# **Tim Finn navigates Perth premiere**



Tim Finn charts a new course with WA Opera

TIM FINN, who has chartered many courses in his life, has set his compass on Perth for an opera world-premiere, with Captain Cook at its core.

musician. The legendary whose eventful life straddles Australia and New Zealand, with talent that touches many parts of the world, has composed an op era, Star Navigator.

Commissioned by West Australian Opera, New Zealand Opera and Victorian Opera, it is based on the true story of Tupaia, a Tahitian star navigator who sailed with James Cook on the Endeavour.

The opera explores the 1770 meeting of two master mariners each from a vastly different place and culture. As they journey together, the understanding they develop highlights not only their differences but shared terror, love of the sea and the worlds around

Tim told me from his home in New Zealand: "I was on board the Endeavour replica in Sydnev Harbour in the back cabin with its compressed tight space, surrounded by maps and everytning

"It felt like a theatrical setting, suitable for a psychological dra-

The germ of an idea grew into a five-year musical journey involving workshops and collaborations with writers and directors after a chance meeting with West Australian Opera executive director Carolyn Chard who loved Tim's idea and commissioned

"Opera people are always looking for new ways to do things. I've put in melodies and tunes audiences, hopefully, can remember and hum afterwards," he said.

Tim's work highlights the incredible versatility of one of music's most-respected, innovative and successful writers. And as a well-known performer and top record-seller. Tim's music is likely to lure new audiences to the mystical world of opera.

Few branches of music have evaded the Kiwi master's touch. From rock and pop to art rock, vaudeville, swing, punk and glam rock, Tim's talent has endured at the highest level.

Who doesn't recognise Fraction Too Much Friction? Or these: History Never Repeats, Winter Light, Persuasion, Couldn't Be

Done, Astounding Moon, Poor Boy, Six Months in a Leaky Boat and Still The Song.

Tim, 67, also wrote They Won't Let My Girlfriend Talk to Me, a top 10 hit for Australian band Jimmy and the Boys.

In the 1970s, Tim dropped out of university to focus on music and formed Split Enz. His talented brother, Neil, joined later (Neil is currently winding-up a spell with Fleetwood Mac). Formed in NZ, Split Enz moved to Melbourne and the hits poured out.

Tim also steered Crowded House to the top of the charts as well as producing solo performances and albums. And in 1995 he formed the band ALT, with Irishmen Andy White and Liam O Maonlaí (from Hothouse Flowers).

Last month I attended a UWA Policy breakfast covering the topic Better Ageing - What should we be doing and what should we expect the government to do. Panelists included HBF CEO John Van De Wielen, senior lecturer in Geriatric Psychiatry Dr Andrew Ford,

UWA Associate Profes-

sor Christopher Etherton-Beer who is medical codirector at RPH Bentley, the CEO of Brightwater, Jennifer Lawrence and a representative from the Health Department.

A brief introduction was given by Dr Ford some statistics about healthy ageing, but I felt the panel didn't really address the crux of the topic or come up with any structural suggestions on what the government should be doing to encourage better ageing.

It seemed the panel's expertise was centred around aged care and hospital treatment yet only about five per cent of the population go into aged care. The fact is the majority of older people live out their lives doing myriad activities and as we are living longer, policy should be designed so we live better.

My question to the panel was... "Why, when we now have the largest cohort of people aged 60 and over, does the state

government do less than it did 20 years ago?'

From the editor's desk - a reflection and farewell to 2019...

The answer I was given I felt was unsatisfactory with the panelist stating that we have a Minister for Seniors and Ageing. That's all well and good but we used to have a dedicated department for seniors called the Office of Seniors Interests which not only developed policy but also was a landing zone for older people.

As someone who has worked in this field for more than 20 years, I can tell you that the State Government does much less for seniors now.

They fund the Seniors Card Centre, although discounts have been reduced and the age to receive the benefits in-creased. They provide some funding to a few seniors organisations but basically there is very little policy to encourage better ageing or to encourage the over 50s demographic with preventative health messages.

A good example of this

is the Livelighter message is only targeted to people up to the age of 49. Why? WA was once the most forward thinking state in addressing seniors' issues and lead the nation with policy.

This is not just a jibe at the current government, Colin Barnett and his team disbanded much of the infrastructure for seniors. Mark McGowan and his government have certainly not made the demographic a priority, with less than a dozen media statements issued this year through the Minister for Seniors and Ageing.

# Judy Nunn uncovers little known part of Australian history for new book

POPULAR Australian actor turned author, Judy Nunn uncovered a little known piece of Australian Second World War history when she started research for her latest book, Khaki Town, set in Townsville. With a Japanese invasion imminent, 1942 was definitely the most dangerous year in the history of this country, Nunn told Have a Go

"If the Americans had not come to our aid in '42 we would definitely have been invaded by the Japanese," she said.

"With the 70,000 Americans who went through Townsville, it was a garrison city, a hub particularly for aircraft which arrived for battles in the Pacific.

"There was a lot of angst, a lot of racism actually with the white and black African-American soldiers. Segregation was still rife in America and we, of course, had the White Australia Policy. Though the African-American soldiers were welcomed by the people of Townsville, what was extraordinary was our Australian Government following through

on its White Australia Policy, actually saying to US President Franklin D Roosevelt, yes, we desperately want your American troops but only the white ones, not the black ones

Shocking stuff.

"So Roosevelt said if you don't accept the black American soldiers, you don't get any. So the government had to rethink that."

Nunn says the African-American soldiers were certainly welcomed by the Australians (why would they not be), they were there to prevent invasion, but the white American soldiers did not like the fact there was no segregation, no signs saying whites only or blacks only.

"So there was a lot of angst from the white Americans towards their black brothers. And there was the absolute angst by the Australian soldiers that everybody knows towards the American soldiers due to the disparity in pay (oversexed, overpaid and over here).

"So it was a real cauldron of unrest. A riot and mutiny took place and was kept very quiet. It was a case of badly mistreated black American soldiers turning on their white commanding officers with absolute reason.

'That has been kept

secret for 70 years and the aftermath was a young 34-year-old American congressman named Lyndon Baines Johnson being sent out by Franklin D Roosevelt to discover why and how this has happened and to keep it hush hush. A lot went on up there that, because of war censorship, was never allowed to be known and still isn't. I believe it should be taught in schools. We should know more about our history."

Nunn went to Townsville and interviewed people while researching her book. She also researched the net but says this has to be backed up with published works because there is a lot of misinformation.

Khaki Town focuses on March 1942. Singapore has fallen. Darwin has been bombed. Australia is on the brink of being invaded by the Imperial Japanese Forces. And Val Callahan, publican of The Brown's Hotel in Townsville, could not be happier as she contemplates the fortune she's making from lonely, thirsty soldiers.

Overnight the small Queensland city is transformed into the transport hub for 70,000 American and Australian soldiers destined for combat in

the South Pacific, Barbed wire and gun emplacements cover the beaches. Historic buildings have been commandeered. And the dance halls are in full swing with jitterbug and jive. But not everyone is happy as the story reveals.

The author of around 15 books, Perth born Judy Nunn spent many years as a leading stage actress and screenwriter for radio and television. She moved into acting for television in the risqué soap opera The Box. She briefly appeared in Prisoner and after that had a lengthy spell as Dr Irene Fisher in Sons and Daughters and Home and Away from 1988 as Ailsa Stewart. This character was killed off in 2000 after Nunn decided to leave the series to devote more time to writing.

In 2015 she was awarded a Member of the Order of Australia for her service to the performing arts as a scriptwriter and actor of stage and screen, and to literature as an author.

She says it takes about two years to bring out a

"Deciding what to write is the difficult part, I research for several months and then start writing which takes a year. Writing a novel is far different from writing scripts. You are walking a lonelier road writing prose, it also gives you more freedom but you also have to crack your own whip and be your own master.'

Nunn lives on the central NSW coast with husband Bruce Venables who keeps the home fires burning when she is away on book tours. The couple also like to travel and went to Russia this "Perth is my child-

hood home but Sydney and NSW is my home now. I had a terrific book tour to WA recently for Khaki Town with gigs in Kalamunda, Busselton and regional areas. I'm certainly back there every two years for one of

my books. "Í think I am one of the few writers that publishers regularly send to Perth. Many are prevented because of the tyranny of distance and the airlines having us over a barrel... it's disgraceful."

Khaki Town among the top 10 top selling fiction books in Australia for October and Judy Nunn is extremely pleased, already planning next year's book.

