to primetime, 6.30pm. This proved to be a ratings coup for Channel 9 as it captured a loyal family audience who were glued to their screens from dinner time to mid evening and pipped Channel 7's Young Talent Time from its ratings pedestal contributing to its demise a few years later. Daryl and his team truly hit the big time, their success being measured in the show winning the Most Popular Light Entertainment / Comedy Logie almost every year from the mid 80s through to its shock axing in 1999 which I feel has since left a huge vacuum in Australian television entertainment... what a shame, hey?

### No 'Luck of the Irish' for the Kellys - commemorating the convict era in coin

**PROMOTING** three new coins recognising Australia's Convict Era 1788 to 1868, the Royal Australian Mint's website makes reference to John 'Red' Kelly, the Irish father of legendary bushranger, Ned.

In 1841, aged 21, Red Kelly was convicted for stealing two pigs. He was transported from Ireland arriving the following year in Van Dieman's Land where he was imprisoned for seven years. Upon his release he made his way to the Port Phillip District, nowadays Melbourne. Two years later, in 1850, he married 18 year old, Ellen Quinn.

Ellen was also of Irish stock and something of a rebel. As a young girl she disliked school and being cooped up. Having a love of horses she would regularly wag school and ride through the countryside. In the midst of the Irish Famine, her family consisting of parents, James and Mary, along with

four sisters and three brothers, sought a more hopeful future by journeying to the Port Phillip colony, arriving in 1841 as assisted migrants. However, as was the lot of many, they struggled to make ends meet in the harsh conditions on inferior land granted to them north of the colony and so, in order to survive, resorted to stealing horses and livestock.

Against her father's wishes, Ellen married Red Kelly after havfallen pregnant ina to him. Tragically, the newborn girl died soon after. Red sought fortune in the goldfields and managed to find

enough money to buy a farm near Beveridge. A daughter was born followed by Edward (Ned) in 1855 and another five children coming one after another. The young family struggled, Red reverted to stealing, was constantly under the scrutiny of the police, succumbed to alcohol, and died in 1865 of dropsy, leaving his family stranded. They then moved further north to be nearer to relatives.

At 14 years of age, Ned joined up with bushranger, Harry Power, a friend of the family while his mother sold sly-grog for an income. Bitter and desperate,

she appeared in court several times because of her now notoriously violent temper. Several of her siblings and offspring served time in prison, in particular: Ned spent six months in 1870 for summary offences and a further three years soon after for receiving a stolen mare; younger brother James was sentenced for six years in 1873 for stealing cattle; and third brother Dan served three months for damaging property in 1877 with a warrant being issued after his release for stealing horses.

Through this time Ellen had another child to Bill Frost and then three more to a Californian horse thief named George King who was 17 years her junior. Both men abandoned her; King married her but skidadled six months before their third child was born. Days after the birth, Ellen was charged and sentenced to three years imprisonment for the attempted murder of a police trooper who claimed that when he arrived at her place in search of her son, Dan, to arrest him for the horse stealing charge, he was shot by Ned, who then escaped while she set upon him with a spade.

Two years later in 1880, Dan and two

other accomplice bushrangers were killed at the siege of Glenrowan. Ned was captured and charged for the murder of a constable. Because she was a well-behaved prisoner, Ellen was permitted to visit him while in custody. On the eve of his execution, she is purported to have said to him 'Mind you die like a Kelly, son.' She was released the following year, converted to leading a respectable life and died in 1923 aged 91. Of her 12 children, only five survived her.





FEBRUARY was the first anniversary of the introduction of the system known as consumer directed care in community aged care packages across Australia.

Aged care packages help people live independently in their own home for as long as possible. In the past, the Federal Government contracted aged care providers to deliver a certain amount

of care services. The providers then delivered care to clients. The contractual arrangements required the provider to report back to the Government. By contrast, consumer directed care directs the funding to the individual who now has choice and control over what care and services they receive, and from whom.

In theory, the model works well. However, a year on and we are beginning to see evidence, actual and anecdotal, of the reality of this new system.

In December 2017 the second Home Care Packages Program Data report was released by the Department of Health. The report gives a clear picture of the growing needs for home care within the aged care sector and the terrible

gap between the level of need and the funding to respond to it.

in WA alone there were almost 10,000 people on a waitlist for packages in the reporting period (October - December 2017). Of those, almost 6,500 had been assessed at level four, meaning the largest group of people waiting for packages were those with the highest care requirements.

What Alzheimer's WA and other providers are hearing from families is consistent with this disturbing data, with the waitlists being longest for those with the greatest need, with some families waiting up to a year for a level four package.

The concern about wait lists for an aged care package at home is that the carer and the person needing the care are often at crisis when they apply for support. Waiting for a year for the care to arrive is an untenable situation.

Approximately 70 per cent of people living with dementia live at home. People living with dementia are over-represented in those accessing home care packages, particularly at the higher levels (assessed at levels three and four).

The waitlist for home care packages is arguably large and growing. With the number of people diagnosed with dementia rising rapidly over the next decade, the total number of people requiring access to home care packages will continue to increase.

Why are there waitlists? Assessments happen without undue delay and there are more service providers.

However, no matter

how world class your aged care is, its success ultimately lies with how well it is funded.

The Federal Government funds a finite number of home care packages at each level. Late last year an additional 6,000 level three and four home care packages were released across the nation, to help alleviate the strain on the evergrowing waitlists. However, it is not enough.

acknowledge that the challenge of funding aged care is significant, no matter who is in Government. However, consumer directed care was introduced to give choice to our elders and their families. The irony is that within 12 months of the introduction of consumer directed care, there is neither a choice nor a service for a large number of people on waitlists.

### The benefits of being physically active with diabetes

PHYSICAL activity good for everyone, but is particularly beneficial to people living with, or at risk of, diabetes.

Regular exercise helps to reduce the risk of developing type 2 diabetes, and it lowers insulin resistance in people with type 2 diabetes. It has even been shown to improve mental health.

Armadale resident Zara Secker was diagnosed with type 2 diabetes in March last year. After the shock of diagnosis wore off, she decided to see it as a wakeup call and do something about changing her outcomes.

"I went to the local library and borrowed lots of books on diabetes. It made me start taking better care of myself - eating better, reducing portion sizes, and exercising, she said.

In the year since this turnaround, Zara has tried different types of physical activity and settled on group fitness classes and individual coaching at the

"I've moved from hating exercise to liking it because I've seen the benefits. I like the way I feel inside when I'm fit. My blood glucose levels have come down through the combination of diet, exercise and medications. My skin and hair feel and look better, and I'm starting to like the way my legs look," she said.

#### How much do you need?

Experts recommend at least 30 minutes of moderate aerobic activity every day, plus two or three resistance training sessions (weights and strength training) each week. Depending on your initial fitness level, you may need to work your way up to this goal.

Credentialled diabetes educator and exercise physiologist Marian Brennan said that for people who don't think of themselves as the physical activity type, the idea of starting an exercise program can be intimidating.

"A good place to start is to just do a little bit more than you currently do. For example, you could start by walking around the block after breakfast.

#### Exercise for people with diabetes

People living with diabetes may be at higher risk of injury so before starting any new exercise or activity program, check with your doctor to make sure it's suitable for you.

If you are on insulin or certain glucose lowering medications, you may need to take special precautions in order to prevent your blood glucose level from dropping too low (hypoglycaemia).


