#### Fighting to save a celebrated artistic work at the busy Northbridge tunnel

AS motorists sweep through the Graham Farmer Freeway entrance to the Northbridge tunnel each day, spare a thought for the artist behind the evocative hand-carved murals. Renowned Perth artist Joanna Lefroy Capelle executed the colourful narrative which depicts the history of Northbridge down the years.

But the future of her work is under threat because almost two decades of dripping bore water combined with the elements have damaged the murals, prompting Main Roads WA to write to the artist saying they will be replaced.

Joanna is waiting on further word from Main Roads WA after submitting an amended quote to her original estimate of \$200,000 after being told there was no money in the budget to restore her work. It would take at least 10 eight-hour night shifts every eight weeks when the tunnel is closed for maintenance, working with her original master plasterer Allan Dunk and three artist's assistants.

"It would be a crying shame to

replace the work, as has been suggested, with textured aluminium panels," she said. "Reticulation installed initially was modified but still continued to stain the artwork. "In addition, leaching water from behind, caused by insufficient sealant on the walls, has seeped through and damaged it.'

Known for her fascinating figurative artwork, Joanna spent almost six months carving out the figures and faces of Northbridge on 255 square metres of stone. The stirring images were based on her extensive historical research at the Battye Library and keen observation of life in the area.

Both sides of the tunnel entry are adorned with bold images that represent hundreds of years of Aboriginal and later European occupation leading to multiculturalism and present day arts, nightlife and dining.

There is an image of Fanny Balbuk, the last known full-blood Aboriginal in the area holding the stick she used for digging for haematite. The final artwork panel depicts football legend Graham Farmer (after whom the freeway is named) handballing into the tunnel. The artistic team is also depicted and includes Allan Dunk, his son Linton and Joanna's able assistant sculptor David Brazier.

The scene of the early history of Northbridge has been set with images of early Aboriginal education in the area, a panel recognising the

ANZACs, reference to the miners who stayed in Northbridge in single men's quarters, the sly grog trade, illicit gambling and prostitution, as well as the influence of the Chinese with eating houses, laundries and market gardens.

A blue-grey thread meanders through the artwork, symbolising the Swan River. Colours used in the work are terracotta (derived from the naturally occurring product haematite), yellow ochre, and black and white oxides.

In her Helena Valley studio, Joanna unfurls the rice paper maquette of her artwork secured with a rolling pin which she presented to Main Roads WA as part of her submission. She was contracted to undertake the public art project for the Main Roads and Clough in late 1997.

Joanna's first public art commission was a 20-metre etched cement render mural in Victoria Gardens, East Perth, for the East Perth Redevelopment Authority. The work, Regeneration, traces the area from its earliest Aboriginal inhabitants through to the arrival of Europeans, the horticultural and industrial phases of development to the current regeneration.

Joanna Lefroy grew up on a farm in northern WA. On leaving school she joined WA Newspapers as their first female cadet artist. She wrote and illustrated a half-page of fashion for the Daily News and subsequently the Sydney Morning Herald in Perth, then the UK and Europe while living in London in the late 60s. A highlight was covering the couture collections in London, Paris, Rome and Madrid.

She started painting with a box of oils for her 17th birthday and, apart from a handful of lessons with Wim Boissevain and Henry Froudist, is self-taught.

Her works are figurative narratives which focus with humour and sensitivity on the everyday and the complexity yet simplicity of human nature. Her Woman with Balls series uses body language and metaphors for life and won her acclaim and a Lorenzo di Medici medal at the Florence Biennale in Italy in 2009.

Her work is represented in private, public and corporate collections throughout Australia, and in the UK, the United States, Canada and Spain, the Netherlands, France and Greece.

Now living in Helena Valley with second husband David Cameron. Joanna is continually on a quest gathering new material and inspiration for future paintings. She teaches children and adults in her studio and takes part in a weekly figurative art workshop under the Bassendean Library. She has also turned her hand to writing short stories.

"It's painting with words." she says.







IN the November issue of the Have a Go News Frank Smith reported Jeff Fielder talking about the problems faced by seniors/ pensioners due to rents they have to pay for housing and how more and more people are retiring although still having a mortgage, who then have to sell up and try to rent a home.

The editors of the paper know full well how often I comment on those seniors/pensioners who are still in their own house, still paying off a mortgage. Some may be like me and still go out and still have a pet rather than sit and stagnate and end up with mental health issues.

In many cases mortgage payments, other bills and making sure the pet has food, leaves the person with very little money to buy themselves proper food. That is food other than, say, two minute noodles or cans of spaghetti or baked beans. I mean fresh fruit, vegetables, meat, fish and so on.

As Mr Fielder mentioned many renters in financial difficulty are women.

I am paying more than I need off of my mortgage because although the great institution I am with (Keystart) is very good, I am a young 71 and want to pay the mortgage off by the time I am 75. I also pay more to provide a buffer

for when interest rates increase.

I think Mr Fielder and Dr Debbie Faulkner of the University of Adelaide need to expand the study they are doing on seniors who are doing it tough to include people who are doing it tough on the age pension and those who are doing it tough if they are selffunded and therefore not receiving the age pension.

Those of us in these groups do not always get considered, particularly if we do not belong to seniors organisations such as Council on the Ageing or selffunded retiree.

### Foodbank WA fights hunger across the state year-round

WITH Christmas looming, Foodbank WA is gearing up for a busy time providing food to the less fortunate, while most of us look forward to the festive season. Foodbank is Western Australia's biggest food relief organisation, providing more than 6.1 million meals a year throughout WA to people in need.

Based near Perth airport, Foodbank works with the food and grocery industry to source and distribute surplus and donated product. It also works with industry and government on innovative programs to provide key pantry staples.

This strategy enables Foodbank to supply almost 900 community groups and schools with the provisions they need to fight hunger. It also provides a range of healthy eating and education programs to build the capacity of children and adults to better take care of their

health and wellbeing. Foodbank CEO Greg Hebble says Foodbank WA this year provided the biggest number of meals in any given year in its 24year history.

"Of major concern is the growing demand for hunger relief that exists in regional WA, with 57 per cent of the food being distributed to those living in Albany, Bunbury, Geraldton, Kalgoorlie, Peel and surrounding communities," he said. "Demand for our services has continued to grow with more West Australians seeking support from our charity partners each month, more than a third of whom

are children. "Also, our Rumbling Tummies research report also revealed one in five children are living in food insecure households and have gone without food at some time in the past year. We are fully committed to partnering with farmers, ers to tackle food waste and provide more meals for Western Australians in need. We are especially proud of our increased supply of fresh fruit and vegetables sourced this year from local growers."

Despite Foodbank WA's best efforts, it still needed to purchased more than 500,000 kg of food to ensure it had the right volume and variety of foods available in its distribution centres to meet demand.

Foodbank WA's School Breakfast program continues to be in high demand, providing more than 2.4 million serves of breakfast to students last year, helping them arrive at school ready to learn. The program started in 2001, with 7 schools registering.

More than 450 schools across WA from Kalumburu and Kununurra in the north to Esperance and Albany in the south and remote schools along the WA-Northern Territory borders are now involved.

Sadly, the number of emergency meals needed has also continued to rise. This year 876,280 meals were provided to children with no lunch packed and no means to buy food for themselves.

A qualified team of nutritionists and dietitians deliver evidence-based healthy eating and education programs throughout the state and achieve positive health outcomes for adults and children alike, thanks to continued funding from the Department of Health, Department of Education, BHP and Healthway.

"We have identified a need to provide food to the Pilbara and Kimberley regions and we are currently seeking support to service both regions," Mr Hebble said. "We have Hebble said. also realised that transport can be a barrier for many people living in the metropolitan area, so we are looking at new ways to take food to people.

Foodbank WA is trialling its Joondalup Hub and has plans in place for pop-up Foodbanks worklocal welfare groups and charities operating in the areas. These will be rolled out next year.

