THIS year visitors are in for an exciting change at the annual Have a Go Day which will be held on Wednesday 9 November from 8.30am to 3.30pm at Burswood Park.

Due to structural changes at Burswood Park the event will now be focused along the riverside and will provide visitors with a more compact event.

Have a Go Day, a LiveLighter event, is the highlight of WA Seniors Week and is organised by the Seniors Recreation Council of WA (SRC).

This free event provides people with the opportunity to come and 'have a go' at many activities, visit displays and enjoy the entertainment around the park.

The day kicks off with an official walk at 11am, leaving from site 118 which is lead by the Over 55 Walking Association, Heart Foundation and COTA WA Mall

The Climbing Wall, Scout's Obstacle Course and canoeing on the river will provide an opportunity for people who love to challenge themselves physically. Disc Golf Park will be running putting and how to play golf clinics and the Melville Amateur Angling Club will also offer practical advice and demonstrations for anglers.

The West Coast Eagles will be on the grounds again this year with their Speed Kicking Cube, often a famous Eagle pops in for a visit too. There are a variety of health checks available including hearing tests, blood pressure and blood sugar testing.

Entertainment will include the Men in Harmony singers, a huge variety of dancing including ballroom, square, line, tap and belly dancing or enjoy a demonstration from the Prime Movers exercise to music group. Budding chefs will not want to miss the Bethanie Bake Off finals or the variety of cooking demonstrations.

For those who want to become more savvy with technology, Tech Savvy Seniors will be on hand as well the opportunity to try Seniors Exergaming. If people have a smart phone they will be able to utilise their GPS and try geocaching around the grounds.

Have a Go News will be running the hospitality tents which serve people free tea, coffee and water. The chocolate wheel will be spinning at the main tent with great prizes available for people to win. Visitors to the hospitality tents can also play giant chess and giant jenga.

Channel 7 Perth and 6PR personalities will be in attendance throughout the day. There are a huge variety of food and drink outlets around the grounds to buy lunch or bring along a picnic and enjoy the riverside view.

# **Ageing** research snippet

VOLUNTEERING middle age and senior years is linked to enhanced mental health.

There is no positive association seen before age of 40, suggesting the link varies across life course.

Volunteering in middle and older age is linked to good mental health/emotional wellbeing, finds a large study of British adults, published in the online iournal BMJ Open.

But no such association was seen before the age of 40, suggesting that the link may be stronger at certain points of the life course, say the researchers.

THIS is the story of two grand ladies. One is a 100-year-old humble, limestone, single-storey, brick-walled building with a corrugated metal roof in a non-descript street in Perth's southern suburbs. The other is the champion of her close-knit community's mission to see the hall's history rightly recorded for posterity. She is June Caunt, 81.

The attractive stone building in Mell has served the Road Spearwood community since 1916. Its records reflect the struggles and eventual successes of one of Western Australia's most historically-significant regions.

The Swan River Colony of the 1800s was transformed into a prosperous State thanks to the sweat of passionate pioneers and dedicated migrant gardeners who created a lifesaving food bowl for our early settlers. Spearwood was at the forefront of the back-breaking battleground.

Three years ago, with the 2016 centenary of their community centre on their minds, locals turned to congregation member June Caunt. June's mission was to dig deep, unearth every fascinating fact about the sturdy little hall that has endured through eventful times and put it on the record.

The selection of June, then approaching her eighties, was an inspired choice and the book on St Michael and all Angels Anglican Church is now complete.

Deadlines, hurdles and challenges are nothing for June. At 81 years young, June recently underwent a total hip replacement and also endured shingles and the flu. But it merely slowed her home and community activities with husband Doug, 83, a retired quarantine inspector. Champion pedigree dog breeders, they love to show their animals, including national cham-

pions.
"I have a Japanese Chin and an Italian Greyhound", a smiling June tells Have a Go News. The couple has bred and sold many champions of both breeds and also raised greyhounds from their former Casuarina property.

They jokingly named

wood is long and convoluted. Part of the Parish of Beaconsfield originally, the Spearwood area was served by visiting ministers who held services in private homes.

"The construction of the mission hall was an outreach into the area and was built by contributions from the Parish of Beaconsfield and local businessmen who were mainly market gardeners.

"Services, while being held regularly, were only a small part of the use of the hall. Various organisations including sporting clubs held meetings there, much to the consternation of some of the members of the committee running the hall.

"It was also used for electioneering meetings and light entertainment such as plays and comedy skits. One of the major uses was for dances. Many older residents in Spearwood remember the dances.

"The history of the area is recorded in accidents and war efforts. The story of the Anglican Parish of Spearwood is also a social history of the Spearwood district.'

June is now on a mission to find funding to support the publishing and distribution of the book, A Journey of Faith. While, in a small market, the book fills an important gap in the State's heritage. June can be contacted by email: junecaunt@yahoo.com

**Future Brain** 



WHEN I first glanced at

this book I thought uh-oh

heads and with more than a little trepidation I began to read. How wrong I was.

Yes, it would be invaluable to CEO's and team leaders who may need to motivate their staff,

This book shows an interesting insight into how the brain can be re-programmed from habitual negative thinking and destructive learning from long held beliefs to structured thought patterns that in a non-complex way can unlock the superpower of the

There are challenges to face every day and at times we need to think on our feet especially as technology advances and we need to keep up with the changes. The brain needs to be a sharp and capable tool maximising its full cognitive potential.

Dr Brockis writes that Future Brain will help people expand their brains capability, manage stress, and be more creative and innovative. By using neuro-scientific principles she shows people how they can boost their brain's fitness.

This book isn't one that can be read quickly or skimmed through. Like a good meal it should be savoured, each morsel slowly digested and appreciated. There are twelve chapters or keys that help to improve the brain's performance and Dr Brockis would like to make brain fitness as well known and understood as Jamie Oliver has made healthy eating. I believe that she will fulfil that goal through this intriguing and extremely interesting book that promotes brain fitness for everyone.

IT'S no surprise to people who lived through last year's Esperance and Harvey/Waroona bushfires that one in three of people reading this letter will face at least one natural disaster in their lifetime. WENDY Singh is part of a group which supports Ugandan schoolgirls and creates useful packages to send to the country. Wendy's daughter Debbie lived in Uganda for 12 years where she worked as a women's doctor.

Debbie also trained local people as health

workers who could then go into their communities and teach good health practices. Up to 10 per cent of Ugandan school girls miss up to 20 per cent of their education each month because they are unable to access feminine hygiene products, Wendy said.

about the good work the Days for Girls campaign was doing she decided to carry on the same work for the villages where her daughter worked. She approached a group of her friends from the Timbers Edge Craft group in Dawesville to see of they could help with this project and they happily accepted. The group started

creating packs to send to the girls in Uganda containing two pairs of knickers, three pad holders, ten pads, a bar of soap and a washcloth all-together in a drawstring bag. All of these items are washable and therefore can be used over and over.

As well as the donations made by the residents of Timbers Edge, the local Anglican Op Shop have been saving good fleecy sheets and other suitable fabrics. Other donations of new washcloths knickers. and soaps have also

been gratefully received. So far, 50 packs have been sent to Uganda and the Timbers Edge Craft Group were thrilled to receive an email with photos of the girls receiving their gift packs. Their gratitude was humbling.

The next shipment weighs 50kg and is ready to go and will cost around \$400 to send to Uganda.

# Cybercrime Roadshows - Keeping people safe from cybercrime

COTA is running a Cybercrime Roadshow in each parliamentary constituency, financed by the Department of Justice.

Deputy Premier Liza Harvey said social media has become an important tool for people to keep in touch with their children and grandchildren who often moved interstate or overseas.

"Seniors can remain connected via social media and Skype. But if you are new to technology it is easy for fraudsters to take advantage of vulnerable people.'

Last month Ms Harvey introduced a seminar on avoiding being the victim of cybercrime at Innaloo Sporting Club.

Computer scientist and head of Edith Cowan University's Security Research Institute Dr David Cook said there are five major mistakes that people make that leaves them vulnerable to cybercrime.

The first is Trojans. These are computer viruses, small pieces of software sent attached to emails.

"The worst Trojans are

key loggers. They work by reporting everything you do on the computer and steal passwords and bank account numbers.

A common way they spread is in infected emails that friends send asking you to pass them on to other friends.

"Don't send them on even if the email has the name of a trusted friend. And if you are sending out

an email to lots of people, send it to yourself and put all the other addresses in the Blind Carbon Copy

'Grumpy people have the best email technique; they delete. Nice seniors reply politely with a 'no thank you' and thereby give away valuable information such as their name and signature.

He said the second most common problem is the modem or router.

"If you used the easy install program to set it up you are left with a default password. Telstra has supplied over one million routers all with the same password.

Crooks know this and if they also have your IP address, which they can obtain from your email address, they can enter your modem and use it to attack other computers. But the infections appears to come from your computer.

"Call your Internet service provider and ask to change your router pass-

Many seniors run Windows XP. This operating system is most vulnerable because Microsoft no longer updates it so when someone finds a vulnerability nothing gets repaired, allowing Trojans to take control.

"Windows XP is not safe for banking or buying things on the Internet. You can easily update it to Widows 7 for around \$50." he said.

Your WiFi may be secure at home but if you use publically available WiFi such as an Internet café, or cruise ship everyone using it has the same password. Crooks can copy what you are doing. It is not safe to do Internet bank-

ing.
If you are away from home and need to do banking get a paid

WiFi with a separate password.

Most importantly choose a password that is difficult to guess. Not the name of your cat or your children or birthday. Crooks can narrow the choice using your social media posts.