PADDLING enthusiast Terry Bolland says that not being able to hit the water each day at the moment isn't that big of

He has plenty of other interests to keep him busy while confined to the land. But those who know Terry will probably find that a little hard to believe. You see, calling him a paddling enthusiast is really understating his passion for being in a canoe or a kayak.

Then he started selling kayaks for a living and the travelling stopped.

His latest trip was with friends, John Breed 67 and Luke Dooley 19. They completed an 1100 km, 33-day kayaking expedition along the west coast of Canada, from Vancouver to Prince Rupert near the border of Alaska.

They paddled up to nine hours a day (30-45 km), carrying 85kgs of gear and food in their 35kg kayaks. Along with physical aspect of the journey, was the daily making of camp and packing up, cooking and keeping an eye on the wildlife; things such as whales, killer whales, eagles and bears.





BY THE time that you are reading this article there may be a new Government in the UK and we will know more about where the UK is going for the next five years.

The UK Labour Party manifesto proposes to unfreeze pensions for expat pensioners. However they are only offering partial uprating - increasing the state pension annually by the triple lock (the higher of 2.5 per cent, wage growth or inflation).

That policy is unfair to those expat pensioners who have been receiving their pension for many years because they are not being paid the amount that they would receive if they were in the

For example, if a per-

son retired in 1995 on a full basic state pension of £58.85 per week their increase in 2020 would be only £3.89 per week. A pensioner who retired this year on a full basic state pension will increase from £125.95 to £134.25 an increase of £8.30.

It is unfair when one pensioner receives an increase of £8.30 and the other only receives £3.89 and these differences will increase over future years.

Prior to April 1977 married women could choose to pay a reduced rate of National Insurance called the Reduced Rate Election. After 1977 they were allowed to continue paying at the same rate in expectation that when they reached State Pension Age, they could claim a pension based on their husband's contributions.

However, since 2016 women who reach State Pension Age receive state pension payments based only on their own National Insurance contributions, then only if they have the minimum of 10 contribution years.

However, there is a special concession for those who paid the reduced rate for at least one year. They are entitled to receive a minimum of £129.20 if they are widowed or divorced or £77.45 if still married under the new State Pension rules. To be eligible you must have been born before 6 April 1961. Women born on the 5 April 1961 will reach State Pension Age on their 67th birthday under the current rules.

This is a very little known concession and could affect many expats as at its peak over 4.4 million women were paying the reduced rate.

If you reached State Pension Age after 5 April 2016 and previously paid the reduced rate, contact the International Pension Centre and ask them to check that you are entitled to receive the additional pension.

UK Expats born before 6 May 1954 reach State Pension Age on or before 6 November 2019. Those born between 6 May 1954 and 5 June 1954 will be eligible to claim their UK State Pensions from 6 January

# Where opinions matter - palliative care emerges from the darkness

PALLIATIVE care has finally emerged from decades of darkness in WA, thanks to the heat generated by the debate on Voluntary Assisted Dying (VAD). And with admirable results.

To venture into a palliative care institution, as I did in suburban Perth,

is understandably sobering. But it is also reassuring that there are humans here caring and capable of confronting and comforting those whose time is ending.

As a spin-off to the VAD legislation, millions more dollars have been directed to palliative care, including needy country centres, starved of medical and connected support.

How little we in the general public have known about this important branch of treatment. Palliative care is provided when the patient has progressive, life limiting or life-threatening disasse.

State health authorities say: "Palliative care

helps people live their life as fully and as comfortably as possible when living with a life-limiting or terminal illness. Palliative care identifies and treats symptoms which may be physical, emotional, spiritual or social."

Our health experts outline palliative care like this:

"The patient has symptoms that require specialist assessment/ management and which are beyond the capacity of the primary care team to manage optimally. The patient and/or their family has psychological, social or spiritual needs that require specialist assessment.

"The patient is dying and the primary care

team requires additional support and/or advice."

Patients who are having life prolonging treatment are not excluded from referral to palliative care.

Triggers for referral include that the referring clinician would not be surprised if the patient died within the next 12 months, recurrent presentations to hospital and for inpatients; where it would not be a surprise if they died this hospital admission.

Other triggers are disease progression despite life prolonging therapy, low probability of success from available therapeutic options and withdrawal, or consideration of withdrawal,

of life prolonging treatment.

While both palliative care and hospice care provide comfort, palliative care can begin at diagnosis and at the same time as treatment. Hospice care begins after treatment of the disease is stopped and when it is clear that the person is not going to survive the illness.

Nedlands Dr Roger Paterson writes: "Terminal sedation (TS) is used in palliative care and has similarities to VAD: compassionate relief of suffering through medication and hastening death."

He argues that the choice of procedures – VAD or TS – should be

up to the patient.

"Palliative care doctors have the right to use terminal sedation but not VAD. It seems unreasonable for those same doctors to oppose the right of patients to VAD if that is their preference."

Professors Arlene Chan and Marion Harris say: "The ability to further lessen the likelihood of severe suffering in the terminally-ill can come about with adequate funding for research and increased personnel so that overwhelming suffering at the end of life can be exceedingly rare.

"We who care for the dying can fulfill our task best with committed governmental support of excellent palliative care."

And that's the nub: Funding for research and increased personnel.

The VAD debate has created much-needed focus and political support for palliative care. It's a spin-off from the main debate but it's also one of the great steps forward in WA's health care history.

Perth's palliative care facilities include home palliative specialist care units and specialist palliative care units at Bethesda Hospital, Glengarry Hospital, Hollywood Private Hospital, St John of God Bunbury Hospital, St John of God Murdoch Community Hospice and Kalamunda Campus of Swan Kalamunda Health Service.







# As the year comes to a close here's some tips if you are planning for retirement

THERE is a lot to consider when retirement is in your sights, so it's never too early to start planning. If you're thinking of applying for the Age Pension, there's a few things to be aware of before you kick-start the process.

First-off, the Age Pension qualifying age is now 66 years. Austra-

lians born between 1 January 1954 and 30 June 1955 are eligible for Age Pension when they turn 66 years of The qualifying age will increase by six months every two years until 1 July 2023 when it reaches 67 years. The qualifying age will next rise to 66.5 years on 1 July 2021.

There's also the income and assets tests, which we use to determine if you're eligible for a part or full rate pension. We'll calculate your payment rate by looking at any income you earn, any deemed income we apply, and assets you own in and outside Australia. Your assets might include real estate, life interests, financial and superannuation investments, income streams and business assets.

While the family home on one title of less than two hectares is exempt under Age Pension, for the purpose of the assets test, we still need to categorise you as either a homeowner or a non-homeowner. For instance, homeowners can have assets worth up to \$263,250 if they're single, or \$394,500 for a couple combined, and non-homeowners can have up to \$473,750 for singles and \$605,000 for couples combined. Anything over these limits will reduce your pension rate and vou will receive a part pension.

If you tick the boxes on the qualifying age and the income and assets test limits, then the last thing to keep in mind is your residency. You need to be an Australian resident for at least 10 years in total to claim an Age Pension, and for five or more of these years, there must be no break in your residence.

You don't need to wait until you turn 66 to lodge a claim for Age Pension. Get a head start and apply as early as 13 weeks before you turn Age Pension age, so that you can start receiving payments immediately you become eligible.

Claiming Age Pension online is the easiest and most convenient way, and around half of Age Pension claims are submitted online. All you

have to do is register for myGov and set up a Centrelink online account. The benefits of going online mean you can save and exit your application as many times as you need, scan or photograph supporting documents to attach to your claim, and check your claim's status. Just make sure to keep an eye out in your myGov inbox for any letters from us, as we may request more information to process your claim.

Of course, for those who just can't quit the working-bug entirely and would like to give a little boost to their retirement funds. There have been some changes to the Work Bonus this year that might benefit

The Work Bonus allows you to earn up to \$300 a fortnight from work without it affecting your payment rate. Any unused Work Bonus accumulates into a bank, known as the Work Bonus balance, which reaches a maximum of \$7,800. If you earn more than \$300 in a fortnight, you can then offset any extra income by dipping into your Work Bonus

The changes to Work Bonus now mean selfemployed pensioners are eligible if they actively participate in their own self-employment, meaning they apply personal effort to earn income. This applies to people who for instance, drive for Uber, have a lawn mowing company or do bookkeeping.

# Connecting with family who have dementia during the festive season

CHRISTMAS seems to come earlier and earlier each year, even though the actual day doesn't change. Fruit mince pies and Christmas decorations have been selling in supermarkets since October, the Alzheimer's WA office has been well and truly decked with holly and we finally have our tree up at home.