WA has Foodbank partnered with the West Coast Eagles for the past six years and is proud that this year West Coast Eagles premier partner AGL ioined the fight against hunger. Thanks to AGL, Foodbank WA will be able to purchase key staple foods that are in demand year round, yet are rarely

donated such as rice, pasta, canned soup, vegetables, beans and pasta

AGL Metres for Meals was launched in round nine of this year's football season with Eagles midfielder Andrew Gaff becoming the face of the campaign. Thanks to his running power, AGL easily achieved its season target

of 50,000 meals for Foodbank WA

Animals have not been forgotten with Foodbank WA receiving a share of more than 40,000 kgs of donated pet food delivered to disadvantaged pet owners and pets, thanks to a partnership between animal welfare group PetRescue, Pedigree and Woolworths.

And there is always a personal story of hardship and being helped by Foodbank WA.

Linda says ten years ago her life and that of her husband Neil changed dramatically when they became legal guardians of their two-year-old grandson Blair.

"When we first took custody of him we still had money coming in so we were doing alright financially. I kept working for a while, however I found it increasingly difficult.

"Neil retired aged 70 and then things got very tough for us and I knew I had no choice but to reach out for help. It was one of the hardest decisions, as we have never needed charity before.

The food and other things like tissues, washing up detergent and toiletries have been a huge help because in the weeks when you haven't got that extra bit of money, you know you can still enough food to get you by until the next fortnight."

Linda is one of more than 140 grandcarers supported by Foodbank

#### Being Centrelink prepared this holiday season

WITH the holiday period fast approaching, we want to advise you that reporting and payment dates may change when we close for public holidays.

Centrelink service centres and phone lines will be closed on Christmas Day, Boxing Day, Thursday 27 December and New Year's Day.

If you have to report your income for a Centrelink payment on one of these days, we'll let you know how your reporting or payment date has changed. However, you'll still be able to use your myGov online account, Express Plus mobile apps and phone self-service to report during this period.

If you don't need to report to get a payment, we may pay you early. You can find out more information about reporting and payment dates on our website, just visit humanservices.gov.au/holidays.

It's also a timely reminder to protect yourself from opportunistic scammers during the festive season. Be especially aware of scammers pretending to be from the Department of Human Services.

There are many different types of scams. You may receive emails, phone calls, and SMS messages which can look and sound very convincing. They may try to get personal information from you, or ask you to transfer money or purchase gift cards in order to get a benefit or pay back a debt.

If you're unsure who's contacting you, or suspect an email,

phone call or SMS might be a scam – don't follow their instructions, especially don't give out personal information or make payments

You can find information on our website about what to do if you think you've received a scam here – humanservices.gov.au/scams.

If you have given out personal information to a scammer pretending to be us, you should immediately call our Scams and Identity Theft Helpdesk. The helpdesk is open Monday to Friday 8am to 5pm on 1800 941 126 and you can find more information on our website here.

RECENTLY I had an accident that made it difficult to walk. At first I was in a wheelchair, then graduated to crutches. I am currently using a walking stick while my leg recovers. It has become a lesson in what physically disabled people put up with as they try to live a normal life.

up with as they try to live a normal life.

Using a public toilet became a frustrating adventure. My husband was forced to help me access unisex/disabled toilets in a new movie theatre, shopping centre, casino and even Fiona Stanley Hospital. We found it was impossible for someone alone to access most disabled toilets.

Many doors are very heavy, and if that was not enough, they also have automatic door closers that push against the person trying to get in or out. I could not open the doors by myself. On one occasion I needed a help from a male cleaner to get in and out of a toilet.

We talked with a friend who lives in a retirement village and she said that the operator changed the doors to give the residents access to the facilities where they live. We believe the lighter doors were installed but cannot say if the door closers were removed or made more user-friendly.

Architects and building regulations should give more consideration to disabled persons access to toilets. This is nothing new. The old Fremantle Hospital provides a fine example of what is possible. Some toilets there have sliding doors with lighter doors and no closers. These toilets are usable by a person on their own.

I dread to think what we would have done if my husband could not have helped me. I have great admiration for the singles who face these access problems every day. We wondered how many would need to rely on a cleaner, or passerby, to open a toilet door for them.

We also wondered how many would not even bother to go out and socialise in public places.

PERTH'S southern suburb residents complain about being unable to converse due to aircraft noise. Hardly surprising but worse is coming.

Perth airport plans to close the cross runway and channel more planes our way. Their sound-modelling adopts 65 dB as the level which interrupts conversation and contemplates levels to 70 dB (creating 60 dB indoors) as acceptable outdoors.

This is well above the level of 45 dB at which International best practise asserts conversation is disrupted. No mapping of the 70 dB noise contours has been published so the public cannot identify the im-

pacts of the airport proposal.

I find this unacceptable.

The US Environmental Protection Agency recommended a maximum indoor noise level of 45 dB(A) and outdoor noise level of 55 dB to allow for intelligible communication. (World Health Organisation Guidelines for Community Noise).

Higher noise levels injure public health. I quote:

"a 5-dB(A) increase in noise level between 45 and 65 dB(A) has been associated with a 38 per cent increased odds of hypertension even after control for several well-known risk factors [particularly when noise

results in] sleep disturbance... between 50 and 150 noise-induced awakenings per year may occur at outdoor noise levels equivalent to those [proposed by Perth Airport].

Subsequent impacts to health and well-being include: impairment to cognitive performance, changes in hormone levels, changes in heart rate, sleep patterns, and mood. Several studies have demonstrated an increased prevalence of cardiovascular diseases at noise levels as low as 70 dB(A)."

This will happen if we do not fight and stop the second Perth Airport





#### The great tradition at Christmas - it is better to give than receive

THERE is much discussion in the community and in my family - about the commercialisation of Christmas. Some worry that Christmas draws you into its vortex and you end up spending far more that you planned. Others worry that the oversupply of gifts simply contributes to unsustainability and landfill.

These are not easy considerations, as they are usually weighed against the fact that gift giving is one of the great Christmas traditions, one of the key ways we celebrate those we love at this festive time. It is at this time we are reminded of the old proverb that it is better to give than to receive.

Christmas can also be a time where people feel disconnected, lonely and isolated. What gift is of value to these individuals?

I'd like to throw out my usual Christmas challenge to you, and ask you to consider the gifts you can give that are entirely sustainable and bank account friendly. While these gifts have value and meaning for everyone, they have special meaning for those living with dementia.

We often feel challenged by our loved ones with dementia at Christmas. How should we spend time? How can we best relate to our loved one whose cognitive impairment now impacts on their ability to relate. How can our exchange be positive, affirming the value of our relationship? How can we be with them and be confident that we have given a gift of value to them?

This Christmas, I want to give you some tips on how you can give any or all of the following gifts to any of those you love, especially those with dementia.

Time: A person with dementia may not always remember what you have said, but they will always remember how you made them feel. Time spent with a person with dementia is never wasted. This is never more so than at Christmas.

When you spend time with your loved one this

Christmas, don't focus on information or facts that they may not be able to store or access. Focus on sharing at an emotional level. Do less, and be more. Be present in the moment, find where they are in time and share that memory. Don't feel pressured to fill your connect time with language. Just be. Time is the most wonderful gift of all.

Connect: The second great gift is to connect with your loved one with dementia. Christmas is full of nostalgia and sensory cues that assist the memory or reminiscence of the person with dementia - the smell of Christmas dinner, the sound of Bing Crosby singing I'm Dreaming of a White Christmas, the sight of the Christmas tree.

through Connect shared memories or ex-

Reminisce periences. about times shared. We do that with everyone at Christmas - we laugh about the Christmas camping trip that went wrong, the time the dog ate from the Christmas table while grandma was finishing serving up, we look at photos of the children as babies and wonder at where the years went. All of these activities have visual, auditory or emotional cues that support a person with short term memory loss to access their memories of treasured times. You can facilitate this precious connect. It is a great gift

Joy: When you connect with another human being and share a moment where you are both joined by the memory or experience, joy will result. It is the same for all of

us. For people with dementia, it is a special gift. You have supported their recollection, shared in the moment of its remembering and joined with them in a relationship that enables them to feel the joy of being connected and remembering something familiar that is treasured. What a gift to give.