It is difficult to remember more than one password, so it is a good idea to use simple passwords for non-critical software and a complex one for applications such as bank-

One way to get a hard to guess password is to think of a passphrase. That is a phrase, such as a line of a song known only to you as a mnemonic. Use the first letters of each word in the passphrase as your password and change it very six months.

# It is so important to live well and stay connected

WHAT would you say if I said to you that you are getting old and your health is failing so you should go home, settle vour affairs, stay out of danger and wait for the end to come? Would you listen to me? Do you think this is good ad-

This approach is often described as Prescribed Disengagement, a term

first coined by dementia commentator Kate Swaffer in her blog. "Following a diagnosis of dementia, most people are told to go home, give up work, in my case, give up study, and put all the planning in place for their demise such as their wills," she wrote.

Such advice has been given by those who treat people living with dementia or other serious health issues with much professional concern for their well-being. Those who support us have our best interests at heart when they want us wrapped in cotton wool and kept safe from those things that might harm us. There are times when this advice is appropriate. I'm sure many

of us have taken this approach with a loved one struck down by an illness like the flu, and rugaed them up in bed safe from the world.

But dementia is not the flu and protection from the world is no rem-

The challenge is between a fight or flight response to a dementia diagnosis. Often the advice given is to take a flight response, as Kate experienced, because for some a fight response is not considered viable or worthwhile after a diagnosis of dementia. The thinking has been that you can fight many illnesses but with dementia there is no point. The medical world used to take this prescribed disengagement approach to a diagnosis of cancer, but that has now all changed. The problem for someone with dementia is that disengagement is highly likely to lead to a much poorer well-being. In truth, a fight re-

sponse is the outcome now more likely be recommended by health professionals. You should fight for your right to live well, whatever that means for you, until the time you are unable to do so. Living well is rarely characterised by disengagement.

Living well is everyone's right. The older you get the more you need to focus on ensuring your later years are lived as well as you possibly can, especially if you have a diagnosis of dementia.

What is meant by living well? Each of us might answer that question differently, but many of the reports on ageing well over the last thirty years have identified connectedness as a key criteria in living well in later life.

The recent report Living Well With Dementia (2016) from Alzheimer's Australia NSW also identifies connectedness as one of the keys to living well with dementia. It defines connectedness as a state of being and feeling connected, alive. belonging, engaged, involved, not detached,

connected to the past, present and future; connected to personal possessions, place, and nature. Connectedness is the polar opposite of disengagement.

In my last column, I wrote about the research showing people with dementia were twice as lonely as the rest of the population. I feel sure disengagement plays some worrying role in this sad result. Engagement takes courage and a positive approach. It isn't always easy with especially dementia, given the stigma experienced by those with a diagnosis. However, there are many ways those living with dementia can be supported to continue to engage and live well.

I urge you, whether you have a diagnosis of dementia or not, to use all the energy and courage you can muster to stay engaged, live well and focussed on connectedness. Every day that is lived well is usually defined by the moments we share with others. And every day lived well is one we will treasure.

# The campaign for pension parity continues

THE UK Political Parties are now having their conference seasons so political news from there is extremely quiet.

The UK Independence Party (UKIP) have already had their conference and elected Dianne James (MEP) as their leader to replace Nigel Farage who has stood down. They have been historically good supporters for our campaign for pension parity and have included pensions uprating in previous manifestos. The money was to be recovered from the huge UK Overseas Aid Budget which currently stands at nearly £12 billion. I have written to Dianne James to solicit her promise to continue to include pension parity in her manifesto.

The All Party Parlia-mentary Group (APPG) met in the Palace of Westminster on 14 September for its AGM and to discuss forward business. It was well attended and also included discussions with invited guests from the Overseas Territories who are also looking at frozen pensions because currently only British pensioners living in Bermuda (as a result of a historical agreement) and Gibraltar (within the EU) receive a

fully uprated pension.

They therefore, like us, find that as a group /organisation they are also treated differently by the UK Government. The APPG has offered its support to the Overseas Territories group as this could create a chink in the UK Government's intransigency. The APPG recommended that the case for special treatment for the Overseas Territories would be strengthened through a better understanding of the Bermuda exception and relevant aspects of individual constitutional arrangements. This will be followed up over the next couple of months and discussed

at the Joint Ministerial Council meeting later this

The new UK Pensions Minister, Richard Harrington, has continued to spout the same excuses for freezing pensions as his predecessor Baroness Altmann, when he was challenged about this issue in a recent parliamentary debate by lan Blackford (SNP Pensions Spokesperson). However, since leaving the Government she has turned against some of the information that she was 'forced to state' especially with regard to the unfair increases in omen's State pension ages. If anyone has a direct contact to her I would be most interested to hear whether she has anything to state about the frozen pension





The ability to listen, really listen, is something to be treasured and nur-



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# Woolies "go for gold" in great **Rio Olympics special coin edition**

AS Australia's athletes strove for gold, silver and bronze at the Rio Olympics, Aussie coin collectors jostled for 'aluminium bronze' in the checkout lanes of their local Woolworths supermarket. Their marathon, six-week quest for numismatic achievement began before the opening ceremony when the first of six different special edition Olympic \$2 coins (made of an alloy of aluminium and bronze) bolted out of

the tills at Woolies stores. The first coin featured the blue Olympic ring. The second, with a black ring, became available the following week with the other colours of red, yellow and green appearing in successive weeks to complete the set of five rings. A final edition in celebration of the Paralympics with a multicoloured ring was wheeled out the week thereafter.

It proved to be an absolutely brilliant marketing and public relations exercise on behalf of Woolworths and the Royal Australian Mint with the Australian Government and our Olympians also rewards. An reaping impressive logistical team effort culminated in the successful distribution of 12 million (2 million of each colour) collector coins as normal change via Woolies' 900 plus stores around the coun-

Under strict instructions from management, the coins were given out on the basis of one coin per customer per transaction and they had to be received as regular change thus ensuring customers made a purchase, and had a fair chance of getting them.

On the face of it, one could easily gain the impression that this was just a clever ploy to get customers into their stores, and it was, as they were only available through Woolies. Indirectly, it was also a money spinner for the government because to make the coins would have only cost say 10-20 cents each and as the bulk of them would be retained and not spent again, the difference would be clear profit.

As much as such was true, Woolies, the Mint the government were major sponsors of our Olympic team and so from their perspective there was vindication as

it was a means to an end to be able to provide that financial support. Truth be known, all collector edition Olympic coins (and stamps, etc) of the past were produced and sold as revenue raisers of some form or another.

That aside, in this case and exercise, I genuinely commend Woolworths, the Royal Australian Mint and the checkout chicks who may have been hardpressed by collectors.

Why? Because according to what I've heard and read, those collectors who wanted them, managed to acquire them fairly easily without paying a premium. In the last few years, other coloured special edition \$2 coins have been issued yet it became increasingly evident that an element of employees working within either security companies (who transport the coins) or banks (who distributed them) had been snaffling them for themselves and selling them, usually online, at comparatively exorbitant prices.

They're referred to in the coin fraternity as scalpers - such opportunism and profiteering is unfair, for which collectors would like to see their employers rake them over the Coles. (If you pardon the

# Stamp column: John Walter Scott takes on the American world of philately

JUST as English dealer and catalogue publisher, Stanley Gibbons, is internationally hailed as the Godfather of Philately, in the USA, John Walter Scott is recognised as the Father of American Philately

Born in England in 1845, at the age of 15, Scott worked in a London mercantile office at which time he became interested in collecting stamps and, courtesy of the incoming office mail, managed to acquire a reasonable accumulation. Three years on, he and his stamp collector friend, Charlie Watson, emigrated to New York. Upon their arrival, Scott sold his collection for \$10 to a stamp dealer, William Brown, who was operating from a pushcart in City Hall Park. Brown is recognised as one of New York's first stamp traders, apparently pinning (yikes!) to boards and selling most for usually 1 to 2 cents each.

The year was 1863, right in the midst of the American Civil War and so finding work, particularly for an Englishman, proved to be very difficult thereby inducing Scott to consider enlisting to fight for the North against the Confederates.

William Brown however took a liking to the young man and offered him \$100 worth of stamp stock for him to sell at another location in the city. He managed to turn a profit, returned for more stock and also supplemented his inventory with sendings from his sister in England.

A letter he sent to her reveals that he was selling the English 'Penny Blacks' for 12 cents each, presenting him 'a very good profit.' However, while Scott managed to get by on his stamp income of \$30 per month, he thought he might seek his fortune by journeying on foot across the country, through treacherous Red Indian territory, to the goldfields of California. Unfortunately he was not a successful prospector and so he returned to New York in 1866 by which time the Civil War had ended, thus allowing people to spend more time on hobby pursuits at the forefront of which was the flourishing craze of stamp collecting, and so, Scott fell back into the stamp trade.

Within a year he issued his first monthly pricelist which by 1868 he then evolved into a monthly journal titled The American Journal of Philately which he claimed was supported by the newly-formed New York Philatelic Society comprising eight collectors. At this time there were a dozen or more stamp journals and numerous pricelists issued by budding traders

With competition mounting amonast them, it seems there was no hesitation in what were essentially litigious-free times, to denounce one or another's publications in vari-

Boston stamp dealer, Ferdinand Trifet, proclaimed in his journal, the American Stamp Mercury, that the New York Philatelic Society was an imaginary club contrived by Scott to provide credence to his journal. He also accused Scott of plagiarising his stamp prices and campaigned against the term 'philately' being promoted as the name for the hobby as it was his preference to retain the term 'timbrophily' as originally conceived by the French and also adopted by other European collectors.