If your doctor has asked you to monitor your blood glucose levels, you should check your levels before and after exercise, and during exercise if it's

for longer than 30 minutes. Your blood glucose levels may be lower for up to 48 hours after exercise.

Don't be worried if you see your levels rise during or for a few hours after vigorous exercise, as exertion may stimulate the liver to release more glucose into the blood stream. The long term benefit of high intensity or vigorous exercise is that it helps lower blood glucose levels and improve cardiovascular health.

### Benita's joyful leap from Play School to Senior Moments...

BENITA Collings' happy voice comes down the line, fresh from the first day of rehearsal in Sydney with the cast of the hilarious Senior Moments comedy reveue which opens in Perth this month.

It might be almost 20 years since she gave up her gig as presenter for Play School on the ABC but her enthusiasm and charm appear as strong

Benita is perhaps best known for her long-running stint as a presenter for Play School starting in 1969, a role she held for more than 30 years spanning 400 episodes. Along with John Hamblin and Don Spencer she was one of the longest serving cast

"They would only make 45 programs each year split between five couples so you only worked 10 days a year and the rest of the time we were off doing theatre, film and television. But it's lovely to come back and tread the boards as they say."

Apart from Play School, Benita has been a stage and screen performer. appearing in Australian television dramas The Sullivans, The Young Doctors, Sons and Daughters, The Restless Years, Homicide, A Country Practice and others. In film, she appeared in the feature film Knowing, as the mother of Nichols Cage's character John.

Benita hasn't visited Perth since the Play

School concerts back in the early 2000s when she played Perth and Bunbury.

"I say to people when I come to Perth I can look this and that up, but mind you I am really working."

There is a sense that Benita is really enjoying playing in Senior Moments which will have visited Adelaide, Melbourne, Hobart and Sydney before Perth. She describes it as a comedy revue about older people and the young people they have to deal with. So it's sort of like how do the older generation cope with the younger generation. There are some lovely moments in the show when that comes out strongly.

'There's one sketch called Old School and it's a sendup of Play School and in it we do fun things such as nursery rhymes like Rub a Dub Dub Three Men in a Tub... that's a valid lifestyle choice and I am not judging it. Another one is Star Light, Star Bright, Hope I Make It Through the Night.

"In the sketch Old School, I am not being Benita but Miss Jane. I would never ever perform in Play School the way I do in Old School so there's lots of fun with all the cast being different characters. I tell stories and they become characters in the stories and act it out and it really is a lot of fun - a hoot.

"There are sketches, songs and performers who are old enough to know better. The cast of Senior Moments are old friends with John Wood, Max Gillies and Kim Lewis who I worked with in television way back in the 70s, so it's like old home week.

"We all came together in Sydney after the boys rehearsed in Melbourne the cast is split between Sydney and Melbourne and so far everything has worked well."

The popular Geoff Harvey is on piano and Benita says the cast and people are delighted he is part of the show.

What drives her?

"As I said to someone a while back when I walk on stage or walk on set. I'm home, that's how it is for me. It's something I have had all my life and I love and enjoy it, it's my place to go to.

'We were all talking about the fact there is a show like this and it has an audience. It's not as if anyone won't come. When we played in Sydney at different venues a year ago people came and laughed and laughed. This time we have a new cast

and we are really looking forward to it. It's not just for older people but young people who come back later and say: "that was so much fun, I so enjoyed it,' So it's not just for oldies.

Benita lives in the Sydney suburb of Camperdown and says she is very happy there.

Lots of people even now recognise me. Some have children and grandchildren so if you go back to when Play School started in the 60s these people were tiny tots then and are now grown up with children and grandchildren. They approach me and say, "Oh Benita I watched you on Play School so that is a good drawcard."

Outside the theatre, she is a member of a choir at Royal Prince Alfred Hospital which has a nearby cancer hospital, Lifehouse

"Patients there are being treated and other patients come and go, so the choir is made up of ordinary people like me and ex-cancer patients and people still coming in for treatment.

"They join the choir and sing and it's terrific music therapy. We have funding for another three years which is terrific."

After Senior Moments, Benita isn't sure what awaits for her the rest of the year.

'But that's the way it is for actors, they often don't know what their next gig is. Luckily that has never bothered me, I don't fret and worry but believe something will happen and it does."

### Information on government pensions and claims for British expats



by Mike Goodall

I HAVE spoken with two people recently who received e-mails inviting them to apply for their UK State Pension using a link in the e-mail. The UK Pension Service does not (except in very exceptional circumstances) use e-mail to contact expats informing them of their entitlement to a UK State Pension. Please take note and do not open any of these emails.

Members of our campaign group British Age Pensioner Alliance (BAPA) in Australia have received responses from letters sent to the Foreign Minister Julie Bishop.

Ms Bishop wrote to the UK Foreign Secretary, in December 2017, outlining the Australia Government's serious concerns over the UK policy on this issue. In response, Mr

Boris Johnson reaffirmed the UK's determination to retain the policy, principally for financial reasons.

She said that the forthcoming Commonwealth Heads of Government Meeting (CHOGM) in London in April will be an opportunity to press the UK on the issue again.

At previous CHOGMs UK Government claimed that this was not the right forum to discuss the issue. However, this year's CHOGM will have a different format and the UK, probably because of BREXIT, is promoting the benefits of potential improvements in trade and business between member countries.

Very few people are aware that if you are under UK State Pension age and as a grandparent have returned to the UK to care for a grandchild (under 12 years of age) you can apply for National Insurance credits for periods from 6 April 2011. These credits may be used to add an additional year (or years) to enhance your UK State Pension contribution

On a similar theme, many living in Australia will have claimed Child Ben-

efit in the UK for a child under 16 between 6 April 1978 and 5 April 2010 and could qualify for what is known as Home Responsibilities Protection (HRP). Some may have received this automatically. If you were living in the UK and looking after a child under 16 during that period it is worth checking whether these years can be added to your National Insurance contributions record as any additional years can go towards your State

Pension. Don't forget to claim your pension increases when returning to the UK or Europe. The rules have been tightened up and they only accept applications (better by telephone) less than four weeks before you go and up to four weeks after you arrive. Waiting until after you return home means you will most likely miss out.



### New exhibition at the Art Gallery of WA captures Italian art at its finest



The Palazzo Corsini in Florence is home to one of the most amazing collections of artwork

WORLD War II was raging in Europe in 1944 when brave Italian woman Princess Elena Corsini

smuggled from Florence priceless paintings belonging to her family. She hid some paintings from the Germans in the countryside and, when peace came, the works were returned to their rightful place inside the family home the magnificent Palazzo Corsini on the banks of the Arno river.

Thanks to Elena Corsini's bravery, a new generation has the opportunity to view the works the esteemed Corsini collection at the Art Gallery of WA's next international exhibition, A Window on Italy-The Corsini Collection: Masterpieces from Florence which opened last month and runs until 18 June.

Historical and modern art curator Melissa Harpley, who visited Florence last year and spent several days with the Corsini family, says her visit was a fantastic opportunity to meet the family, "They were delightful. excited about the collection, passionate and proud of it," she

"It was also terrific to see the works in the flesh so to speak, in the home where they normally live and are on display in the Palazzo Corsini overlooking the Arno River. Most of the collection was saved during World War II and hidden away by Princess Elena Corsini, an extraordinary brave woman."