I always feel privileged to be able to give the gift of supporting a person with dementia to feel valued, connected to their memories and life experiences and more importantly connected to those around them. It is one of the most treasured parts of my role at Alzheimer's WA. At Christmas, you can give these gifts. You will experience the truth that giving is the best reward of all.

Give the gifts of time, connection and joy to those you love, and especially to those living with dementia. It will bring sparkle to their Christmas

and yours. I wish everyone a Christmas full of love, laughter and joyful memo-

#### TV Talk with Lee Tate - Everyone's favourite English Doctor... the grumpy Doc Martin



I SALUTE Martin Clunes aka Doc Martin. Standing the test of time on television is no mean feat.

Aussie viewers have embraced Doc Martin repeats on 7TWO after the series ran successfully on the ABC.

The quality of the scripts and the actors, with constant plot surprises, puts the series in the rarified air of television programs that survive repeats. Dedicated fans around the world have also turned to video stores to rent entire series.

the uninitiated. For Clunes plays grumpy medic Doc Martin - a GP with a brusque bedside manner, joined by a cast of oddball characters in an idyllic hamlet in Corn-

The comedy, created by Dominic Minghella, is set in the fictional seaside village of Portwenn and filmed on location in the English village of Port Isaac, Cornwall, whose coastal, rolling-hills-beauty has understandably attracted hordes of the show's fans.

(Most interior scenes were shot in a converted local barn).

The series aired from 2004 and streamed in the US and Canada. An American TV remake was promptly planned, Notro Films produced a Spanish version (Doctor Mateo), Germany released Doktor Martin while the French, Dutch and Czechs produced their own versions.

Watched by millions in Britain, Doc Martin was constant tabloid fodder.

The press reported that the series would end after Series 9 in 2019 but Martin Clunes clarified that it had only been commissioned that far, giving hope of more to come.

Dubbed 'Doc Martin' by the locals, the central character is Dr Martin Ellingham. He is deliciously politically-incorrect and described as grouchy, pugnacious, and lacking social skills despite his medical excellence.

"His direct, emotionless manner offends many of the villagers, made worse by his invariably unpleasant responses to their ignorant, often foolish, comments," says the show's blurb.

"They perceive him to be hot-tempered and lacking in a bedside manner, whereas he feels he is performing his duties in a professional and by-thebook manner, not wasting time chatting.

is "Ellingham deadpan and dresses formally in a business suit and tie, regardless of the weather or the occasion, and he never takes off his jacket, even when deliver-

ing babies.
"He does not smoke and has no hesitation in pointing out the risks of unhealthy behaviours,

both in private and in public gatherings.'

Consistent comedy being the great challenge for TV writers and producers, Doc Martin comes as a tonic.

In 2004 Doc Martin won the British Comedy Award for Best TV Comedy Drama and was nominated as Best New TV Comedy. Clunes won the Best TV Comedy Actor award, primarily for his portrayal of Doc Martin.

Clunes, 57, was gonged with an OBE in 2015 for services to drama, charity and the community in Dorset.

He shone in Men Be-

having Badly and has narrated TV documentaries on islands and animals. He also voiced Kipper the Dog in an animated series, Kipper.

Clunes wed actress Lucy Aston but they divorced after seven years and he married future Doc Martin producer Philippa Braithwaite.

They have a daughter, Emily, and live in Dorset where they run a farm with heavy horses. (Clunes became president of the British Horse Society).

The last we heard, Clunes was saddling-up for more appearances as Doc Martin. Bring it on.

# Finding gratitude in small things

MICHAEL Leunig, poet, philosopher and toonist, has a great deal to say about both the lighter and darker sides of the human spirit. His recent Perth concert, in partnership with the WA Symphony Orchestra and singer Katie Noonan, was called Gratitude and Grief after one of his iconic poems.

Someone who perhaps understands those two conditions better than most is Kym Walker. Among many hats she wears, Kym is a funeral celebrant. She was profoundly moved by the

performance. "The lyrics were sometimes dark but at the same time I felt joyous," she told me. "He touches a facet of so many Australian lives. It's about living in relative privilege but also being brave enough to confront

The Christmas season can be a daunting time of year for many people, watching media depictions of the 'perfect' family unwrapping expensive presents under a fairy-tale Christmas tree. For most of us, that's far from the realty. For some folk experiencing loss or loneliness, it can be

deeply distressing. Kym feels that getting in touch with our grief is a fundamental need.

"I need to experience it. It informs my heart to be a real part of the community. Each of us has our shadow, our loneliness, but it's not who we are," she said. "There are other parts of us that are healthy and joyous.'

As Leunig says in his poem When the Heart: Let the wind from the good old sea blow in to bathe the wound with salt'.

We each have our own version of the wind from the salty sea. I asked Kym what she feels gratitude for.

"Simple things," she said. "It's not so much the big blessings, the constructs of our culture, that we have good reason to be grateful for.

"There was a fine misty rain in the forest this morning. The air was so pure and sweet. I felt my heart would burst. Gratitude is purer if it comes from nature, from music. dance; simple things.'

I agree. An excited greeting from my dog, a warm hug and glorious fruit tree blossom with its promise of abundance, are some of the things that fill my cup.



#### Vince's pork and duck rillettes





#### by Vince Garreffa

WITH the festive season approaching I thought I would share with you a wonderful dish to make which will surely impress friends and family.

Rillettes are a meaty spread to serve on bread or biscuits, a bit like a spreadable terrine. Great to serve anytime. It keeps very well in the fridge for about two months but once you dig into it you should use it all up within a week. That's a good reason to make it in lots of small pots instead of one big one. It is very morrish and you won't have trouble eating it. The problem will be to have the strength to stop eating it all and leave some for your guests.

Ingredients for two for a month or enough for a

small party 1kg of boneless skinless pork belly (with a bit of fat, not too lean) 750g duck legs (bone in skin on and fat on) 1 medium onion 6 cloves 1 sprig tarragon cracked black pepper

to taste

water

sea or lake salt to taste Method

Dice your pork and duck into 2 cm cubes but save the bones and don't discard any fat. Dice the onion, now put all the including ingredients. bones, into a casserole pot with one litre of water. Cover with a lid and simmer for five to six hours until the meat disintegrates into Ittle strings. Do be careful to replace any water that evapo-

rates as you cook. Check the juices and stir at least every hour. Now strain the juice (don't throw it away) and allow the meat to rest, discarding the bones, cloves and any visible

onion and tarragon.

Blitz the meat in a blender and rest it in a large bowl while still warm. Your juices should now have settled and separated, fat on top, juices on the bottom. Save the fat, you will need it. Add a little of the juices into the meat bowl. Just wet the meat so it's not dry. Taste the mix and season with salt and pepper. When you are happy with the taste put the meat mix into little pots. Only fill about 80 per cent up and refrigerate for two hours. Then put half a centimetre of warm fat on top of the meat mix in the pot, immerse one large or a few small leaves of flat leaf Italian parsley in the fat and refrigerate till needed.

You'll be the talk of the town over Christmas when you serve this dish. I take this opportunity

#### **Knife and fork talk with the Dining Divas**

THIS month was on a learning curve. We travelled further afield heading to Pinjarra via public transport. Easy peasy, provided you keep your eye on the Transperth timetables.

We travelled by train from Perth to Mandurah, picking up the Pinjarra bus outside Mandurah station. The whole journey was a relaxing one and half hours, followed by a pleasant amble past and into some interesting shops.

We came to the bridge over the Murray River and whilst checking out the scenery we spied the pub. The Premier Hotel is on the banks of the river and thinking refreshment we noticed they offered \$14 seniors meals.

From the menu we chose fish, chips and salad and chicken schnitzel with chips and salad.

The fish was cooked to perfection, it was encased in a very light beer batter and the edges of which were very crispy and very morish. The chips were also beer battered and very tasty. Unfortunately, the salad was more of a garnish consisting of a very small piece of iceberg lettuce with a little colesiaw.