It appears Scott may well have been tempted to exaggerate or mislead as evidenced by his assertion that he circulated 2000 copies of his monthly journal and had sold within just a few months, 15,000 units of the first stamp album he produced for collectors.

Furthermore, he soon after reported the New York Philatelic Society had disbanded because two of its members had to resign due to increased work commitments. It is thought John Scott's marketing methods were influenced and misguided by his friend and associate, Charlie Watson, and another person said to have questionable business integrity, John Casey.

Scott eventually severed ties with these fellows to then go forth and develop one of America's great philatelic empires.


This is the second year that the YAL, one of Australia's oldest youth organizations, has offered scholarship opportunities to young West Australians in need.

# Beware the march of mosquitoes as spring arrives

ACCORDING to a recent ABC report by Emma Wynne, Perth's highest winter rainfall in five years may also mean an onslaught of mosquitoes as spring sets in. Future heavy rainfall predictions and above-average high tides in the coming months will also create more stagnant pools, which provide a

perfect environment for mosquitoes to breed in.

Michael Lindsay, from the WA Department of Health stated on 720 ABC Perth that "all of that combined is telling us that we are probably in for a busier year, for mosquitoes, than in other years." As well as the irritation and itching mosquito bites cause, Dr Lindsay claims that they can also spread serious diseases like Ross River virus and the less well-known Barmah Forrest virus.

"The symptoms of both are painful swollen joints, sore muscles, and Barmah Forrest in particular can have quite a significant rash," he said.

"People also have other symptoms typically associated with viral infections such as fever, fatique and headache. Those symptoms can persist for weeks and in some cases months.

"It's not a thing to take lightly; it does have a very significant impact on quality of life.' There are no registered

vaccines for either virus and treatment involves managing with the symptoms with painkillers and anti-inflammatory medications. In this case (as in most cases of disease) prevention is better than cure, so Dr Lindsay suggests trying to avoid being bitten altogether, which means trying to eradicate potential mosquito breeding sites around your home and garden.

"There are certainly mosquitoes that breed in backyards in what we call cryptic breeding sites," Dr Lindsay said. "These breeding sites may be quite obscure, such as little saucers or a drip tray under a pot plant that holds water for a few days, or pet bowls - any stagnant water source where mosquitoes may lay their eggs. There are a whole range of backyard breeding sites that people can manage by tipping out the water or putting away rubbish and plastic containers that might be lying around collecting

When it comes to natural breeding sites like wetlands and salt marsh-

klers.

water from rain or sprin-

es, the public is reliant on local government efforts to tackle mosquitoes. However, Dr Lindsay emphasises that being aware of the risks in mosquito-prone areas and taking personal protective measures would be most effective.

"Wearing appropriate long, loose-fitting clothing and using personal repellents (so you don't getting bitten) is surprisingly effective," Dr Lindsay af-


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

SHOULDER bursitis is swelling and inflammation of an inflamed bursa. People have several bursas in their shoulder. The role of the bursa which is a small gel filled sac is to reduce friction in between shoulder tendons when they move.

Subacromial bursitis is a common cause of shoulder pain that is usually related to shoulder impingement of the bursa between the rotator cuff tendons and the prominent bone at the end of the shoulder blade called

The causes of shoulder bursitis is repetition of movement and overuse of the shoulder muscles and joints or a single more significant trauma such as a fall or blow to the shoulder.

How can a physiotherapist help?

A physiotherapist can diagnose a shoulder injury from a patient's detailed description of the pain from and a thorough physical examination to differentiate between shoulder bursitis and a rotator cuff injury using manual tests. Shoulder bursitis commonly co-exists with rotator cuff injury and tendonitis.

An ultrasound scan is the most common tool to diagnose subacromial (sub meaning below the acromion bone) bursitis.

# Fascinating look into Perth - the way we worked



The stunning Palace Hotel will be open for guided tours during Perth Heritage Days

OUR fair city did not just happen. From the early days of settlement there were systems and processes put in place to make the colony work. Just as there were people charged with the duty of carrying out the work. This year's eighth annual Perth Heritage Days will reflect on 'Perth – the way we worked'.

As people began to settle in this foreign land, they sought ways to adapt the rules and social customs of their homeland in a manner that was workable in an environment with no on-hand support services.

From government to legal and court systems, roads and transport, emergency services, food producers, religious services, health-care, waste disposal and factories, the colonists worked on

every part of community infrastructure to create a functioning, orderly city.

Throughout our young history these work processes have changed many times to build, mould and fashion the state in which we now live. With more than 80 different activities, the weekend of Saturday 15 and Sunday 16 October October looks set to be the best Perth heritage days to date.

Some of the highlights include 18 vintage biplanes landing on Langley Park, Government House open day, the chance to look inside the wonderful Palace Hotel and two extraordinary exhibitions; Gwalia's Gold – its People and Places and The Coolbaroo Club.

The Coolbaroo Club exhibition was created by the City of Perth and

explores the contemporary history of Aboriginal people in the city of Perth and celebrates the role the Coolbaroo League had in the 1950s during years of change and modernisation in Perth. Young people yearned for a new sense of glamour and freedom from conservative dogma and discrimination. It was a particularly important time for the local Aboriginal population as they broke through barriers on many fronts. This exhibition will truly surprise you.

Gwalia's Gold – its People and Places tells the story of the Sons of Gwalia gold mine which at its peak was the sixth largest gold mining operation in Australia. When the mine closed in December 1963, the majority of Gwalia's population took what they could car-

ry and left, chasing gold in nearby Kalgoorlie. Funded by a Minara Community Foundation grant, the exhibition features photographs and a video documentary, telling stories of residents both past and present. It is a fascinating journey into the goldfields of WA.

With thanks to Woods Bagot Pty Ltd and Brookfield Multiplex, for the first time this year, the stunning Palace Hotel will be open for guided tours. In 1892 American John De Baun arrived in WA and started investing in real estate buying land mostly along St George's Terrace as well as building two hotels in the city, the first being the Palace Hotel. This is sure to book out, so get in early.

Once agáin Government House will host an open day on Sunday 16. Since opening its doors in 1863, the present Government House has been home to successive Governors appointed to serve Western Australia. From gardeners, the cooks, and animal husbandry, to the grand events and education of children, everyone played a vital role in the workings of the household. This year's open day gives you the opportunity to discover how the house worked and the people behind the scenes who kept this most important residence functioning.

In the year 1870, Miss Cook was a governess to the two daughters of Governor Frederick Weld and his wife Mena. Through theatrical performance, the charming and genteel Miss Cook will reveal what her working life was like as a governess, life in Perth in the 1870s and her impressions of Government House which she considers "...the finest building in Perth".

Enjoy this performance and so much more on the day; self-guided house tours, cellar tours, ball-room dance exhibitions and kids activities including pet farm animals and 'experimental archaeology', fabulous family fun.

During the weekend there will be more than a dozen talks from eminent speakers, museums not normally accessible to the general public at the weekend, talks, workshops, interactive drama and music presentations and garden walks. The problem will be to choose what not to see.

Saturday 15 and Sunday 16 October discover 'Perth - The Way We Worked' during a journey of exploration, fun and adventure for everyone. All events are FREE but some require advance booking. # TV talk with Lee Tate - our enduring love affair with television cooking shows

TELEVISION superstar chef Manu Feidel, who describes himself as a "Frozzie" (French-Aussie), says it's a shame no-one has invented "smellavision".

No, we viewers can't smell or taste the food on TV cooking shows. But aren't we gobbling them up? The proof is in the pudding. On Wikipedia, if you call-up Aussie cooking TV shows you're confronted with 53 pages of cooking series.

Here's a recent onenight's SBS rundown: Antonio Carluccio's 6 Seasons, Luke Nguyen's Street Food and Destination Flavour Down Under with Adam Liaw.

It has been an amazing worldwide evolution since the likes of another ladies' heart-throb Frenchman, Gabriel Gate, made TV cooking shows popular from 1977.

Several years ago some TV producers and executives, at their peril, predicted that cooking shows would burn themselves out. How quickly did they go back in the kitchen?

Forty years later, Channel 7's greatest asset, clearly worth a fortune in advertising, is *My Kitchen Rules*, overlorded by Feidel and Pete Evans, where home cooks turn up the heat in their

culinary clashes.

Cooking shows have exploded. Like a truck-load of popcorn. How do you rate them: Iron Chef, the Great British Bake-Off, Master Chef, Surprise Chef, Huey's Kitchen, Ben's Menu?

While chocolate queen Nigella Lawson is finger-lickin' good, favourite in our house so is Vietnamese gent Luke Nguyen with delightful, delicious and daring demonstrations among Asia's street vendors.

Britain's self-titled "bastard of Billingsgate", Roger Barton, tackled the toughest traders in World's Greatest Food Markets, showing how an English fish merchant competed in New York's Bronx where a billion bucks' worth of fish trading is done every year. Some traders looked very fishy.

And the menu for TV cooking shows is growing. With this lifestyle approach we go into eateries, markets, castles and homes and learn about healthy and alternative eating.

We are told that Italians with traditional diets including olive oil and sundried tomato "live longest, apart from the Japanese".

The great Jamie Oliver even took healthy eating programs into schools.

The healthy eating path was officially trialled many years ago in Sydney when greasy grub was banished from government department canteens, only to be reinstated after public servants trooped down the

road for their chips, pastries and cakes.

It all makes good fodder for the home viewer though, doesn't it? Jamie Oliver, incidentally, with all his profitable programs, spin-offs, books, crockery and cutlery, easy recipes, healthy food and cheeky approach still ranks at the pinnacle of TV cooking supremos.