Towards the end of World War II the German army was retreating through Italy. The Corsini family was aware the German army had been looting artworks along the way so Princess Elena worked with some of her staff to hide as much of the collection as they could to try and preserve it. Some works were hidden in a crypt in a church in Florence, and others were loaded onto a truck and driven to one of the family's country proper-

Princess Elena instructed that a false wall be built to hide the artworks. The Germans arrived, noticed the false wall and one officer thinking there might be people behind it - shot at it. Luckily, the only work damaged was the painting of the family saint, Saint Andrea Corsini and this work is included in the Perth exhibition. The family decided not to have the work conserved so that bullet hole is still visible.

"People will find that quite a moving experience." Melissa Harpley said. It is the first time 74 works from the Corsini collection have left Florence though individual works have been lent to different exhibitions. The collection tells many stories; the history of Italian art and the fascinating story of the Corsini family themselves told through the exhibition and the collection.

The Corsini family came into prominence in Italy in the 13th century and occupied various professions. One of the Corsinis was the Pope Clement X11. The Corsini princes were among the most important and influential families in central Italy from the Middle Ages to the 17th century.

Melissa Harpley says

the collection features paintings from Italian artists such as Botticelli, Pontormo, Tintoretto and Caravaggio and is rich in Italian paintings from the Renaissance and Baroque period with the subjects of the paintings covering religious stories, portraits and mythological scenes. Decorative objects, furniture, costumes, works on paper, along with a lavish dining room setting for six, portray the life of the Corsini family and bring the ambience of Palazzo Corsini to Perth. Highlights include Madonna with Child and Six Angels by Botticelli and the Caravaggio portait of Maffeo Barberini.

"The exhibition is something the Corsini family has been thinking about for a while," says Melissa Harpley. "It is a collaboration between Mary Kisler, senior curator at New Zealand's Auckland Art Gallery, who was doing some work in Florence and met the Corsini family and our director Stefano Carboni."

"The exhibition presents an exquisite and absorbing window into Italian art and history," says Mr Carboni. "Through their patronage of the arts over hundreds of year, the Corsini family has acquired and safekept a magnificent collection of works, rarely seen outside Florence.

"The works not only tell the story of Florence and Italian art over the centuries but also reveal the history of an extraordinary Florentine family."

A personal touch at the exhibition opening was the presence of Corsini family members Countess Livia Branca and Countess Elisabetta Minutoli who came to Perth from Italy especially for the opening, along with David Gramazio, of exhibition partner Monde Mostre.





LIMITED onsite parking is available for \$5 per vehicle and this is managed by the Royal Agricultural Society of WA.

Their helpful parking attendants will be on hand to direct you to the nearest available parking spot. ### Caravanning kick-start - everything you need to know



#### by Lee Tate

AT THE end of a three-month north-west trek, the culmination of a few years caravanning with Robyn, his wife, Lee Tate spells out some tips for anyone hearing the call to join the caravan caper.

NOTHING totally prepares the caravan novice for what's on the road ahead: the adventures, the surprises, the delights and the disappointments.

But ask the seasoned tower and he/she will invariably say: "I wouldn't have missed it for quids."

Or "I wouldn't be anywhere else.' Owners of Australia's 500,000-

plus caravans and campervans can't all be wrong. And no-one is more van-mad than West Auss-

WA has Australia's highest combined caravan and campervan registrations per head of population - nearly three out of every 100 people own one.

Mandurah has the highest

combined number of caravan and campervan registrations in Australia. Albany is fifth.

In one year, that adds up to over 50 million nights and nearly 12 million overnight trips by caravans and campers.

#### Buying your van and car.

There are myriad choices. Spend time looking at different caravan configurations. Narrow it down to a model and search online: New or near-new. Secondhand vans can hide much internal damage.

The car. Not all 4WDs have the power needed to tow a van of two tonnes or more. Check models with the RAC.

Tip: Take a few trips wandering through caravan parks. Checkout models: Pop-ups, push-outs, awnings, annexes and sizes. It all

Cost. Spend about \$40,000 on a near-new van if you can't afford new and the same on a 4WD. Naturally, for greater comfort, you can go far higher. Good models of van and car seems to hold their value.

Decide: Do I really need a washing machine? Will I be comfortable towing and maintaining a van longer than 20ft (they still talk in old measurements).

#### Planning your trip.

Think like an astronaut: Travel light. Don't cater for others. Campers provide their own everything: when joining others for sundown drinks, you take your own chair and own drinks and nibbles to share.

Pack your van only for the two of you: plates, cutlery etc. Keep your van free of clutter. It makes the van lighter and cheaper to tow. Run short of anything? Get it at the next discount shop. Not all your travel will be long-term in remote areas without facilities.

#### Booking ahead.

Big numbers of campers don't book ahead with the exception of school holidays when it's always a risk. Vans generally stay only a few days so there's a huge turnover and likelihood of a site.

Sometimes you may have to free-camp without power for a night until a site is available. More councils provide space free for free-camping but some require you to catch and dispose of your grey water.

Costs to camp are rising. But so too are facilities: campers' kitchens, private bathrooms, entertainment, grassed and manicured areas. Sometimes a little bowling green and dog exercise area. Many parks don't allow dogs (they are listed in guides).

Insurance. Car and van insurance is highly-recommended. We have called for the RAC and heard many stories of RAC rescues. Go for the premier country travel option.

#### Travel time.

A common practice is to drive for a few hours a day (check-out time is 10am), and if a van park is not within range, free-camp for a night. Join other campers where possible for security. While towing, fuel could cost \$50-\$100-aday and the object of camping isn't to keep driving endlessly to see how far and fast you can go.

A general rule when towing is to travel 10 km/hr below the speed limit. Many campers make a point of stopping for refreshment breaks. More-and-more roadside areas and equipped with toilets, rubbish bins, tables and seating. Water, of course, is a priority and bottled drinking water can be bought cheaply, especially in

#### Accessories

Don't rush into buying a generator or an extra fridge or freezer until you discover whether you are a consistent remote-area traveller. Caravans have fridges, clever shopping doesn't have to cost the earth (plus you haven't splashed out thousands of dollars on coolers) and van parks often provide kitchen fridges.

Caravan annexes, awnings and shade cover are important. Many people make-do with the van's awning, simple and easy to pullout and wind-up, especially in a hurry. But an annex will provide space for your activities including watching TV even though there's a TV inside. Sitting outside is part of the game. Also an annex can serve as a bedroom for your guests such as school kids.

### Broaden your fishing - don't forget the boat!



A dinghy can open up heaps of fishing options

#### by Mike Roennfeldt

TAKING a boat along with you on your next family fishing holiday broadens your horizons immeasurably. Given fair weather and sheltered water, your chances of having fish for the table are much better than if you are stuck on the bank. Those tucked away snags, sandbars or deep fishy holes are now within easy reach.

Some of my favou-rite dinghy fishing has been over clean white sand patches scattered among the inshore seagrass meadows where King George whiting love to cruise. You'll find them at many spots along the south and south west coasts including Albany,

Augusta, Eagle Bay and Quindalup. Such places can even be within rowing distance. You don't need a big boat to get into serious fishing.

If you have a caravan or camper trailer, towing a boat isn't an option, so you need something that can either be carried on top of the car or the mobile accommodation. I had a little 3.4m rig that was ideal, but a lightweight 3.7m boat is still a feasible proposition, just make sure it's within the load carrying capacity of the roof rack or bars.