Christmas brings with it many emotions for family members. It is meant to be a time for joy and laughter, but for some it is also a time when the stark reality of separation, the loss of a loved one, of loneliness or depression is brought into sharp focus.

It is also a time to visit family members you haven't seen for a long time, perhaps since last Christmas or the Christmas before. You might find yourself noting a change in the way a loved one interacts with

you or others. Perhaps they don't quite seem themselves. They may appear withdrawn, distracted or disinterested in the festivities around them. Perhaps they are having trouble remembering the relationships between family members in the room, or are unable to locate the bathroom despite already being shown. They may make a few unusual comments, or not participate in banter despite previously being the life of the

When you haven't someone for seen months or years it can be confronting to witness a change in them. You may wonder if they are experiencing cognitive decline or symptoms of dementia. Alzheimer's WA always receives a noticeable increase in calls after Christmas, from well-meaning family members concerned about the changes they have observed in a loved

Early signs of dementia can vary from person to person, and depending on the type of dementia - there are more than 150 types - however Alzheimer's disease is the most common form in Australia.

Symptoms of dementia can include short term or recent memory loss, increased forgetfulness or difficulty remembering

things even after being reminded, and difficulty performing known tasks - such as paying a bill, using cutlery at meal times, or making a cup of

For some people, dementia can mean they become disoriented to time and place, have trouble recalling the day or year, or become lost in areas that are familiar to them. Other early signs include errors in judgement, making rash decisions while driving or spending, losing or misplacing items, leaving items in irrational places or forgetting they had an item in the first place.

Changes may include noticeable and frequent mood swings. Apathy towards a previously enjoyed activity, can also indicate cognitive changes.

What should you do if you are worried? In the first instance, you could try talking to the person, or someone who is close to them.

Keep in mind, there are other conditions such as stress or depression which can cause symptoms similar to dementia. Rather than immediately decide the person must have dementia, it is important for these conditions to be first ruled out by a GP.

If it is dementia, a diagnosis from a GP is a positive step towards accessing services and support. While for some people a diagnosis of dementia may come as a shock, for others it will also bring some relief to realise the symptoms they have been experiencing have an explanation.

# Your legal rights versus respecting last wishes: Should I challenge the will of a loved one?

PASSING of a loved one is inevitably a painful process that everyone will experience in their lifetime. After the funeral family members have to consider what they think should have been theirs to receive

from the estate of the deceased. Very often, a will stands in the way.

The testator or testatrix (a person who made the will) will have appointed executor/s to assist with the distribution of their estate in accordance with the directions of the will.

If for unknown reasons, you discover to your dismay that the will has expressly excluded you from the estate or given you much less than you think you ought to receive. Here comes the dilemma, do you honour the deceased's last wishes, or should you seek what's rightfully yours?

There are two types of challenges that a beneficiary may choose to claim their fair share of the estate. If for any reasons you suspect that the will was made under suspicious circumstances or the testator/ix might lack legal capacity when the will was made, you must immediately seek legal

If you have a distinct interest in the estate, your lawyer should file a caveat on probate straightway. The caveat will stop the court from granting probate to the executor and distributing the estate. The will can then be

challenged in court where the judge would make a determination on its validity. In some cases, the Court may find parts of the will invalid and that is when the rule of intestacy will

The second type of challenge happens after probate has been granted, but this type of challenge is only available to a restricted group of people, mainly direct family members. Beneficiaries who missed out on the distribution of the estate or think that they should be entitled to a bigger portion should bring a claim under the

Family Provision Act. There is a time limit to bring such claims, so make sure that you lodge the claim as soon as possible. But note that the court respects the testamentary freedom of the testator/ ix and will only use its power if you fit into one of the relevant eligible categories of applicants and there is a need for you to be provided more.

Court proceedings between family members are generally more emotionally straining compared to when other matters. Many clients come to us for administration estate

but most of them come with an underlying wish to preserve the familial relationship. We understand that it is a tough decision for you to make but we will endeavour to resolve the matter with your best interest at heart whilst saving you an immense amount of time and money.







We adopted plastic wrap and all the new convenient synthetic items as they came along, enamoured by technology.

I also remember the first alarm bells that reached my ears - Rachel Carlson's famous book Silent Spring published in 1962. Her research on the environmental effects of the increasingly indiscriminate use of pesticides helped to inspire an environmental movement that led to the creation of the US **Environmental Protection** Agency.

The book's title referred to silencing the birds, a metaphor for a bleak future for the natural world.

I was so influenced by the alarming news that we were poisoning ecosystems and damaging human health that my 1971 Zoology Honours thesis and my first job focussed on organic pest control.

Something I didn't know until recently was that Rachel Carlson was also a philosopher with an ethic of wonder. She encouraged her readers to consciously cultivate habits of awe, to pay careful attention to the often-overlooked beauties and mysterious rhythms of the natural world. She observed that wonder and humility are wholesome emotions, and they do not exist side by side

with a lust for destruction.

The author died in 1964, leaving a legacy of grass-roots environmentalism. Her warnings seem prophetic now. However her ethic of wonder is something else that lives on in many

As we move into the festive season, too often associated with tinsel, plastic toys and overindulgence, I wish we could gift big doses of this wonder, especially to young people. There is so much to be inspired by when we look outside ourselves and witness nature.

heart sing? Maybe it's the ocean, the stillness of dappled shade under a huge tree, the sun setting in the west lighting the clouds pink. Perhaps your garden brings joy. For me it's the sight of a whale breaching or a splendid fairy wren in all his blue glory.

Five years ago, Better Homes and Gardens was gonged with a record 12th Silver Logie.

The program began on Tuesdays at 7.30pm, back-to-back with The Great Outdoors. Then, in the early 2000s, the travel program was moved to Mondays.

From 2007- 2011, Seven showed BH&G at 7.30pm ahead of Friday Night Football starting at 8.30pm. This was great, except footy fans on the east coast kicked-up because it meant the footy was shown on a one-hour delayed telecast (except in Perth where,

because of the time difference, it was live).

Seven naturally wanted to leave the show in its top-rating timeslot except for large footy matches. But, at the start of the 2012 AFL season, due to the new **AFL Broadcast Rights** deal requiring live footy, BH&G was forced into a new timeslot.

Better Homes now airs in all states on Friday nights at 7pm and has become the highest rating show on Australian TV and the longestrunning Australian TV lifestyle program. Audiences of up to 2 million can't be wrong in knowing what's good for Aussie viewers.

Company blurbs claim Better Homes and Gardens has an audience reach exceeding 4 million (2m TV viewers and 2m magazine readers). Two-and-two do make four but we'd wager that more than a few TV viewers also read the magazine and vice versa.

Whatever, like a good garden, BH&G has grown and blossomed.

# Individuals, businesses and local councils recognised at WA Seniors Awards

CARERS advocate Angela McCluskey and long-term volunteer Rae Endersby were awarded the top honours at the 2019 Western Australian Seniors Awards for their dedicated community service.

Ms McCluskey was named Metropolitan WA Senior of the Year in honour of her work in establishing the popular Forget-me-not café community group that provides a connected and nurturing environment for people living with dementia and their carers.

Finalists for the Metropolitan Senior of the Year included long-term volunteer, Colin Wilson who developed rapport with a terminally ill man who had no close familial relations.

The other finalist was

Patricia Halvorsen who is an active member of the Attitudinal Healing WA volunteer organisation, which advocates for the awareness and inclusion of people living with de-

mentia.
Rae Endersby who took out the Regional WA Senior of the Year award for her 30-plus years of service to the Friends of the Murray Districts

Hospital Group. She has been president for the last 20 years and operates a voluntary patient trolley service at the hospital as well as delivering basic essentials to people experiencing financial hardship or in other difficult circumstances.

Finalists for the Regional Senior of the Year award included Bruce Langoulant AM, who for nearly 30 years, has worked tirelessly towards the eradication of meningitis in Australia and across the world; and in doing so has made a significant contribution to health, community wellbeing and disability advocacy outcomes.

Jacqui Thorpe was the other regional finalist. She has been influential in driving activities for the Independent Living Units at Bethanie Fields for 12 years. Jacqui is a staunch advocate for creating an environment in which older people can contribute and enjoy their lives, regardless of age or ability.

Seniors and Ageing Minister Mick Murray said: "Well done to Angela and Rae and all of the individual finalists. While we know nobody does this sort of work for the recognition, I hope you take a moment to reflect on your years of dedicated service to these worthy causes."