How long can it go on? Even pioneer Gabriel Gate still pedals onward. For the past 12 years he's presented his *Taste Le Tour* program during TV's tour de force, *Tour de France*, on SBS. He's matured like a

good French wine.

My Kitchen Rules is not only "cooking with gas" but has been overseas.

Just when we thought we'd seen it all, up pops Zumbo's Just Desserts with "Australia's most celebrated patissier" Adriano Zumbo and British chef Rachel Khoo, clearly taking its visual flavours from the movie Willy Wonka and the Chocolate Factory. Even Aussie amateur dessert-makers have their day in the sun.

Television cooking shows are astonishing. And perplexing. All that food and cooking tips from the world's experts and home cooks. There's even a dedicated fulltime Food channel. All preparing and dishing-up tucker with recipes and methods most us won't ever follow.

We can't taste it, we can't smell it. But, like Oliver Twist, we keep on coming back for more. For the TV networks there's clearly a lot more lolly.

I would recommend this to anyone who has had a stroke or recovering from a stroke to put their problems right.

I know a lot of people try magnets, I have used magnetism myself, I wore a bio-flow bracelet for over twelve years but it didn't make much difference.

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# Chicken lasagne with cheese sauce

A LASAGNE without tomato - now that is a bit different for a Calabrian born-Australian boy like me but this is so delicious and elegant - you must try it soon. Ingredients for three-four people 600g lasagne pasta sheets 150g butter 50g butter 75g plain flour big pinch nutmeg 750ml full cream milk 1 white salad onion finely sliced 500ml chicken stock 250g chicken thighs boneless 2 eggs beaten 200g grated parmigiano 250g drained fresh ricotta 100g grated pecorino cheese 1 x cup flat leaf parsley handful of fresh sage leaves 100ml dry Sicilian Marsala WA organic lake salt freshly cracked black pepper

#### Method:

Put the chicken stock on to boil then add the chicken and salt and simmer for about 30 minutes. While this is happening boil your pasta sheets in lots of salted water. When al dente drain the pasta sheets on a damp tea towel to lose excess water. Pat dry the top of the sheets with absorbent paper.

Check that your chicken is thoroughly cooked. Then cut the chicken into fine slices and set aside. Save the stock.

Now in a frypan melt your 150g of butter and fry the onion until soft, then add the flour stir and cook for two minutes. Then add milk and nutmeg (be generous with the nutmeg if you like it) and cook and stir on low simmer for five minutes then add 250ml of leftover chicken stock. Mix and boil this sauce till it reduces and coats the bottom of a spoon lightly but not too thick. Then set aside to cool to just warm - not too hot - not too cold. Now add the eggs, Marsala, parmigiano, and pecorino and whisk until the sauce is smooth.

In a baking dish of appropriate size, put a thin layer of sauce, then a layer of pasta, now a layer of sauce, not too much. Next spread a few slices of the chicken, a crumble of ricotta, a few parsley leaves and three or four chopped sage leaves spread out over each layer of sauce.

Now put the next layer of pasta and repeat the filling (don't be too generous or it will be too sloppy) repeat until you finish with pasta, sauce and ricotta on top but no chicken or herbs on top layer.

Make sure you use all the chicken and herbs in the layers. Baked the finished lasagne at 175° for one hour. The top must have a little colour. Serve hot. Yum! Buon appetito.

# Low alcohol wines - lots of flavour and not too much kick

LOW alcohol wines have yet to make their mark. That's a pity because you can safely drink two or three glasses of low alcohol wine with a meal. And that is the amount of wine which most of us like to drink when accompanying a meal. The alternative of course is to alternate drinks of wine with water, but that's not for everybody.

Mr Rocco Longo of Charles Sturt University is cooperating with David Lowe to create a full-flavour low alcohol wine, by combining varying quantities of grapes harvested weeks

"Low alcohol wine varieties have a bad reputation; they can taste like water because of a lack of full-body and full-flavour characters caused by a loss of aroma compounds," Mr Longo said.

The changing climate means the amount of sugar in wines is increasing and more sugar means more alcohol. Winemakers are harvesting two weeks earlier than they were 20 years ago. It is becoming difficult to find the optimum level of sugar, acidity and aroma compounds.

"If we can provide consumers with a wine that has less alcohol but a great aromatic and flavour profile then we are going to succeed."

Have a Go News tasted a range of low alcohol wines:

Lowe Tinja low alcohol Verdelho 2015 The colour is pale straw with a slight, youthful green tinge. The nose is slightly musky and palate is light and crisp with fresh lemongrass, apple and tropical fruit flavours and balanced natural acidity and is at 10 per cent alcohol RRP

Azahara Moscato (Azahara is Spanish for orange blossom) is a sparkling wine with a floral nose, light sweet zingy acidity and a refreshing finish. It is ideal as an aperitif or to accompany a light lunch, fruit platter or sweets. Only six per cent alcohol. Look for it around \$10/bottle.

Lindemen's Early Harvest wines are crafted from flavour-ripe grapes harvested from early ripening regions in south eastern Australia and contain 8.5 to 9 per cent alcohol.


Pinot Grigio 2015 is pale straw in colour with a nose of nashi pear, red apple and orange citrus. The palate is light-medium bodied, fresh citrus and pear with a crisp, refreshing finish. RRP \$15.99.



# **Climbing the Ladder in Mount Hawthorn**

THIS month my regular brunch partner Dan and I ventured to Mount Hawthorn to try the Ladder Café and Deli. The décor at the Ladder reminded me of a vintage beach feel, with a laid back at-mosphere with pictures of ladders and other WA landmarks adorning the walls and we felt gave it a cute touch.

Dan and I were promptly greeted as soon as we entered with very friendly service. Beside all-day breakfast they also offer other services including catering and venue hire. They also have on offer a nice selection of cakes and salads displayed in their cabinet.

We sat down at a share table which added to the community feel that we both thought the venue's atmosphere exuded. We both decided pretty quickly what we wanted and ordered at the counter.

I ordered a spiced banana smoothie (\$7) and a chai latte to warm up (\$3.50) and for brunch I chose the rosti, salmon and eggs (\$22) with a side of haloumi (\$4) and mushrooms (\$5). Dan ordered one of the specials of the day which was the French toast (\$17) with a strawberry smoothie (\$7).

Our food was served before our drinks which I didn't appreciate. My chai latte wasn't what I expected so I couldn't finish it all. Though my spiced banana smoothie was amazing and



thick - definitely the highlight of the meal, and a lot nicer than the strawberry.

The rosti wasn't quite what I was expecting with sweet potato used instead of potato so it wasn't crisp like a normal rosti and was more like a frittata. The hollandaise was very nice and creamy and fluffy and my eggs were cooked how I like them. The haloumi was very good but I felt like the mushrooms could have been cooked longer. My only disappointment was that halfway through my meal I found a hair in my food.

Dan's French toast was nice and buttery and the bananas, strawberries and bacon with maple worked well together. He felt the dish did not have a "wow" factor and as he kept eating felt there was a little too much maple syrup and that sweetness overpowered the dish.

Ladder is a nice spot for a brunch, the presentation of the food is excellent but we thought there were a few improvements they could make.

Overall I woud give them 3 spoons.



# Simple spring salads to welcome the season

NOW is the time to start making or even inventing fresh, delicious salads. Perfect for warm spring days, salads can literally be a meal on their own or otherwise make a terrific accompaniment to a main meal. Using lots of fruit, vegetables and other whole ingredients is the key to a fresh and healthy salad that will be sure to impress. Give your salad a range of textures as well as making it more substantial by adding meats, poultry, seafood, noodles, pasta, rice or crunchy croutons.

Combining authentic flavours from all over the world is the key to a successful salad. Marinated olives, sundried tomatoes and gourmet lettuce are readily available along with gourmet cheeses and meats. The flavours of Italy, Greece and Thailand (just to name a few) are now an important part of Australian cuisine.

Tasty strips of char-grilled chicken or spicy marinated lamb will be sure to impress dinner guests or family. The hardest part is choosing only a couple of flavours so you don't overcrowd things. Try adding some home-roast-ed red capsicums, baby mozzarella balls (bocconcini) and fresh basil, or for some Thai flavour, marinate your chicken or beef in green curry paste before cooking and add coriander leaves, fresh chilli and cucumber to your salad base. A squeeze of fresh lime juice will finish it off perfectly.

Roasted vegetables also make wonderful warm salads and flavours of sweet potato, pumpkin, potato (mondial is in season), carrot and beans team perfectly with fresh herbs like thyme and rosemary and a touch of garlic. A good potato salad never goes astray at a barbecue, teamed with crispy bacon, boiled eggs, spring onion and fresh dill.

Fresh herbs can be incorporated into your dressing or the whole leaves can form part of the salad base. Ideal ingredients for a dressing include freshly squeezed citrus juice, Dijon or whole seed mustard, sour cream, sweet chilli sauce, olive oil or balsamic vinegar. Avoid overdressing salads as this can drown out the other flavours. Have a little extra on the side so people can add to suit their tastes. Toss only small amounts of the dressing through right at the last moment to prevent the

salad going soggy.

Spring weather is bound to offer plenty of sunny afternoons and opportunities to entertain. Whatever your tastes, there is a salad to suit you and your friends. Here are some you might like to try:

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# What's fresh



Asparagus: "Asparagus inspires gentle thoughts", wrote the English essayist Charles Lamb. Inspired thoughts or otherwise, it is certainly the vegetable that most signifies the arrival of the delicate spring season and all the delicious morsels that come with it. Choose firm, plump spears with compact tips and tight scales, avoid any that are slimy or soft and check that the tips and bottoms of the spears are not dried out.