Ensure your outboard motor is small enough to be manageable, say to a maximum of 15hp, and it's not bad insurance to include a set of oars and rowlocks. Remember though that using a motor bigger than 6hp means you have to have a Recreational Skippers Ticket and it pays to check out the Department of Transport website for the latest boating regulations and useful

In terms of fishing gear, you can't go past a little single-handed spinning outfit, or flick rod as they are often called. Keep the length to a maximum of two metres so it can be easily handled in the confines of a small boat. Loaded with 3-4 kg line this sort of gear is ideal for most of the small species you will encounter within the operating range of a dinghy. Sand whiting, King George, skippy, black and silver

bream, tailor, herring, flathead and flounder are found throughout most of the southern estuaries and lower reaches of the rivers.

Of course, if you're heading for the Pilbara or Kimberley and hope to troll for barramundi or any of the hard fighting tropical estuarine species such as queenfish, trevally or threadfin salmon, the gear needs to be beefed up a bit.

A small tackle box with a selection of hooks, swivels, light sinkers and lures will cover most situations. Toss in a landing net, bait knife and cutting board, long nosed pliers for hook removal and sharp filleting knife and you're away. Handy too are the fish measuring stickers available from Department of Fisheries offices. Most dinghy anglers have one stuck along the inside of the side of the boat to easily check that their fish are legal minimum length.

Once at your holiday destination the fun starts, one of the nice things about having a car topper is that you don't usually need a launching ramp to get the boat in the water.

Next time you go camping, don't forget the boat and double your holiday fishing fun.

### Camping in Quaranup with a gang who never grew up

THE VERANDA from my dormitory was only metres from a steep embankment covered in eucalyptus trees. It led to a rocky foreshore which fringed the wide expanse of silvery, grey water that formed the huge har-

bor. On the opposite side mountainous hills stood sentinel over the entire let

Nearby a mob of kangaroos grazed contentedly beneath the canopy of the trees. In the early dawn the scene held a brooding, haunting quality.

Throughout the day it came alive,

the water turning a brilliant blue with anything from an ocean liner to mall boats bobbing along its rippling surface. The houses dotting the hills opposite were clearly visible. But as dusk turned to dark that's when the place became magic as one by one the residents turned on their lights and the entire mountains came alive like a huge Christmas tree with a multitude of glistening bulbs.

I was at Camp Quaranup which operated as a quarantine station around the late 1800s. The place was redolent in history. There were stone buildings including the doctor's residence which overlooked the bay and the old hospital. Beautiful stonework was also evident in many of the other buildings in the complex and the old school rooms were built of weather-board.

In the harbor a whaler ship sat rusting where it became grounded on a sand bank when it broke its moorings during a violent storm in 1992.

For five wonderful days I joined Come Out Camping Older Adults (COCOA), a mob of wildly spirited adults who never grew up. I tried archery (least said about that the better) at least, thanks be to heaven, I didn't shoot anyone.

MARGARET River Dairy Company now officially holds the new Guinness World Records title for the largest cheese tasting event at a single location.

The Dairy was over-whelmed with the response it had to a call out for cheese lovers to join in the attempt on 25 February at their rural dairy in Metricup.

Margaret River Dairy Company head cheesemaker and production manager Thiago Bacellar said it was a huge buzz for him and his team to see so many people tasting three of their most popular cheeses in unison.

population of Metricup is around 200 made up mainly of dairy

farms and wineries, so to have 560 people join us was quite an achievement.

"We do cheese tasting for visitors to the region on a daily basis but to see the number we had for the record attempt was incredible. It shows you how many people truly love cheese!

"We had to set up a

special area outdoors for the largest cheese tasting event because we couldn't fit them all in the tasting room, and then a formal process was required to adhere to the rules set by Guinness World Records.

"We had an official adjudicator and witnesses to ensure the tasting went to plan. I described each of the cheeses to the tasters and they were then invited to eat and rate the cheese, starting with our Farmhouse cheese, followed by Original Cheddar and finally the Original Brie," said Thiago.

Brian Sobel is one of three Guinness World adjudicators Records based in Australia and was onsite to make the official record announce-

"It was great to be back in WA and the Margaret River region and I love mass participation events." Brian said.

"The team efforts are

great to witness when there's been a lot of people involved both in the preparation for the event and the attempt itself.

Designed in the late 1800s by the 31st president of the USA Herbert Hoover who worked as the mine manager before going into politics.

It is now a bed and breakfast business and quests can book the Hoover bedroom and sleep where the former president laid his head.

The miner's ghost town at the bottom of the hill in Gwalia is a living museum and a tribute to the courage of those pioneers who lived in truly harsh conditions.

Hessian and tin shanty homes have been left untouched and it's worth spending a few hours here to step back in time.

From Leonora head to the cute little town of Menzies dotted with pretty heritage buildings, a pub and along the main

drag a selection of street art depicting everyday life and incorporating how the local Aboriginal people, the Wongi adapted to the Goldrush.

About half an hour's drive from Menzies is Lake Ballard which is home to the Antony Gormley statues. These iconic statues were modelled on residents from Menzies and have been placed around the salt lake to provide one of the world's most unique and isolated art installations.

Many people have family links to the Goldfields and there is much history to discover. There is a website called Outback Family History which has an active Facebook page and a comprehensive historical website.

I found some long lost relatives here and some interesting family heritage from my Italian and English forebears.



### The Coral Coast is the perfect place to get in touch with nature



NINGALOO Reef is the perfect place for some once in a lifetime experiences.

It is one of the most beautiful places in the world to swim and snorkel with its abundance of marine life and clean wa-

With humpback whales, manta rays and whale sharks people have the opportunity for some rare marine experiences. Ningaloo Reef is one of the few places in the world where these creatures congregate in great numbers.

Every year, between mid March and mid July, the gentle giants of the ocean, whale sharks, congregate following the mass spawning of coral. Harmless to humans, they are the world's largest species of fish and can grow up to 18 metres in length.

Whale shark tours are available both in Coral Bay and in Exmouth.

Swimming with the manta rays is an activity which is available year round in Coral Bay.

Manta rays are filter feeders and have a large and toothless mouth which they use

to scoop up plankton and krill.

Unlike stingrays they do not have a sharp barb which makes them very safe to swim and snorkel with.

These beautiful creatures have a wingspan which can measure up to several metres which enables them to swim at high speed. Occasionally they can be seen leaping out of the water and landing with a slap. It provides a theatrical experience for those lucky enough to experience it.

They glide elegantly and effortlessly through the water. To see a group of males displaying their acrobatic skills competing for a female's attention is a sight to behold.

Swimming with humpback whales is now available in the area and from August to November visitors to the region will have the opportunity to take part in this experience.

Interest in this activity is so great that you are is recommended to register now to ensure you get a spot.

The tours focus on small group encounters and there is a maximum of ten swimmers per tour with no more than five in the water with any one whale pod.

The humpback whale was previously an endangered species along the WA coast but due to conservation efforts the population has increased to more than 30,000.

The whales usually arrive in the area from mid-July and the operators in the area offer a full day tour. It costs around \$400 to \$500 per tour but is an experience of a lifetime to swim amongst these gentle giants in the sea.

There are a variety of experiences to be had with sea creatures along the Coral Coast from feeding the dolphins in Monkey Mia, to kayaking with sea turtles and dugongs in the Ningaloo Marine Park.