The City of Bayswater earned the WA Age Friendly Local Government award, highlighting a range of successful initiatives that followed the launch of the City's Age Friendly Strategy in 2017. With one in every six residents aged 65 years or above, the City of Bayswater's strategy was designed in consultation with older members of the community, leading to positive outcomes across social, welfare and health indicators.

Finalists for the Local Government Award were Shire of Manjimup for the work of the Manjimup Home and Community Care organisation which operates through the support of the Shire. It provides a range of services to some 400 individuals residing in the Shires of Manjimup and Bridgetown and enables older people to live longer in the comfort and familiarity of their own homes with enhanced quality of life.

The City of Greater Geraldton was the other finalist. Its QEII Seniors and Community Centre serves more than 3,500 residents a month who visit the facility to engage in one or more of the 39 programs available each week. The QEII centre encourages inclusion and activity for seniors. The City, in consultation with the centre's members, has also developed the Senior User-Friendly Business Program (SUB) which provides free training to local businesses on how to provide excellent customer service for the benefit of seniors.

Hawaiian's Melville received the WA Age Friendly Business Award for its innovative service for seniors. It hosts regular morning teas with guest speakers – through its involvement in the Melville Age-Friendly and Accessible Businesses network.

"The City of Bayswater and Hawaiian's Melville are both to be commended for their achievements in proactively creating opportunities for older members of the community to feel included, safe and valued.

"The awards also provide a wider opportunity for the community to reflect on the many and varied contributions older people make to Western Australian life and remind to us all that age does not have to be a barrier," said Mr Murray.

The 2019 WA Seniors Awards were presented by the Council on the Ageing (WA) in partnership with the McGowan Government. The annual awards are celebrated as part of WA Seniors Week, which ran from 10 – 17 November.



AS we head into the festive season, there will be hundreds of timely reminders about our need to drive carefully. There is nothing more power-

ful a reminder than when a couple of WA's finest, pull up beside you, if only to buy a late night coffee. But remind me it did.

The last month or so has seemed busier than usual; testing and talking about some wonderful new cars, the Volkswagen Touareg Launch Edition (pictured) is case in point. Stunning to look at, brilliant to drive; you'd own one in a heartbeat. Starting around \$79,000, will be a joy for years.

will be a joy for years.

Honda Civic (pictured) is back, so very sensible, fun to drive and does everything you want it to

do. Affordable from mid-20's, with 127 kW/220 Nm it's a peppy and engaging motor car that matches comfortably to Honda's continuously variable transmission, supplying performance similar to most of the 2.0-litre engines offered by competitors.

But it was the Nissan Leaf, (pictured) from under \$50,000, that really commanded attention. Plenty has been written about electric vehicles. There are many who argue for and against. However each time I drive an EV, I'm left with an overwhelming sense of satisfaction.

Is it the quiet, which at first is beguiling? Is it (misplaced?) commitment to environmental issues? Or the extraordinary torque and drive experience?

I suspect it's all of the above. If you can overcome range anxiety, (not a real thing), I highly recommend you take one for a test drive, if only to satisfy your curiosity. Nissan will happily oblige.

For those who grew up loving Holden and who didn't? Holden Ar-

cadia is worth checking out. Australian life changed when Holden stopped manufacturing in Australia. Sales are nowhere near where they hoped they would be.

Why have Australians fallen out of love with Holden? Callers often tell me great stories on 6PR about the family Holden Kingswood, the iconic Monaro, the cool looking Torana or Commodore. Will we reconcile and love Holden once again? Maybe Arcadia will be the beginning of something special.

The 2019 Holden Acadia LTZ-V AWD is the climax of a six-Acadia range which starts with the \$43,490 LT two-wheel drive and peaks with the all-wheel drive LTZ-V. (pictured) The first thing you notice is size; it looks amazing, (especially in black).

While it is a large SUV, the Acadia is very much considered a mid-size crossover, nearly 5 m long, 1916 mm wide, and 1767 mm tall, and with a kerb weight of 2032 kg. Those dimensions quickly vanish once you're driving.

Powered by a 3.6-litre petrol V6 thrusting 231 kW and 367 Nm of torque, channelled to all four wheels via a ninespeed auto, the Acadia feels substantial on the road. Gush of acceleration from standstill, always liberal; the big SUV making easy work of overtaking. Step on the accelerator for overtake, and the kick-down is immediate and spontane-

Now, her second book, The Attachment, Letters from a Most Unlikely Friendship, a poignant exchange of letters between herself and Catholic priest Tony Doherty has just been published.

Ailsa answers some questions about

latest walk...

What was the route you took and how long did it take?

"In early September I began walking a section of the Via Francigena, a pilgrim route that runs from Canterbury in England all the way across the Channel and through France and across the mountains into Italy, then runs south to Rome. I think it is about 2300km in all, not sure how far one has to swim.

"I decided to walk the luxe pilgrim route this time, after carrying sins for 1300km in Spain (which

resulted in my book Sinning Across Spain) and walking many other roads in the true pilgrim mode. I wanted to give myself a treat, so I chose a 400km section from Luca in Tuscany down to St Peters."

"The road could not have thrilled me more. Autumn... figs, porcini and truffles. Hill towns, which does imply long uphills at the end of each day, but also means vistas that restore and excite. The utterly unique, timeless and exquisite Tuscan light. The pleasures of a largely untravelled road.

"Yes, it ran through San Gimignano and Siena but it also traversed many small and jewel-like villages that were unknown to me. A place called Radicofani was my favourite, but that may have been the day or the weather. All were populated by welcoming, charming Italians with generous hearts. Well, all but the big bustling tourist centres, where one can't expect them to do more than give you a

cursory hello. "But even in these places, somehow generosity prevailed. I also walked across the border into Lazio, of which Rome is the capital - and the difference in landscape. architecture and people was immediately evident. Equally entrancing but so different; kind of grittier I suppose. It was a dream walk, temperatures in the high 20s, only two days of rain in three weeks, and long stretches of glorious solitude broken with the sing-song chatter of Ital-

How different was it from other walks you have

done overseas? "This time I was a walker and not a pilgrim. I didn't stay in refuges or pilgrim accommodation, and I did book ahead, just small B&Bs and hotels, the room above a pizza shop, a convent, a couple of farm-stays.

"I always had a room to myself, which is not usually the case when walking pilgrim-style. So I didn't have to carry a sleeping bag or towel, luxury! I also made myself stick to an average distance of 20 km, which is very low for me. I get into a rhythm when walking and find myself burning up the roads in a euphoric state - if you've read my book, you will know how that manifests! But this time I wanted to be slow, sit in villages and savour to take in the landscape at leisure. After all, this is the home of the slow food movement.

"It proved to be a brilliant decision, but if I had not pre-booked my accommodation, I know I would have raced through because I was utterly happy the whole time, so I would have walked on and on...

"As it was, I had time for indulging in fresh peaches, sampling gelato, savouring Camparis, discussing the way a pasta sauce had been made, watching olives being picked, and generally dreaming in Italian.

What experiences did you have, did anyone accompany you?

"I walk alone, I always do, that way I meet the locals. I speak reasonable Italian, French and Spanish, and so I am able to have chats at slow speed. Everything needs to be slow. My preference is to talk to the people who live in a place, rather than visitors like me. But I did intersect on several occasions with a mother and daughter from Canada, and we managed to share some memorable meals and a lot of laughs over Aperol Spritzes. I also met a fellow Sydneysider, but we only saw each other twice. He had walked from the Italian border and has convinced me that I must go back and stride through the northern section. I didn't take much convincing.

"We have already had a walk together in Sydney and I'm sure there will be some more. But for the long walks, I always go alone. There is something deeply restorative for me when I set out with just my 10kg of possessions, that includes 2kg of water and a road in front of me, and not another person in sight. That looks like freedom to me."

What appeals to you about these walks, does it make you a better and more fulfilled person?

"I think I am at my best when I'm on the road. Along with possessions, think I put down many of the aspects of myself that plague me - my punishing self-assessments; my drive to be better, my crazy ideas about responsibility. On the road I am quieter, the voices are kinder in my head, and less demanding.

"I need so little, a road, some food, a place to do hand-washing and to sleep. It's a salutary reminder of what matters. Of course, I know that those I love are waiting at home, and watching Instagram, of course. That is how I reassure people that I'm safe, I post far too many images.

"But mostly yes... I'm definitely an easier person when I'm walking, whether at home in Australia or away.'

What plans for walks do you have in 2020 and beyond?