There were two varieties of schnitzel (Holstien or Parmigiana) both accompanied with fries and salad. Given a choice of toppings for the schnitzel, we chose mushrooms, although fresh mushroom gravy would have been more appetising. The salad combination of lettuce, tomato, cucumber and coleslaw was fresh but very small.

# A little cherry cheer makes for delicious summer entertaining

THE short but sweet WA cherry season is here and this year's crop is looking as irresistible as ever. Sunny spring days have sweetened the fruit which also promises to be of good size.

Čherries have a very short season so it's time to enjoy this year's locally grown cherries through the holidays. These cheerful morsel of colour are a true celebration of fresh summer flavours and perfect for sharing amongst friends and at

family gatherings.

Cherries are best enjoyed fresh from the stem so choose carefully. Look for fresh green stems and firm, plump and bright-looking fruit. Cherries are only picked if they are mature so any you buy will be sweet and juicy. Most cherries are red although the white varieties make a stunning appearance in time for holiday fun times.

If you do buy ahead, cherries should be stored correctly to get the best flavour and texture. Keep in the crisper drawer in the fridge in a

clean, plastic bag, keeping the end loose. This allows air to circulate and slows deterioration. Cherries can be stored for up to a week in this way. Wash just before use and gently pat dry with a clean towel.

Glossy red cherries have a special appeal at any summer festive occasion and even a handful or two can provide a touch of luxury. A bowl of perfect cherries as a table centrepiece during a meal is indeed a treat for the senses. Use cherries as decoration on desserts like pavlova and chocolate cakes, arrange over

the top of fruit salad or simply use a tiny bunch at each place setting at the table.

Once again, the 2018 cherry season will be officially launched at Market City, Canning Vale on Friday 14 December with the annual Charity Cherry Auction. More than \$1.1 million has been raised for the Perth Children's Hospital in the 25 years since the auction began in 1992. This year funds raised will support the amazing work of the children's burns unit lead by Professor Fiona

Arriving fresh from the south west of the state - extending from the hills area around Dwellingup, Donnybrook, Manjimup and through to Mount Barker - cherries flourish in the coldest areas of the state. Ideally cherries need 1100 hours of temperatures below 7°C followed by a mild spring. This limits the locations in WA that are able to grow cherries.

For those who can't resist the cherry temptation, here are some creative cherry ideas to share with your clan at any festivities over the summer.

#### Cherry cheesecake in a glass



250g cream cheese, softened 1/3 cup caster sugar ½ cup thickened cream 1 teaspoon gelatine 400g fresh black cherries, pips removed % cup tawny port or other sweet red wine 1/₃ cup sugar 2 tablespoons fresh lemon juice 2 teaspoons cornflour 2 teaspoons water

Beat cream cheese and sugar until smooth with an electric mixer. In another bowl, whip cream until soft peaks form. Combine gelatine and two teaspoons cold water in a small heatproof bowl. Stand for five minutes. Heat in a microwave on high (100 per cent) for 20 seconds. Allow to stand for five minutes to cool. Add gelatine mixture to cream cheese mixture and stir until well combined. Fold whipped cream through mixture. Spoon into serving glasses. Refrigerate for one hour or until set.

To prepare topping, combine port, ½ cup sugar, cherries and lemon juice in a large saucepan; bring to a boil. Cook five minutes or until cherries have softened and mixture is syrupy. Combine juice, cornflour, and four teaspoons water, stirring with a whisk until well blended. Stir cornflour mixture into cherry mixture; bring to a boil. Reduce heat; simmer three minutes or until mixture is slightly thickened and shiny. Remove from heat; allow to cool. Serve over cheesecake.

Preparation: 20 minutes; chilling; 1 hour; cooking: 10 minutes; serves: 4

#### What's fresh and best now in the markets



Mangoes: NOW is the time to indulge your taste for the tropics, with the Ord River mango season in full flight. Most people will wish for no more than to slice each 'cheek' from the flat stone, cut a diamond pattern in the flesh and flex the mango half to turn the sweet flesh outwards. Eat as is, or slice the dices away from the skin to add to salads: mango, avocado, coriander and a squeeze of lime juice are a particularly good combination.

Cherries: Can any other fruit be as perfect for summer celebrations as fresh WA grown cherries? These ruby-hued and snow white wonders are deliciously sweet and plump and make an ideal centrepiece for a Christmas table. No need to serve dessert, just start nibbling. Cherries should be stored in the vegetable crisper in a clean, plastic bag with the air removed. Better still, to avoid bruising or bumping, store in an airtight container and use within three to four days.

**Herbs:** Herbs make the feast at Christmas. There aren't many dishes that don't benefit from a sprinkling of green zinginess – be it basil, coriander, chives, or my perennial favourite, dill, which pairs exceptionally well with summer seafood. Experiment with the under-utilised flavours of Thai basil, marjoram, sage (great for stuffing your turkey or chook) and chervil. You could even really go all out and pot some fresh herbs as a beautiful, living present - wrap with a big red bow and deliver with the request that you'll get to sample the end results.

Stringless beans: Beans are a good choice for summer menus as

they are equally good hot or at room temperature. go exceptionally Thev well with Mediterranean flavours; toss beans with olives, feta cheese and slow-roasted tomatoes, finishing with a drizzle of extra virgin olive oil for a colourfully appropriate platter to take along to a

Christmas barbecue. Valencia Oranges: A great way to give your day a glowing start is with a glass of freshly squeezed orange juice. An excellent way to detox, after Christmas festivities. All citrus fruits give a more generous yield of juice if they are at room temperature when squeezed - rolling them firmly with the palm of your hand also helps. Valencia oranges are ideal if you like your juice chilled as the juice keeps well in the fridge, ready for that morning burst of energy and Vitamin C.



#### Cherry chutney



THIS cherry chutney goes beautifully with turkey, ham or pork and is great on sandwiches with cold meat. It will also make an ideal gift to that special someone who has everything.

500g cherries, halved and pitted

1 cup red wine vinegar

1 onion, finely chopped

½ cup brown sugar ½ cup dried cranberries

½ cinnamon stick

2 teaspoons freshly grated ginger

3 whole cloves

Combine all the ingredients in a heavy-based saucepan. Stir over low heat until the sugar has dissolved, then increase the heat to medium-high and bring just to the boil. Cover, reduce the heat to low and simmer for 45 minutes. Remove the lid from the pan, and adjust the heat so the mixture continues to simmer. Cook for a further 10-15 minutes, until the liquid has reduced and the mixture has thickened slightly (it will thicken further on cooling). Keep a close eye on the mixture towards the end of cooking time, and stir occasionally so it doesn't stick on the bottom

Cool to room temperature, and transfer to a glass or ceramic bowl. Cover with a lid.

Preparation: 5 minutes; cooking: 55 minutes; serves: 1.5 cups

Napoléon Bonaparte advised: "Always carry champagne. In victory you deserve it and in defeat you need it.'

Nowadays we are not allowed to call sparkling wine 'champagne' unless it comes from the Champagne district of France. So we call it sparkling wine. The French call sparkling wines effervescents and hold annual blind tasting wine competitions called Effervescents du Monde. Australian sparklings often do well in them, but not in the most recent competition where wines from France, Brazil, Switzerland and South Africa all were awarded gold medals.

Here are some efferves-

cents we tasted for your Christmas enjoyment.

Casella Family Wines make the ubiquitous Yellowtail wines.

Yellowtail Pink Bubbles has soft floral aromas with hints of wild strawberry, red cherry and a touch of musk. The palate displays a soft creamy texture thanks to millions of tiny bubbles and flavours of strawberries, red cherry, spice and a hint of tropical fruit. RRP \$9.99.

Yellowtail Bubbles has aromas of tropical fruits with a dash of lime juice and a hint of fresh cut flowers. The bubbles create a fresh and creamy mouth feel. A fruit basket of lemon, lime and citrus flavours makes a refreshing wine with a light and crisp finish. RRP \$9.99.