A visit to the coral coast provides an opportunity for people to get in touch with nature in one of the cleanest environments in the world.

#### **Explore the delights of Salmon Beach near Windy Harbour**

THEY grow them big on the south coast and salmon can be caught from - would you believe - Salmon Beach near Windy Harbour.

Visitors can drive there on sealed roads and for those with a 4WD, there are lots more places to access and camp for the small price of a national park pass. Easter sees the beaches dotted with fisher families as far as the eye can see and beyond.

It's also a good time for other species, such as the related Australian herring and for those who want to launch a small boat then Windy Harbour offers more possibilities along with a camping ground.

And the weather's usually calmer.

For those who love the forests then there's lots to explore in this incredibly diverse region. Start with the Northcliffe Visitor Centre where visitors can be directed to what's flowering and to the RAC top ten rated Understory Art and Nature sculpture trail.

Late autumn sees the appearance of fungi from incredible to edible. And for those into things botanical. visit Northcliffe in spring where they'll come to understand the reason for the area's biodiversity hotspot status.

Finally, for those who bring a mountain bike, then aim to take part in the Northcliffe Karri Cup MTB Challenge, with sub-sections catering for all levels from elite to over-the-hill and a separate Karri Kids event for the younger riders.





Nielsen Estate 2008 Cabernet Merlot is ruby red in colour. The nose is of intense oaky cherry and plum. The palate is medium bodied with blackcurrant flavours and a full flavoured finish. \$20 (two for \$35).

Nielsen Estate 2008 Reserve Shiraz is dark imperial purple in colour with an aromatic nose of sweet ripe plummy fruit and cedary oak. The palate is medium bodied showing rich shiraz fruit and toasty oak flavours and an extended finish. RRP \$25 (two for \$45).

All Jim Nielsen's wine has been cellared for a long time and are ready to drink now. No waiting for flavour to develop, the cellaring is already done for you. Jim calls them museum specimens.

Jim sells his wine over the Internet (www.neil sonestate.com.au) or at Farmer's Markets. A good place to look and taste before you buy.

Corymbia 2014 is an unusual blend of Tempranillo (83 per cent) and Cabernet Sauvignon (17 per cent) produced by the Mann family (of wine and cricket fame) in the

Upper Swan. It is a medium bodied Australian Burgundy style with aromas of black berry fruit and an extended fruity palate with hints of oak. RRP \$39.

Zabava Talijancich doesn't fit into any established category of wine but it is an ideal drink on the odd hot day as summer changes to autumn. It is a light red style wine, deep purple in colour with a light spritz and flavours of fresh black cherry and spicy fruit. The finish has touch of sweetness and a refreshing natural spritz. Serve it chilled in a champagne flute for any celebration. Zabava is a Croatian word meaning fun and entertaining - it is appropriate. RRP \$19.

Talijancich Peter's Ruby. A rich fortified wine made from ripe shiraz fruit with a touch of Grenache and matured in old oak. It is blended every year to

maintain consistency of the fruity palate. RRP \$22 for 1.5 Litres.

Fortified wines were the traditional product of the Swan Valley before the days of temperature con-

Peter's Ruby is probably the best known Port style wine. It was the mainstay of Peter Talijancich's production in the 1950s and it is still available.

TOBY couldn't believe it. This nine-year-old roller-coaster and Wet'N'Wild aficionado was dumbstruck as our fast, custom-built open boat roared out of Adventure Bay on Bruny Island. Toby's eyes widened as the boat engages the two-three metre waves, skipped over the surface of the Tasman Sea and occasionally landed with a thump that sent spray over the thirty passengers. And the look on my grandson's face told me that the exhilaration we're experiencing easily eclipses that of any theme park ride.

Getting to Adventure Bay is easy. Our day trip with Pennicott Wilderness Journeys starts at 8am in Hobart. On the way down to the Bruny Island ferry, our bus driver/guide Nick gives us plenty of information about the towns we pass through and the history of this part of southern Tasmania. After 45 minutes, we reach the small town of Kettering, where we board the vehicle ferry.

Bruny Island is about the size of Singapore. The difference is that Bruny Island has fewer than a thousand residents rather than five million. Bruny is beautiful and remote, without the five-star resorts and big hotels found elsewhere. On the way to Adventure Bay we stop at a lookout giving a wonderful view of the Neck, an isthmus joining North and South Bruny. Fifteen minutes later we are eating freshly baked muffins for morning tea in Pennicott's new beachside café.

for some minutes on the southern side of a massive rock formation known as the monument, which stands alone some metres offshore.

As we go further down the wild and enchanting coast, we see many more birds, including an improbability of shearwaters (I learn that an improbability is the name for a group of these birds). Around 50 shearwaters rise from the ocean's surface in front of us, creating quite a display.

We reach the turning point at some rocks known as the Friars, where there are thousands of fur seals. The Friars are known as a haul-out place for seals, where they spend time on land for reproduction and rest. It's a stunning sight to see so many seals gathered in the one area, and all the cameras on board are clicking away frantically.

We have reached the Southern Ocean and the next stop is Antarctica. So we head back up the coast, using the heavy swell to propel us towards Adventure Bay. It's an exciting trip, with plenty of sea spray as our boat surfs the waves.

When we return it's time for a leisurely lunch at the beachside café. The ocean journey has made us hungry. Toby hoes into some fish and chips, while I enjoy homemade pumpkin soup and a salmon and salad

On the way back to Hobart, I reflect on the wilderness cruise experience. I now understand why it has won so many awards, including 'Australia's best tourist attraction' three times. To my mind, this cruise stands out because it's accessible to all ages. And it's fantastic fun.

### Perth woman's bequest motivated by the impact of diabetes

THE generosity of a Kingsley woman whose diabetes caused her to lose some of her

eyesight could help ensure others with the condition don't suffer the same fate.

Royal Perth Hospital-based group Diabetes Research WA, WA's peak diabetes research funding group, recently received a significant donation from 79-year-old Catherine Hardy who passed away last July

erine Hardy who passed away last July.
Executive director Sherl Westlund said Mrs Hardy chose to leave a gift to diabetes research in her will because she'd lived with type 2 diabetes for many years and wanted to make a difference to others.

"Mrs Hardy was losing her vision because she'd developed diabetic retinopathy - which is the most frequent cause of new cases of blindness among adults in developed countries, with one in three people with diabetes impacted by it," said Ms Westlund. Ms Westlund said it was inspiring when people chose to give back to charity in their

"There's no greater legacy than being able to help others after you're no longer here and we're pleased that we can channel Catherine's bequest into a new avenue for reducing rates of diabetes-related blindness in the hope of ensuring others aren't impacted by it like she was," she said.

Diabetic retinopathy is caused by damage to the tiny blood vessels inside the retina at the back of the eye. In the early stages there may be no symptoms, meaning the disease may not be diagnosed until it is advanced.

"One of our latest \$80,000 research grants supports the next phase of the development of a new artificial intelligence-based screen-

ing system for diabetic retinopathy, which will for the first time allow GPs to screen patients," Ms Westlund said.

"Currently patients are referred to specialists so they're waitlisted or have to be sent to another clinic. Many patients, for one reason or another, don't follow up and the chance of early detection is often lost, causing irreversible loss of sight."

The technology has been developed by the WA-based Australian e-Health Research Centre at the CSIRO.