"I don't make plans, but I have high hopes. I'd like to do some more of the Via Francigena. And I have heard of some lovely roads in Slovenia too. But for now, I'm walking Sydney and not just the harbour. There is a path called the Great Bush Walk, and last Sunday I tramped the surprisingly beautiful all-bush section of 18km from Parramatta to Blacktown. Highly recommended and a peek for Have a Go read-

"On 8 December, the new Bondi to Manly walk opened, 80km around the harbour, taking in two great beaches, the Opera House and the Bridge. I predict this will become one of the great walks of the world, as iconic as Cinqueterre. It is the brainchild of another WA expat, the former Senator John Faulkner, another great and obsessed walker.

"I live along part of the route, so I am sure to be checking it out over summer. Mainly I just like to keep walking when I can. People will recognise me by my hiking poles, I can never leave home without







# A chirpy tourist magnet for the south west... WA's unique and colourful native birds

BIRDS are taking-off as a major tourist magnet to WA's south west.

Those of us who live down south know we blessed with a variety of unique and colourful birds. They are widely appreciated by naturelovers and photographers across the world.

Peter Taylor who operates Birding Tours South West based in Maniimup says 90 per cent of his clients are from Britain and

the US. Just the remaining 10 per cent come from WA and interstate.

Bird-watching is also an activity attracting more from the older generation. I have hand-picked five of the best endemic birds I caught on camera to show them to Have a Go News readers.

Almost 550 species of birds have been recorded in WA of which 15 are endemic to the south west. Birds special to the region Carnaby's Black-Baudin's Cockatoo, Black-Cockatoo, Western Corella, Western Rosella, Red-capped Parrot, Noisy

Scrub-bird, Red-winged Fairy-wren, Western Bristlebird, Western Thornbill, Western Wattlebird, Western Spinebill, Whitebreasted Robin, Western Ground Parrot and Redeared Firetail.

Bird watching in Australia is nowhere near as popular as in Europe and America but more local followers and twitchers (those that record their bird sightings) are learning how best to see and snap our brilliant birds.

Clearly, it pays just to sit and listen. To stand is to present a more solid. scary body shape when birds are inherently afraid of humans.

Surprisingly, it's often possible to talk without disturbing birds in the bush. But movement is far more likely to scare them. Loud and sharp noises obviously are best avoided.

Move slowly to get comfortable and with patience you might surprise vourself with how close you can get.

Small bush birds are mostly insectivorous and tend to move in small flocks through the leaves of trees and bushes.

Magpies and Mudlarks feed on insects on the ground, as do seed-eaters like Bronzewing and Crested Pigeons, doves and parrots. Honeyeaters, including wattlebirds and Spinebills, feed on insects as well as nectar and are often found in flowering trees and bushes.

Rainbow Bee-eaters, Wood-Swallows, Martins and Swallows are insect hunters, taking their prey on the wing.

Up to five species of birds may travel together as though they are one flock. It provides them with security. Because they tend to travel within their territory in one general direction, you can position yourself in front of them and watch them come to you.

Because many birds are curious, they may approach you or observe you from a distance. But most are preoccupied searching for food and if you aren't seen as a threat, they will ignore

Bird Guides and information are available from Birdlife WA's website [www.birdlife.org.au] and on Facebook.

If you're lucky, patient and know what you're looking for, you might hit the jackpot and come across, perhaps photograph, some of WA's sought-after species.

More than 200 species of birds can be found in the Albany region. Rare and endangered species include the Western Ground Parrot. Threatened birds include the Hooded Plover, Carnaby's and Baudin's Black-Cockatoo. Endemic birds include the Western Rosella, Red-capped Parrot, Western Spinebill, Red-eared Firetail, Redwinged Fairy-wren and White-breasted Robin.

Around Two People's Bay and Cheynes Beach endangered Western Whipbird, Noisy Scrubbird and Western Bristlebird live, but are hard to see. Others are the Southern Emu Wren, Red-eared Firetail Finch, White- breasted Robins and Western Spinebills.

In Bunbury, Big Swamp hosts many water and bush birds with Bunbury Wildlife Park just across the road. Leschenault Estuary has migratory waders, Osprey and bush birds. Near Mandurah is the Samphire Cove Nature Reserve and the Creery Wetlands Nature Reserve, nesting place for the vulnerable Fairy Tern.

Inshore from Creery Island can be found Bartailed Godwit, Great Knot, Eastern Curlew, Banded Stilt and Pacific Golden Plover. You might strike Yellow-billed Spoonbill and Australian White Ibis plus Black Ducks and

Grey Teal. For those who want an easier way to see our birds, there's Eagles Heritage Margaret River, for rehabilitating injured birds of prey including owls, Bunbury Wildlife Park with walk-through aviaries containing native and introduced birds and Leschenault Estuary with its migratory waders, raptors, nesting Osprey and

Meanwhile, watch for birdlife in your own backvard. But don't feed them. Best ways to attract birds to your garden is by planting flowering shrubs and installing birdbaths.

Then await their arrival. camera at the ready. Many areat award-winning bird photos have been snapped in photographers' own backyards.





# London Calling - 60 year old trapeze artist to star in London Festival

LEE Carter spent most of her life working as a photographer. She photographer. started teaching yoga at 40 but it wasn't until nearly 50-years-old that there was a new calling for the late bloomer, Carter was to become a circus performer. Fast forward 11 years and the sexagenarian stars in *This* Time, a show produced by Ockham's Razor and headlining the London International Mime Festival (LIMF), all thanks to a mysterious set of events that Carter says will be

revealed if we catch the

"At 49 I had a life changing experience that I talk about during the performance so I won't mention it here. That moment ultimately led me to doing a weeklong Le coq based physical theatre workshop," she said.

It was an experience that inspired Carter so much she joined a two year full time course at LISPA (London International School of Performing Arts).

Ockham's Razor's latest show includes a wide range of performers spread across the demographics from 13 - 60, breaking out of the narrowing pool of similar bodies and similar ages that populate contemporary circus. The conventional view on what a circus artist should be and indeed what age that person should be is something that Carter was

defiant of when deciding to pursue a career in the performing arts.

"Despite the reservations of friends and the enormous age gap between me and my fellow students I had a fantastic time and knew I had found something that I wanted to pursue. I was lucky enough to find a niche for the older performer and joined Maresa Von Stockert's company Tilted for four years and from that I got to audition for Ockham's Razor.

For 2020, the 44th year of London's annual festival of contemporary visual performance, LIMF co-commissioned has This Time with aerial theatre company Ockham's Razor and with its broad church of ages the show can boast a truly diverse cast, a cast that weaves a story together with a 360° rotating frame, spinning harness cradle and a cloud/trapeze hybrid. Cutting edge circus apparatus sees characters in doubles, triples and quadruple trapeze folding into one another as they fly through the air on the pieces designed by the company's creative directors Charlotte Mooney and Alex Harvey.

"There are a series of aerial frames which are raised from floor to ceiling, they look like mirrors and doorways; we lift, push and cradle each other around and through these thresholds. It features partner acrobatics... and swinging cradle. These highly physical scenes are intercut with honest stories from our lives," says Mooney.

Opening the festival at the Shoreditch Town Hall the production focuses on the human condition combining physical theatre, acrobatics and original takes on the traditional trapeze and cradle in what the company describes as a show about time, age and the stories we tell ourselves, the reason, Mooney says, why the cast is so diverse.

"In traditional circus it was common to have whole families performing in shows, so you would see the full range of human experience and possibility, toddlers and grandparents included. One of the losses of contemporary circus is that as the training has become professionalised range of performers has narrowed and the vast majority of shows feature similar bodies and similar

Being among the 10 overseas companies, eight British groups and multiple workshops at the London LIMF lineup, Lee says that it's a privilege to be working with Ockham's Razor.

"I feel extremely fortunate that I have been given these opportunities and to be doing things I would never have dreamed of in mv 30s.'

This Time can be seen

at the London International Mime Festival from Wednesday 8 to Sunday 19 January 2020. It is a show that truly embraces the Have a Go News ethos of healthy ageing through activity and its sense of adventure and exploration.

But I think Lee Carter, at 60 years old, starring in a show with one of the most cutting edge theatre companies working today says it best:

"Follow your heart, be inspired by your fears. It's never too late to create new neurological pathways or get new muscles.

You and your body are capable of much more than your mind allows you to imagine. Feeling scared, swinging around and hanging upside down is just like being 12 again, it's great!"