Sugar snaps: The soft and tender edible pods of sugar snap peas are crisp, ads, stir-fried or lightly steamed. Before being eaten, mature snap pea pods may need to be "stringed", which means the membranous string running along the top of the pod from base to tip is removed. Unlike its cousin, the snow pea, the sugar snap pea is picked more mature and is fully rounded, with thick pod walls that retain their natural plumpness.

Button mushrooms: With their subtle flavour and compact size, button mushrooms are perfect for adding whole to spring meals like salads, stir-fries and fresh tomato-based pasta sauces. Mushrooms are so quick and easy to use; apart from a quick wipe over with a cloth or paper towel, no further preparation is necessary. Try marinating in good olive oil and balsamic vinegar and garnishing with fresh herbs; lovely served at room temperature as part of a barbecue feast. Best of all they have been shown to reduce the risk of breast cancer - so add a few extra to anything

Ellendale mandarins: Ellendale mandarins is a late season variety and some of WA's best. They are now in fresh produce stores and supermarkets. Éllendales are a good size, have a distinct deep orange skin and fewer pips than some varieties so they are a popular choice. They are also sweet and very juicy and create a rich colour contrast when added to a green salad. Time to savour the final month of mandarins till next

## Roast pumpkin, orange and avocado salad



- 1 butternut pumpkin, peeled and cut into 2.5cm cubes
- 1 tblspn ground cumin
- 2 tblspn olive oil
- 200g stringless green beans
- 2 oranges, skin removed and segmented
- 100g baby English spinach leaves 2 avocados, cut into 2.5cm cubes
- 100g chopped macadamias, toasted Dressing:
- 1 tblspn honey
- 2 tblspn soy sauce
- ¼ cup olive oil

PRE-HEAT your oven to 220°C. Combine dressing ingredients in a jar and shake well. Combine the pumpkin cubes, ground cumin and olive oil. Spread pumpkin mixture out in one layer on a tray and roast in the oven for 20 minutes or until tender. Bring a saucepan of salted water to the boil and cook beans for 2 minutes, so they retain a good crunch. Refresh in cold water to halt the cooking process and ensure the bright green colour is maintained. Place pumpkin cubes and green beans in the serving bowl. Add the spinach, avocado, orange, macadamias and dressing to the serving bowl and toss to combine. Serve im-

## Recipe for one: glazed navel oranges



Rind of ½ navel orange

- 1/4 cup boiling water
- 1/4 cup sugar
- 1 navel orange
- 2 tblspon ricotta cheese

SLICE orange rind into matchstick sized pieces. Put the rind and boiling water into a small casserole dish and microwave and HIGH for three minutes. Add the sugar and stir to dissolve.

Microwave for two minutes. Peel orange. Remove pith and outside membrane using a very sharp knife. Take care to keep orange whole.

Put orange into a dish that just holds it and cover with syrup and rind. Refrigerate for several hours or overnight. Serve glazed orange on a bed of ricotta topped with glazed rind and syrup.

### Avocado, apple and beetroot salad

Preparation: 15 mins, Cooking: 0 mins Serves: 4



- 1 avocado, peeled and sliced
- 1 large beetroot, peeled and grated
- 1 carrot, peeled and grated 1 small cos lettuce, torn into small pieces
- 1 red onion, sliced
- 1 apple, cored and sliced
- 1/4 cup walnuts, chopped and toasted Dressina:
- 1/4 cup Italian dressing
- 2 tblspn lemon juice 1 tspn wholegrain mustard

PLACE all salad ingredients together in a bowl. Toss gently to combine. Place dressing ingredients into a jar. Secure lid. Shake well. Drizzle over salad prior to serving. Serve salad with barbecued meats.

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
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# Experiencing the many moods and colourful people of beautiful St Petersburg in the summer

PIERCING whistle catches my attention and, as I turn, there striding towards me was a grim faced man in uniform pointing at me. He had something Cyrillic and official stamped on his flat-topped hat which I think translated to, 'I was Stalin's Batman'.

Our eyes met. I frantically looked for Irina our tour guide only to see her otherwise engaged in a loud argument with the Chinese tour leader up ahead. Irina's hands were punctuating the air with every point of her argument and Stalin's Batman was coming nearer

We were lined up in hordes outside the Peterhoff Palace and a voice from the horde shouted to me to step back onto the gravel path, stepping on the grass was strictly forbidden. I moved quickly and international warfare was averted. I had only been in St Petersburg for an hour.

We had left the ship and boarded a bus for a tour of the city. In my ignorance I thought that I would be seeing colourful cupolas the minute we drove off but instead we passed block after block of drab Stalinesque apartment buildings, the remnants of a different era.

This all changed as we came through the city on our way to the Peterhoff, The Grand Imperial Palace built for Peter the Great. There were literally hundreds of tourists trying to gain entrance to the Palace and we were all iostling and shuffling and treading on each other's toes for quite a while. It wasn't very orderly and it wasn't very pleasant. Eventually we made it in-

Stylistic baroque the rooms are full of rich furnishings, copious gilded wood carvings, paintings and the attention to detail on the highly ornate fireplaces turn them into works of art in their own

We were quite rushed through the Palace because of the amount of people passing through (it was the weekend) and in each room perched on a chair, (utility not baroque) sat an unsmiling babush-

ka with a buzzer and if the hordes were not moving quickly enough the buzzer was pressed and we were herded along buzzing babushka style.

Irina was way ahead speaking into her mic but unfortunately my ear piece kept being knocked out of my ear and I missed half of the history, the half that I tried to hear had so much static that I yanked it out myself in a childish tantrum.

One part I do remember; it seems Catherine was a piece of work. If she heard that a younger, prettier woman was attending one of her lavish balls she found out what she would be wearing and had her furniture upholstered in the same

Forget assassinations ladies - this was serious. True or false. I don't know.

We made our way out to the front of the Palace overlooked the Grand Cascade and lower gardens.

There are more than a hundred fountains, three palaces and three or four cascades in the gardens which defy description; such is the beauty of it all. The Grand Cascade spectacular, water splashes and glistens onto gilded statues of Greek and Roman gods that flank the Cascade, and it is a most amazing and stunningly beautiful waterfall.

There are three parks to wander through and at the end of one you can follow a waterway to the canal and take a hydrofoil back to the city.

After the Peterhoff we

visited 'The Church of the Spilled Blood' or "The Church of the Saviour on Blood' which was built on the spot where Alexander II was murdered.

At last I had found my cupolas and how magnificent this church is. I was ecstatic. I had seen photos of these domes but nothing prepares you for the sheer beauty and decorative embellishment inside and out.

The mosaic designs are so intricate that it is hard to visualise how long it must have taken to place the thousands of tesserae that cover the walls and

There is a shrine in one corner that is covered with semi-precious gemstones; this marks the exact spot where Alexander

It was almost impossible to fully appreciate the architecture and beauty of St Savoir because of the masses of people, but never the less, I didn't feel cheated at all.

The next day we met our new tour guide. Small in stature, big in voice and dressed in tight black jeans and tee-shirt she was young and quite severe. I coined her "Madam Lash" and she commanded and we obeyed, like a James Bond agent she exuded power.

She took us to a government market, the people's market. Supermarkets catered for the richer population whilst the government market served the less well-off I was taken aback by the sheer artistry of the vendors, the visual displays of their merchandise paid testament to their pride in their goods. They only had a small space to use but used it diligently.

Vegetables shaved and arranged in colourful mounds that had a rainbow effect in the dull building, the dried fruit and nuts were a showpiece of their own, meticulously displayed in small containers set out with eye-catching simplicity. The tiny nooks selling seeds was a delight. Bijou came to mind. Seed packets were pinned around the walls using the limited space in an ingenious way.

I poked my head in and waved my hands around in that tourist semaphore that quite surprisingly works. I loved this lady's shop (I semaphored) and her smile, and took her photo. She was shy at first but then delighted with the picture, she gave me a packet of shasta daisy seeds which I had to accept, I didn't want to offend her and her kindness. I scattered the seeds around the city and the empty packet has pride of place on my fridge door.

Madam Lash appeared from the back of the market and I had visions of her sitting on a crate smoking a Sobrane and swigging vodka from the bottle until it was time to

She took us to the Metro, the deepest in the world, ninety meunderground and escalator seemed never ending and steep. Mosaics. chandeliers. statues and beautiful art deco wall mounted lights transforms the stations into miniature palaces. A seated statue of Pushkin at one station quite takes the breath away it is so life like. Tokens are used to enter the Metro and one token allows unlimited travel. We were told that this method of payment means cheaper journeys but passengers travelling only one or two stops dis-

Madam Lash tells us to. "board zer last vagon, zer last vagon only" and get off at "zer fourth stop." We watched as Cyrillic station names and works of wonder flashed past until Madam Lash yelled, 'You vill get off now.'

With such a commanding voice it meant that half the passengers came with us. Impressive doesn't begin to describe the fabulous feast for the eyes, but perhaps spectacular, spell binding, grandiose might do for a

St Petersburg is a city of majestic architecture. monuments and statues, canals and rivers. The Nevsky Prospect is the widest road that I have ever seen and it must be a least six lanes wide and leads us over the Fontanka canal by the way of the Anichkov bridge. The statues of the Horse Tamers on the bridge are quite famous; they are superb and finely sculptured, the workmanship indescribable.

Like McArthur, "I will return." There is so much more to be seen and experience here, I only had a glimpse but it was enough to set my sights

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

In Ruedesheim we were taken by open air cable car to the top of Niederwald Forest to walk slowly back down through myriad vineyards just starting to sprout green in the spring, and where an alfresco picnic of local sausages and beautiful bread complemented many glasses of Riesling in the bracing air.