#### Mad Tatters Morris trip to China: A newcomer's perspective

NO Have a Go Day is complete without a performance from the Mad Morris dancing **Tatters** troupe.

For the last few years they have travelled to China to compete in a dance

competition. As a newcomer to the Tatters dance group I was not sure what to expect from China. As it turned out, it was a positive experience.

Straight up to Hong Kong, and on to Shanghai. What could go wrong? As it turned out, not much, but it could have gone wrong big time. For example, a huge typhoon was lurking around the region wreaking havoc here and there, but we fortunately avoided it.

I wondered what I had done wrong when we ar-

rived in China and we had our finger prints taken, which is part of their immigration policy. It was a bit surprising but ultimately efficient. Our welcoming bus was on time and we headed off to a hotel in Pudong, a city about the size of greater Perth.

We have arrived to participate in the 5th China Luiiazui International Folk Fitness Dance Festival, held in Shanghai. Along with the Mad Tatters Morris team from Guildford, WA, there are dance teams from Peru (who live in Germany), Panama, who live in Los Angeles and Armenians who live in Seattle, USA. There was a Swedish belly dancing group and an Argentine team whose dance impersonated Egyptian peasants getting married.

There were 17 teams in all from eight nations. China also had nine teams entered and they are all very different. We danced by the Huangpo River in Shanghai which is brilliantly lit at night and were welcomed by a Chinese audience who must have wondered about wild looking, shouting westerners who wear top hats with multi-coloured feathers sprouting at the top.

We knew we had them when we suddenly stopped whooping and sang a sentimental love song In a faraway place in Chinese which had them clapping and singing along with us. Many of the Chinese said: "that we had touched their hearts".

One of the highlights for me were the Tibetans in national dress dancing with huge long threestringed guitar-like instruments about a metre and a half long. They stamped and played their instruments behind their heads and were spectacular and athletic.

As well as the Festival appearance we danced at a Farmers' Harvest Festival in the country, a school and in the city itself.

One day we performed at three different venues with long bus drives in between. We were always very well received. We presented organising officials with a wooden plaque from the City of Swan which was very well regarded.

The Mad Tatters Morris. as a group, is very diverse. Our ages vary, and for this trip included a 16-year-old flautist who enjoyed the experience of being involved with so many ethnic groups and varieties of dance and song, so different from being at school!

Shanghai is a super-city of 25 million souls but I don't know where they were all hiding as it had less traffic than Perth, was inexpensive and clean evervwhere. No graffiti, no anti-social behaviour and it felt safe to walk around

To sum up, a satisfying and fun trip for all concerned and made all that practice in singing Mandarin worthwhile.

# To the Top of Europe - heading to the heights of Switzerland

MOUNTAINS are there to be climbed but I have never been drawn to ropes, picks, anchors and spikes. I'm more for sitting back and letting a train or cable car do the hard work for me. That is one reason I love going to Jungfraujoch - The Top of Europe.

The Top of Europe is 3454 meters above sea level in the Swiss Alps above Interlaken. With a majestic backdrop of ice. snow and rock, the exhilaration of being there is palpable, yet all you have to do is sit back as three separate trains take you progressively higher and

The first train starts at Interlaken East station. We chose to board one stop along the line at the cute village of Wilderswil where accommodation is cheaper, parking is easier and people are friendlier than in the city.

The Bernese Oberland Railway travels from Wilderswil into the Lauterbrunnen and Grindelwald valleys. Our train split a few stations later with the front half going to Lauterbrunnen and the back half going to Grindelwald. If you are going to the Top of Europe it doesn't matter which way you go.

We choose to travel via Grindelwald, a dreamlike mountain resort under the infamous north face of the Eiger. The surrounding alpine pastures are achingly idyllic and cable-cars make it easy to reach scenic mountain lookouts, the Grindelwald Glacier and lakes. It is no wonder that this landscape was chosen as a location for filming Star Wars and James Bond movies.

From Grindelwald we caught the narrowgauge rack railway to Kleine Scheidegg. This where the trains from Grindelwald and Lauterbrunnen meet and from where the train to Jungfraujoch departs. The scenery is dramatic as we enter the snow zone and everything turns to

Cable cars head in all directions from remote stations and even in May some skiers are out chasing the last runs for the year. Kleine Scheidegg is the starting point for scenic hikes in summer and it is a significant

winter sports centre. The train journey to the Jungfraujoch (Top of Europe) through the rock of the Eiger and Mönch is an incredible experience. The majority of this section is in a tunnel but you get to enjoy stunning views from Eismeer (Sea of Ice). The cogwheel railway track to Jungfraujoch with gradients up to 25 per cent was completed in 1912 and has been in continuous use ever since.

Arriving at the top brings new levels of anticipation and it is not long before we have icy air streams across our faces, snow crunching under our feet, and a view which nearly takes our breath away, even with the cloud and fog we are coping with to-

When we visited here some 25 years ago there were limited things to do at the top. Not anymore. Over the next few hours we were absorbed by the 360° cinematic panorama of Jungfrau, intrigued by the lights and music of the Alpine Sensation and fascinated by the huge Ice Palace where enormous caverns and passageways have been carved into the ice displaying crystal-like sculptures of eagles, bears, penguins and so forth.

The high-point of any visit is the Sphinx Terrace attached to the observatory and research Station. We ride Switzerland's fastest lift to the terrace and are rewarded with spectacular views over the Aletech Glacier which is over 22km long and nearly one km thick. Sadly, the views into France, Italy and

Germany are masked by low-cloud and fog.

Next we brave the cold and venture out on to the Glacier Plateau. It is briefly majestic but then it turns bleak, freezing cold and merciless. In better weather you can skim down the slope on snow tubes, skis or snowboards, but not today. The 250 metre-long zipline is not providing an adrenalin rush to anyone either. We quickly retreat inside.

Mountain air makes you hungry and thirsty so fortunately there are several restaurants and cafes. Top of the line is Restaurant Crystal but we opted for the selfservice Aletsch. those who brought their own food the Café Bar provided drinks.

There are a few shops here with souvenirs, clothing and other items but Lindt Swiss Chocolate Heaven seems by far the most popular. This advertises itself as the

highest Lindt Chocolate Shop in the World and there are six interactive

ucts only available here. The time has come to leave so we retrace our journey back to Kleine Scheidegg then take the next train, this time to Lauterbrunnen before making one more change before we reach Wilderswil. It has been a great day despite less than ideal weather and we would do it again in



YOU could easily spend a week in the Wairarapa, which is located in the south eastern corner of New Zealand's north island, exploring the spectacular coastlines, wide valleys, five colonial townships and wineries which make this region famous.

While it is possible to do a day tour from Wellington or visit the area by train, a hire car gives you more flexibility.

For those short on Greytown and Martinborough offer the perfect combination for a day trip or overnight stay. Here are five 'don't miss' activities if you are in the Wairarapa for a good time, not a long time.

#### Wine tasting with a difference

Haven't ridden a bike since you were a kid? No problem. Green Jersey Cycle Tours offer wine tours with a difference, with a choice of bikes ranging from vineyard cruisers and electric bicycles to a cycle rickshaw pedalled by your partner or a guide.

Hire a bike and go as you please, book a picnic and peddle package which includes gourmet local produce or take a auided tour with insider tips and excellent company provided by owner Stuart Edwards. Over 20 wineries are within easy cycling distance of Martinborough so you won't have to go far to sample some of New Zealand's best pinot noir. Step back in time

Pretty surrounds invite visitors to relax and take their time at the Cobblestones Early Settlers Museum which features a fascinating collection of historic buildings and artefacts. One look at the antique dental equipment at the Wairarapa's first public hospital will ensure you never complain about visiting a modern day dentist again.

Donations from residents have been beautifully curated in a new contemporary museum space, offering an intimate glimpse of pioneering life, along with the many original buildings. You can almost hear the shears clicking as you breath in the comforting smell of lanolin and run your hands over the machinery in an 1870s shearing shed.