# Searching for the best spots to catch one of the burgeoning local yellowtail kingfish

AT a time when many of

our popular fish stocks are said to be in decline, there is one that seems to just get stronger each year, especially in metropolitan waters. I'm talking about yellowtail kingfish, a sleek, handsome pelagic species that is highly regarded around the world for both its brutal fighting ability and its quality on the plate. In Japan, the yellowtail king aquaculture scene is huge, driven to some extent by the locals' love of the fish as sashimi.

Only 30 years or so ago we didn't hear much about these great fish, although I suspect many of those that were caught were identified as samson fish and left at

that. The king is a sleeker fish than the samson, its head is less blunt and its colour generally more silvery with, as the name suggests, a yellowish tail. While it is found in WA waters in sizes up to 40kg or more, most kings we see are in the 2 to 4kg range, with a few up around 10kg and patches of better ones to 40kg at spots such as Shark Bay's South Passage.

The most prolific local yellowtail king spots near Perth are around Rottnest and the best places to find them are in reefy areas, sometimes in water as shallow as 5 m. Trolling medium sized minnow lures like the Laser Pro 120 or 160 along the south side of the island can put you in touch with schools of smaller fish in the 1 to 3 kg range, and berleying up outside the trolling-only zone at West End can be productive for bigger fish.

Jigging for kings was part of the sport fishing revolution on the east coast way back in the 1970s, but we have never really had the concentrations of fish for kingjigging to take off here. Samson jigging was a whole different story and

was a boom sport out behind Rotto just a few short years ago, before the sharks spoiled the party.

Once hooked, a king

will put on a display of power that can belie its modest size. Anyone who has hooked a samson in shallow water will have idea of what that's like, but the king has the added attribute of fighting dirty, often heading straight for caves and rock ledges once hooked. Once they decide to sulk in such country the fight is as good as over. They will occasionally swim back out into

open water, but don't count on it.

Good quality 8kg spinning tackle is about right for tackling kings of modest size, but even then you probably won't land as many as you lose.

When it comes to cooking yellowtail king-fish, I like to cut the flesh into relatively thin fillets of less than 1cm thick, roll them in breadcrumbs and shallow fry them in good quality oil. Don't overdo it though, just a minute or so each side should be enough. Serve with a squeeze of lemon and get ready for the compliments.

# Glaze your own ham for the Christmas table

#### Ingredients

- 1 good ham (cooked)
- 1 cup honey
- 1 cup brown sugar • 100ml fruit juice (your
- choice)
- 50ml Port or Liquer Glazed cherries
- Pineapple slices
- Cloves Method

You will need one small sharp knife and a pastry brush. Cut out a kings pointy crown in the skin ½ cm deep around the shank. Remove the rest of the skin by putting your thumb between the skin and the fat at the end of the ham opposite to

the shank. Moving your thumb side to side releases the skin from the fat, eventually you can get fingers in and then the hand until you can peel off all the skin you don't want on.

If this is difficult, pour boiling kettle water over the skin you wish to re-move (do this safely in your clean sink). This will help the skin come away easier. This skin makes great crackle. Bake it at 250°C for 30 to 40 minutes till it bubbles into crackle, yum!

Now back to the ham; cut some criss cross lines 1 cm deep into the fat to create diamond squares or any geometric shapes

remember from school.

Place the ham on a tray in a hot oven at 225°C and with a pastry brush paint the fat with your glaze every 10 minutes for 30 minutes to an hour until it is golden brown. If the skin around the shank starts to burn or curl cover it with alfoil to protect it.

After you have a nice brown fat ham decorate it with slices of pineapple cut thin and glazed cherries cut in half and speared into the ham with cloves. Now one last timeput it in the oven with one last paint of glaze over all the fruit.

Serve hot immediately or cool quickly in your second drinks fridge if you've got one, so that it can keep for a week. Cooling a hot ham in the fridge warms all the other foods in your fridge, which is not a good idea. The ham will have lost some of its moisture and have a more intense flavour with a yummy sweet

### What's fresh and best in the market place



MANGOES: Now is the time to indulge your taste for the tropics, with the Ord River mango season in full flight. Most people will wish for no more than to slice each 'cheek' from the flat stone, cut a diamond pattern in the flesh and flex the mango half to turn the sweet flesh outwards. Eat as is, or slice the dices away from the skin to add to salads; mango, avocado, coriander and a squeeze of lime juice are a particularly good combination.

Cherries: Can any other fruit be as perfect for summer celebrations as fresh WA grown cherries? These ruby-hued and snow white wonders are deliciously sweet and plump and make an ideal centrepiece for a Christmas table. No need to serve dessert, just start nibbling. Cherries should be stored in the vegetable crisper in a clean, plastic bag with the air removed. Better still, to avoid bruising or bumping, store in an airtight container and use within three to four days.

Herbs: Herbs make the feast at Christmas. There aren't many dishes that don't benefit from a sprinkling of green zinginess - be it basil, coriander, chives, or my perennial favourite, dill, which pairs exceptionally well with summer seafood. Experiment with the under-utilised flavours of Thai basil, marjoram, sage (great for stuffing your turkey or chook) and chervil. You could really go all out and pot some fresh herbs as a beautiful, living present - wrap with a big red bow and deliver with the promise that you'll get to sample the end results.

Stringless beans: Beans are a good choice for summer menus as they are equally good hot or at room temperature. They go exceptionally well with Mediterranean flavours; toss beans with olives, feta cheese and slow-roasted tomatoes, finishing with a drizzle of extra virgin olive oil for a colourfully appropriate platter to take along to a Christmas barbecue.

Valencia oranges: A great way to give your day a glowing start is with a glass of freshly squeezed orange juice also an excellent way to detox, post Christmas festivities. All citrus fruits give a more generous yield of juice if they are at room temperature when squeezed - rolling them firmly with the palm of your hand also helps. Valencia oranges are ideal if you like your juice chilled as the juice keeps well in the fridge, ready for that morning burst of energy and vitamin C!

# It's a short and sweet season to enjoy some cherry cheer for summer fun

WA CHERRY season is here and this year's crop is looking extra irresistible, given it's likely to be short and sweet. Sunny spring days have sweetened the fruit which promises to be of good size, however a spring storm caused a little disruption to some orchards.

Locally grown cherries have a very short season so it's time to enjoy this season's locally grown cherries through the holiday season. These cheerful morsels of colour are a true celebration of fresh summer flavours and perfect for sharing among friends and at family gatherings.

Cherries are best enjoyed fresh from the stem, so choose cherries with fresh green stems and firm, plump and bright-looking fruit. Cherries are only picked if they are mature, so any you buy will be sweet and juicy. Most cherries are red although the white varieties make a stunning appearance at holiday fun

If you do buy ahead, cherries should be stored correctly to get the best flavour and texture. Keep in the crisper drawer in the fridge in a clean, plastic bag, keeping the end loose. This allows air to circulate and slows deterioration. Cherries can be stored for up to a week in this way. Wash just before use and gently pat dry with a clean towel.

Glossy red cherries have a special appeal at any summer festive occasion and even a handful or two can provide a touch of luxury. A bowl of perfect cherries as a table centre-piece during a meal is indeed a treat for the senses. Use cherries as

decoration on desserts like pavlova and chocolate cakes, arrange over the top of fruit salad or simply use a tiny bunch at each place setting at the table.


The 2019 cherry season will officially launch at Market City, Canning Vale on Friday 13 December with the annual Charity Cherry Auction. More than \$1.25 million has been raised for the Perth Children's Hospital in the 25 years since the auctions began in 1992.

Cherries flourish in the coldest areas of the state as they need 1100 hours of temperatures below 7°C followed by a mild spring. This limits the locations in WA that are able to grow cherries to the south west the State - extending from the hills area around Dwellingup, Donnybrook, Manjimup and through to

# Lamb and cherry tagine

# **Quinoa cherry salad**

A SUPER easy salad - perfect for festive or summer entertaining

1 cup uncooked quinoa, rinsed

2 cups vegetable stock

1 medium cucumber, diced ½ cup spring onions, thinly sliced 1 cup fresh cherries, pitted and halved

1/3 cup sliced almonds 1/3 cup chopped fresh basil

¼ cup olive oil

- 11/2 tablespoons apple cider vinegar
- 1 tablespoon pure maple syrup
- 1 teaspoon orange zest
- 1 small clove garlic, minced salt and pepper to taste For the salad:

ADD the quinoa and stock to a medium saucepan. Bring the mixture to a boil. Give it a stir, cover, then reduce the heat to low and let simmer for about 15 minutes, until the liquid is absorbed. Turn off the heat and let the pan sit covered for 5 minutes, then fluff the quinoa with a fork. Transfer the quinoa to a large bowl. then allow it to cool for about 10 to 15 minutes.