Ms Westlund said that without bequests, Diabetes Research WA would not have been able to fund some of its most important

BUNBURY born Barry White started dancing at 15 with Clive and Anne Dorney at their local studio. Born in Collie on Christmas Eve 1947 Barry's teenage dance ambitions turned into a lifelong love affair with dance which took him to illustrious heights.

Barry worked through his exams, partnered by Nancy Norris and Pam Gatley for his star medals and was only 17 when he started dancing competitively with Lennie Hood.

He and Lennie would finish school or work on Monday afternoon, jump in the car and drive up to Perth, compete and then drive back to Bunbury for commitments the

next day. Road trips seemed the flavour of Barry's competitive dancing with convoys of vehicles travelling every year from WA across the dirt and gravel Nullarbor to compete in the eastern states, including at the 1965 and 1966 South Pacific and Australian championships.

amateur competitor, Barry and Lennie decide to turn professional, teaching with Ken and Nancy Norris and studying under Derek Gatley, Gwen Johnson and Ailsa Miller with the AID (Australian Institute of Dancing), then Daele Fraser with WADMA (WA Dance Masters Association, now Dance Masters International) and examined by Robert Wrightson and Kay Gilkison.

The couple continued to compete, now in the professional field, and in the exhibition category, training under one of Barry's favourite coaches, the late Ron Barker. Barry recalls how daunting it was to walk onto the floor with the likes of champions Len and Pam Humphreys and Barry and Cheryl Wrightson.

But it was mainly the experience of working with and competing against leading dance identities that equipped Barry to open his own school in Bunbury, the Bunbury Dance Studio, in 1974. Barry also pays tribute to the late Robert Wrightson, a mentor in dance and the intricacies of the dance business industry.

In the 24 years he ran

Barry also watched John Strawn and Amanda Brian, who he had taught and trained since they started, win the juvenile titles in ballroom, Latin and new voque in the Closed Australian championships at the world championships at Perth Entertainment Centre in 1980.

Barry also expanded his school to the Perth city area, when he opened a branch of his school in Piccadilly Arcade, formerly Winnie Wright's ballroom which he continued for four vears.

He sold his Bunbury school in 1998 to Stephan Whiteside, who continues it today. Barry had a change of career, opening a bed and breakfast hotel in Fremantle which he has run for 12 years. He became a major sponsor of the dance industry in WA, helping the WA Open Dancesport championships and holding naming rights sponsorship for three years, sponsoring the 2014 ADS Night Of Stars and other

Apart from his executive roles, Barry continues to be active as an adjudicator and examiner in WA and nationally. He has also judged at international events in Singapore, Penang and Malaysia, coaching many international couples.

#### Positive attitude to ageing protects people from dementia

STUDY of nearly 5000 retired Americans found those with positive attitudes to aging were nearly 50 per cent less likely to develop dementia over a fouryear study period than those with a negative attitude.

One in four people carry the variant of the APOE gene which is a strong risk factor for

developing dementia, but fewer than half the carriers actually develop dementia. Scientists are trying to find out why this is so.

Ólder adults who have acquired positive beliefs about old age from their culture are less likely to develop dementia, according to a study by epidemiology profes-sor Becca Levy and her colleagues at the Yale School of Public Health, USA.

Those with a positive attitude interpret their environment in a more age-friendly way. Psychologists have found that this is a means of coping with exposure to the ageism prevalent in society.

Participants in the Yale study were at least 60 years old and dementia free at the start of the four-year trial, with an average age of 72. Over 25 per cent were carriers of the APOE gene variant as assessed in saliva samples.

Dr Levy measured beliefs by a standardised five-item questionnaire asking agreement (or not) with questions such as "the older I get the more useless I feel". Higher scores reflect a more positive and lower scores more negative attitudes.

Results were corrected for other variables such as whether participants had heart disease or diabetes.

Dementia increased with age, less education, cardio-vascular disease, presence of the APOE gene and initial poorer cognitive performance.

The research team found that positive age beliefs approximately halved the risk of older people developing dementia. Those with positive beliefs at the start of the trial had a 2.6 per cent chance of developing dementia within four years compared to 4.6 per cent for those with negative beliefs.

Moreover positive beliefs protected carriers of the APOE gene variant to the same extent at those without the variant. However having both a negative attitude and the APOE gene was a double whammy resulting in a much higher (6.14 per cent) chance of developing dementia within four years.

The authors said a positive attitude to ageing appears to help offset the extra risk due to having the gene variant. They suggested this may be due to reduced stress that resulted in an epigenetic process in late life that limited expression of the deleterious gene.

"We found that positive age beliefs can reduce the risk of one of the most established genetic risk factors of dementia," said Dr Levy. "This makes a case for implementing a public health campaign against ageism and negative age beliefs."

Psychologists have devised ways to bolster positive and mitigate negative age beliefs which if applied could halve the incidence of dementia.

The study was published in February 2018 in the open-access journal *Plos On*.



PALLIATIVE Care WA (PCAWA) is helping people living in Peel to plan for the end of life and discuss their care wishes with their fami-

Eighty-five per cent of Australians believe that it is important to have a conversation with family about the care one would like to receive at end-of-life, but only a third of those surveyed have actually had the discussion, according to a survey by Palliative

Care Australia in 2017.
PCAWA executive PCAWA executive officer Lana Glogowski said while Australians clearly agree on the im-portance of planning for the end of life they need to take steps to inform their loved ones about what is important to

"Dying is a normal part of life and everyone deserves a positive end-of-life experience. It's important we normalise <sup>'</sup> conversations around death so that people can plan ahead and their families know what they would want if they can no longer talk for themselves," Ms Glogowski.

Palliative Care WA is running interactive community workshops in the Peel region to help people to plan ahead and let their families and health care providers know what they would want if they could no longer speak for themselves.

The workshops cover topics such as: what is advance care planning; how to have a conversation about death and dying with your family, loved ones and health care providers; exploring your values and what you want at end of life; what is palliative care and what are the health and lifestyle choices you can make at the end of life?

Also how to make an Advance Health Directive, Enduring Power of Guardianship and an Enduring Power of Attorney.

The Peel half-day workshops are being held in Mandurah. Mundijong, Pinjarra, **Boddington and Waroo**na. #### **Changes to HACC funding**

PEOPLE currently receiving support services through the state Department of Health's Home and Community Care (HACC) program, may have heard of the changes to their funding from 1 July this year.

From this date, home support funding will be provided through the Commonwealth Government's Commonwealth Home Support Program (CHSP).

Hearing specialist Don Hudson says trouble hearing the television is one of the strongest complaints by those with hearing loss.

"Even those with the very best hearing aids often complain that

television dialogue is unclear, and their family complains if the TV volume is turned up."

"We have worked for two years to optimise the speech circuitry to work for the three most common configurations of hearing loss. Other headsets focus on stereo sound effects and quality bass, but those features are generally not beneficial to those with hearing loss. My patients' main concern is to hear the TV dialogue, and the TV Voice Pro system uses circuitry that is customised to work for hearing loss and optimise speech clarity for television listening. That's what makes it so effective," he said.

The TV Voice Pro headset is completely wireless, has up to 120 dB of volume, weighs just 70 grams and is a fraction of the cost of purchasing a hearing aid. The device is rechargeable and guaranteed to connect to any television.