At Strasbourg it was a private cruise on a glass domed bateau-mouche took us past the exquisite timber houses, before free time at the mighty Strasbourg Cathedral.

After every excursion there was a warm welcome back on board Imagery II, with the crew greeting us like much-missed friends before showing us the lounge where coffee and cake waited.

This Romantic Rhine cruise on Imagery II glides you past some of Europe's prettiest charms - Hansel and Gretel houses, endless vineyards stretching high on rising hills, and too many castles to count (although we tried, got to 42 at one stage).



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

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# Quendas'- our little Aussie garden diggers at risk

RESIDENTS of outer suburbs and hills are familiar with quendas (bandicoots) digging for earthworms and insects

in damp parts of the garden. With a little encouragement they become quite tame.

However close contact between humans and their pets and wildlife can spread diseases.

"Our amazing urban wildlife including birds and marsupials, are threatened by diseases of human origin like toxoplasmosis from food scraps and domestic cats, and Giardia from sewage contamination of the environment," said Professor Andrew Thompson from Murdoch's School of Veterinary and Life Sciences.

"A common interaction with wildlife that provides the means of transferring disease is backyard feeding with inappropriate food sources.

"We also want to educate the community about the important impact humans have on the environment and native animals, for example, releasing invasive fish species like goldfish into waterways that then not only compete with native species of fish, but also transfer new parasitic diseases to native species."

Ms Alison Hillman is completing her PhD study at Murdoch University on the parasite burden and reproductive fitness of quendas and possums in urban areas.

During her study she trapped nearly 300 quendas in urban gardens and native bush. Those trapped in gardens were generally more likely to be overweight or obese and were less likely to carry

pouch young that those in the bush.

Ms Hillman also studied the parasites they carried. Most quendas carried giardia but a species that did not infect humans, so it poses no threats.

The main problem is fleas," she said. "I found cat fleas and stickfast fleas on many of them.

Oddly enough cat fleas are often found on dogs as well as cats. Stickfast fleas are found on domestic poultry.

"There is a low risk of the passage of disease from quendas to pets and humans and vice versa. I did not study bacteria or viruses but the main problem is parasites.

'The best approach is to make sure pets and chooks are flea free. There are good fleacontrol products on the market.

"All quendas infected with stickfast fleas were trapped in gardens where domestic poultry are kept."

There is a very small possibility that quendas act as vectors of antibiotic resistant bacteria from animal to animal, but it is unlikely.

A major concern is that garden quendas tend to be overweight

"The cause of obesity in quendas is hard to pin down. The fattest quenda

food from seed put out for birds.

"Overweight quendas were either deliberately fed or they exploit food source associated with humans such as pet food,

waste and compost bins. The best advice is don't feed quendas. If you must, don't feed them every day; once every two or three days is best and limit the portion size.

"I suggest one or two mealworms or a piece of fruit the size of a 20 cent coin. If you are cooking carrots the bits you cut off are fine.

"I would love to have quendas in my garden,' she added.



# Hundreds visit Duyfken during her voyage along the WA coast

WITH a change of crew, *Duyfken* set sail for Mandurah on 4 September. The voyage was much smoother than the first and the crew was welcomed by hundreds of spectators lining the wa-

terfront on 5 September. Once the ship was

berthed and secured, Captain Chester handed over the post bag containing First Day Covers commemorating Dirk Hartog's 400th anniversary and signed by the captain himself, to postmaster Willa Currie. The City's Mayor, Marina Vergone, was also at the arrival to welcome Duvfken and her crew.

Over the next nine days 3,500 guests paid to board

As *Duyfken* exited the marina entrance all was looking good and then suddenly she ground to a halt. *Duyfken* hits bottom in Mandurah...she just didn't want to leave town. Sea Rescue was quickly on hand, and with

a bowline attached and a 1000 horsepower of grunt, *Duyfken* was soon on the move downstream and into open waters.

There were beautiful sailing conditions once all sails had been set with *Duyfken* hitting a cracking five knots as she headed to Hillarys, her next port of call.

# **Anglers can look forward to some** fine summer southwest fishing



The new trout season is always a time to look forward to

THE southwest freshwater fishing season officially fired up on 1 September and runs until 30 June next year. For me. it was good to get back into the beautiful environment down there again. even for just a weekend. Everything was so green and fresh and water levels in the smaller streams around Manjimup/Pemberton looked just right after a relatively wet win-

I was fortunate enough to be invited for a fish at a friend's dam just out of Manjimup and we enjoyed some great moments tempting rainbows to around a kilo on small brown nymphs. There

wasn't a lot of surface activity going on, which was a shame. Dry fly fishing is the most fun you can have with a trout but it's hard work if there aren't any insects on the surface drawing the fish up to rise.

I did tempt one fish on dry though, after casting the fly right up against the bank underneath some reeds in just a few centimetres of water. A fish took it within seconds, probably thinking an insect had fallen out of the reeds. It was the best moment of the trip. Just seeing the fish's nose poke through the surface and suck the fly down was what fly fishing is all

Record numbers of trout from the Pemberton

hatchery were released into south west waterways this year. Over the past four years more than 2.3 million trout frv have been released along with around 100,000 Rainbow Trout vearlings and over 10,000 Rainbow and Brown trout ex brood stock, testament to the value the community place on trout restocking. This year key stocking locations include the Warren River, Collie Gorge, Donnelly River, Blackwood River, Lefroy Brook and the Murray River.

Fishers will also be able to target feral freshwater species such as redfin perch without a bag limit and are urged to not return them to the water when caught. Besides, redfin are prized table fish, renowned for their

tasty white flesh. To provide a more accessible and enjoyable fishing experience for the whole community, anglers under 16 years of age will no longer be required to hold a south west freshwater angling licence, meaning families can enjoy fishing in the south west, without having to worry about licences for the kids.

Observers expect the combination of good water levels and healthy stocking should provide a quality fishing experience in the south west well into the summer months.

# Take advantage and visit the wildflower hot spots around the wheatbelt region

THIS year's rains have ensured that the wildflowers are prolific throughout the state. This provides people opportunities to with view the blooms on show. Here are some of the hot spots around the wheatbelt region to discover.

Quairading - Quairading Nature Reserve located three kilometres west of town has everlastings and 12 varieties of or-

Kwolyin Reserve has carpets of everlastings out. Take a walk around the campsite where orchids, flowering annuals and sandalwoods sur-

Kokerbin Rock is nine kilometres north of Kwolyin campsite and is well worth a visit during wild-

along the reserve. Jura

west of Kulin and people can view the macrocarpa along the trail. Lake Grace is known

for its western mallee, noted biologically for its diverse range of flora and high number of indigenous plant groups, including grevillea, hakea, eucalypts and acacia. Within the reserves and roadsides of the shire people can find these and many other beautiful flowering plants and

Merredin -Tamma Parkland offer hakea, grevillea and hibbertia flowering in bushland and inland hairy stem orchids, showy sundew and white and pink everlastings in Tamma Parkland.

Totadgin Conservation Park is located 15 kilometres south on the road to Bruce Rock and has donkey, spider, blue and slipper orchids in flower with small patches of everlastings in the park. Peel Road has everlastings out in bloom. Merredin Peak has orchids, everlastings, hakea, grevillea all flowering along the bush walk.

The Merredin Chandler Road 20 kilometres north of Merredin has everlastings and orchids out in

Kellerberrin Hill offers great views over the town and is a wildflower hotspot. Follow the flowers along the Trayning/Bencubbin Road to Durokoppin Reserve. This 1500-acre reserve of woodland, heath and mallee supports a wide variety of flora and fauna.

Discover tea trees, wattle and grevillea amongst a colourful array of species.

**Tammin –** The Charles Gardner Reserve, an area of 600 hectares of natural vegetation 14 kilometres south of Tammin. It contains a wide variety of wildflowers and under-

storey, some of which are unique to the region. Yorkrakine Rock situated 26 kilometres north of Tammin is a solid granite outcrop. A strip of native flora surrounds the outcrops which is one of the largest of its kind in WA.

**Cunderdin Hill offers** great views over town and a variety of wildflowers. Bulgin Rock reserve located 18 kilometres east of town is a great spot for a picnic and wildflower exploring.

Westonia - At Sandford Rock Nature Reserve the silver mallee (Eucalyptus crucis subspecies crucis) and purple peacock beetles are some of the rare species found this time of year. Starting from Westonia townsite, wander the walk trail through tall Red Morrell Eucalyptus Woodland of the Westonia Common.

Southern Cross Grab a copy of the Yilgarn wildflower brochure and follow the wildflower drive throughout the Yilgarn shire. The Great Eastern Highway between Southern Cross and Coolgardie is in bloom with hakea, grevillea and wattle out in

Dowerin - at Tin Dog Creek Reserve there's an array of birdlife and flora. eight kilometres past the wheat bins at the Y junction, take Amery - Benjaberring gravel road to explore historic Minnivale townsite and cemetery. Pink feather flowers line the roadsides and black toothbrush grevillea, kunzias and verticordia are blooming here.

Wyalkatchem - has some great flowering reserves, including Walk-A -Wyal Trail, Wyalkatchem Reserve and Korrelocking Reserve. Find rare orchids, sundew, everlastings and fauna including echidnas, dunnarts, blue reasted and red-capped robins. Along Wyalkatchem North Road to Cowcowing Reserve see the endangered Wyalkatchem foxglove.

Trayning - Billycatting Reserve - explore the two marked walk trails. White flowered sundews (drosera species) eating plants at the damp base of the rocks. The gnamma holes located north of Trayning on Bencubbin Road have orchids including spiders, donkeys and fairy.