#### Shop, stroll and dine in Greytown

Greytown is with lovingly restored Victorian wooden buildings, many of which have been converted into charming shops and boutiques. Whether you are seeking one-ofa-kind fashion, original artwork, edible gifts or antiques, you are sure to find it here. Stock up on healthy goodies at Food Forest Organics, a gourmet store and delicatessen featuring produce from the Cameron Family Farm which just happens to be owned by famous Hollywood director, James Cameron.

Vintage furniture and homewares store, The Retro Room, is a browser's delight featuring funky 50s and swinging 60s finds. Just off the main street, Imperial Productions' Victorian-style toy store sells handcrafted lead toy soldiers which are coveted by collectors around the world. The Lolly Jar, an old fashioned sweet shop selling over 150 pick 'n mix lollies, offers a sweet dash of nostalgia. Hearty fare and superb people watching can be found across the road at The White Swan Hotel, a pub that began

life as a New Zealand Railways' administration block.

#### Meet some local artists

Oggi Domani is a welcoming ceramic art and design studio where artist Josephine Durkin hand paints pieces using intricate Italian designs. Josephine trained in Italy with a ceramics maestro and her studio offers a fascinating glimpse into the process of creating ceramic art from designing to the glazing, painting and cooking in the kiln. Even if you don't plan on buying, it is worth a visit.

Schoc Chocolates, an artisan studio of a different kind, has developed a reputation for exquisite handcrafted chocolates with unusual flavour combinations. There are more than 80 different flavour combinations to sample including curry and pappadums and lime and chilli. Everything is made on-site in a tiny kitchen where you can watch delicious chocolates being created with commentary provided

by charming owner and raconteur Murray Langham. 'Crafted to be eaten not stored' appears on every label; one more reason for chocoholics to love this shop.

#### Spend the night in style

Surround yourself in the old world charm of the Martinborough Hotel which is located in the heart of town on Martinborough Square. It was a beacon for prosperous travellers in the 1800s and remains an ideal spot for visiting adventurers to lay their heads. With a charming sense of history, including rooms named after local pioneering families.

From there it is an easy stroll to many of Martinborough's attractions, including Pain and Kershaw's General Store which has been operated by the same family since the 1880s.

Most of the region's best known wineries are also within easy walking distance.



# A day trip to New Norcia offers cultural treats for travellers

JUST 90 minutes by road from Perth, New Norcia falls into that travel category of a good Sunday drive with rewards at the destination.

Australia's only monastic town, New Norcia is unique, making it a worthwhile target for you and your visitors.

Multiple trips to New Norica over a period of time are fine too, there is so much to do and see.

For the first time, we coughed-up (\$30 for two seniors and a grandchild) to peruse the museum and art gallery which are packed with genuine religious and historic treasures.

There are artworks by European masters and Australian contemporary artists including incredible botanical drawings by Charles Gardner (not ex-WA Governor Charles Gairdner).

A couple of dozen paintings have been restored after being stolen in 1986, in the biggest art theft in WA history. Two masked men bound and gagged 61-year-old attendant Connie Mc-Naughton and made off with precious works of art from the monastery's

The thieves hired a car in their own names, left it at Perth airport and took-off for Melbourne but, given the clues they left behind, were quickly traced and arrested. It is said they had been contracted to make the heist on behalf of Asian interests with art world connections.

You don't have to be religious to appreciate the New Norica artworks or the human works of monks that have built this incredible community in isolated, formerlybarren country.

1848 Since monks, led by Spanish Benedictines Rosendo Salvado and Joseph Serra, performed miracles with needy Indigenous children, providing shelter, work and education at the original mission some 8kms further

Today's community has evolved a network of buildings that are attractive to the traveller fascinated by architecture and history. Standouts are two former boarding schools, St Ildephonsus

and St Gertrude's.

Groups of up to 200 can stay in New Norcia's buildings including the old convent.

The venues are suitable for school camps, music and art workconferences. shops. and special retreats events. Music can often by heard wafting from the buildings.

After inspecting the information office, museum, art and tourist shop with interesting knickknacks and religious material, we adjourn for coffees at the marvelous, imposing New Norcia Hotel which dates to 1927 but with understated, subtle renovations.

The hotel is ideal for weddings and special social functions.

Owned by the Benedictine monks, the hotel's drinks list includes New Norcia's own Abbey ale, wine and port which can be consumed in the tastefully-decorated bars and rooms or outside under jacarandas.

Good news for baked goods lovers. The old mill is being restored and will be opened to the public.

New Norcia bread

is still baked in the 140-year-old wood-fired oven and distributed to the town. Outlets in Perth have been discontinued. Their baked goods have no artificial additives although are pricier than supermarket bread (but worth it).

Goodies on offer include olive oil, wines, nut cake, biscotti and Dom Salvado Pan Chocolatti.

The town makes provision for caravans behind the roadhouse for a small fee and campers with self-contained vans are welcome to park free on the field opposite the roadhouse.

Perhaps next time we will stay at the Monastery guesthouse - quaranteed to be peaceful observing the monks. Ten monks still live, pray and work at this unique Australian icon.

There's a New Norcia river walk but with darkness approaching we must leave it for another time. It promises to be a leisurely stroll through bush to the Moore River and surrounds - an experience that changes with the seasons. Relax, unwind and enjoy the fresh country air.

#### The good looking coral trout is a favoured fish...

CORAL trout are one of my favourite fishes. They are such fine looking individuals, superbly coloured and possessing an attitude that is the equal to practically anything else in the marine world. They fight hard and best of all, taste as good as anything that swims.

They are found in coral reef country from Geraldton north, rarely venturing south of there, although a couple have turned up in Perth waters over the years. Mind you, for every hundred people who excitedly think they have hooked one of these stunning fish in metro waters, ninety nine have really caught is the superficially similar harlequin fish.

Essentially an ambush species, a trout will lay doggo in its coral hideaway, waiting for a meal to swim past, then burst from cover to snatch its prey. This trait is part of what makes them so fascinating to catch, especially in shallow water.

I remember fishing In the shallow lagoons of the remote Rowley Shoals, where coral outcrops dot the sand flats in just a few metres of water. It was an exhilarating exercise, running a surface popper over the top of the bombies, where I witnessed closeup the explosive nature of a coral trout ambush.

While the fish inside the lagoons at the Rowleys are small, some of the biggest trout you will see anywhere live on the outside dropoffs, where pulling in a fish of 10kg or more on a trolled minnow lure barely raises an eyebrow.

The Abrolhos Islands is another area that holds a prolific population of coral trout, albeit mostly on the small side. Once again, most are caught by trolling in 10m of water or less.

While coral trout are enthusiastic lure takers, most are caught by conventional bottom fishing in northern waters. Drifting through or anchoring up in coral country brings the chance of catching a trout into play and they are likely to be part of a mixed bag of tropical species that includes spangled emperor. Rankin cod, baldchin groper and even red emperor.

Trout generally average 1-4kg in weight, but can grow to 15kg or more in areas that aren't generally subject to intense fishing pressure. They can be very strong in the initial stages of a fight, as they do their utmost to get back into the line-eating coral they call home. One coaxed away from the bottom, trout will still fight strongly, but without that initial mad

intensity.

Of the big five northern bottom species mentioned, coral trout is easily my favourite on the table. The firm white flesh can be prepared just about any old way, but they really shine when shallow fried after being dipped in milk, egg and breadcrumbs. To add an extra little something, try fine grating some parmesan cheese into the breadcrumb mix. Serve with a squeeze of lemon, rocket salad and fresh chips.

# Discovering the magic of the Pilbara's Karijini experience...

LADIES and gentlemen, start your engines. Dates for the Pilbara's iconic Karijini Experience for 2019 have been announced and for those who enjoy a bit of a drive, followed by a spot of camping - and a heap of fun - mark 16 to 21 April in your diaries.

OK, so the drive is a bit more than popping around the corner to the shops, with a journey of around 1400km to some of the most remote, but spectacular scenery imaginable.

If this year's Karijini Experience was anything to go by the prospects of a road trip don't come much better than this.