Once cooled, add the cucumber, spring onions, cherries, almonds and basil to the bowl. Toss to com-

For the dressing:

Whisk together all the ingredients for the dressing in a small bowl. Pour into the bowl with the quinoa and toss to combine. Taste and season with salt and pepper as needed. Serve.

# **Cherry chia pudding**

Preparation: 10 mins; chilling: 4 hours or overnight; serves: 2



½ cup chia seeds 2 teaspoons honey 2 cups unsweetened almond milk 2 cups cherries, pitted ½ cup Greek yogurt

MIX chia seeds, honey and almond milk in a medium bowl. Cover and chill in the fridge for 4 hours, or even better, overnight. Blend half the cherries with a drop of water until you have a thick sauce. Pour the chia mix into two jars, top with fresh cherries, yogurt and cherry sauce over top.

Add toppings of your choice. Try toasted coconut flakes or granola. Store leftovers in an airtight container in the fridge for up to five days.

THE classic excuse for drinking Champagne no matter what, comes from Napoleon Bonaparte, who is reported to have said: "In victory, you deserve Champagne; in defeat, you need it.

And Christmas of course. Here are a few very drinkable sparkling wines mostly from Australia.

Chardonnay Faber Blanc de Blanc 2016 from the Swan Valley is pale straw in colour, with very fine bubbles and aromas of toast and lemon rind. It is fresh and crisp on the palate with melon flavours, and a complex range of secondary characters. The finish is long with a bite of green apple acidity. RRP \$27.50.

Howard Park Petit Jeté Brut is pale gold in colour with aromas of citrus zest, peach, and freshly baked macaroons. The palate captures flavours of citrus, red berries and baked apple. Time on yeast lees has added creamy lemon curd and subtle wafer biscuit layers of flavour and texture. This wine is full of flavour balanced by a gently lingering acidity. Jeté is a ballet movement requiring dedication – just like making sparkling wines the traditional way. RRP \$32.

Umamu 2012 Sparkling Chardonnay is a clear vibrant pale straw colour with distinctive beads, following four years aging on yeast lees. The aromas are dominated by citrus and the palate is fresh, elegant and refined. This is a drier crisp style of wine with good length. RRP \$42.

Flying Fish Cove Pinot Noir Chardonnay is pale straw with delicate aromas of strawberry, citrus blossom and toasted brioche. The palate shows rich almond meal and fresh citrus flavours. The small, abundant bead provides a generous and

# Volunteers wanted for important new heart study...

IRREGULAR heartbeat (atrial fibrillation or AF) affects around five per cent of people at 65 and is even more prevalent in older people. In atrial fibrillation the heart does not pump blood round the body as well as it should

If not treated, it increases the risk of stroke by about five times compared with other risk factors such as coronary artery disease, high blood pressure, and heart failure.

Often it has no obvious symptoms and can go undetected for years. Detecting and treating abnormal heart rhythm is a key strategy in preventing stroke.

This year researchers are seeking to recruit 1000 participants over 55 for a new trial called the Pacific Study run by the Centre of Clinical Research and Education (CCRE), School of Public Health, Curtin Univer-

Dr Jacquita Affandi, research

fellow at the Curtin School of Public Health says: "The expected outcome of this study is to identify the prevalence and the incidence of undetected atrial fibrillation in the WA community.

"We are planning to roll out this study across Australia, with the help of future funding. It will help to raise awareness and the importance of screening for atrial fibrillation in older people in order to prevent future cardiovascular events.

Each volunteer will make two visits to the clinic and fill in an annual questionnaire for five

"At the first visit we will measure your blood pressure, height and weight, waist and hip measurement, heart rate and rhythm. We will also ask you a number of questions about your lifestyle habits, medical history, memory or thinking test medications you have taken over the past year and your daily activities.

"You will be asked to donate

blood and urine samples. We will measure your blood cholesterols, blood sugar levels, and the presence of protein in your urine.

'The remaining samples will be kept for to measure important substances called biomarkers, which are released into the blood when the heart is damaged or stressed. Your samples will be destroyed once we have finished analysing the results.

"We will check your heart rhythm by two methods: standard electrocardiograph (ECG) and a small mobile device (iECG) about the size and weight of a credit card, which will record 30 seconds of your heart rhythm, twice daily, over two weeks.

"On your second visit, two weeks later, return the iEGC and we will carry out ultrasound tests of your carotid artery for plaque.'

Dr Affandi said some participants may experience health benefits from the early detection of an abnormal heart rhythm or elevated cardiovascular risk factors.

"We will provide you with the results of your assessments to your doctor.'

The Heart Foundation says most people with atrial fibrillation will need to take medicine to prevent blood clots from forming. In addition, treatments may be needed to prevent the heart from beating too fast or to restore and maintain a normal heart rhythm.

In some people, such as those with infrequent AF longterm medicine may be all that is required.

In people with chronic AF, cardioversion techniques may be used to restore a normal heart rhythm. If these approaches can't be used or are unsuccessful, ablation procedures may be considered.



### Pedal power for Rockingham seniors to feel the wind in their hair

PEDAL power has arrived at Baptistcare Gracehaven Residential Care in Rockingham, much to the delight of 93-year-old resident Annie Jones.

Mrs Jones was one of the first to put her hand up for a ride on the special Cycling Without Age (CWA) trishaw now visiting Baptistcare Gracehaven on Wednesday afternoons.

The trishaw visits are part of a two-year Baptistcare-sponsored program that has helped make CWA available to the Rockingham community.

"I loved it!", Mrs Jones said. "It was nice to feel the wind in my hair. I'll definitely have another turn next week, but I'll be asking if we can

Like many of the residents who have enjoyed a spin around the neighbouring park with their own CWA pilot, Mrs Jones says the experience brings back happy memories of cycling as a

For others it's a chance to ask questions about the mechanics of the bike, chat to dogwalkers out by the lake, wave back at children in the playground or simply laugh out loud while sounding the old-school horn.

Tim McGrath, CWA treasurer and a volunteer trishaw pilot, said passengers enjoyed being the centre of attention as the three-wheeled bike took them out into their local community.

'There's a phenomenon that happens; one we call the royal wave," Mr McGrath said. "It seems being out on the bike prompts an unconscious desire to wave at people.

'The little kids in the playground wave back as the seniors go past on the bike. It's wonderful to see such a nice interaction."

An international movement represented in 42 countries, CWA believes nothing beats seeing the smiles of elderly passengers coming back from their first ride with the wind in their hair, rosy cheeks and lots of stories.

"But it's not just about the bike ride," Mr Mc-Grath said. "It's also about bringing people who

are not normally visible, out into the community. "It's one of the things that drives us as CWA

volunteers. Our passengers enjoy being out in the community, but also the community gets to see them.

"Because it's such a fun thing, people are seeing seniors in a positive context.

"There's always lots of smiles and waves. Very often we'll stop the bike because people want to chat to our passengers," Mr McGrath

Kim Jordan, lifestyle coordinator at Baptistcare Gracehaven, said the CWA rides were proving a popular addition to the weekly line-up of activities, with a growing list of trishaw fans among the residents.

They love to get out on a bike - something they thought they would never do again - and they also get a change of environment," Mrs Jordan said.

"They're out enjoying the fresh air, following the cycle trails around the park. These are the little things that many of us take for granted, but that mean so much to our residents.

One of the residents has made a block booking for a 15-minute ride every week with his wife. "He doesn't chat much, but his wife says that

on the bike he doesn't stop talking," Mrs Jordan

Another resident is taking secateurs on her next ride because she wants to stop to pick a flower and another wants to bring her grandchildren with her on the trishaw.

Baptistcare Gracehaven staff are always available to help residents get on and off the bike, making sure the trishaw adventures can be enjoyed by as many Baptistcare Gracehaven residents as possible.

# Volunteers wanted for end of life companion project

AN INITIATIVE to reduce the number of older people in residential aged care who die alone has been launched in Perth.

Amana Living has created the No One Dies Alone Companion (NO-DAC) project which will see the organisation recruit 12 volunteers for a pilot. The project will start at Lady McCusker Home in Duncraig where around 10 per cent of residents died alone or with little family support in the last six months

The NODAC volunteers will be part of a team whose role will include being present with the resident at the end of their life, having conversations, holding their hand, reading aloud from favourite books, and providing a calming environment through music and lighting.

A vigil will start when the resident becomes terminal and each volunteer will take part in a four-hour vigil shift until the resident passes away.