Nungarin townsite and Mangowine - explore Eaglestone Rock, Talgomine Reserve and Danberrin Hill botanical walks and smell the fragrant vanilla bush (Grevillea species) and Kunzea pulchella splashing vivid colours of red.

Westonia to Elach-butting Rock - see the spectacular Wave Rock formation and Monty's Pass, wattles, senna, grevilleas and hakeas are in full bloom.

Wildflower Drive Starts at Quarry Road two kilometres north of town. Doodlakine - Bruce Rock Road has several places where there are outstanding displays of everlasting particularly between Euginyn and Giles Roads.

Narembeen - Donkey, spider and snail orchids, white and pink everlastings, boria, boronia, verticordia, drosora and many ferns along the Merredin-Narembeen Road in the large bush reserves.

Corrigin - The Corrigin Wildflower Drive starts opposite the Dog Cemetery, five kilometres west on the Brookton Highway and takes you on a well-maintained gravel track to the scenic look out, which overlooks the town site and wheat bins.

Hyden-Wave Rock -Take the many walk trails around Wave Rock where the bush is starting to bloom. The Hippo's Yawn loop takes you through bushland where people can see wattle, hakea. arevillea, bottlebrush and numerous orchid species.

Kulin - Hopkins Nature Reserve is an extremely important flora conservation area. North Jitarning Nature Reserve is perfect to walk through and experience many different vegetation areas.

The Macrocarpa Walk is located one kilometre

# Singapore WWII bunker now open for interesting history tours



Fortress Command Room: Visitors to the Battlebox will get to see the actual rooms used by Allied generals and officers to plan the war in Malaya and Singapore during WWII.

ON A fateful February morning, surrender stared them in the face.

The British, Australian and Indian Army commanders had already endured 70 days of brutal fighting down Malaya and Singapore – a land mass 800km in length.

Their forces were short on food, water, ammunition and petrol. They faced a formidable enemy that was determined to take Singapore.

By the evening of 15 February, 1942, Lieutenant-General Arthur Percival – the General Officer Commanding of Malaya Command - signed an unconditional surrender of 120,000 men - including 15,000

The Japanese 25th Army, led by Lieutenant-General Tomoyuki Yamashita - the Tiger of Malaya - had triumphed with fewer than half the men Malaya Com-

The story of how Malaya and Singapore fell to the Japanese in just 70 days is told today in the Battlebox, a former WWII underground command centre in the heart of Singapore City.

The location is apt, for the Battlebox was also the very headquarters where Percival and his senior commanders and officers made the decision to surrender Singapore on the morning of the 15th.

Today, the Singapore History Consultants Pte. Ltd. (SHC), a Singapore-based private heritage consultancy, runs up to five guided tours a day through the corridors and rooms of the Battlebox.

The tour, titled A Story of Strategy and Surrender, takes about 60 to 75 minutes, and tells two stories. One covers the primary causes of defeat surrounding what British Prime Minister Winston Churchill later dubbed the "worst disaster and largest capitulation in British

The other covers how the Battlebox took part in the running of the war, and key rooms used by generals and officers during WWII.

The tour also shows the key role the Australians played in the defence of Malaya and Singapore, including some of the fiercest battles of the campaign.

The Battlebox had closed its doors a few years ago; in 2013, SHC took over the running of the place. After a massive effort resolving maintenance and structural issues with the ageing bunker, it reopened the Battlebox in February this year.

SHC - which has more than 20 years of experience in heritage tours and history research - hopes to preserve the Battlebox for future generations, so that an important story in this part of the world can be shared with visitors, including Australians.

# **Cancer treatments changing with** advanced modern technology

AS PEOPLE reach the prime of life, the chances are high that they will experience cancer, either personally or through someone they know. One in two Australian men and one in three Australian women will be diagnosed with cancer by age 85.

The death rate from cancer is, however, declining thanks to advances in drugs, technology and better health screening. Inflating the lungs creates a natural space between the heart and the breast. When this space is at its greatest, radiation is delivered, reducing the heart's risk of radiation exposure.

Stereotactic Body Radiation Therapy (SBRT). This can provide three-dimensional images of tumours allowing radiation oncologists to shape the radiation beams around the tumour.

By doing so, damage to adjacent organs is limited. SBRT uses this technology to treat some smaller (less than 5cm) lung cancers, for example. Increasing data shows that SBRT may be an alternative to surgery in some patients. Patients that may not be suitable for surgerv, such as the very elderly or those with other medical problems, can often be treated with SBRT. It is also non-invasive and has few treatment complications.

Radiation therapy is also used to combat many other types of cancer tumour, including testicular, prostate. and skin, as well as a range of non-cancerous condi-

tions, such as severe keloid scars or plantar fibromato-

New and highly sophisticated drugs are also emerging in the fight against different tumours. In recent years, significant advances in drug development have seen new drugs emerge for melanoma, a specific type of breast cancer called HER2-positive, lung and prostate cancers. Many of these newer drugs target a specific defect in the cancer cell, while others harness the body's own immune system to help turn off the cancer.

EARLIER this year in June I set off in a hire car from London Heathrow Airport and drove from to Cardiff in South Wales and onwards through central and Northern England then finally on to Scotland. # Downsizing need not be a pain in the pocket...even for the state government...

READERS tell *Have a Go News* that their major disincentive to downsizing is the cost of stamp duty on buying a new house. In WA that amounts to \$18,186 on a \$500,000 house.

This can take away a lot of the financial advantages of moving from a large house to one more appropriate in size for older people.

Two months ago treasurer Mike Nahan told *Have a Go News* that stamp duty (transfer tax) "can pose difficulties for older Australians seeking to purchase a home better suited to their changing needs."

But... "Western Australia ... does not have the financial capacity at this stage to provide downsizing grants."

So we decided to do some fact checking.

In the Australian Capital Territory the Pensioner Duty Concession Scheme (PDCS) assists eligible pensioners, who own a residential home, to downsize by reducing the duty payable on their new purchase.

There are a number of conditions. For example at least one applicant must be an eligible pensioner, they can receive the concession only once in a lifetime and must live in their new house for at least one year.

If all conditions are met ACT residents aged over 60 who sell their house for \$765,000 or more and buy one worth less than \$595,00 pay only \$20 in stamp duty. For a \$500,000 home that is a massive saving of \$15,780 on stamp duty compared to before the policy was introduced.

Smita Chakma, senior communications officer to the ACT Chief Minister says the ACT scheme has been operating for seven years. In that time 808 applications (113 per year) were approved costing the state government \$10.244 million.

The population of the ACT is

390,800 and the population of WA is 2,591,600. Stamp duty of a \$500,000 property in WA would be \$18,186. Therefore if WA were to introduce a similar Concession Scheme as the ACT the State could expect some 750 downsizers per year and it would cost the government approximately \$13.5 million per year in lost revenue.

However this revenue is not actually lost as at present potential downsizers are largely staying put. Moreover the 750 people who purchase downsizer's larger properties would pay approximately \$20 million in stamp duty. And this would have a ripple effect as they sold smaller

houses to other buyers who would also pay stamp duty.

So WA State revenue would benefit from encouraging downsizing by at least \$6.5 million per annum.

In addition there is the social advantage of making better use of the existing housing stock. Seniors will be able to move to more manageable homes and younger families to move into larger homes.

The Pensioner Duty Concession Scheme is a win-win situation for everyone, seniors, young families and even the state treasury.

Unfortunately the state government hasn't noticed this yet.

CURTIN University is partnering with Amana Living on a collaborative research project designed to get older people moving, enhance their wellbeing and improve their quality of life.

The Residents in Action Trial will promote walking among older people living in Amana Living retirement villages. The goal is to encourage greater physical activity, reduce

sitting and enhance mental health among residents.

Researchers from Curtin University will recruit active residents as ambassadors for the project and train them in using motivation techniques to support their peers. It is hoped this approach will ensure the residents learn skills they can use to sustain an active and healthy life over the longer term.

Associate Professor Cecilie Thøgersen-Ntoumani, Curtin's School of Psychology and Speech Pathology and project lead, said older people who are inactive are at higher risk of chronic disease.

"If we can encourage more physical activity with peer support, we can potentially have a significant impact on their health and wellbeing, reduce loneliness, and delay or prevent movement into residential aged care," she said. "Based on previous research, we know social support is critical for people who aren't physically active.

"We'll examine how this theory works in a retirement community as well as investigating the impact of the physical environment, such as proximity to parks."

Mrs Stephanie Buckland, chief executive officer of Amana Living, said it was well documented that remaining active in later life was key to having a healthy mind and body.

"We're delighted to be working with Curtin University on an initiative that could set the benchmark for retirement communities across Australia."

The Residents in Action Trial is funded by Healthway and will take place across 14 Amana Living retirement villages over two years. The recruitment of ambassadors began in September and will be followed by a series of training workshops before the project starts in April for four months.

Participants will be followed up six months after the trial has ended to establish whether the activity has been sustained. The project will be completed in partnership with Australian Catholic University and Victoria University.

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

# Setting the record straight on Retirement Visa Holders

THE original report on retirement visas which was produced by the Australian Government Actuary (AGA) in 2010/11 took account of the actual costs to the Government that they estimated would be needed if 410 Retirement Visa Holders (RVH's) were given a pathway to permanent residency after a period of 10 years since their Visa grant date.

Since that report and in various conversations with Senator Michaelia Cash (who was at the time deputy minister for Immigration) it was agreed that the basic conditions used in the report were incorrect as well as some of the assumptions made by the AGA.

Primarily they did not take account of the contributions to the Australian economy or increase tax revenues that would be received if a 410 RVH

accepted Permanent Residency. It was agreed that the term should be changed to having lived in Australia for a minimum of 10 years and been in Australia for greater than 80 per cent of the time.