The weather at Easter in the national park, around 80km north-east of Tom Price, was pretty close to perfect, with low 30° maximums during the day and a bit of a chill overnight.

It was warm enough during the day for a refreshing swim in the glorious waterholes that line the spectacular red gorges and the red bluffs are a photographer's dream.

While Karijini should be on everybody's bucket

list for its scenic splendour alone, coinciding the trip with the Karijini Experience, a festival of food, music and Aboriginal culture, takes the journey to a whole new level

I was there for the full week of the 2018 Experience as part of the PR team, and I found myself spellbound. 2019 will be the seventh year of the Karijini Experience.

Much of the action takes place under a vast marquee on the gravel airstrip where free adventures abound.

One minute we're getting a cooking lesson about native ingredients from celebrity chef Mark Olive and then we're being invited to sample kangaroo being cooked underground by the local Banjima people or watching birds of prey, a market day, games and activities for the kids and an opportunity to varn with the Baniima elders.

There are around 100 performers in dozens of events.

It's an eclectic mix of elements, particularly when you start throwing in some of the ticketed events. These include degustation meals with native and local food pop-up restaurant group, Paul

Iskov's Fervor, opera in the gorge with a WASO string quartet and singer Deborah Cheetham and Gina Williams singing in Noongar in the same gorge to an audience of less than 100 people accompanied by the beautiful guitar of Guy Ghouse.

Add a tinkling waterfall in the background, the chirp of bird song and the rustle of the breeze in the trees - oh and a huge monitor lizard that decided to calmly meander through the audience on his way to the creek.

There were musicians left, right and centre, Mark Atkins with his extraordinary didgeridoo performances, Archie Roach performing with his band on the big stage, The Mexicans, Josie Alec and many more, along with corroboree, dance and music from Aboriginal people young and old.

The whole thing really was one of those notsure-where-to-look-next experiences.

Many of the same artists will be back again in 2019 along with some new ones, but the focus will be on successful Aboriginal performers. Seeing so many of them together does make you realise what a wealth of Aboriginal talent there is in

The Karijini Experience will never become a vast festival. Pressure on the national park means there will always be limits to visitor numbers and it is unlikely to get much above a couple of thousand visitors.

But along with its remoteness the relatively small numbers make it intimate and special.

There are a couple of accommodation options including glamping it up at the Karijini Eco Retreat in the national park, although the Retreat fills up quickly and you need to book early.

True campers will opt for a site at Dales Gorge which has a large camping area divided into several loops, each with picnic tables, gas barbecues and bush toilets.

Camping fees apply. It is accessible to twowheel drive vehicles and is just a few minutes' drive away from the main action at the airstrip.

Just remember, don't wear white. I'm still using a notebook that's stained red and I don't think the red dust stains in my trainers will ever come out.





# The frozen pensions campaign receives a boost in the UK

WHAT a month it has been for the campaign. The main thrust this month was the visit of several International Consortium of British Pensioners (ICBP) directors to London along with Anne Puckridge (91) from Canada and Monica Phillip, a West Indian migrant who retired home to become a frozen Caribbean pensioner.

The week opened with meetings with sev-eral firms of solicitors to discuss grounds for commencing fresh legal proceedings against the UK Government. The discussion was wide ranging and the ICBP are awaiting their written advices before considering any future action.
ICBP director John

Duffy met with the High Commissioner for Antiqua and Barbuda who is very supportive of our campaign and has agreed to raise it when the Caribbean Commonwealth countries meet with the UK next year.

On the Tuesday Anne Puckridge was interviewed on BBC local radio which went out to various stations around the UK. This was followed by meetings with the Financial Times and other newspapers, plus interviews with ITN and the BBC TV.

On 31 October the ICBP held a parliamentary drop-in at the House of Commons. 35 MPs attended with 34 agreeing to support our cause and the All Party Parliamentary Group (APPG). Only one Conservative MP declined. Twenty five MPs signed a letter to Theresa May (UK Prime Minister) supporting the abolition of frozen pensions.

Anne Puckridge delivered her petition of 218,660 signatures (now 221,863 signatures and still increasing) to No 10 Downing Street and was even invited inside for tea. The person who met her was from the Department of Work and Pensions. He told Anne that he had only heard about 'frozen pensions' the day before he was delegated to meet with

A short video about Anne's day in Westminster is on Facebook on the Pension Reformers United Group.

Afterwards Anne was interviewed live by the Jeremy Vine Show on BBC Řadio 2 and also by You and Yours on Radio 4. The press activity around her visit was huge with articles appearing in The Guardian, the Sunday Express, BBC news amongst others.

One of our main difficulties in the past has been to attract sufficient attention from MPs and the public. We are now linked into many large Facebook pension groups which increases our profile. The main objective now is to capitalise on this success and to move the campaign forward in the New Year.

My best wishes to you all for Christmas and let us all hope that the New Year will being around some success to our campaign.





#### Research into grandcarers - participants needed

GRANDPARENTS raising their grandchildren represent the fastest growing form of out-of-home care in Australia.

Many grandparent carers take on this role due to complex family situations, often in response to a crisis such as mental illness, domestic violence, substance abuse, or death of a parent. Children can come into the care of their grandparents very suddenly, with trauma due to abuse, neglect or grief. Some children suffer from disabilities such as autism or ADHD. It's not difficult to imagine that raising children in these circumstances is not an easy ask.

While we know some of the issues that affect grandparent carers – such as the additional costs of raising grandchildren, trouble

accessing legal help, and social isolation – what we don't know is the impact this has on their mental, physical, social, and financial health. To better understand this impact, and therefore create better supports and services for grandparents raising their grand-children, Wanslea is coordinating a significant piece of research in this area.

The \$1 million Lotterywest funded research project is looking at the experiences, joys, and challenges of being a grandparent carer in Western Australia. The research is being done in partnership with Edith Cowan and Curtin Universities.

One challenge the research team faces is reaching out to what is effectively a hidden population. Exact numbers of grandparents in this situation are unknown and they aren't necessarily found where you would typically find people of their age group.

The research team needs your help to connect with grandparents we would otherwise be unable to reach. We want to ensure all grandparent carers have the opportunity for their voice to be heard.








AFTER an unusually cool spring, summer is finally upon us. Apart from a few high 20s and a couple of mid 30s it has been a very different spring to what we have been used to. The summer weather will eventually hit, but let's hope for some comfortable temperatures to enjoy around the festive period.

With plants being a hot topic at the moment there are lots of different gardening and plant gifts in the nurseries, garden centres and hardware stores that are sure to please your loved ones, just make sure that Father Christmas can fit them down the chimney or through the door.

There won't be many homes without an indoor plant on the table during the Christmas period and it wouldn't be the same without a traditional red Poinsettia. The range of speckled, white and pink varieties can make your table decoration even more interesting and could be quite a talking point over Christmas

Cacti and succulents are everywhere with bowls, glass domes, mini-gardens and ready made potted specimens making an instant gift. Just be careful when watering them. Only water around once a week and place them in a brightly lit spot indoors. Bowls crammed with succulents may require splitting up later next year as the plants mature and grow.

Hydrangeas are another Chrissie staple with their mop top or dainty lace cap varieties in shades of blue, pink and white. The new Obsidian range of Hydrangea varieties with dark or black stems is gorgeous. These include the deep pink mop top Storm Cloud, the delicate Black Lace with pink, blue or mauve lace cap flowers and White Knight with pure white mop top flowers. The aptly named Perfection with exquisite double mop top flowers makes a perfect table decoration for a week or two. Keep Hydrangeas well watered and then place them in a pot or in a partially shaded spot in a south facing aspect of the garden with morning sun after Christmas.

The easiest orchids to grow and flower are the Moth orchids or Phalaenopsis. These will add an exotic touch of grandeur and luxury to your home, without all the hard work. All they need is watering once a week and a liquid feed with orchid fertiliser once a fortnight. I particularly love the newer mini moth orchids, which look charming in glass jars and wine glasses, without the wine of course.