#### Family law and how it relates to defactos, pre-nups and blended families

WITH second marriages

the rise, and with couples getting married or entering into de facto relationships in later years when they have accumulated some wealth behind them, there are advantages in carefully considering the value of a pre-nuptual agreement.

Pre-nups, as they are colloquially known, are agreements entered into by couples who are contemplating marriage or a de facto relationship.

These agreements are more formally known as Binding Financial Agreements.

In many family law matters and disputes when couples have separated and are divorcing, the parties often express regret about having not entered into a pre-nup.

Why? Well, for starters, family law disputes are often costly, emotionally draining and the discretion of the Family

Court as to how it divides marital property is so broad, that you never really know exactly what you're going to get. In the absence of an agreement after separation, the only option left is to go to Court.

In the event a couple have entered into a prenup, neither spouse is allowed to commence Family Court proceedings. The pre-nup essentially ousts the iurisdiction of the Family Court, meaning the Family Court cannot make a decision as to how the couple's property is to be divided and the property of the relationship is to be divided in accordance with the terms of the prenup.

Of course, either party can ask the Family Court to set the pre-nup aside.

The High Court of Australia handed down its landmark decision in November 2017 in the eagerly awaited decision of Thorne v Kennedy. In this case, the couple had first met online via a website for potential brides. He was 67. She was 36. She was of eastern European background and living overseas. The husband, a wealthy Australian property developer, was worth about \$18 million and had adult children from his first marriage. At the very start of the relationship, the husband said to the wife-to-be that if they were to wed, she would need to sign a paper and his money was for his children. Eleven days prior to the wedding, he said that if she did not sign the financial agreement the wedding would be called off. At the time, the wife-to-be was in Australia and some of her relatives had travelled to Australia for the ceremony. She signed the financial agreement four days prior to the wedding.

The pre-nup provided for the wife to receive a total payment of \$50,000 adjusted for inflation in the event of separation after at least three years of marriage.

The couple separated about four and a half years later. They had no children. The wife sought relief from the Federal Circuit Court of Australia seeking an order that the financial agreements be set aside and that she receive \$1.1 million lump sum and spousal maintenance of \$104,000.

The trial judge found in the wife's favour and set aside the financial agreements. The trial judge found that there had been "undue influence and duress" on the husband's part. The husband's adult children (the husband had since died and his adult children represented his estate) appealed the decision and the Full Court of the Family Court of Australia found that there was no duress and that the financial agreements were in fact binding. The wife appealed to the High

The High Court did not agree with the decision of the Full Court of the Family Court of Australia which had upheld the financial agreements as binding. The High court found the financial agreements should be set aside for "unconscionable conduct" and "undue influence".

Court of Australia.

In light of the High Court decision, are prenups worth entering into? The simple answer to that is - depending on your circumstances and subject to bearing in mind the factors carefully considered by the High Court in their recent decision – yes.

When entering into a pre-nup careful consideration must be given to factors including but not limited to:

- · whether or not the agreement was "negotiable" or "non-negotiable";
- · whether or not any threats or ultimatums were made about ending the relationship or calling the wedding off if an agreement was not signed;
- · whether or not each party had sufficient time to consider the agreement and also sufficient time for a party to consider the legal advice that they were given prior to signing; and
- · the circumstances of each party, in particular the disadvantaged party and the terms of the agreement.

Australian law makes provision for these financial agreements to be entered into. There are obvious advantages to having a pre-nup, however a great degree of caution is required in relation to the preparation of pre-nups and the circumstances in which these pre-nups are entered into.




I have always prescribed to a hi-low shopping style. There are items worth investing in and then others you know will date so buying from discount outlets is

THIS month Dan and I ventured to Maurizio di Ciano's new restaurant No Menu in Highgate. many Maurizio ran a successful restaurant in North Perth next door to the Italian ing experience.

No Menu's concept is that the menu is determined by what fresh produce is available on a daily basis.

We ventured there on a Saturday morning where they also have a small market in the alley down the side of the restaurant offering a selection of Italian goods.

Maurizio came to the table and introduced himself, then explained how the concept for the restaurant works and what was on the (nonmenu). He is a vibrant character and his personality adds an extra charm to the whole din-

Dan chose Eggs Purgatory (\$18.50) and I went for the Eggs Romany (\$18.50).

Dan also ordered a cappuccino (\$3) which came with a selection of homemade biscuits which were delicious (we shared these) and it was a perfect start to the morning.

Our toast arrived, a little too early, as our main dishes took another ten minutes to come to the table, but it was worth the wait.

Dan's Eggs Purgatory came with three poached eggs served in a rich tomato and vegetable sauce and he said had

an amazing flavour. My Eggs Romany consisted of two poached eggs on mushrooms with truffle oil and asparagus with a side of mustard.

We both agreed that we have never had poached eggs that were so light, fluffy and melted in your mouth as these. The truffle oil and mushrooms in my dish were rich and with the added creaminess of the egg it really was a perfect brunch dish.

Dan said his sauce was rich and delicious and complemented the eggs perfectly. Both servings were excellent value for money as the toast was included in the price.

#### Vince's sage and butter polpettine with pasta

Two spoons

PASTA with meatballs without tomato - now that's different and delicious.

Ingredients for 4 500g minced steak (beef, lamb or pork) 100g finely diced prosciutto

100g finely diced mortadella

100ml white wine 2 heaped tablespoons grated parmesan 2 heaped tablespoons

bechamel sauce 250g dry spaghetti 150g butter 1 cup of sage leaves 1 cup of seasoned flour WA organic lake salt Freshly cracked black pepper

Extra virgin olive oil (EVOO)

Method

Mix the mince, prosciutto, mortadella, parmesan, bechamel sauce and a little salt and pepper in a bowl until it is thoroughly combined. Now roll the mixture into little meatballs and set aside. Boil your pasta in lots of salted water till cooked al dente.

At the same time in a large frypan melt half the butter and 100ml of EVOO and cook the meatballs after dipping them into the seasoned flour. Add half the sage leaves as they cook, stirring the meatballs and sage often. Add the 100 ml of white wine and cov-

er with a lid.

After five minutes test a meatball to see if it is cooked. When cooked put meatballs in a bowl covered with alfoil. Now using the same frypan (don't clean it after removing the meatballs) heat it on a medium flame and add the other half of the butter and sage leaves stirring well. Now add the cooked pasta to the pan and half cup of hot pasta water and toss and stir well, releasing and melting the burnt bits stuck to the bottom of the pan into the liquid for flavour.

Take off the heat and serve with the meatballs. cracked pepper and any pan juices. Very yum! Buon Appetito.

## Fruit for the heart

FIRST of this year's harvest of apples and pears are now available in-store, signalling the launch of the new season of Western Australia's favourite fruit. In WA the apple and pear harvest occurs from February to June, commencing with the first picked varieties gala apples and red sensation and Bartlett pears... so let's get crunchina!

Fresh apples and pears are extremely nutritious and should be an important part of your eattioxidants and the soluble fibre pectin, which are both known for their heart protective capabilities. Dietary fibre aids in reducing the risk of some cancers and helps to control blood sugar levels, which is important in diabetes sufferers. Interestingly, pears are one of only two food products that are nonallergenic, making them ideal for introducing solids to babies and for people on elimination diets.

To increase your consumption of fresh fruit, simply add to your daily breakfast cereal, use as a garnish pear as an in-between meal snack - vou can spice things up by trying a different variety each day.

While the weather is warm, store apples and pears in the fridge to ensure they keep that freshly picked crunch.