Following upon the re-

port that I presented and have continued to present to MPs and Senators since February 2015. I was recently contacted by the director of the temporary visa section of the Department of Immigration and Border Protection (DIBP) based in Canberra. Since that original contact there have been continued discussions and a slight change in the wording for the definition of the residency conditions.

This has culminated in the statement below which I received last month.

"The Minister for Immigration and Border Protection is aware of the concerns raised by Retirement Visa Holders (subclass 405 and 410) and has asked the Department of Immigration and Border Protection (the Department) to engage the Australian Government Actuary to undertake a review of the costs associated with providing permanent residence to Retirement visa holders.

The Australian Government Actuary review will help to assist the Department undertake an analysis of the beneficial economic and social impact made by retirees who live in Australia. As part of this review representatives from the department have met with retiree organisations including AIR and BERIA.

You are welcome to provide a submission to the Department in relation to this review by emailing icap@border.gov.au"

If however you do e-mail Canberra would you please copy me in so that I can take account of your comments in future conversations.

PS. The department is considering 405 RVH's as well as 410 RVH's because there has been a very low uptake of this Visa with only 316 Visa's granted of whom only 216 were in Australia as at 30 December 2015. Of these only 133 have spent greater than 80 per cent of their time in Australia.

A STUDY at the University of WA has shown that exposure to the arts is good for your mental health.

Dr Christina Davies, research fellow School of Population Health, found that once a person was involved in at least two hours of arts activity each week there was a clear correlation between time spent and wellbeing as measured by the Warwick-Edinburgh Mental Well-being Scale.

Dr Davies, who has a background in health promotion, said she had identified a gap in wellness research.

"The association between sports involvement and health has been known for 80 years. Now we know that there is also an association between arts involvement and mental health," she said.

"There have been qualitative studies since the 1990s but there have been no population studies previously."

The first problem was to tie down the rather fuzzy concept of what is meant by arts involvement.

"There was not even a definition of what is 'the arts'. We took the opinions for 280 experts and narrowed their responses down to 15 activities including attending, learning, participating or membership of arts related activities."

Next followed tele-

phone interviews with 700 adults in Western Australia assessing both the time they spent involved in the arts and their mental wellbeing.

ucation, income, sports and religious activities, health and even whether the respondent had taken a holiday in the past year.

"There was still a relationship between arts involvement and mental well being however we looked at the results."

"You get the doubters who say that the difference is because people who are engaged in the arts are richer or because people who are engaged in the arts also do sport, but we can now definitely say that excluding all those things people, who engage in the arts have higher mental well-being scores."

Dr Davies is now planning a larger study of the relationship between arts involvement and health over a long period utilising the Busselton healthy ageing study from 1960 to 2020.

She said good mental health was the foundation for individual and community wellbeing, yet every year one in five Australians experience mental illness.

"People need a range of easy enjoyable options they can use to stay well. Depending on a person's interests, the arts can provide a range of health enhancing opportunities, activities and events."

This could include listening to music, reading, colouring, creative writing, watching movies or attending concerts.

"People need to give themselves permission to be creative and to make time for arts activities and events that they enjoy. It need not be expensive. There are free things, events, libraries and arts aps that can be downloaded."

The study was funded by a grant from Healthway and the WA Department of Health and published in BMC Public Health.



MENTION ballroom dancing and the name Robert Wrightson AO comes to mind. A master of his craft, he left an indelible mark on dance across the country which continues today. People still speak of the magical duo of Robert and wife Shelda who captivated audiences.

Shelda Barker and Robert (Bob) were born and raised in Fremantle, but their paths did not cross until they were in their early twenties. Shelda's love of dance developed early, learning ballet from older sister Irma.

Robert's career in entertainment also started young when, aged 13, he was chosen to go to NSW with the Young National Group concert party, after which he travelled with the group on a tour to South Africa. His ballroom career started with lessons with Rene Esler and Gerald Mc-Morrow. Partnering Kath Smith, Robert became WA Amateur Ballroom champion.

Robert and Shelda crossed paths on a trip to Kalgoorlie and started a life of dance together. Shelda joined Bob in the ballroom world and began lessons with Rene and Gerald focussing on the ballroom style and branching into exhibition.

At just 23, the couple married, turned professional and started teaching with the Esler/McMorrow School of Dance. They also opened their first school in the his-

Street, Northbridge, which also became an institution of dance and entertainment in Perth, alongside venues such as the Pagoda Ballroom in Como and the Embassy Ballroom in Perth.

Always innovative and enterprising, Robert had a dream to create an institution that would oversee the industry of dance in Australia and established the Australian Institute of Dancing, with colleagues including Sam and Ronnie Gilkison. He started negotiations which eventually led to the creation of the Australian Dancing Board of Control.

Some years after the tragic loss of Shelda to cancer, Bob married again to Josephine Ingram, an authority and international adjudicator in the hairdressing profession. Josephine and Bob set off on a world tour to promote the upcoming world Professional Ballroom Championships being hosted in Perth, staged and managed by the Wrightsons on behalf of the Australian Dancing Board.

Top dancers and adjudicators from all over the world were invited to attend, with Tony Evans of Tony Evans Orchestra (Hammersmth Palais, London) conducting the accompanying music.

In 1981 Robert was awarded the Carl Alan award for his services to dance and the Order Of Australia in 1982. He was also inducted into the Australian Dancing Board Hall of Fame in 1988.

Bob Josephine and proudly celebrated years of service to the Australian dance industry in 1991, at a gala dinner dance. Robert continued to put Perth on the international map by hosting the Asian Pacific Championships in 1992 at the Perth Entertainment Centre. In 2006 the Wrightsons celebrated 60 years of service with another special evening of dancing and dining.

Probably the greatest tribute to the Wrightson era is that some 80 per cent of the dance schools currently teaching in Perth and many other cities had their beginnings and were trained through Wrightson Dance Studios.

This influence and foundation will continue for generations to come.

# Mozart masterpiece highlight of St Mary's Cathedral special concert series

ST MARY'S Cathedral concert series continues with its third concert for the year with collaboration between the Cathedral Choir and the students from the University of WA School of Music

Titled *Celebration of Voices and Winds* this is a true celebration of young talent in Perth.

Apart from some delightful combinations of wind instruments and small vocal ensembles, a very special feature of this program is the performance of Mozart's *Mass in c minor K139* (written when he was only 12-years old) in a never-before heard version: re-orchestrated by the composition students from UWA.

Mozart was not much older (and was in actual fact younger) than some of these students and choristers when we wrote some of his masterpieces. A prodigy who was already

travelling and performing in various parts of Europe at the tender age of five, he was opened to experiences and influences which would enrich his musical language throughout his entire life.

In a way, this project of re-orchestration of his Mass links the ingenuity of the young Mozart with the ingenuity and imagination of a new generation of young musicians as we hear familiar Mozartean phrases from a fresh perspective.

So, in a sense, this presentation of a timeless classic could be seen as a world premiere.

Also featured in the concert is the Cathedral's grand pipe organ - the Cathedral's director of music, Jacinta Jakovcevic, plays the sparkling 'Scherzo' from the 2nd organ symphony of Louise Vierne (1870-1937)

# Five top goals for having a healthy and happy long life



WHAT areas of your wellbeing would you like to improve?

Sound for Life asked this question in a survey from 131 participants ided between 50 and 80 and the top five areas that were identified were memory, confidence, energy, listening skills and concentration.

Coincidentally, were the top five goals for participants in Sound for Life's seniors' pilot study conducted in 2013 and 2014. Considering the program was for only 10 weeks the outcomes were very exciting.

The study involved a group of adults aged between 55 and 85 years who participated in a clinic based program to see how the Integrated Listening Systems (iLs) program of sound therapy and movement would improve their wellbeing.

Forty two per cent of the participants reported an improvement in energy, stamina, listenina confidence and concentration and 33 per cent felt their memory had improved. Standardised testing showed that there was a 30 per cent improvement in the group average scores for bal-

In the study group clinic based sessions, Sound for Life incorporate specific exercises that target the vestibular system which is situated in the inner ear and is responsible for keeping people upright.

The Integrated Listening System provided further stimulation to this sensory system through an additional speaker (bone conductor) positioned in the headphones. Having difficulty hearing with background noise is a common problem as people age.

The Integrated Listening System program incorporates filtered classical music which is recorded in such a way that it stimulates these two small muscles and improves their function of filtering sound.



MANY Australians think of WWII as a conflict fought on foreign soil and in remote oceans. The newly released book False Flags turns that assumption on its head, telling a spine chilling tale of how disguised German raiders brought the war right to our doorstep.

From Fremantle to Hobart and from Newcastle to Apollo Bay these pirate raiders went to extraordinary lengths to conceal their true colours. Terrorising the south seas they slipped breathtakingly

close to shore, mining the approaches to our major ports and shutting down shipping lanes while the Australian Navy hunted them across the Tasman Sea, Bass Strait and the Great Australian Bight.

Author Stephen Robinson studied Asian history and politics before working at the Department of Veteran's Affairs researching British atomic weapons tests and as a policy office in the defence department. An officer in the Australian Army Reserve he has also instructed at the Royal Military College.

While researching the book he conducted extensive archival research of German, British, Australian and New Zealand naval records uncovering never before accessed eyewitness accounts and declassified intelligence reports.

Beautifully written and illustrated with historic photographs, this book is a vivid and freshly told

story of how Nazi pirates brought WWII to our doorstop, attacking our harbours and sinking unsuspecting merchant ships while masquerading as harmless freighters. This book provides the complete and dramatic story of this naval campaign for the first time.