Indoor plants have been all the rage for the last year or so and they are easy to grow as long as you choose carefully. My pick of the best plants for an easy care Christmas gift are the Devil's ivy, ZZ plant, Philodendrons, cast iron plant, corn plant, moth orchid, Easter and mistletoe cactus, peace lily and Anthurium. I suggest combining a colourful trailing or hanging plant like the Devil's ivy (Epipremnum), easter cactus (Rhipsalidopsis) or the mistletoe cactus (Rhipsalis) with an elegant hanging basket like the ones from Angus and Celeste.

For those who loving cooking,

a pot of mixed herbs or vegies is sure to go down a treat and they could also come in handy for the Chrissie dinner.

There is now a wide range of dwarf fruit trees available that can fit into most small home gardens or they can be easily grown in a large pot. Similarly small fruit bushes like blueberries make a sweet and delicious potted delight and can be easily moved around.



## West Aussie heads up International Federation of Ageing

NOT many West Australian are in charge of major international organisations, but there is one exception. Dr Jane Barratt has been Secretary General of the Toronto (Canada) based International Federation of Ageing (IFA) for 15 years.

Dr Barratt graduated from the University of WA and completed her PhD at Curtin University as well as a Masters' degree from a UK University and set out on a career in aged care and disability.

She has more than 35 years of public and private sector experience in public health, community and aged care, and ageing and disability before being asked to head up the prestigious international organisa-

"I have enthusiasm for helping improve the lives of people. I believe we should all give what we can to others," she said.

Speaking at a Perth workshop on age-friendly cities she said all old people are not the same but developing an age friendly environment could be the equaliser.

"Health inequalities and determinants of health are the main issue. An African child's chance of reaching 55 is 10 per cent compared to a WA child's 90 per cent chance.

"Life expectancy has been increasing slowly for decades but recently the curve has flattened.

"In most cultures older people are seen as a burden.'

A Japanese government minister said, "let elderly people hurry up and

"This is ageism. Thinking ageism is stereotyping of older people, feeling ageism is prejudice and the action of ageism is discrimination.

Healthy ageing means maintaining function as we age. To help this we need to design an environment to assist mobility, ways to maintain relationships, to ensure we meet basic needs and health to maintain functionality," Dr Barratt said.

The cost of loneliness is enormous. In the US some two million older people speak to less than one other person a month

The problem for age-friendly cities is to find ways to utilise technology to combat loneliness.

WA is an affiliate of age friendly cities, part of the World Health Organisation's global network.

'This is an honour but also a responsibility. WA has important role to lead showing other cities how to become age-friendly," she said. The International Federation on

Ageing is an international non-governmental organisation with a membership base comprising government, NGOs, academics, industry and individuals.

It was started in 1973, at a time when the social and economic impact of population ageing was only beginning to be understood by governments around the world. Members include both individuals and organisations from 62 countries, representing 50 million older people

The IFA has consultative status at the United Nations and its agencies and the World Health Organisation. It has been involved in drafting key initiatives such as the UN Principles for Older Persons, actively advocating for older people to be recognized in the UN Sustainable Development Goals, and contributes to international dialogue on the social, political, cultural and physical environments that impact the lives and human rights of older people.

Dr Barratt is a Churchill Fellow, and she was recently awarded the Queen Elizabeth II Diamond Jubilee Medal in Canada in recognition of her efforts to enhance understanding of ageing, engage governments and the private sector, and improve the quality of life of older people.

## Diabetes Research WA reveal new grants to help change lives

WA's PEAK diabetes research funding group, Diabetes Research WA. has revealed the winners of its 2019 research grants - and, for the first time, three projects have been supported.

These grants West Austrafund lian-based research that hold enormous potential to change the lives of people with diabetes, said the charity's executive director, Sherl West-

"There's still a need to undertake research because while we can manage diabetes, we don't yet have a cure or all the answers to preventing health complications," she said.

The first grant to be awarded was to Associate Professor Kevin Pfleger from the Harry Perkins Institue of Medical Research.

He and his team have received \$60,000 to progress their work into a molecule called RAGE (the Receptor for Advanced Glycation End-products) - a molecule that sits in the membrane surrounding cells that are injured or stressed, as in type 2 diabetes.

When activated, RAGE triggers signalling in cells leading to inflammation and cell injury. The team has found a way to inhibit this process that should, in turn, limit the complications of type 2 diabetes developing.

The second successful grant recipient was Dr Aveni Haynes, a Research Fellow at the Telethon Kids Institute.

Dr Haynes and her team will use continuous glucose monitoring (CGM) to assess blood sugar levels in children at high risk - but who have not yet developed type 1 diabetes.

There is evidence that high blood sugar levels in children can be abnormal some years before they develop symptoms, however no previous studies have investigated the pattern of glucose levels in very young children. The project should improve clinical care of WA children at high risk of developing type 1 diabetes.

The third recipient was assistant professor Vance Matthews, group leader, Basic Science, at The University of Western Australia's School of Biomedical Sciences.

This is the first time they've funded an extension of a project previously supported in order to help ensure powerful WA research continues on to a point where it can positively impact patient

They funded the first stage of this work into the firefighter-like TNFSF14 protein in 2014. The

project aims to create an improved anti-obesity medication to help reduce rates of type 2 diabetes. The work may also give rise to a new way to tackle type 1 diabetes in patients that still have beta cells.

TNFSF14 has been shown in mice fed a high-fat diet to play a role in preventing people developing obesity and type 2 diabetes. The next step for the team is to

design compounds that can activate TNFSF14 receptors and test them in selected human cells and mice with pre-diabetes and type 2 diabetes.

"We look forward to watching these projects progress and thank all of our donors for making our research grants possible," said Ms Westlund.

## There's more to aged care than food and medication

THE Good Neighbour Program, a social connection program de-veloped by University Queensland (UQ) researchers could help shape the future of the aged care sector.

Ms Nicole Walker of UQ School of Psychology developed the Good Neighbour Program as part of her PhD study.

"The program aims to improve the quality of care and life in residential aged care. It's a social intervention for residents who are isolated and have little social support outside the facility," she

Third-year psychology students undertake applied work experience as part of the scheme, with medicine and other allied health students to join them from 2019

"The students are not offered credit for their involvement but I'm hoping the University will offer it as an elective throughout all health science courses.

"They volunteer their time and work on building relationships with the residents, many of whom have mental health and behavioural issues, as well as age-related decline.

The program doubles as a learning and development initiative for the students.

"We have an integrated approach that identifies how attitudes are important in shaping the future for residential aged care and older people," Ms Walker said.

Conventional treatment of people living in care can foster depersonalisation, which directly impacts resident well-being.

Ms Walker said the impending royal commission into aged care meant it was timely to examine existing models of care and the influence of negative attitudes.

"The residential care medical model does not reflect home even though we call the facilities a home.

"How can we make the model more home-

"Extra attention to residents has to be paid for either by charging the resident more, which is discriminatory or through taxation and there will be fewer taxpayers in the future as the population

ages." There are some 200,000 people in residential aged care in Aus-

Mr Walker says the Good Neighbour Program could provide the extra resources of time needed in these homes.

"If it was adopted across all Australian Universities it would provide integrated care as well as educational content.

"The model taps into 2-300 students at each university and they become more involved because each one is paired to a particular aged person and build a relationship with them. "Participants

how to critically analvse behaviour and care needs, but the most important issue is that it helps change ageist attitudes to the elderly and all aspects of residential aged care."

These students will become part of the future aged care workforce.

'Students help the staff become better informed and freer to carry out their clinical tasks."

She said the residential facility blossomed with energy from the presence of 65-100 visitors, who are not family and develop a one on one relationship with residents.

"Staff in the facility have reported a sense of being more supported in the work place and having more time to devote to the residents' clinical care. They are seeing improvements in resident behavioural and the psychological symptoms of dementia."

"I was not able to take objective measurements performance, but qualitative feedback was that memory improved in some isolated residents. They were asking about the students and taught them things about recent history and their lives.

"One even taught a student how to play a ukulele.

"Many students were keen to keep on visiting after the semester was