Fresh is best with WA apples and pears, yet they are just as delicious cooked in savoury and Generally, the sweet dishes. sweeter the fruit, the better it will perform in a cooked recipe. Grab an apple and pear today and enjoy the recipes below.

#### Pear, fennel and prosciutto salad - recipe for one

**Preparation: 10 minutes;** serves: 1



- 1 tablespoon white wine vinegar 2 tablespoon olive oil 1/4 teaspoon dijon mustard Salt and cracked black pepper 75 a prosciutto, roughly flaked 1 Red Sensation pears, thinly sliced
- 1/4 baby fennel bulb, trimmed and thinly sliced
- 1 cup watercress, trimmed and sprigs separated
- 1 tablespoon Persian feta

1 teaspoon chopped chives

Whisk together the vinegar, oil, mustard, salt and pepper until fully combined. Place the prosciutto in a pan over medium heat till crispy. Remove from pan, crumble roughly. Place prosciutto, pears, fennel, watercress and chives in a large serving bowl. Scatter with feta. Pour over the dressing and toss lightly and serve.

Note: This salad is best made close to serving. If this is inconvenient, drizzle a little lemon juice over the sliced pears and fennel to prevent any brown-

#### Coconut baked gala apple wedges



Preparation: 10 minutes; cooking: 25 minutes; serves: 4

- 4 Galaxy apples, peeled, quartered and cored 1 lemon, zest and juice
- 3 tablespoon macadamia nuts, finely chopped
- 3/4 cup shredded coconut
- 1 egg, lightly beaten 2 teaspoon sugar

Preheat the oven to 180°C and line a baking tray with non-stick baking paper. Toss the apple quarters in the lemon juice. Combine the lemon zest, chopped macadamia nuts and coconut in a bowl.

Combine the egg and sugar in another bowl and dip the apple quarters into the mixture. Allow the excess egg to drip off, then roll the apple quarters in the coconut mixture. Place on baking tray and bake for 20 to 25 minutes or until the apples are cooked and golden.

#### Apple ricotta pikelets

Preparation: 10 minutes; cooking: 15 minutes; serves: 4

- 1 cup ricotta cheese
- 1 cup grated Royal Gala apples
- ½ cup white flour
- 1/4 cup wholemeal flour
- 1 tablespoon honey
- 1 teaspoon lemon juice 1 tablespoon chopped pecans
- ½ teaspoon cinnamon Sprinkle of nutmeg
- 4 eggs, separated

Natural yoghurt and fresh fruit, to serve

Combine all ingredients together except egg whites. Mix until well combined. Beat egg whites until stiff and fold into batter. To make pikelets, brush the base of a pan with oil. Spoon about two tablespoons of batter into pan to make individualsized servings. Allow to cook until golden on both sides. Continue until all the batter has been used. Serve warm with natural yogurt and fresh fruit.

#### What's fresh in the markets for March

Royal gala apples: For the lovers of freshly harvested fruit, the new season Royal Gala is a welcome arrival on the scene. They are as sweet, crisp and juicy as you would expect from a freshly picked apple, with a beautiful peach coloured skin and an exterior of red stripes over a pale cream background. Choose carefully, keep your purchases in the fridge until you are ready to eat them, and you'll be rewarded with a perfect eating experience. Gala apples make wonderfully moist cakes and muffins and are fantastic in a hearty crumble.

Bartlett pears: Another lovely new-seasoner, Bartlett pears are a light green to yellow pear, or a red-green in the case of 'red sensation' Bartlett's. They're medium sized and are sweet and aromatic with the red sensation being slightly tarter. These pears are a good all-rounder being suitable for both cooking and eating fresh. To test for ripeness, the flesh near the stem should give when gently pressed. It's often best to buy them quite firm and let them ripen at room temperature for a couple of days, however remember that pears ripen from the inside out, so don't leave them too long. Pears and a strong cheese such as a blue or a goat's cheese make a gorgeous combination.

Cucumbers: Indeed a very cool addition to salads and dips. Picking up a cucumber to feel its weight for a good indication of freshness; they should feel heavy and have firm, bright-looking skin. Lebanese and burpless (continental) cucumbers are very similar in texture and flavour but they differ in size, the Lebanese being the smaller of the two. One of the most commonly asked questions about cucumbers is whether to peel and deseed? The best way to decide this is to slice a small round off the cucumber. If the skin is tough and the seeds are large and bitter, it's best to peel and deseed it. A fantastic way to eat cucumbers is in a home-made tzatsiki, a Greek yoghurt-based dip. Simply peel and seed one cucumber and combine with natural yoghurt and minced garlic to taste.

Sweetcorn: Nothing beats piping hot sweetcorn eaten straight from the cob, and thankfully luscious juicy cobs are now plentiful. Use as soon as possible after purchase and cook for a short time only. Steaming for about seven minutes allows corn to maintain all its lovely succulence and flavour. Sweet corn works well on the barbecue, either whole wrapped in foil or back in its original husk, or in chunky slices threaded on skewers and brushed with good olive oil. Sweet corn is wonderful with crab or prawns and works particularly well with butter, garlic and

## Empowering People

## Help STOP Elder Abuse

Advocare supports and protects the rights of older people in the WA community by providing advocacy, information and education. One of the important issues we deal with is elder abuse.

Elder abuse affects one in 20 older people in WA. Which makes it an all too common issue facing older members of our community at a time when they are often most vulnerable. Every week our advocates work with people who are experiencing elder abuse. We offer advice, organise access to suitable resources and support services, and work with them so they can resolve their situation.

#### How YOU can help

You too can play a part in helping to stop elder abuse in your community by:

- 1. Being aware that elder abuse comes in many guises.
- **FINANCIAL** improper use of an older person's money or assets. This can cover withholding money or making decisions on how their money is used without their consent.
- **NEGLECT** withholding essential care such as food, shelter, clothing, medical or dental care.
- **PSYCHOLOGICAL** Inflicting mental anguish, fear, or feelings of shame and powerlessness.
- SEXUAL non-consensual sexual contact or language.
- **SOCIAL** isolating an older person by restricting social contact with family, friends or social activity.
- **PHYSICAL** deliberately causing physical pain or injury, including physical coercion and physical restraint.
- **2.** Understanding elder abuse can happen anywhere in our community in residential aged care, in community housing and in families... anywhere. You may even recognise it in your own family.
- **3.** Listening to and supporting an older person who is concerned or stressed about their situation. Encourage them to call our Elder Abuse Helpline on **1300 724 679** for advice and assistance from one of our advocates.



#### Gwen's story...

Gwen (not her real name) contacted Advocare via her Residential Aged Care facility. She was upset that her son was taking advantage of her through the abuse of an Enduring Power of Attorney. Gwen had set up the EPA when she went in to hospital for major surgery.

After she recovered, Gwen wanted to take back control of her finances and discovered her son had been using her money for his own purposes and not paying her bills.

As with many people who find out a member of their family is involved in financial abuse, Gwen was highly distressed at the thought of confronting her son. She also felt ashamed about the situation.

One of our Advocates discussed various options open to Gwen and she requested assistance to revoke her son's EPA. We prepared a letter revoking the EPA for Gwen, and her Residential Aged Care facility then assisted Gwen to provide copies of the letter to Centrelink and her bank. It was important to Gwen to be able to make her own decisions and be back in control of her own money.