The project is based on a similar approach used in hospitals and hospices. It is modelled on the successful No One Dies Alone (NODA) program at the Assisi Hospice in Singapore. and draws on the experience of the hospice unit at Busselton Health Cam-

Buckland, Stephanie CEO of Amana Living, said: "We look after the physical, mental, emotional and spiritual wellbeing of our residents from the moment they join us to the time they leave. This involves providing critical support and comfort to them as they reach the end of their life.

"Sadly, some of our residents don't have relatives or friends who can spend time with them in their final days. They might be estranged from their family or have outlived them, or the family doesn't live nearby. The No One Dies Alone Companion volunteers will provide compassionate support and human connection to our residents in their last moments on Earth."

Recruitment for the NO-DAC volunteers has begun. Training will commence in February 2020 with volunteers starting in their role at the end of March / early

The project will identify residents at Lady Mc-Cusker Home who want to participate in the project through conversations with them about their end of life wishes. Ideally this will happen when residents first move into the care centre to allow time for the companions to form a relationship and bond with the residents.

Volunteers who sign-up to the NODAC project will be supported by a dedicated Amana Living NO-DAC coordinator, Volunteer Services coordinator, and the Chaplaincy Service team. Volunteers will also be part of the Employee Program, Assistance

which includes access to confidential counselling.

# Hydrangea heaven brings Christmas cheer to the garden this festive season

CHRISTMAS is just around the corner and it just wouldn't be the same without the iconic hydrangea displayed throughout all the shops, garden centres and nurseries. Their large brightly coloured flowers adorning lush green leaves can quite easily become an impulse buy.

Hydrangeas have a old-fashioned delicate charm and grace that makes them ideal for both formal and cottage style planting, mixed borders with roses and

other perennials or under planted with spring and summer flowering bulbs. They also make perfect potted plants for some seasonal colour on the patio or inside the home for a short period of time.

There are around 100 species within the Hydrangea genus, comprising both deciduous and evergreen, shrubs, climbers and even some small trees. There are some newer compact varieties growing from around 45 cm up to the evergreen climber Hydrangea serratifolia from Chile that reaches around 10 metres tall. Most varieties tend to grow between one and two metres tall.

The Latin name hydrangea comes from the Greek hydor meaning water and angos meaning jar, as the fruit is shaped like a cup. Hydrangeas are native to the temperate areas of Eastern Asia including Korea, China and Japan as well as North and South America.

Most species have large oval leaves with serrated margins, which may take on rich yellow, bronze or red tones before falling in Autumn. They are found naturally growing in full sun to partially shaded areas. In warmer temperate areas like Australia they prefer partially shaded to full shaded areas with morning sun only, such as on the southern side of the house or underneath deciduous trees, otherwise the large leaves and flowers will tend to scorch.

The flowers comprise two different types: The fertile flowers which are small and insignificant apart from their colour and the sterile flowers or ray florets, with three to five showy coloured petals usually 2-3cm across. In most species of hydrangeas, the flowerhead is a panicle of flat fertile flowers surrounded by a few sterile flowers or ray florets similar to those in the 'lacecap' types of hydrangea.

The 'mop-top', 'mop headed', 'hortensia' (H.macrophylla cultivars only) have domed flowerheads composed of mainly or entirely sterile ray florets. H. paniculata, H. serratifolia and H. quercifolia have conical shaped flowerheads

composed of entirely fertile flowers or either sterile flowers, with some a mixture of the two different types.

#### Pink or Blue Flowers?

Most hydrangeas flower in late spring and early summer in Australia, usually in shades of white, blue, pink, purple and red. The flower colour of most hydrangeas will change according to the pH (acidity or alkalinity) of the soil or growing medium. A pH of 7.0 is neutral, below 7 is classed as acidic and above 7 is alkaline.

Hydrangeas grown in a pH of between 6.0 and 7.0 and above will turn varying shades of pale mauve or purple, pink and red. Most will go darker towards the pinks and reds as the pH increases above 7.0 towards 8.0. The addition of garden lime (calcium

carbonate) or a 'pinking liquid' applied to the soil in spring will turn the flowers pink.

For deep blue hydrangea flowers, the soil needs to be quite acid with a soil pH between 4.5 and 5.5. Alternatively, apply a blueing tonic containing aluminium sulphate to turn your pink flowers blue. It should be applied monthly after winter pruning between August and November, remembering to always follow the directions on the pack.

I always recommend using a pH testing kit, so that you can test your soil and potting mix prior to applying any additive and also periodically to see how it has changed. The white varieties of hydrangea tend not change colour or be affected by the pH of the soil or potting mix.

#### Taking care of Hydrangeas

Hydrangeas require a free draining but moist water retentive soil, with plenty of added organic matter. Work Bentonite clay in prior to planting to get the best results.

Plants can be potted up in spring or after flowering. A pot with a diameter of around 45-60cm works best. Always use a premium potting mix with added coir and water holding crystals such as Osmocote Professional Premium Plus Potting Mix for Hydrangeas. Keep them well watered daily during the summer months. You can place a saucer underneath potted plants to act as a water reservoir, this also helps to increase the humidity around them, reducing water loss. You may also apply an anti-transpirant to the leaves like Yates Droughtshield in warmer areas.

Feed hydrangeas in early spring with a controlled release fertiliser such as Osmocote or Powerfeed with Troforte and then liquid feed in October and November with a liquid fertiliser high in potassium.

The flowers on hydrangeas can be removed after flowering or left until the main annual pruning in late winter around August. Remove any dead, diseased or weak growth to the lowest bud. All other current seasons growth should be cut back to two or three plump buds above the ground to ensure large flowers.

For a larger shrub with more but smaller flowers remove around half to two thirds ot the stems in late winter. Many new compact hydrangea cultivars require less pruning and are naturally more compact. Climbing hydrangeas require minimal pruning and are commonly grown in cooler temperate areas.

Hydrangeas can be propagated quite easily from softwood cuttings in spring and early summer or hardwood cuttings during winter.

My favourite hydrangeas include the Tea Time range (various colours), Endless Summer range (various colours), 'Soeur Therese' (white moptop), and the delicate 'lacecap'

# Australian churches unite to help millions fleeing conflict with Christmas Bowl appeal



THIRTEEN hundred churches spanning 15 denominations across Australia have come together to stand-up to injustice and respond to the urgent needs of

men, women and children who are fleeing conflict and disaster worldwide in an initiative that runs from until 28 December 2019.

"It is heart-warming

to see that in an age of increasing division, churches in Australia from a wide range of faiths and traditions have pledged to take action together in order to provide life-giving support to people in urgent need around the world," said Hannah Montgomery, Act for Peace, the International aid agency of the National Council of Churches in Australia.

The pledge has been made to support the 70th anniversary of the annual Christmas Bowl appeal – a pioneering fundraiser launched in Australia in 1949 to help the millions of refugees suffering after WWII.

The Christmas Bowl appeal was founded by the Rev Frank Byatt, who, as he surveyed the abundance of his Christmas dinner, felt the strong contrast between our abundance in Australia and the needs of others around the world.

He felt that he had to do something, so he came up with a simple idea – to place a bowl on the Christmas dinner table to: see if you can get everybody round the table to make a generous gift so that you can share your good dinner with hungry children in other lands.

"This simple act resonated with so many, as it still does today. Sharing a meal with family and friends at Christmas time and taking a moment to reflect on how we can share what we have with those less fortunate than ourselves is a tradition that everyone can relate to," said Hannah.

The very first Christmas Bowl raised £1,808 – no small sum for a congregation at that time. Up to today, churches have raised more than \$100 million through the

Christmas Bowl. This illustrates the incredible impact that Australian churches can have when they work together.

"Today, 70 years since the first Christmas Bowl appeal, we are facing the biggest refugee crisis since WWII with more than 70 million people uprooted from their homes because of conflict and disaster. The call to love thy neighbour has never been more poignant," said Hannah.

"Most of us take it for granted that Christmas will bring good food, good friends, family and festivities. Our shopping centres are festooned with Christmas decorations, Christmas music plays and the shops are piled high with presents ready to be bought," said Dr Joe Goodall,

moderator of the Congregational Federation of Australia and New Zealand.

"Yet overseas over 65 million people are forced to flee their homes to escape conflict and disaster: more than any time since World War II. Families have lost everything. They struggle to feed their children, watch them die for want of medical care and as for a future – rebuilding their lives, education – it is too distant to even contemplate.

"These are the people aided by Act for Peace and the Christmas Bowl Appeal," he said.
